Expensive sulfa drugs and penicillin, ineffective against viruses, are wasted in treating the virus infections of colds and their medical opinion no wholds that a moderate fever is helpful in overcoming infections.

Cathartics are unnecessary, ex hausting and often harmful, Dr. Reimann says, Mild sweating "can do no harm" but is neither a pre-ventive nor a cure. Gargles, sprayand swabs involve use of antiseptics which cause irritation and may spread the infection they are sup posed to quell. Claims that vaccines will cure infections of the re spiratory tract a r e "obvious frauds" because none of the in-fection-causing viruses has been identified.

Coughing, an "unscrupulously ex ploited' 'human discomfort, actu ally serves a useful purpose, Dr. Reimann states, and should not be checked unless unduly harassing Codeine and similar narcotics con tained in cough medicines are po tential habit-forming drugs. If us ed at all, they should be prescribed apart from a cough mix ture so that the physician car control the dose.

To lessen a cold's discomfort and to minimize the danger o f complications, the patient should rest. If a fever is present, he should go to bed. Preventive measures include avoldance of sudder chilling, drafts, dust and fatigue.



HOW TO PRESERVE

QUALITY IN EGGS

U. S. poultry raisers are be coming increasingly aware of the importance of 'quality' in the bus-iness of producing and marketing eggs. In many market places, the poultry man gets a premium for fresh high-grade eggs. Thus, it's worth his time to pay some tention to the care his market eggs receive before they are sold

What can be done, you ask, to preserve the quality of eggs, be-tween the time they are hatched and the day they are taken to market? There are quite a numb-er of things that enter into the preservation of egg quality. Such factors as proper storape a n d cleanliness, fir instance, have a real bearing on how eggs a r

Here are some pointers to re member about egg handling, sug-gestions which may help you earn extra egg money.

1. Collect eggs often, three times per day if possible. The quality of eggs deteriorates rapidly if they are left in a warm laying house too long.

2. Be sure that the nesting material is clean and deep.

3. Do not allow birds to roos in nests at night-dirty eggs re

 Store eggs in a cool, mois place. Storage temperature should be 45 to 55 degrees.

6. Use wire baskets for egg gathering and cooling. Dont' pack eggs in boxes or cases until they have cooled.

. Clean dirty eggs with steel

8. Pack eggs, big end up.

9. Line the cases with news

10. Before taking them to market, candle all eggs for poor shells, cracks and meat spots, separating them according to ex-





Report On Europe

By GEORGE MAHON
This is about Greece, written
from London while I am awaiting a ship for New York. Our
Committee on Foreign Aid has
recently reutrned from a week in
Greece.

Moreover the people depend principally on agriculture for a living as there is practically no industry. The an nual rainfall is about the same as West Texas.

We first went to Athens and then to Macedonia in northern Greece where much of the guerr illa warfare is being carried on. In company with Greek soldiers and officials, we went as far north as the Bulgarian and Yugoslav borders. In this part of Greece I saw scores of farms which would normally be planted to wheat ly-ing idle because the people had fled from their farms and villages as a result of the terrorization program of the so-called bandits and guerrillas. It is estimated that 250,000 have fled from their homes because of the guerrilla menace, and they are living in menace, and they are living in the cities under unspeakable con-ditions. There are about 16,000 of these bandits in widely separated areas who hide out in the mountins and conduct sporadic raids pon the villages.

Some of the bandits are accept ing the offer of the Greek Government to surrender on a pro-mise of no punishment. I talked to a number of these surrendered bandits in different localities. And most of them were quite young. Their stories and everything I beard in Greece confirmed the eard in Greece confirmed the harge that the bandits are being

charge that the bandits are being inspired and supported by the Communists across the Greek borders to the north.

The primary need in Greece is employment and freedom from the reign of terror of th bandits. Governor Griswold and his staff are actively pressing for action in the American aid program but their job is difficult and success is not assured. The Greek Government has been reorganized under Prime Minister Sophoulis, age 86, but the Government is still weak and the Greek army at present is doing a poor job of suppressing the bandits and restoring order. I found no one who thought American troops should take over this task. Such a policy in my opinion is not



Be Patient About Your Baby's Growth

IF YOU'RE concerned about how your baby is growing, just give him the best possible care and be patient, advises Beulah France in an article in Capper's Farmer, one of the leading farm magazines. He will develop only as rapidly as nature intends.

ture intends.

"How fast your baby grows depends on 2 things," she writes in the magazine read by 1,300,000 farm families. "One is heredity-traits he inherited from both sides of the family. The other is environment—baby's surroundings—which include the food he eats and the treatment he receives."

In the early months, once a week is often enough to weigh your baby, she says. Later, once a month will be sufficient. Baby usually doubles his birth weight in 6 months. At one year he should weigh about 3 times his birth weight.

Your baby may begin to sit alone for a moment or two at a time when he is 7 months old. But he must not be propped and left that way. He will sit without support

and walk alone when his bones, nerves and muscles are ready for the effort. Between 12 and 18 months he will try to walk. By a year and a half he may be toddling. Between the ages of 2 and 3 he'll become an accomplished walker.

Some bables repeat a word or two as early as 10 months. But they generally don't know what they are saying. By a year, your child may call several things by name, including his father and mother. But do not expect a child to use phrases before he is 18 months old. Even bables of 2 years may not speak clearly.

"Don't use baby talk with your child," Miss France cautions. "Speak slowly, correctly, as you want him to speak when he grows up. It's unfair to teach a child a language he must later discard."







To Re-Size Rugs

Machine-made pile rugs often lose shape or wrinkle and curl because the sizing on the back is worn off. Stretch the rug face side down, tight and smooth on some flat surface where it can remain until dry. Tack firmly. Make the size solution: Dissolve ½ pound flake glue and ½ gallon water in double boiler. Sprinkle or paint lightly on back of rug. Allow to dry 24 hours. Take care not to put so much glue on that it soaks through to the right side.

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
