**FALLACY OF THE ROAD**

Statistics are often dull but there is one traffic statistic that intrigues us. Stated simply it is: In 82 per cent of all fatal traffic accidents, one or more driver violations are reported.

In almost any issue of any paper you are likely to find an "accident" story. It might read something like this: "Two men were killed and another seriously injured in a two-car collision just south of the intersection of such-and-such highway last night . . ."

You read through looking for familiar names and then go to another story without further thought. These "accident" stories have become a standard part of the newspaper not unlike the financial pages, comic strips and sports results.

If you do give it a second thought, or if a friend is involved in a mishap, you feel helpless and humble as you wonder what unusual quirks of fate created the conditions which led to the "accident."

Perhaps you are wondering why the word "accidents" has been in quotation marks here. It's because the word is a misnomer for the terrifying smashes and collisions that occur every day on the highways.

Remember the statistic—in more than four out of five fatal traffic accidents a driver violation was reported. How many of these crashes would have occurred had there been no violations committed? No one can know. But one can certainly say that the number would have been far less than it is.

A fatalistic attitude about traffic accidents only serves to complicate the traffic problem. The Texas Safety Association and National Safety Council have been hammering at this fallacy for years. "Accidents do not happen," they say, "they are caused."

We suspect that the "what will happen, will happen" attitude is really a rationalization by selfish and lazy people—lazy physically, intellectually and morally. It is easier to say "no one can prevent an accident if it is going to happen," and thus justify all unsafe and illegal driving practices, than it is to bend every effort to prevent accidents.

Throughout our land religious and civic forces are organizing a "moral mobilization" for traffic safety. Its aim is to make the Bible as much a guide for motorists as the driver's rule book.

Unless the moral and intellectual climate of the road is strengthened we will go on wantonly killing innocents and kidding ourselves that we are without blame.

**SEPARATE VETO**

President Eisenhower's letter to Speaker Rayburn on possible budget cuts makes one suggestion which would save the taxpayer much money, not merely now but in future years. He asks Congress to give him authority to veto separate items in appropriation bills.

Now the president has to take the whole bill, even if it is crammed full of items which he thinks extravagant and unnecessary. The only alternative is to veto the whole bill, thereby running the risk of stopping the work of an entire department until Congress passes a bill to his satisfaction.

The permission that Mr. Eisenhower seeks would enable him to weed out undesirable expenditures. Many states give their governors corresponding power. And the Constitution of the Confederacy, drawn up by statesmen with long experience in the working of our own government, gave the president this privilege.

Sometimes, too, an obnoxious clause having nothing to do with appropriations is tacked on to a money bill because only in this way could it hope to escape a veto. The proposed statute would prevent this.

Congress should grant the President's request. But a lot of pressure from the taxpayers will have to be brought to bear first.

**HEAD-COUNTING COSTS**

New York City is taking a special census in the hope of getting a larger percentage of state aid funds. The job is being done by 10,000 enumerators.

It may be a bit surprising to see the great metropolis working to get extra cash by counting heads. But the census itself is an excellent illustration of the kind of needs that make extra cash so desirable.

In the first U. S. census, back in 1790, enumerators were paid a dollar for every 150 persons listed in country areas and a dollar for every 300 listed in town. That compares with the six cents per head—or \$18 per 300—enumerators are receiving in the present census.

Officials in Washington are urged to become "cost conscious." About time, considering how many taxpayers seem on the verge of being cost unconscious.

"Now in the morning as he returned to the city, he hungered. And when he saw a fig tree in the way, he came to it, and found nothing thereon." Matt. 21:18-19.

The Miracle of the barren fig tree gives an object lesson as to what Christ does with all useless things. In many other ways we find Christ's attitude toward useless things as recorded in the New Testament. Note some of these: "If the salt have lost its savor it is henceforth good for nothing but to be cast out and to be trodden under foot of men." We find that the unprofitable servant lost his place as a servant. The man who did not use his talent lost it. There is a spiritual law of life. Useless

things wither away.

This is true of institutions. When Christ comes up to some benevolent institution in society seeking fruit, if he does not find it, he causes it to wither away. This is the reason that many times we see large buildings, but the institution within is dead. It died the death of uselessness.

I am sure that Christ comes up to many institutions of government and finds that they are fruitless. It is possible that it is founded upon sound principles, but it is dead anyway.

I wonder how often the Lord comes to churches and finds them fruitless? Some of them name the name of Christ, and pretend to carry out the commission of Christ, but they are not bearing fruit. A church can have a beautiful building, and a strong program, but if they are not bearing fruit, the Lord will bring them down low. Why should a fruitless church cumber the ground?

This is true of individuals. There is a law which seems to indicate that those who use talents get power to gain more talents. If a person will work at the job now it will be good training for a larger job later on. The person who is faithful over a few things will one day have the doors to larger opportunities opened to him.

While there is a desire to do more, and a willingness to do what

we are able to do now, the Lord will continue to bless us. As long as there is one drop of sap in the bruised reed Christ will not break it. One of the tragedies of the day is the large number of folk who think about what they could do, or would do if they had the opportunities of another. Oh, that we might be found faithful now. Present barrenness and fruitlessness, is always disappointing to Christ as well as destructive to ourselves.

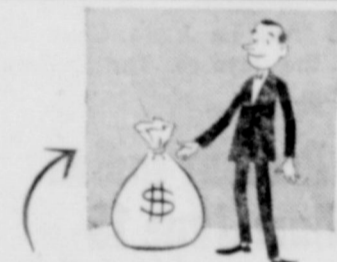

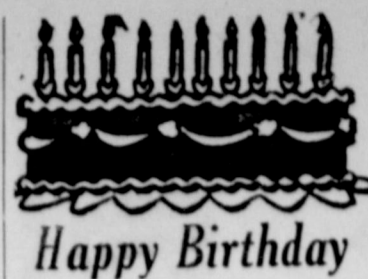

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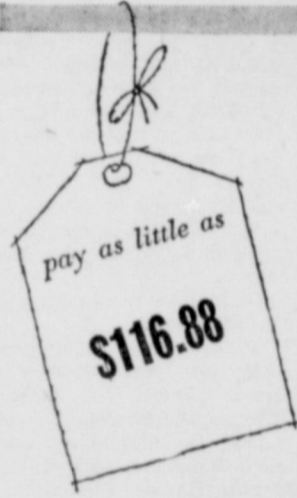

**Sharp Dip in Layer Hatch Means Year End Production Will Trail 1956, USDA Says**

(By Special Correspondent)

WASHINGTON—The die is cast. At last, U. S. egg producers are heading into a period of reduced production and higher egg prices.

Even if a sudden spurt in chick orders should accelerate late-season hatchings of laying flock replacement chicks, there will be fewer pullets in the nation's October-November-December laying flock this year than last.

Hatchings to date have been so severely cut that this result seems assured, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Moreover, USDA says flatly, egg production in the final quarter of 1957 "will be smaller" than in the same quarter of 1956—even if more hens are retained, or if the rate of lay per bird increases, as expected.

After late summer, the Department foresees egg prices higher than their year-earlier counterparts.

Egg prices last year reflected the pressure of successive months of record-shattering production from July onwards. U. S. average egg prices received by farmers in the last half of 1956: July, 36.5 cents per dozen; August, 36.9 cents; September, 38.6 cents; October, 38.1 cents; November, 37.2 cents, and December, 37.1 cents per dozen.

During the first three months of 1957 farmers' egg prices have averaged about 10 cents per dozen below those prevailing a year earlier. Producers received an average of 33.2 cents per dozen on Jan. 15, 1957, compared with 46.6 cents a year earlier; 32.8 cents in February, compared with 40.2 cents a year earlier, and 30.6 cents in March, compared with 39.6 cents a year earlier.

Here is USDA's latest summary of the demand and price situation for eggs:

"Hatchery output of laying flock replacement chicks through March was 24 per cent below last year, and on Apr. 1 the number of eggs in incubators was 18 per cent below the corresponding 1956 date.

"These reductions are sharp enough so that they are unlikely to be offset by any increases later in the hatching season and the laying flock in the last three months of the year will include fewer pullets than in 1956. (In 1956, more than 60 per cent of the year's replacement chicks were hatched before the end of April.)

"Egg production in the last quarter of the year will be smaller than in 1956, even if more hens are retained or if the expected increase in rate of lay per bird occurs. Egg prices are likely to be above a year earlier after late summer." DeKalb pullets—16 weeks old—

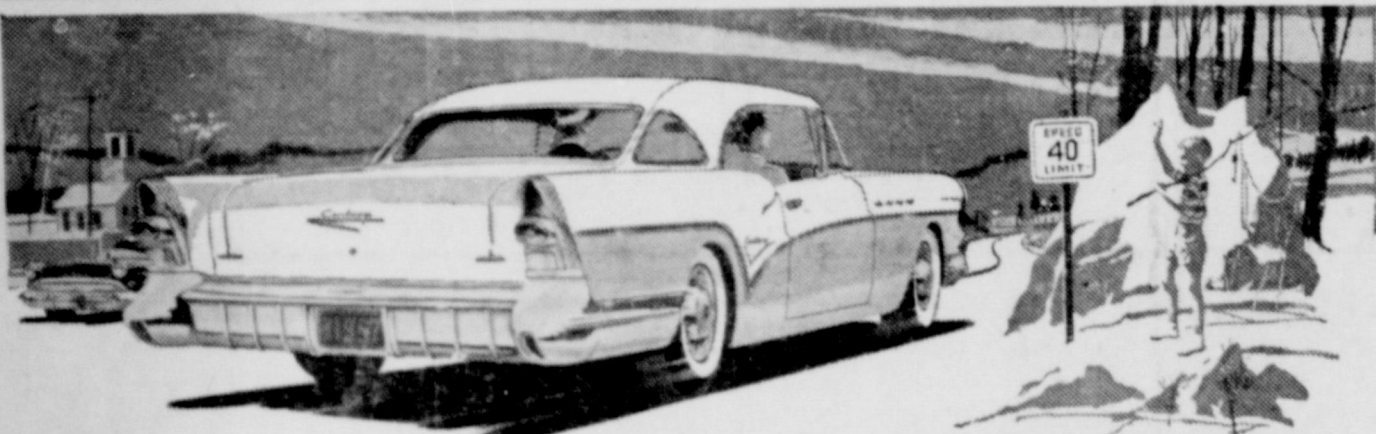

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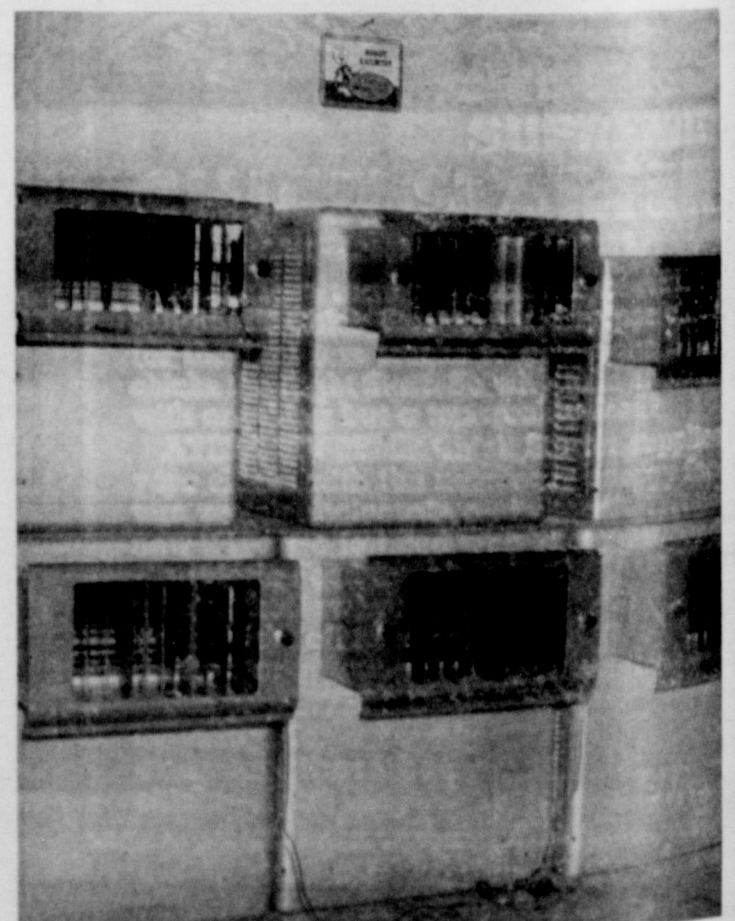

FORT BLISS, TEX.—Army Pvt. Dick W. McKaughan, 22, son of E. W. McKaughan, Route 2, Slaton, Tex., recently completed a course in the operation and maintenance of radar equipment at Fort Bliss. McKaughan, a 1953 graduate of Slaton High School, entered the Army last December and completed basic training at Fort Bliss.

The 120-day pay period for members of the 55th Legislature ended Tuesday.

All the extra time necessary to complete some of the important decisions left over will be contributed at the expense of the lawmakers of both houses.

Statistics compiled by the Legislative Budget Board in its study of the necessity for annual sessions of the Legislature reveal the 48th Legislature meeting in 1943 was the last regular session to conclude its work on a 120-day period. At that time, the legislators received \$10 for the first 120 days and \$5 thereafter until adjournment. The 51st Legislature, meeting from Jan. 11 to July 6, 1949, holds the record for length of session, 177 days.

The constitutional amendment adopted in 1954 raising the per diem to \$25 for 120 days, with no pay after that period, applied to the 54th Legislature, the last regular session under Gov. Shivers. This was a 148-day session, running from Jan. 11 to June 7.

Average number of legislative days per biennium, however, from 1931 through 1954, which includes 16 special sessions, is 180.7 days. Fourteen of the special sessions were in the 10-year period from 1932 through 1942, and for that period the biennium average of legislative days was 205.5. Since 1942 there have been two special sessions, one in the 1949-50 biennium and the last in the 1953-54 biennium. For the period of 1943 through 1954 the average number of legislative days per biennium has been 156.
