Mr. Sadler had three new Nash tourings and 1 new Nash roadster in the building, two of these cars being covered with insurance. He also had five second-hand cars in the building which were not insured, according to a statement made by one of the garage men. Kendrick had one secondhand car with no insurance. A car belonging to Bob Webb, of the Slaton Cotton Oil Mill, was stored in the building and was damaged by the fire.

The damage to the building was not so great but that with repairs it will be usuable again, according to advices.
