

MODEL A FORD GIVEN FOREIGN TESTING

An official test of the Model A Ford motor in Switzerland, with the Alps as the proving ground, has demonstrated that the new Ford could be operated for a long, continuous period over abrupt, steep hills, without lifting the hood. Reports of the test have just been received by the Ford Motor Company.

The Ford motor was kept running for a period of six days and during virtually all of that time the car was emoute over the Alpine passes, a reief taking over the operation while the driver rested. Day and night the test continued. No attempt was made for distance or speed, the sale object being to determine the reliability and power of the automobile.

The fact that the trip was made when roads and climate conditions in the mountains were bad is cited as further evidence of the stability of the Ford car. A strictly standard Model A Ford withTudor body was used. Zurich was the starting point. The hood of the car was sealed officially by a representative of the townthip. Crewless trains of 33 cars, without a human being on board, are operated under the streets of London to speed the mails from collection boxes to delivery points in the city.

About 23,000 bags of mail are carried daily by these electrically operated and electrically controlled underground lines. Dispatchers, at the various subterranean stations, guide the cars by throwing switches, and automatic safety cut-outs prevent collisions.
