While it is natural instinct for a child to be restless and to resist the control of its movements and actions either by subtifuge or by open defiance, this soon disappears under the influence of a good church, for not only does a child receive the primary education that a child can grasp concerning religion but it also learns how to associate with other children in the proper way.

While church life is not the only important influence in a child's life it is the most important one to get the child started off on the right track.

The future of our nation, our state and our town depends upon the children we are raising now and never has the time for proper influence among our young people been more important. Regardless of the age of your children it is your duty as a parent to see to it that they attend church regularly and to set a good example by attending yourself. Among other things let us all work together to make Slaton a God Fearing town.

lessons. The "Pilates System" is revolu-tionary in that it is so simple. Mr. Pilates doesn't believe in elaborate exercises and apparatus for the pur-poses of body building. His theory, as related to Kenneth Wilson for the February Cosmopolitan, is that any-one under eighty can have a young body by making a habit of posture and breathing. Actually, there are few exercises that Mr. Pilates rec-ommends; the routine can be ab-sorbed in such natural forms as brushing one's hair in certain ways, using a scrubbing brush when tak-ing a shower, relaxing before going to sleep. The hair brushing business, for

to sleep. The hair brushing business, for example is as simple as this: take your comb in one hand, brush in the other. Stand up straight and raise the elbows shoulder-high. Then with alternate strokes, moving only the forearms, brush-and-comb the hair from front to back ten times, start-ing from the left side of the head and working over to the right. Then repeat, until finally you have worked up to one hundred strokes. Hold your head straight and don't move it. Move only your forearms. "And one word of warning." says

"And one word of warning," says Mr. Pilates, "the important thing is to be regular about exercising. Reg-ularity is the price you must pay if you want a really youthful body. Why not make it a 1941's New Year resolution to get down on all fours (palms on the floor and don't bend the knees) before summer?"
