### Our Weekly Sermon—

#### The Unfinished Task

By Rev. Clarence H. Benson, Director of Christian Education Course Moody Bible Institute of Chicago

Text This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come.

Matthew 24:14

1. The Fact "This gospel of the kingdom." The Bible is not a supposition or a speculation, but a revelation of facts. The Scripture cannot be broken, because its contents are a series of verified facts. The apostles were threatened, persecuted, and martyred, yet they persisted that they were but speaking the things which they had seen and heard. Luke says that he wrote nothing except what was delivered unto him by eyewitnesses. He insists that his gospel was built upon many infallible proofs. Peter substantiates his mission and his ministry in his dying message and his ministry in his sage: "We have not followed cunningly devised fables, when we made unto you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but were eyewitnesses of his majesty."

2. The Field. No person can be a follower of Jesus Christ until he recognizes the world as the field of his religion. He must think and talk and act in world terms. He must overcome racial prejudice and exclusive selfishness. Christ thought and talked of the world. Paul recognized that the world was his field, and extended his business into the remotest corners of the earth.

3. The Force "This gospel shall be preached for a witness," Mark says. "The gospel must first be published among all nations." Christ said, "Ye shall be witnesses also the uttermost parts of the earth." The force is the factor that conveys the good tidings. It is, at least should be, the church. What sort of a force is your church? What sort of a force are you as an individual Christian? What sort of witnesses are you proving to be to the uttermost parts of the earth?

4. The Finish. Today you and I stand looking upon "The task the centuries might have done. Now crowded in the hour of setting sun." What we need, what the world needs today, is to be reminded that there is an end at hand, and that it may be at our very doors. Never since the days of the apostles has the world had better facilities of transportation and communication. Never before have so many Bibles been printed. Never before have such efforts been put forth. It is not presumptuous for us to believe

that the unfinished task may be accomplished in our day. What an opportunity! What a responsibility! Where will the end find you and me?

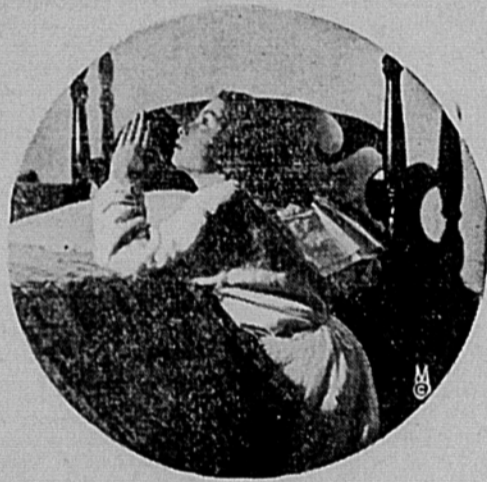

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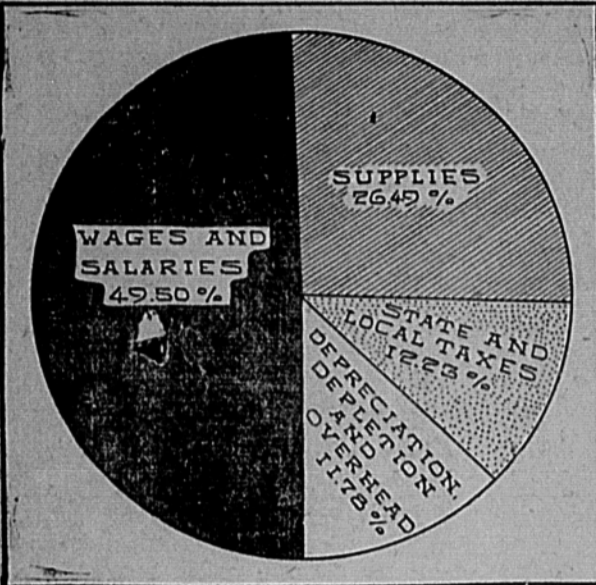

## Workers Get Half of Texas Oil Cost Dollar



Dallas—Texas workers receive half of the money spent in the production of Texas oil, according to a booklet just issued by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association. The booklet, entitled "Important Facts About Texas Oil," is now being distributed by the association from its headquarters in the Continental Building here.

Wages and salaries to Texas oil production workers amount to 49½ per cent of the net cost of producing the average barrel of oil in Texas, the booklet shows. One-eighth of the net cost dollar goes to Texas tax-collectors for State and local taxes. Supplies cost about 26½ per cent, while depreciation, depletion, overhead and Federal taxes make up the remaining 11 per cent.

To this net cost must be added an extra one-eighth of the price of the oil which is paid as royalty to the Texas farmer or rancher who owns the land on which the oil is produced.

Texas petroleum workers and Texas farmers together receive \$400,000,000 a year in wages and salaries and lease and royalty payments from the Texas petroleum industry, the book shows. Of this huge sum, the workers get \$272,000,000 annually and the farmers and other land-owners \$128,000,000. The \$400,000,000 paid these two

group of Texans is four-fifths of the total value of all crude oil produced in Texas. Texas tax-collectors get from the petroleum industry an additional \$75,000,000 a year.

These huge sums are spent and respent in Texas to benefit every Texan, the book points out.

"Fortunately for Texas and its people," it states, "the development of this great natural resource has not only revealed the existence of underground supplies of oil and gas to last for many years, but also has created a permanent home industry which directly provides living for one-sixth of the State's population. Directly or indirectly, practically everyone living in Texas today shares in the distribution and redistribution of money created by this one industry. Every Texan has a stake in the future of this business."

### NEW ASSIGNMENTS OF NYA YOUTH FOR DUNCAN FIELD PROJECT SCHEDULED

Assignment of a new group of one hundred youth to the NYA airmechanics resident center near the Duncan Field Air Depot, San Antonio, will be made beginning March 2, J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator, said today.

Assignment to the center is for a six-months' period, during which time the youth work 44 hours weekly in the division of the Duncan Field airplane mechanics shop for which it is felt they are best fitted.

Unemployed, out-of-school youth eligible for NYA employment will be selected on the basis of general all-around qualifications and mechanical ability. Youth desiring to make application should write to the NYA State Office, Austin, or to local NYA area director.

No flying instruction is offered the youth on the project.

In addition to the work experience gained in the repair, construction and maintenance of airplanes and airplane engines, the youth attend classes 12 hours weekly after regular rours. These classes are taught by teachers furnished by after regular hours. These classes and the Trade and Industrial Division of the State Department of Education.

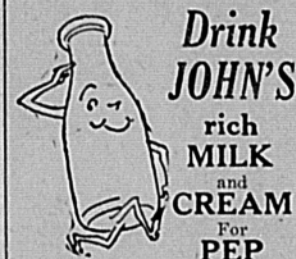

This Oklahoma lady was summoned into court for over-time parking. When asked why she had been guilty of over parking, she replied, "Judge, I was in a department store trying on corsets and the zipper got hung." Needless to say her alibi worked, if the zipper didn't.

A lady way up in Maine was stopped by a state trooper at Bucksport and was asked why she didn't slow up at the flashing signal. She was extremely nervous and started to cry, but managed to answer, "I thought it was a lightning bug."

But ladies are not the only alibers. Here are some alibis actually given by men drivers. "I was speeding because I was going to be late to a Safety Meeting." "I was hurrying to my church to preach a sermon on safety." "There wasn't any sign saying I couldn't park in front of the hydrant."

Fellows, there is no alibi for brainless driving. Safety is our job; We either do that job well or we have accidents that we pay for in one way or another.

"Not One In '41"

Let us make that our motto and keep it all the year through. Practically all accidents are avoidable. Night Driving presents many hazards this time of year.

1. The pedestrian is a real hazard at night. Over half of all pedestrian deaths occur between 6 p. m. and midnight. Accidents to pedestrians account for 72½ of all night accidents. Keep your eyes on the road.

2. Fatigue is more common at night. Get plenty of sleep during your off hours, when your regular run is at night. Don't go on the road when you are not in first class physical condition. The laws about hours are for your protection and for the protection of the public. Observe them.

3. A dirty windshield is a real hazard at night. Keep it clean.

4. Watch your tail lights and sidelights. Keep them shining.

5. Intoxication of both drivers and pedestrians is much more common at night. You have to drive and think for such incapacitated irresponsible occupants of the same highway you are traveling.

Use extra care during these winter nights when on the highways. Don't speed at night. Be sure you can stop within the space your headlights cover.

"Not an Accident in '41"—Make it your motto.

R. Simons of New York.

A standard driver's license law, properly enforced in Texas can do what similar laws have done in other states—reduce accidents, injuries and save lives.

### New Kind Of Grass Would Grow Here

In a bulletin sent out from A&M college describing St. Augustine grass for lawns the college states that this grass will thrive in climates where the temperature goes below zero in the winter.

It makes an unusually attractive lawn and would probably do well on lawns in Slaton. Full information concerning this grass can be obtained from A&M college.

St. Augustine grass is establishing its suitability for lawn-making in southwest Texas, but, cautions R. R. Lancaster, Extension Service pasture specialist for Texas A&M college, such a lawn can be had only by planting pieces of sod. Seed of St. Augustine grass is not available.

The usual practice of plowing manure into the soil preparatory to setting out cuttings of the grass, Lancaster explains, seems to be inadvisable in that it makes conditions favorable for the growth of a fungus disease known as brown patch. It would be better to apply appropriate commercial fertilizer and turn this under before planting. Pieces of the sod should be planted about two feet apart in rows spaced about three feet.

As the grass grows rapidly it is advisable to apply light applications of some nitrate fertilizer every three or four months and to water the lawn immediately afterward to prevent the fertilizer burning the leaves.

St. Augustine grass for many years has been established on lawns in the Rio Grande Valley and more recently is replacing Bermuda as a lawn grass at Houston. The specialists says its northern limits have not been definitely established, but it has survived zero temperature. Seeming it has no equal in enduring shade. It also grows well in sunlight and seems adapted to any soil type from sand, sandy loam to clays to blackland, provided the soil is fertile. St. Augustine remains green after frosts that kill Bermuda above the ground and

endures summer drought better. St. Augustine is commonly mistaken for carpet grass, but the two are readily recognized when the seed stalks or flowering heads are present.

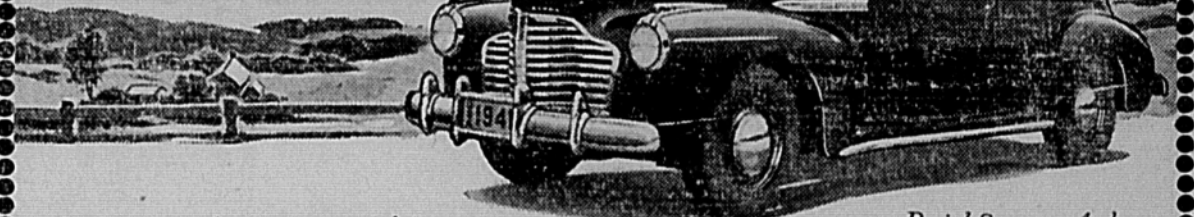
