

parcels for men in the service in Alaska or in foreign countries will now be accepted for delivery until Nov. 1st however those parcels mailed at early dates will be more likely to reach their destination in time for Christmas than the later ones. Each parcel should be marked "Christmas Parcel".

Regulations on parcels for shipment to points in Alaska and those outside the United States are 11 lbs. limit in weight, 18 inches in

## Texas Lemons **Prove Popular**

This year for the first time, Tex. es a factor in the lemon market of the nation, with the in-troduction of Texsun Meyer Lemons. The deal started in a very small way when first shipment was made on August 18. Dependent on weather conditions, peak movement should be about September 15 to 25. The history of the Meyer Lemon


