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CHICK CHATS

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SEPARATE PULLETS AND MALES EARLY

When chicks are 5 to 6 weeks old, or whenever you can easily distinguish the cockerels, it is time to separate the sexes. Remove the male birds and place them in a separate en-closure, finishing them off as broilers. Retain only those cockerels needed for breeding purposes.

Removal of the males gives pullets additional room and eliminates crowding at the feed troughs. They will do better as a result, and the poultry raiser realizes a saving in feed costs.

Keep in your focks of me-dium and heavy breeds only one male to every 15 females For Leghorns and other light breeds the ratio should be about one rooster to every 20

Retain Good Breeders Keep the best cockerels for breeding stock. To pick the best males, here are some rules to follow

1. High quality chicks are the cheapest in the long run. If you haven't already purchased your chicks, plan to get the best available at your hatchery.

2. Look for good feathering. Mark all chicks which have long pin feathers in their wings at hatching time or tail feathers at 10 days of age. Keep for later selection the largest cockerels at 8 to

12 weeks of age.

Retain all cockerels that are free of standard disqualifications and have no body deformities. Look for points on the sides of the comb and feathers on shanks, toes and between the toes. Get rid of any of these disqualifications. Eliminate the runts and slowfeathering birds.

When your pullet flock be-gins laying, do not house males and females together until the production of hatchings eggs is started. It is best to produce market eggs which are infertile.

DOG TRAINING CLASSES TO FIGHT DELINQUENCY

Dog ownership "as a splendid means" of building character in young people and of fighting the rising tide of juvenile delinquency, is being urged by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City Sociologists have long recognized the challenge of continuing responsibility as a valuable factor in molding character. Dog ownership provides such responsibility to an ideal degree, the Center states. Looking after a dog's daily requirements, taking him out, feeding and caring for him, giving him needed attention when he is not well, and sharing with him innumerable experiences of a varied sort are invaluable aids that lead to a desirable maturity. Young people having a dog in their care are not likely to have the time or inclination to run the streets, engage in petty thievery or after-school fights, or other forms of juvenile gang terrorism.

Soviets Planning Third War Former Red Official States

Soviet Russia intends to fight a third world war in order to achieve world domination, in the opinion of Igor Gouzenko, former cipher clerk in the Russian Embassy in Ottawa, whose disclosures of Red espionage in the western democracies shocked the world.

Just recently the Canadian Parliament passed a bill which gives Gouzenko a constant guard for life as a result of his exposure of the Red espionage network. Since his disclosures he and his family have been guarded twenty-four hours a day by Royal Mounted Police.

"From my experience in the Red army intelligence service, I sincere-iy believe that the leaders of the Soviet Union are bent on world conquest," Gouzenko declares in an article which he wrote for the May issue of Cosmopolitan magazine.

"There is no question in my mind about the Soviet government's intention to fight a third world war. It may not come for many years but unless there is a drastic and fundamental change in the thinking of the Politure, the small council of Communist leaders whe guide Soviet policy, it will come Every Soviet move is pointing toward it. Every Soviet citizen in the foreign diplomatic service expects it. The ones who are not devout Communists—and there are many such Russians—fear it and hope that it can be avoided. The others look forward to it quite naturally as a process in the development of the human race that cannot be avoided. They feel that a completely Communistic world is inevitable."

Intensified activity of the Com-intern and increased Communist activity among the democratic nations of the world are two of the

tions of the world are two of the reasons given by Gouzenko for his belief that Russia is planning a third war to conquer the world.

"First of all there is the increased activity of the Comintern, or the Communist International, that branch of the Soviet government which supports Communistic action in foreign countries for the purpose of setting the stage for a world revolution against capitalism," Gouzenko declares. "Although Stalin announced during the war the abolition of the Comintern, every Russian knows that it was never abolished. If anything, it was expanded.

never abolished. If anything, it was expanded.
"And there is the increased use of the Communist parties in such countries as the United States, Canada, Great Britain, France, China, Australia, and the South American republics as Soviet fifth columns.

American republics as Soviet firm columns.
"Soviet espionage networks abroad are also establishing close liaison with the diplomatic representatives of nations that are now within the Soviet sphere of influence in Europe, such as Austria, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia."
