

# Local Highways To Get \$30,600 For Surface Repairing

In a recent meeting of the Tex

In a recent meeting of the Tex-as Highway Commission, a resolu-tion was passed calling for high-way surface improvement around the Slaton area which will amount to an estimated \$30,660 in costs. On Highway 84 from Slaton to the Lynn County line, 3.1 miles will receive seal coating costing \$2,800; on Highway FM 41 from US 87 to 5.0 miles west of Sla-ton, 6.8 miles will receive seal coating costing \$5,600; on High-way FM 400 from US 62 to Hale County line 11.3 miles will be seal coated costing \$10,300; and on Highway FM 41 from Hockley County line to US 87, 14.6 miles will also receive the seal coating costing \$11,900. The entire program, including the above work to be done in Lubbock County, calls for almost 3000 miles of betterment projects at a cost of \$5,890,000, One hun-dred and sixty-eight counties have projects on the program.




# Former POW's Can **Collect Benefits**





**Given Road Test** 

Continental Oil Company today revealed devleopment of a new motor oil-the result of eight years' laboratory research, two winters of testing in Montana and Colorado, and a 50,000-mile road test in temperatures ranging up to 110 degres, according to K. R. Dunlap, local agent for Contin-ental.

to 110 degres, according to K. R. Dunlap, local agent for Contin-ental. The new oil, according to Mr. Dunlap, marks another advance in methods pioneered and developed by Continental to use additives in mineral oils to decrease wear and assure longer life for engines. The spectacular road test made on the Mexican border in the sum-mer of 1949 showed the oil "prac-ticaly stops wear before it starts." Mr. Dunlap reported. "In fact, in measurement with highly sensiti-ve instruments, wear averageless than one-thousandth of an inch on cylinders and crankshafts. Origin-al factory machining marks wert still visible en piston rings." In the To-day road test, six cars and four trucks piled up a combined half-million miles at an average speed of 60 miles an hour by cars and 50 by the trucks. Trav-eling 800 miles a day, six days a week, each car rolled up a mini-mum of 50,000 miles in the test. This distance equals five years' mileage for the average famly car.

mileage for the test was certi-fied by Norman Penfold of the Southwest Research Institute. Pen-fold is acknowledged as an out-standing independent authority on oil testing.
