SLATON IS BEST PAVED TOWN FOR ITS SIZE IN WEST TEXAS Vardy Announces Two Involved In

Doors Open Sept. 4

Preliminary instructions for school enrollment procedure were issued today by school superintendent Lee Vardy. The procedure will be about the same as it was last year, but a few changes have been made.

The public schools will open their doors Monday, September 4, at 9:00 in the morning. High school students will report to their classes on that day if they registered last May. If the student is new in Slaton High School this year, or if he for some reason did not register in May, he will register on September 4 instead of reporting to classes. Students are requested to bring their book cards with them when they report to school.

Blood Sucker

Another destructive insect frequently an inhabitant of the poultry premises is the mosquito. The mosquito is a blood sucker and attacks the head of the bird. It may carry the infection of dry pox from an infected bird to a noninfected bird and is the kind of disease carrier known and referred to as a "carrier host." The mosquito begins its life cycle in water puddles, drains, and other places where water stands.

The eradication of the fly and mosquito is mainly a problem of control. Clean all manure and filth where the fly can breed. Also remove old litter and manure away from the poultry raising area. Put it in a cultivated field where birds cannot range over it after it has been scattered. In addition, it's a second policy to disinfect the areas from which manure and litter have been removed.







Mammoth Crop Foreseen!

Unless some unforseen difficulties arise this section bids fair to yield the largest cotton and grain crops that have ever been produced and at a time when it will most likely be needed as never before. However the problem of gathering the crop will likely be as great as was the problem of gathering crops in the last two years of the last war. Charley Austin, who operates two big farms in this area, says that it is probable that regardless of how high the grade of the cotton may be it is possible that many farmers will have to use machines or sled the cotton. Last years cotton crop, the largest ever experienced in this area, and probably the best per acre yield ever gathered from unfertilized fields anywhere, did not mature as rapidly as the crops will this year, the cotton will have to be gathered in a short span of time and it is likely that labor conditions will be more jammed for a short time than ever in the history of the South Plains.

What the farmers and business men can do to avoid sky rocketing labor costs and conditions that make business operations most difficult is a problem that should be given serious consideration now. Competition for workers will only bring added expense to all the farmers and in the end force many hundreds of pounds of cotton to be left in the fields to deteriorate before it is gathered or will force the farmers to use machinery to get the cotton out of the fields. Business men should prepare now to take care of a peak load of traffic and to have help able to do the work.

Who Is Going To Pay The Bonus_

Should the United States become embroiled in another world conflict that would require all of the younger men's services then what are the Senators and the President going to do when it comes time to issue more war bonuses and pay the veterans after such a war ends?

Within a few years there will be few people left who have not served in at least one of the last two wars and with another war nearly all of the able bodied men will have served at least once and some of them for the second time. When the bonus business, big ballahoo and so forth starts again the men who get the money will be the ones who will have to pay it and so it will be like a lot of the stuff the Government is doing today only there will be more of it.

It is very confusing to consider the fact that the Government is spending millions on developing ways to improve the preduction of cotton, corn, onions, and what have you, and at the same time is putting controls of how much of these things the farmer is allowed to reise. Just how much useless bookkeeping, bonus to farmers, to industry and to the armed froces this nation can stand must be limitless for it has pyramided time after time and we are so confused now that no one knows what is going on, and probably the folks who are guiding these activities know less than any of us.

We all need to get closer together, save more and simplify things more than ever in the history of our nation and it could be done especially with a good example from the men who are guiding our destinies from Washington.

Are Russians Operating Tanks In Korea?

For security reasons it may be necessary, for those who are in position to know, to keep many military facts from the American public but there are some things that make it appear that the military or the diplomatic big guns must think that the average citizen has very little intelligence.

There have been a few hims that a few Russian military advisors are in Korea telling the North Koreans how to fight but nowhere has it been said that the American soldiers and the Russian soldiers are in direct combat.

If this is not so then whose soldiers are operating the hundreds of giant tanks that have been giving our soldiers so much grief? To hold back would not be doing the Government any good as some other persons or concerns would get them that have no more right to them than people here in Slaton.

To buy such things could be considered hoarding but if the Government does not wish such things to go fast then action should be taken at once. That there is no perfect fairness in any thing is an admitted fact and in time of stress the unfalmess of distribution to those who have money becomes more apparent.





According to the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, which is cooperating with the President's Conference on Industrial Safety to emphasize the need for greater occupational safety, one farmer in every 15 is temporarily or permanently injured while plowing a field, milking a cow, riding a tractor, or doing any number of other chores.

Last year in America, more than \$300,000 farmers suffered disabling injuries on their jobs, 4,400 others weren't so lucky. They were killed by falls, machinery, animals, or other "potential hazards." —The Hockley County Herald.
