Pre - revolutionary Russia welcomed the New Year with booming cannon-a hundred shots fired at midnight.

The observance of the New Year

The observance of the New Year on January 1, according to the Gregorian calendar, was instituted by Peter the Great in 1700. The evening of December 31, known as St. Sylvester's Eve, was the time for great fun and enjoyment.

In Petrograd Clater St. Petersburg, and now Leningrad) the streets were gayly decorated with flags and lanterns, and thronged with merry-makers. After the booming cannon ushered in the New Year, the Czar formally received the good wishes of his subjects. jects.

On New Year's Day the Winter Palace was opened to society. Festivity reigned throughout the city, hospitality and charity were the watchwords from palace to cottage, at least, at New Year's time.

The mythical Ovsen was supposed to be around about this time. He was usually depicted astride a boar, symbolically associated with the pork served for New Year dinner and the symbolism of Aryan descent.



When a dog vomits, serious trouble may be ahead. But at other times such an upset may occur when there is nothing wrong with the stomach. Veterinarians say excitement, shock, pain, a bitter taste, parasites in the ear canal, or even worry can cause the upset.

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DIAGNOSE SICK BIRDS PROMPTLY One of the common faults found in the management practices of poultry raisers is the failure to recognize and treat poultry diseases before they make headway it. a flock. This is especially true in the case of the unsuccessful raiser, who often becomes disillusioned and confused when he repeatedly loses birds to disease.

In the first place, a poultryman must become a student of disease problems. Any grower who ignores the disease factor in poultry raising is certain to be handicapped in his efforts sooner or later.

The successful control of poultry diseases and parasites depends to a great extent on the prompt diagnosis of such diseases. Quick recognition of the disease enables the poultryman to curtail its spread in the flock and keep down the losses.

Observe Birds Carefully

Too often the raisers believe killing alling birds is the best policy, feeling that by eliminating sick birds they can precent further spread of the disease, Actually, however, it is best to separate sick birds from the other poultry and observe them for additional symptoms. Following observation, a post mortem examination should be performed.

If a poultryman is to make a success of his enterprise, he owes it to himself to become familiar with the symptoms of poultry diseases. All diseases have distinct symptoms, By learning to recognize these symptoms quickly and accurately, the poultry raiser often can detect diseases early and head-off discouraging outbreaks.

Disease Symptoms

Some common symptoms and thd various ailments which they frequently characterize are as follows:

General unthrifty condition—Examine birds for external parasites, such as lice, mites, ticks, etc.

Lameness— Lameness in turkeys may be due to range paralysis, bumble foot, scaly leg, rickts, fracture or bruises.

Diarrhea— This may be caused by digestive disorders, cholera, coccidiosis, fowl typhoid or worms.

Bloody droppings—These may be due to coccidiosts, enteritis, or worms.

Gasping—Gasping symptoms usually indicate disorders in the wind pipe or larynx, "Colds," coryza or roup may also be responsible for the same symptoms.
