Slaton Faces A Bad Problem!

That Slaton has a traffic problem that needs serious consideration is a self evident fact, and the answer is not available from the study of similar problems in other towns, for there are no other towns that have the same traffic problems that Slaton has.

The standard regulations that have been installed on West Lubboek and on Lynn Street have improved conditions considerably, but the changes that have been made on the west side of the square have created a problem that is far worse than it has ever been. There is seldom a minute in the day between 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. when there are not from two to four cars double parked in front of the post office.

This is not written as a criticism of the efforts of the city commissioners to improve the traffic conditions, which they have done, but the particular problem of solving the situation that Slaton has around the square is one that an Einstein might have difficulty in solving.

As space in front of the post office is the most used parking room in Slaton the accomodations should not be available to only a few people and those who drive up to mail letters or get their mail can hardly be blamed for not wanting to drive three or four blocks to park.

The arrangements, as they are, make it very dangerous for all concerned with cars backing out from both sides of the street to the center. It is either just plain good luck or because the motorists realize the danger, that some very bad accidents have not occured.

What the answer to the problem might be is something that will have to be worked out by some very clever people. It might be that a time limit and the old parking meter racket is the only thing that will solve the situation. If it is then it should be installed, but only after every other idea has been considered.

Parking meters have not solved the parking problem anywhere, to the satisfaction of any group, except the City Commissioners where the community receives a huge revenue. They do not increase the amount of parking space, but they do rotate the available space to a limited extent, Parking meters in small communities cripple the greatest advantage shoppers have ove

The business situation in this area is much better than it is in most any part of the state if visitors from other parts of the country are to be believed.

The situation where a large number of soldiers, and men in training, are congregated is most confused and the amount of money that is handled per person, is not great. The soldiers buy a great deal of food and crowd the amusement places, yet spend little money, they create a crowded condition and not only make themselves unhappy, but cause discomfort to the people in the communities where they are situated, and it might be that some military installation might be constructed in this area although there are no indications of it at the present time.

The higher valuation on property and the shortage of merchandise has caused some firms to feel that the immediate future will show less volume and higher prices than in the past but most of the business firms in this area are looking forward to an active spring and summer with many difficulties of price changes, help shortage and less goods to sell, but they do not have to have the confusion that many towns will face and the opportunity for progress, even in the fact of many obstacles, seems good.

The Way Of The Aggressor!

"After you have officially labeled the enemy an aggressor, then what?" This question, in substance, is rightly receiving a great deal of thought at United Nations headquarters, in the American State Department, and in various world capitals. If one declares a conviction without doing what he can about it, onlookers may conclude that the conviction does not run very deep. Yet, as regards Communist Chinese intervention in Korea, there is extensive doubt as to what the non-Communist world can do—apart from present resistance in Korea—to enforce its point of view without provoking broader war.

And it needs continually to be emphasized that neither war nor military victory is, for its own sake, the objective in this contest. In fact, though Red China perforce is regarded now as an enemy, the point should be conveyed by every possible means to all Chinese that the "People's Government" at Peiping need not retain that status an hour longer than it inisists on mainaining troops in Korea.

Moreover, the UN and the United States should take every practicable means to assure the Chinese people that there is no threat to the national safety of China in the purpose to permit Koreans to establish an independent, unified government through free elections in their peninsula.

There still exists provision for a Good Offices Committee of the UN to receive any communications or conduct any negotiations that may lead toward a just peace in the Far East. The functions of that committee properly have priority over any discussion of sanctions against Red China. Moves toward sanctions are to be held in obeyance any time the negotiating committee can report progress.

Thus far, however, Peiping officially does not deign to the progress of the committee of the UN to receive any communications of the progress.

Thus far, however, Peiping officially does not deign to recognize existence of the committee. Under those circumstances there is little alternative but to consider what stiffer expression may be given to world feeling about the Communist Chinese action.

According to reports, American officials are asking other nations to consider four possible steps:

1. Not a complete economic boycott of China, but a joint refusal to supply it with oil, arms, or munitions-making machinery.

2. A request that UN members which have not already recognized Communist China should withhold diplomatic

2. A request that UN members which have not al-ready recognized Communist China should withhold diplomatic

recognition.

3. Nonrecognition by the UN of any territoral changes brought about by Chinese intervention in Korea.

4. Exclusion of Communist China from any organs of the UN so long as the aggression continues.

These seem reasonable recommendations. They do not go so far as some persons would like to go. They would give Peiping propagandists a minimum of ground on which to incite their people against "western imperialists." They might have only a minor effect on the course of hostilities. Yet they would tend somewhat to make the way of the aggressor hard.



With a good pasture program, you can offer your birds a number of advantages. Besides the feeding value of a well-developed range, your birds are provided ample shade during hot weather. Young stock are also given the advantage of being isolated from old hens and turkeys. A good range, treated with lime and fertilizer to boost crop yields, will support 300 to 500 pullets per acre.

Green feed and sunshine which the range provides furnish poultry with vitamins A, D, and G in good quantities. A certain amount of protein is also supplied by this green feed.

Ask for Guidance

Perhaps there is some question in your mind as to just what crops will provide your birds with the best range land. If so, when planning your pasture program, consult your county agent or local state experiment station. These sources can give you reliable information regarding seeding and management of the range.

In selecting range land, keep in mind the importance of putting birds on clean ground. Usually it is best to use a range once every three years. This necessitates a rotation plan, but it offers birds the advantages of plenty of green food without the threat of contaminated land. Perhaps there is some question
