

Congressman Mahon Makes Statement On Farm Legislation

COLORADO .-- Congressman Geo. Mahon, prior to his d parture for Washington to attend the special assion which convenes Monday, November 15th, made the following statement concerning the prospects for farm legislation;

"I think it is impossible to predict ust what kind of bill will be passed. In our District a strong preference for a compulsory control bill has been expressed by a great majority of the farmers with whom I have come in contact in farm meetings or otherwise. Most cotton producers favor adjusted poyments equivalent to parily, 16 cents or above, on that portion of the crop produced for lomestic consumption. They feel that a moderate reduction program is occessary, but that adjustment payments will be required in order to get a price for cotton domestically consumed commensuratce with the American standard of living. In view of the tremendous foreign production they realize that American cotton sold abroad will have to be sold in competition with the world and at a low price. In each county they favor allotments to each farm on a uniorm basis of equality regardless of tthe length of time the farm has been in cultivation. They favor no discrimination against new farms in areas where a normal development of agricultural land is taking place. They favor a program which will place the emphasis on a normal size farm in each locality. They favor a farm policy which will encourage operation of farms by tenants or occupant owners and which will discourage the displacement of tenants and large operations through hired bor methods. "In the minds of the proddcers here is a wide variiety of opinion as to what should be done. In Congress, which is made up of representatives from all sections of the nation, there will be even a greater diversity of opinion. However, I think it can be safely predicted that the new program will be an improvement over he old."





Out in San Francisco the ferries, naturally, suffered a huge loss of business when the new bridges were opened up. To recoup some, they obtained permission to reduce their rates. So they made the one-way rate for a car 30 cents instead of 50 cents, and the round trip 50 cents. Whereas the bridges charge 50 cents toll each way, except for a slight reduction for commuters.

As a result, the ferries are doing a land office business hauling automobiles, and the bridge revenues are not what they should be. So the six counties that guarantee the bridge, which means that they have to make up any deficit in paying operating charges and interest on the bonds, are alarmed.

They are appealing to the state railroad commission to reopen the case. What they want, of course, is to force the ferries to charge just as much as the bridges. Boiled down, if they get what they want the ferries might as well go out of business.

Just Imagine

Now let's go back a few yearsin other words, use hindsight-and imagine a situation. Let's suppose that when the bridge was first proposed the ferry owners had reduced rates sharply, instead of first waiting in the vain hope that the bridges would never be built, and then seen the inevitable hap-George flayed the government for bridge is built. If the bridge management is permitted, it can make any rates it pleases, drive the ferries out of business, and then raise its rates again. It costs the bridge management virtually nothing, save a little wear and tear on the paving, for traffic to pass over it. The main cost is interest on the investment, and that goes on, whether there is any traffic or not. The case is strikingly similar to a government hydroelectric project. The answer is simple. Those responsible for that resolution, in that curious form, were seeking to build up public opinion against the wages details. So they hit it hardest on what they considered its more vulnerable points, despite the fact that those points had been eliminated in the last session.

Wanted No Change

There is the possibility, of course, that there was a slightly different purpose-that the desire was really to prevent the bill's being changed again into something resembling its original and, to union labor, objectionable form.

As a matter of fact, the bitterest opponents of the bill, the folks who so effectually sidetracked it last session, holding it in the house rules committee after every one had assumed it would pass, are hoping to change the bill substantially. And some of the changes that these potent gentlemen want to make would again add some of the features that William Green managed to get stricken out.

As a matter of fact, the opposition of little southern sawmills and other small plants did not really reach the burning point last session until after Green's federation influence had accomplished these changes.

The effect of the so-called Green changes was to restrict the jurisdiction of the board, or whatever the governing body that enforces the wage and hour regulation may be called, to compelling the 40-hour maximum and the 40-cent an hour minimum. They would leave all disputes involving conditions better for labor than these particular limita-tions to be settled by collective bargaining.

Corporations are now paying 15 per cent of their net incomes to the federal government, in addition to the undistributed earnings tax-which, of course, they do not pay if they distribute all their earnings to stockholders. British Are Enraged

Soon after the Japanese began shelling the residential area of the settlement and an outpost where English soldiers were quartered was destroyed. Continuous shelling of Shanghai by the invaders endangered the British and American lines on the border of the international settlement and shells fell close to the American warship Augusta, Admiral Yarnell's flagship. Japan is angry over the alleged help Britain is giving China in the

warfare and there is a movement in Tokio to break diplomatic relations with London. This is urged by the "council on the current situation," an unofficial body composed of high army officers, political leaders and other influential persons. The council adopted a resolution warning that unless Britain "reconsiders its improper attitude" Japan may be forced to take certain steps of "grave determination" against Britain, despite the "deep friendship existing between the two countries for the last sixty years.

Japanese troops invaded a part of the international settlement guarded by American marines and seized a Chinese junk loaded with rice. General Beaumont, commandant of marines, immediately entered a protest and the Japanese apologized but the marines did not without increasing the treasury defconsider the incident closed because the Japs didn't return the junk.

If those ferries had reduced rates back before the bridges were ausary, in all computations as to whether construction of such bridges was economically sound, to figure tolls on the basis of ferry rates.

This sort of figuring was done, but it was done on the basis of a 50cent ferry charge, hence a 50-cent toll on the bridge. On that basis calculations were made showing that the bridges would pay. Had those calculations been made on a 30-cent straight toll, 50-cent round trip, which the ferries are now charging, the bridges might never have been built.

No Hope of Speed

Crop control and wages and hours regulation legislation, to enact which congress was called in extra session, do not promise very rapid action. Very little doubt exists that both will be enacted, but every indication is also that congress will make haste slowly, and in rather exaggerated fashion.

The one contingency that might result in beating the wages and hours bill is that the American Federation of Labor and the Committee for Industrial Organization should both decide openly to knife it. Some think that the A. F. of L. could do it all alone, but no one here in touch with the situation doubts that both could do it.

Nor does any one doubt that they would kill it if they dared! Neither for this is comparatively slight, as of the organizations likes it even a little bit. That resolution adopted by the A. F. of L. bristles with opposition to the original plan, and while it was disavowed by leaders

ing. Very few people in the country believe this. It sounds too fantastic. But it happens to be true and La Follette, though never quoting it, knows it and acts on it.

Not on Program

Taxes were not included in the announced program for congress. But since the announcement of the program the budget figures have been worked out. It has developed that the deficit for this fiscal year will be much larger than was anticipated. It is now certain that the debt of the government, on which interest must be paid, will be increased this fiscal year by at least \$750,000,000. This is much smaller than has been the case in the last five years, but there is no assurance at the moment that this is the final figure. The only sure thing is that it will not be less than that.

On top of this the Treasury knows now that a heavy shrinking of revenue will be revealed in the income tax returns of March 15, next, both on corporation and individuals. Corporation earnings will be smaller, it is forecast, than for 1936, due not so much to diminished business, to increased costs-wage boosts, higher commodity costs, etc. And it is net earnings on which corporation income taxes are computed.

JUNIOR TOPIC-Two Brave Preachers. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC-Why and How Ministers Are Trained. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC-The Christian Minister in the Modern

"The Christian Minister"-there is no greater calling among men, but none is more often the target for misrepresentation and abuse by those outside, and all too often the victim of the carelessness, weakness, and sin of those within its own circle. On the other hand it has had, and continues to have to this day, within its ranks such a noble army of faithful and sacrificial men as would probably be impossible to duplicate in any other calling.

The study of today's lesson should arouse in the hearts of Christian people a high regard for the ministry as a calling, and a kindly purpose to aid their minister to live up to its glorious possibilities. Every true minister who studies it will find his spirit humbled before God in thanksgiving for the privilege of service, and in prayer that he may be forgiven for his failures and empowered for the work of the future.

The need for such a study is indicated in the verses just preceding our lesson, namely, I Timothy 4:1-5, where we read of the express warning of the Spirit of God that in the latter times there should be teaching and preaching which departed from the faith, substituting men's wisdom for God's Word. One who looks around him cannot but feel that we have fallen upon that evil day.

I. What to Preach (I Tim. 4:6-9). The "good minister of Jesus Christ" preaches the words of God. To do this he must himself be "nourished" by them. Spare your preacher the necessity of running errands, serving on boards and committees, and encourage him to study his Bible.

Little reference is made to Brittany in the ancient classics, save that Pliny speaks of it as the "Looking-on Peninsula," with its eye and vision set upon the Atlantic, and Caesar tells something of the fighting qualities of the Veneti who inhabited the southwestern seacoast. As is well known, it is the home of the Celt, and neither the highlands of Scotland nor the west of Ireland, nor Wales can produce a finer type

Book, learning and teaching "good doctrine"? If so you will have no interest in or time for "profane and old wives fables."

II. How to Preach (I Tim. 4:10-12).

1. Sacrificially (v. 10). The man who regards the ministry as a nice, easy, respectable occupation is not in the same calling as was the apostle Paul. In fact, there is nothing to indicate that be is in the Christian ministry at all, for in that calling there is labor and suffering of reproach. This is not something to be borne in a spirit of resigned submission. The minister knows and "trusts in the living God," and gladly bears every responsibility with which God may entrust him.

2. Authoritatively (v. 11). The minister of Christ speaks for God. In doing so he teaches with assurance and is to "command" men in the Lord's name. All too often the servants of the Lord feel and act like "grasshoppers" (see Numbers 13:33), and everybody else regards them as feeble and impotent, when they should be "strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus" (II Tim. 2:1).

3. Actively (v. 12). Whether young or old, the minister is to be an example, a pattern in his active daily life. Note how discriminating is the scripture. He is to be a pattern for others in speech, manner of living, in love, in spirit, in faith, and in purity of life.

III. Who Is to Preach (I Tim. 4:13-16).

1. The man who is divinely called (v. 14). God called Timothy; men recognized that call and ordained him to give his life to the exercise of his God-presented gift. This is the right order for our day.

2. The man who is properly prepared (vv. 13, 15-16). The ministry calls for the best preparation that a man can possibly obtain. He must know how to read God's Word, both publicly and privately. He is to be skilled in exhortation, and in teaching Christian doctrine.

In conclusion, let us consider the portion from II Timothy 2 which properly presents the work of the minister as that of a soldier at war against the world, the flesh, and the devil. He must be prepared to bear hardness, and he must not yield to the temptation to get into "sidelines," no matter how dignified and profitable they may be. His sole business is to serve and to please God.
