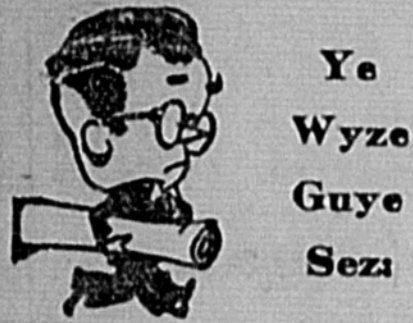

Uncle Ananias says that doctors tell him breathing thru the mouth is harmful, and he is also of the opinion that quite a few people around Slaton have found that talking thru it also results seriously at times.

The lessons we learn painfully in hard times are quickly forgotten in the sunshine of prosperity.

A short time ago this column commented on the belief of a number of Washington writers that the New Deal is tempering its course, and is being steered in a more conservative direction. Recent events add authority to that view.

The President is talking of budget-balancing, and there has been a cut-down in Federal activities, notably in the relief field. And the sentiment of Congressmen, who are worried by the stock collapse, is generally in favor of taking a cautious line.

A continuance of this trend could do as much as anything to encourage business.

The longer we live, the faster time goes. Time is like a ball rolling down hill. With each yard its speed increases.

The reason for this becomes clear if we recall how full and long the days seem when we are placed in a new environment. The first few days of a vacation, if we go to a strange place, seem longer than the succeeding two weeks.

In the early years of life, the senses are hourly stimulated by new experiences. Gradually, however, these senses are blunted and the days fade into one another, leaving almost no impression on our intellect. Birthdays come so fast that we lose the count.

Schopenhauer's reflections on this subject led him to lay down the rule that the length of any given year in a person's lifetime is in direct proportion to the number of times it will divide our whole life. At the age of fifty the year appears to us only one-tenth as long as it did at the age of five; at the age of sixty the fraction is reduced to one twelfth; in other words, the fifth year is twelve times as long as the sixtieth year.

Schopenhauer contends that the time of boredom, therefore, is youth and not old age. Children are so thoroughly alive that they need constant occupation or they are miserable. To them an idle hour is like a day. In later years the days fly so fast that the old man is hardly aware that he is out of bed before he discovers that the time has come to retire. Is this a consolation, or a cause for regret?

One of the chief functions of every business man is to save time and worry for his customers. Whatever business a man is engaged in, he can profitably devote part of his time to this study.

Most of us are compelled to devote our effective waking hours to a specialized task. When anyone relieves us from a duty that consumes part of our time and energy, we have that much more left for our main business.

The old-style inkwell is an example. The ink evaporated and clotted. The self-sealing inkwell and the fountain-pen were improvements.

Selling butter in one-pound bricks saved time and bother. Packaging goods so that they are visible is just now causing a revolution in many industries.

The alert executive daily asks himself: How can I save time and worry for my customers? How can I get this business on an automatic basis, so that people can order what they want and know what they will get?

What a busy week, Armistice Day, Red Cross Drive, and Week of Prayer, and are we busy also with the Mayor's meeting as called upon by the President having reference to the unemployed and partly unemployed, the Mayor called this meeting for Wednesday night at the BCD office, The Red Cross Drive meeting of all Captains at the BCD office Wednesday afternoon, the Directors of the BCD last Tuesday night, and the meeting of the Slaton Grange as called for Thursday night, last Monday night the Canyon City Band at the High school Auditorium, a medicine Tent Show in town, but the best of all is the big Saturday business that the Slaton Merchants are enjoying, every store in town on every street in town was full to overflowing last Saturday and the two previous Saturdays, from Piggly Wiggly all around the square and back to Mr. W. T. Brown grocery back of Piggly-Wiggly, cotton still coming in and the Gins working 24 hours a day and then can't keep up. Cotton Compress using every available space of ground that can be had, and it looks as if the yard will reach nearly to Mr. Klattenhoff's on the hill.

We are getting ready for the First Slaton Poultry Show in December 2, 3 and 4, and the catalogue will be out by the time this is published, and any one who may not get a catalogue please let us know and we will mail one to you, or come in and get one in our office. A more extended write up of this show will be in next week's Slatonite, so be looking for it. This is to be a FREE entry show, and premiums will be given only to the Slaton Trade Territory Poultry in competition.

The five Slaton gins have ginned to this date this year 11,513 bales, a gain over last year same date of 6,147. Posey has ginned to date 2,343 bales showing a gain over same date last year of 1,107 bales. The Slaton gins are ginning about 2,000 bales a week, and if this keeps up for the next six weeks or until Christmas, the Slaton Gins will run over 21,000 bales for 1937. Our guess has been all along as from 18,000 to 20,000 bales for 1937-38. Let's see how close we are guessing.

Congressman Mahon Makes Statement On Farm Legislation

COLORADO.—Congressman Geo. Mahon, prior to his departure for Washington to attend the special session which convenes Monday, November 15th, made the following statement concerning the prospects for farm legislation:

"I think it is impossible to predict just what kind of bill will be passed. In our District a strong preference for a compulsory control bill has been expressed by a great majority of the farmers with whom I have come in contact in farm meetings or otherwise. Most cotton producers favor adjusted payments equivalent to parity, 16 cents or above, on that portion of the crop produced for domestic consumption. They feel that a moderate reduction program is necessary, but that adjustment payments will be required in order to get a price for cotton domestically consumed commensurate with the American standard of living. In view of the tremendous foreign production they realize that American cotton sold abroad will have to be sold in competition with the world and at a low price. In each county they favor allotments to each farm on a uniform basis of equality regardless of the length of time the farm has been in cultivation. They favor no discrimination against new farms in areas where a normal development of agricultural land is taking place. They favor a program which will place the emphasis on a normal size farm in each locality. They favor a farm policy which will encourage operation of farms by tenants or occupant owners and which will discourage the displacement of tenants and large operations through hired labor methods.

"In the minds of the producers there is a wide variety of opinion as to what should be done. In Congress, which is made up of representatives from all sections of the nation, there will be even a greater diversity of opinion. However, I think it can be safely predicted that the new program will be an improvement over the old."

Room Transformed By Demonstrator

To completely transform a bedroom with \$21.73 is the record of Mrs. A. R. Carlile, bedroom improvement demonstrator in the Wolforth home demonstration club. She worked to earn the money used in the transformation and so she is doubly proud of her room.

One of the big things Mrs. Carlile did was to build a large clothes closet in one corner of the room. An iron pipe from the junk pile was enamel-d white and used for a hanging rod. The shelves in one end of the closet and across the top were made of scrap lumber and painted white. Each member in the family has a share in the shelf space and knows where to find his clothes. A shoe rack on the door cares for each one's shoes.

The furniture was refinished by removing the old finish with lye water and giving a new coat of enamel. A new bedstead was added. The floor was treated with boiling hot linseed oil and a linoleum rug put down. New window shades and curtains and bedspreads were added. The mattresses are to be made over and the mattress ticking used to make mattress and spring protectors.

"We are all very happy over my being demonstrator. We feel like we have really moved since we have it all finished. Everything is nice and new and it is much easier to keep house now," says Mrs. Carlile.

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL Lesson

Lesson for November 14

THE CHRISTIAN MINISTER

LESSON TEXT—I Timothy 4:6-16; II Timothy 2:1-4. GOLDEN TEXT—Neglect not the gift that is in thee.—I Timothy 4:14. PRIMARY TOPIC—Two Brave Preachers. JUNIOR TOPIC—Two Brave Preachers. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Why and How Ministers Are Trained. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Christian Minister in the Modern World.

"The Christian Minister"—there is no greater calling among men, but none is more often the target for misrepresentation and abuse by those outside, and all too often the victim of the carelessness, weakness, and sin of those within its own circle. On the other hand it has had, and continues to have to this day, within its ranks such a noble army of faithful and sacrificial men as would probably be impossible to duplicate in any other calling.

The study of today's lesson should arouse in the hearts of Christian people a high regard for the ministry as a calling, and a kindly purpose to aid their minister to live up to its glorious possibilities. Every true minister who studies it will find his spirit humbled before God in thanksgiving for the privilege of service, and in prayer that he may be forgiven for his failures and empowered for the work of the future.

The need for such a study is indicated in the verses just preceding our lesson, namely, I Timothy 4:1-5, where we read of the express warning of the Spirit of God that in the latter times there should be teaching and preaching which departed from the faith, substituting men's wisdom for God's Word. One who looks around him cannot but feel that we have fallen upon that evil day.

I. What to Preach (I Tim. 4:6-9). The "good minister of Jesus Christ" preaches the words of God. To do this he must himself be "nourished" by them. Spare your preacher the necessity of running errands, serving on boards and committees, and encourage him to study his Bible.

Preacher, are you studying God's Book, learning and teaching "good doctrine"? If so you will have no interest in or time for "profane and old wives fables."

II. How to Preach (I Tim. 4:10-12).

1. Sacrificially (v. 10). The man who regards the ministry as a nice, easy, respectable occupation is not in the same calling as was the apostle Paul. In fact, there is nothing to indicate that he is in the Christian ministry at all, for in that calling there is labor and suffering of reproach. This is not something to be borne in a spirit of resigned submission. The minister knows and "trusts in the living God," and gladly bears every responsibility with which God may entrust him.

2. Authoritatively (v. 11). The minister of Christ speaks for God. In doing so he teaches with assurance and is to "command" men in the Lord's name. All too often the servants of the Lord feel and act like "grasshoppers" (see Numbers 13:33), and everybody else regards them as feeble and impotent, when they should be "strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus" (II Tim. 2:1).

3. Actively (v. 12). Whether young or old, the minister is to be an example, a pattern in his active daily life. Note how discriminating is the scripture. He is to be a pattern for others in speech, manner of living, in love, in spirit, in faith, and in purity of life.

III. Who Is to Preach (I Tim. 4:13-16).

1. The man who is divinely called (v. 14). God called Timothy; men recognized that call and ordained him to give his life to the exercise of his God-presented gift. This is the right order for our day.

2. The man who is properly prepared (vv. 13, 15-16). The ministry calls for the best preparation that a man can possibly obtain. He must know how to read God's Word, both publicly and privately. He is to be skilled in exhortation, and in teaching Christian doctrine.

In conclusion, let us consider the portion from II Timothy 2 which properly presents the work of the minister as that of a soldier at war against the world, the flesh, and the devil. He must be prepared to bear hardness, and he must not yield to the temptation to get into "sidelines," no matter how dignified and profitable they may be. His sole business is to serve and to please God.

AROUND the HOUSE Items of Interest to the Housewife

Shoes Must Have Air.—Do not keep your shoes in the boxes in which they were delivered. Shoes require air to preserve them and they should never be kept in an air-tight box. Keep them in a shoe bag.

Scaling Fish.—Fish may be scaled easily by first dipping them into boiling water for a minute.

A Darning Ball.—A discarded electric light bulb makes a good darning ball.

Removing Blueing Spots.—Blueing spots on white clothing can be removed by boiling in clear water.

Serving Omelets.—Omelets should be placed on hot platters to keep them from falling.

Inexpensive Stew.—Chop two onions and a large carrot finely, and cut a pound of neck lamb into small pieces. Put into a saucepan with one cup macaroni broken into small lengths, cover with warm water and season. Let it simmer gently for one and a half hours.

Whipping Cream.—If whipped cream will not stand up, it is often due to the fact that the cream is not sufficiently chilled. It is important, too, to have a heavy cream of the right butter fat (20 to 30 per cent) and 12 to 24 hours old. The cream must be cold, and is best beaten in a cold container.

Ox-Tail Pie.—Wash ox tail in salted water and joint; put into pan, cover with water, and sim-

mer until almost cooked. Line bottom and sides of pie dish with slices of raw potato sprinkled with pepper and salt. Cover with strips of bacon, then place ox tail in center and pour in stock; season and cover with more slices of potato. Cover with pastry and bake in a quick oven.

Save Table Surface.—If you will place a folded cloth under a dish which contains foods to be beaten you'll find the table surface will be saved many marks and the dish will be kept steady.

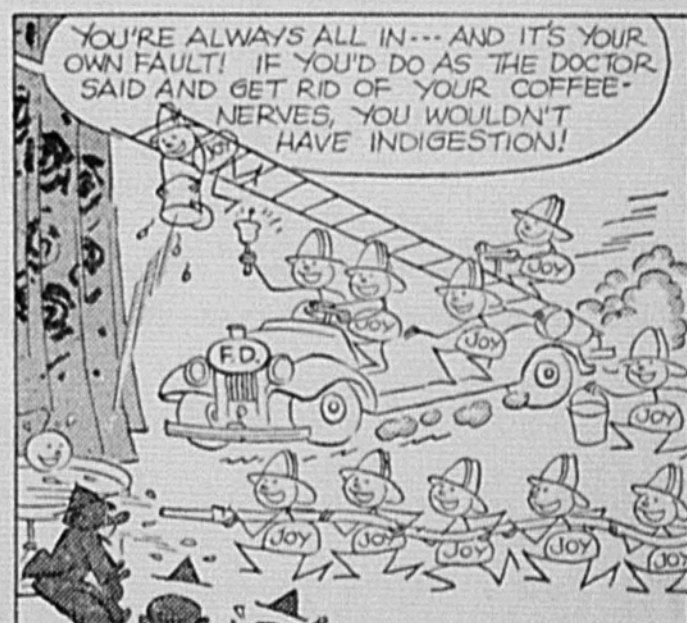
