## Let's Give Them A Chance ....

A good many of this city's Christmas shoppers are going to Lubbock for their holiday buying.

That hardly is startling news. But it is a cold and highly significant fact to local merchants.

Local stores, it must be acknowledged, do not offer the expensively decorated windows, the glitter and sparkle, the widely-known name that some of the Hub City stores can boast. On the other hand, neither are local stores burdened with the high overhead of the Hub City firms, and consequently can-and dooften offer better prices on the same merchandise.

Lots of folks here are highly skeptical of the assertion that they could buy for less at home. In many instances, however, it is a fact, as lots of budget-minded shoppers have discovered.

Entirely apart from the matter of price is the matter of merchandise selection.

On frequent occasions, we hear shoppers say, "Well, there's no use looking for anything like that here . . . I'l just go up to Lubbock and get it."

Maybe so. Maybe not. The erroneous part of that type of thinking is the ASSUMPTION that the desired items is not available locally. We owe it to our hometown merchants to try to find what we need here. Often we can. If we can't, it's doubtful that any local merchant would argue the point that the customer has a right to buy elsewhere.

But let's give them the chance they deserve.

### Come On, Santa Claus . . .

The landowners of Texas don't ask much this Christmas in the way of presents. They'll settle for a rain, preferably on the installment plan, a few inches in December, a few in January, and so on. -Soil and Water,

#### Not For Broadcast . . .

The American people are intensely interested in any plans that President-elect Eisenhower might have for hastening a decision in the Korean war.

But our curiosity on that score is not half as great as that of the Communists, notably the high command of aggression in the Kremlin. Because any disclosures as to strategy in the Far East would be information of value to the enemy, it is not logical to expect that General Eisenhower would tip off the Communists for the sake of appeasing American interest, no matter how strong or how legitimate that interest may be.

Until General Eisenhower becomes President, he is not in a position to give orders or even make announcements that would have the force of executive authority. He is inheriting a war not of his own making, and like many other American people, has a son on the fighting front in Korea. No one obviously is more concerned over a sound policy for the Far East than is the President-elect.

The Korean situation is fraught with potential danger





But military decisions can not, and should not, be made in a goldfish bowl. The revelations about policy in Korea may well come from the war front itself. There is only one possible reservation-that an ultimatum to the enemy could awaken it to its peril and give pause to its aggression. In fact, it can be taken for granted that the Communist aggressors already are worrying about General Eisenhower's plans. To them, above all others, information in regard to these plans would be priceless.

Again as in World War II, the American people are called upon to repose confidence in leadership chosen by a majority of the people. This leadership, particularly suited for such problems as Korea, will be reinforced by exceptionally able advisers. Actions in this naked contest with aggression must be expected rather than word, --- For Worth Star-Telegram.

Occasionally someone asks, "What is the difference between socialism and communism?"


An example, at least as between British Fabian socialism and Soviet Stalinist communism, is given by the recent vote of the House of Commons in London to denationalize the British steel industry.

On this sharp test between the Churchill government and former Prime Minister Attlee's Labor opposition, the Conservatives won by a rather larger margin than expected, since about 20 Laborite members failed to vote. This may reflect a loss of enthusiasm even on the socialist side for such doctrinaire cases of nationalization as steel.

On the other hand, it is to be noted that the process of turning steel mills back to private ownership and operation. even under a Tory regime, is to be very gradual and limited. Steelmaking still will take place under practically all the regulations that applied to it while nationalized.

Yet possibly the greatest significance in the event is at whether the change is to private or to public control but ther is that fact that the change can be made by popular rather forratic decision and by parliamentary processes rather than a price state decree. Therein lies the essential difference tes solcialism and communism.






