Mrs. Eckert was referred to the Gonzales physical medspecialty hospital by her physician for a program of rehabilitation following a bout with polio suffered on Sept. 14, 1952. She was admitted

on Oct. 20 As part of the continuing treatment program, a series of home routines have been set up for Mrs.

Eckert, and she will return to the Gonzales hospital for periodic check-ups and to maintain the correct fit of her braces and other appliances. Improved techniques in hospital and home-administered treatments have enabled the

treatment center to effectively reduce the average hospitalization period and thus accept a greater number of patients each year.

Gonzales Warm Springs Foundaion is a non-profit, non-sectarian tospital, built and maintained by contributions from all over the state of Texas. First opened in 1941, there are now facilities to house 105 patients. A building program just getting under way will increase that capacity by about 30 per cent

Hard On The Little Man ...

Governor Shivers has recommended that Texas' gaso line tax be boosted from 4c to 5c per gallon as one of the best means of raising additional revenue for the state.

Many lawmakers have agreed with the proposal. apparently has a good chance for enaction.

This newspaper hopes not. From our point of view, it is another of those taxes which hits the little man harder than the big man.

Mr. A., with an income of \$100,000 per year, will pay 5c a gallon if the new measure passes just as will Mr. B. with an annual income of only \$4,000.

Percentagewise, that means the little fellow would be soaked a lot harder than the big man.

Such taxes already are too numerous. The sales tax is a good example of another tax that is unfair to the small income citizen. Texas fortunately has escaped the sales tax thus far.

Most of us probably would agree that a bigger gasoline tax is an inequitable way to raise more funds. But talking about it in the drugstore to a fellow citizen doesn't have any repercussion in the legislative chambers.

Enough letters, written to your State Senator or Representative in Austin, would be more helpful in event you're interested in escaping additional oppressive taxation.

Who Owns The Water?

Who owns the water impounded by government-constructed dams across rivers lying wholly within the boundaries of a state" Governor Shivers of Texas thinks it important that this be determined, and says that he is preparing to file suit against the United States.

Army Engineers recently completed a dam across the Brazos River, which lies wholly within the state of Texas. The engineers claim that the water thus impounded belongs to the federal government. They say that they will not release any of this water for the use of the rice growers on the lower reaches of the river unless Texas replaces it from state-owned Lake Sheppard

Governor Shivers argues that if the federal government can claim ownership of the water in Lake Whitney, that it also can claim the water the entire length of the river, that it could prohibit cities and farmers along the course of the river from using the water.

Recently the government went even a step further in California and prohibited farmers from drilling wells, because this tapped the water supply of a government irrigation project. The farmers went into court and wen their fight. However, the court decision apparently did not impress the Army Engineers. The stand of Governor Shivers should be applauded

throughout the South. We resent the constant infringement of the federal government on our rights. -- Farm and Ranch.

More Moss For The South Plains

O. Henry once published a weekly paper when he lived in Austin, the name of which was "The Rolling Stone." His motto "we're out for the moss."

Sidney Porter pretended to be a hard-hearted man al from reports he was too generous for his own good.

Not only can a man he too generous for his own good. but an entire section of the country may become so interested in the welfare of the nation, or the entire state, and overlook the things that are of vital interest at home.

It is right and proper that the South Plains should be in favor of having the tidelands given to the states near which they are located, the people of the South Plains should be interested in the Canadian Dam project and the people of the South Plains should be glad to have the southern part of the state get their irrigation projects constructed, but are we so engrassed in the welfare of the other parts of the country that wy are overlooking our own interests. Are we letting the rolling stones get our moss

Outside of the Panhandle and the certitory around Abilene, there is no part of the state where the lack of water is of such vital interest, yet little, if anything, is being done to secure water for our parched crops and for the needs of our fast growing cities.

Millions of dollars will be spent this year on good roads, for educational purposes and on agricultural promotion. The authority to spend is in the legislture with the balance of the power with the men who represent the interests of the older parts of Texas. The money will be spent for purposes intended to benefit all of us but unless the representatives of the South Plains can raise enough noise to secure a fair share of the things for the South Plains, for which all of the money will be spent, we will get what the little boy shot at.

The South Plains needs water, it needs more roads and more road repairing, we need more and better schools, and our agricultural problems need attention.

Sure, other parts of the state need these things, too, and our representatives should work toward getting them, but how about some water projects for the South Plains, better school buildings for our students, and more educational help for the South Plains farmer

Let's get a little moss and enjoy it along with the other parts of Texas

No mylon stockings, please; no silk dresses or anything, like that. So runs a message smuggled out from behind the Iron Curtain to a friend in the United State specifying what gifts are welcome and what are not. The trouble is that the possession of luxuries will cause the recipients to be suspected of "capitalist connections in the United States"-and that could be dangerous.

Now that we know all the facts, he is even bigger than the American people realized




