It has made up a list of suggested gift packages for Korean children, including: Korea food, \$10; knitted wool, \$10; Korean underwear, \$10; Far East blanket, \$7; Korea cotton, \$10; Golden Rule anti-TB package, \$7.50; and woolen

The gift list of children of other lands includes: standard food, \$10; holiday budget food, \$6.95; all meat, \$11.50; basic food, \$5; baby food, \$10; all wool blanket, \$10; household linen, \$10; and all wool suiting, \$13.50.



About Christmas Trees And Safety

AUSTIN-That Christmas tree ou'll be setting up in your home this season can easily become the center of a tragedy unless you take a few precautions.

Texas was lucky last year. Only 14 Christmas tree fires were re ported, with property damage to taling \$33,298. But the Texas In surance Advisory Association, which keeps such figures, says Christmas tree fires annually take about 100 lives over the nation and destroy thousands of dollars in property.

To help keep your Christmas merry, the fire insurance experts suggest the following safety rules 1. Choose a small tree. It's safer than a large one.

2. Don't set it up until a few days before Christmas, and then be sure to buy a tree that is

3. Then stand it in water and put in the coolest part of the house, away from radiators or open gas heaters. Cut off the trunk diagonally at least an inch above the original cut end.

4. Avoid using cotton or paper decorations, and never place an electric train under the tree.

5. Be sure your electric lighting sets are in good working order and bear a label indicating that they have been approved by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. 6. Never leave the lights burn-

ing when no one is in the house. 7. Place the tree so that its accidental burning would not ig nite curtains or other combustible furnishings, or block off an exit. 8. When the needles start falling, take the tree down and dis-



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

A quick glance at bold headlines, full-page advertisements, tempting displays, unbelievable bargains and easy lay-away plans eems to uphold this accusation.

But a deeper probe provokes the realization that these agencies could not accomplish such a phenomenal feat alone. The money to pay for all this comes from the pay check of the average American family. Admittedly, agencies which thrive on selling have promoted increased Christmas buying.

Starting with mid-summer cam paigns to put dolls or jewelry in lay-away for Christmas, they add an ever-increasing pressure early November to promote the exchange of goods for as much money as possible. Consequently, clever minds of promotion and advertising are not blameless for the commercialization of Christmas. But. in reality, the attitudes and activities of business men are mere reflections of the current American philosophy.

Before children of this generation are capable of reasoning or developing individual opinions, they are beseiged with queries about what they expect from Santa Claus.

For the next few blissfully innocent years they write extended lists of requests to him and impatiently wait for his nocturnal

The desire for toys on Christmas is so deeply imbedded in young hearts that even the rowdiest find enough incentive to behave "angel like" for at least a few days.

And with the dawn of the eventful day youngsters attack bountiful treasures of presents and Christmas is spent hilariously displaying and experimenting with them. Accompanying this is an overabundance of too-rich food which produces some regret and quantities of bicarbonate soda.

Somewhere in the middle of this tradition-suddenly, almost shatteringly-some parent, religious teacher or preacher explains to the little ones that all this is not the real meaning of Christmas.

Second, instead of the exhaustive expenditures of self on physical excitenent, we can pause for the quietness of a sacred time spent in the presence of the central Figure of Christmastime. Reading the story of His birth and portions of His ife would be rewarding. And third, we can give ourselves and part of our substance to the One or whom Christmas is named. LICE, MITES CUT **EGG PRODUCTION**

Louse-free hens averaged 11.11 per cent greater egg production than hens infested with lice ac cording to test results announced by the Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association. What's more, the tests showed that the louse-free hens averaged heavier body weights after 5-6 months of the first laying year and had lower mortality rate.

Poultry lice and mites are a con stant threat to the well-being of chickens and to the profits of flockowners. A high number of culls and a noticeable drop in profits can often be traced to this age-old poultry problem.

Lower eg production, anemia and refusal to lay in nests are some of the typical symptoms of birds with lice. Weak, anemic birds that grow at a slow rate frequently show up as carriers of lice and mites.

Poultry Lice

Lice remain on the bird indefinitely and may go undiscovered for some time. A bird sometimes becomes unthrifty and run-down before the flockowner realizes what has happened.

Roost applications are effective in control of lice. Treatments are usually applied along the top side of roost poles a few hours before roosting time. By slowly vaporizing, the preparation will kill lice while the birds roost. Applications are most effective

if used on a calm night since drafty conditions tend to weaken the concentration of vapor. For head lice, louse powder applied to the affected areas of the bird may prove more effective.

Red Mites

The red mite hides by day and raids by night. During the day this parasite can be found in crevices, under roosts and other places about the poultry house. At night, red mites attack the birds on the roosts. Filled with blood from the fowl, the mite usually returns to its hiding place before the birds leave their perch. Treatment of the entire house i

recommended if there is widespread infestation of red mites Roosts should be removed and sprayed, all dried manure should be removed and the inner walls of the poultry house swept down. All litter from the nests and floor should be taken away from the house area. Spray all quarters with an effective pest spray. The ideal time to delouse bird

is when pullets are placed in the house but an effective job can still be done. Treat your layers this month with a good commercial lice killer.
