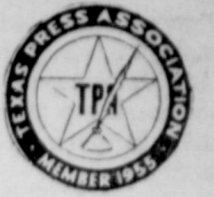

## CHEAPER WATER RATE FOR CANADIAN RIVER DAM SET

Announcement of a cheaper water rate for municipal water to be supplied by a proposed dam on the Canadian River was made at a call meeting Monday in Plainview of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, J. B. Huckabay, Slaton director, said Tuesday. "If the new cost of water meets with the approval of all 11 participating cities, we could start construction of the dam sometime this year," Huckabay declared.

recommended by the New York engineering firm of Parsons, Brinckerhoff, Hall & Macdonald will be \$69,200,000. The dam, which would impound the water for the project would be known as "Sanford Dam," would be located north and slightly east of Amarillo, in Hutchinson County, near the small town of Sanford.

A 20-month-old Slaton Negro girl, who was critically burned at 9 a.m. Monday when her clothing ignited from a heater in her home, was taken by Williams ambulance Tuesday to John Sealy Hospital in Galveston for specialized treatment. Local physicians said the child, Bennie Jean Scott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Beno Scott, First & Geneva Streets, suffered first, second and third degree burns of about 60 per cent of her body. The father, who is employed by Slaton Steam Laundry, said his wife had started next door to a neighbor's home, when she heard the child scream. She found the child with her clothing almost entirely destroyed by flames before the open gas heater. She was taken immediately to Mercy Hospital. The Scotts have one other child, Ted Wayne, 7 months old.

## Scholastics Hit Total Of 1,800

A record total of 1,800 scholastics were enumerated in the recent Slaton Independent School District annual census, Supt. P. L. Vardy Jr. announced Tuesday. He said this figure is tentative until approved on the state level. The 1955 census figure represents an increase of about 80 scholastics as compared with a year ago. Over a 10 year period the scholastics have increased 670, or a 60 per cent jump. If the present rate continues, the local district will have a total of 2,700 scholastics in 1965, the superintendent pointed out. The school district receives a \$60 per capita apportionment from the state. Mrs. F. A. Drewry served as the enumerator.

**YALTA—AFTER TEN YEARS**

At Yalta in one fateful week Churchill, Stalin, and Roosevelt attempted to shape the postwar world.

Yalta was from the first indictable for secrecy, and the secrecy on its major decisions was too long maintained. But Sir Winston Churchill declares that the release of details in the State Department's report is even now unwise. He also adds that there are "serious mistakes" in the American version. So the report may easily start more controversies than it will settle.

Indeed reactions at home and abroad suggest that a Pandora's box has been opened, and that once more domestic political considerations have been placed above the nation's position in the world.

Yet its publication has one great value. It helps to place the Yalta decisions more clearly in the context of 1945 events. The Soviet Union's breaking of Yalta agreements has made the whole arrangement appear much worse than it was. But even in 1945 voices of warning were raised against the assumption that those agreements—particularly on Eastern Europe—would hold.

Commenting on President Roosevelt's report to Congress, this newspaper said March 2, 1945:

We are less confident than Mr. Roosevelt appeared to be that the arrangements made or planned will end spheres of influence or the balance-of-power system. The results of the pledge cooperation to set up free governments will have to be seen to be judged.

We added that they would be tested by whether elections were honest.

History will not excuse Franklin Roosevelt for seriously misjudging the Kremlin's postwar purposes. But the light shed by these documents sharply jolts the easy hindsight of recent years which has explained Yalta in terms of treason or incredible naivete. Charges that Alger Hiss had a big hand in Yalta get no support from the report—which shows him performing more of a secretarial than a policy-making function.

We acquire clearer views merely by noting that Yalta's agreements were made when the American Army, recovering from the "Bulge," was just entering Germany; that Russian troops were within 40 miles of Berlin; that in the Pacific American power had only reached Manila; and that the atomic bomb was still only a promise.

The report reminds us of several other factors which are essential to fair judgment of Yalta. The ghost of Brest-Litovsk peered over the shoulders of western diplomats—they remembered that agreement with Germany in 1918 by which Russia withdrew from World War I. They greatly feared a repetition. The Joint Chiefs of Staff were saying it would take 18 months to subdue Japan after Germany was beaten—and urging efforts to win Russian aid.

Yalta did not give Stalin all he sought, and in only a few cases did it give him anything his forces did not already hold. Finally, it should be remembered that much of the postwar expansion of Soviet power followed not so much from "gifts" at Yalta as from a retreat of American power caused by disbanding armies to "bring the boys home."

We have misjudged Yalta by forgetting some of the circumstances surrounding it. But in another sense we are too close to it—and too partisan about it. Even now our information is not complete. Yet the disclosure of these records might well give us wisdom for today—in at least three ways:

1. To seek a clearer line of cation based more on enduring moral principles, less on temporary power politics, so that today's friends will not become tomorrow's enemies.

2. To improve our military intelligence, so that such mistakes as that made about Japan will not be repeated.

3. To avoid talking beyond our power to perform; to take positions carefully, and then support them vigorously by moral, military, and economic strength.—Christian Science Monitor.

**STRICKEN TAXPAYERS**

The cumulative tax burden in this country today is the heaviest in the nation's history. And the average taxpayer is a fellow who wears with due self-pity his mantle of martyrdom.

Even so, without prejudice to tax relief, mention should be made of the Commerce Department report that disposable income, after taxes, amounted to \$254 billion last year. It was \$3.5 billion more than the total for the preceding year. Before taxes, personal income amounted to \$286.5 billion.

Moscow should take note of taxpayer "hardship" as indicated in the Commerce Department announcement.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram.

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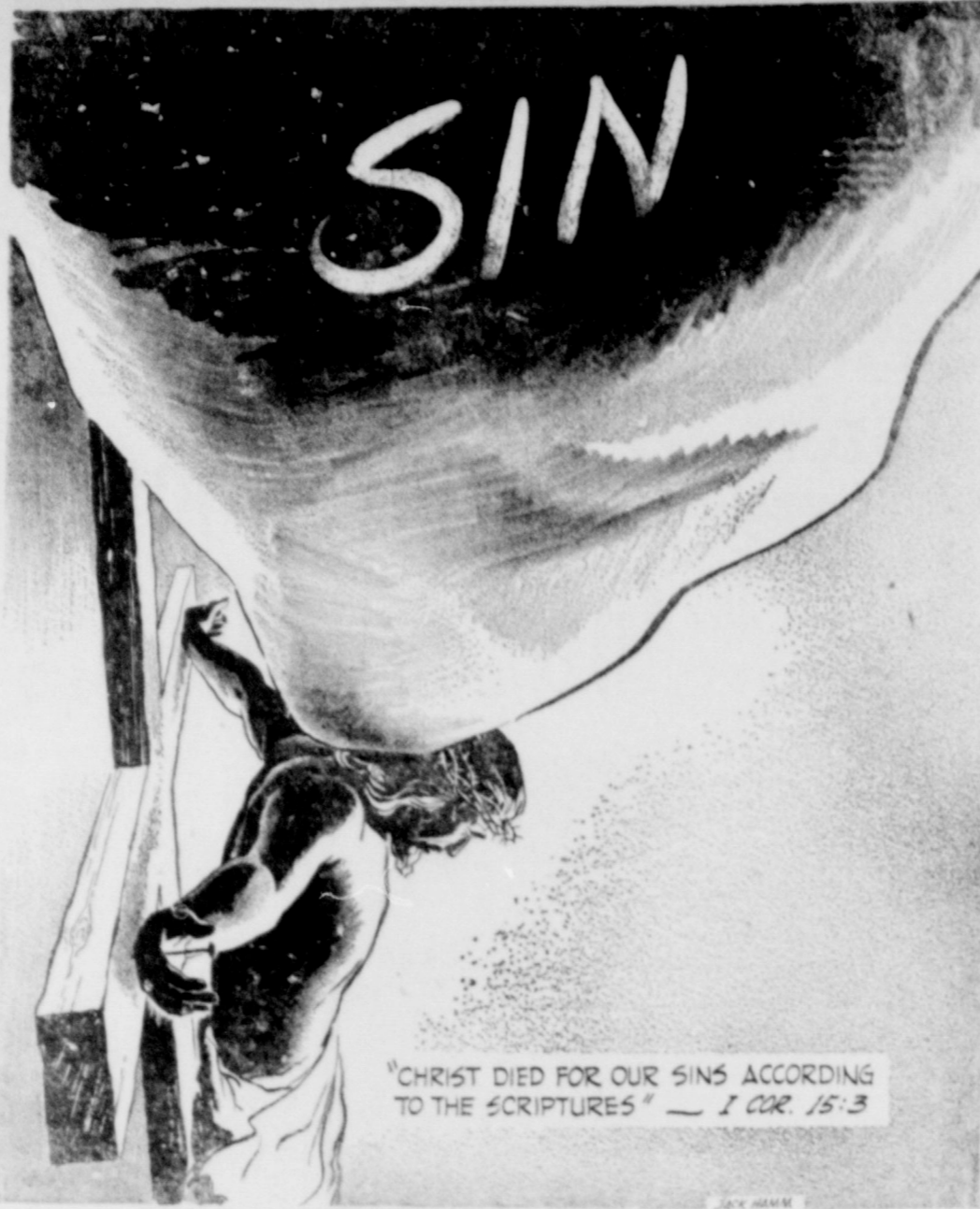

## Deductions For Dependents Listed In Filing 1954 Income Tax Forms

(Editor's Note: This is the ninth in a series of articles to be published in The Slatonite, which, when used with the instructions forwarded with your blank income tax form, will assist you in filing your 1954 income tax return.)

If you are a woman or a widower, the new law will allow you a deduction not to exceed \$600 for the care of one or more dependents if such care is to enable you to be gainfully employed or to seek gainful employment.

Under the provisions of the law, a woman may be either married or unmarried. However, if she is married, she must file a joint return with her husband and the deduction is reduced by the amount which their combined adjusted gross incomes exceed \$4500. These last two limitations would not apply if her husband is incapable of self-support because of mental or physical incapacity.

A "widower," as used in this section of the law, is a man who is divorced or legally separated under a decree of divorce or of separate maintenance, as well as one whose wife is deceased and who has not remarried by the end of the taxable year.

Dependent as used in this section is limited to a person for whom the taxpayer is entitled to a deduction for exemption who is (a) a child or stepchild of the taxpayer under the age of 12; or (b) a person who is mentally or physically incapable of caring for himself regardless of age.

The deduction is not allowable to the extent that payments are made to an individual whom the taxpayer claims as a dependent.

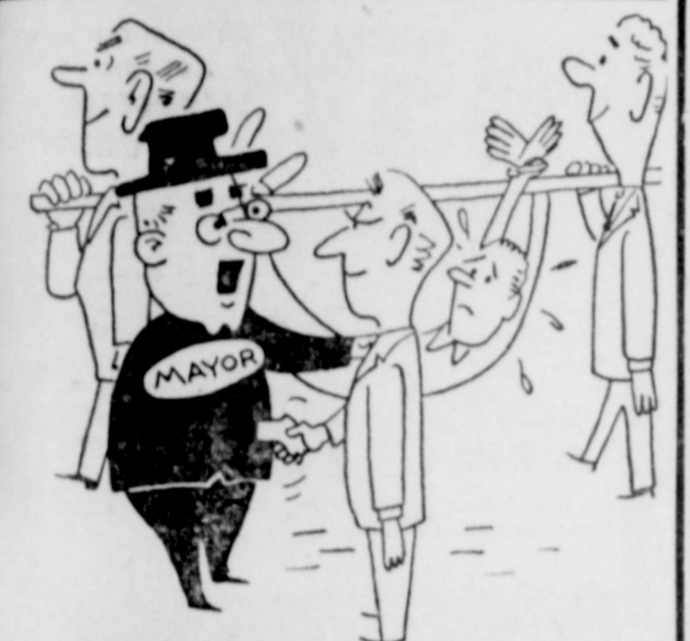

## Social Security Representative To Visit Slaton

Our representative will be in Slaton at the Red Cross Room, City Mall at 9 a.m. on April 8th and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office, says there is a very important special provision in the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act applying to farm workers. It permits crediting a "quarter of coverage" for each \$100 of cash wages paid a farm worker by one farmer without regard to the quarter in which the wages were earned. The number of quarters of coverage credited determine whether benefits can be paid on retirement at or after age 65, or to survivors at time of death.

A farm worker with wages of \$100 will get credit for one quarter, with \$200 will get two quarters, with \$300 will get three quarters, and with \$400 will get credit for all four quarters of the year. For example, a farm worker receiving \$25 for 16 weeks in June, July, August and September would be reported for \$400 total wages, and would be credited with four quarters of coverage, even though he did no other work during the year.

This feature is particularly important for farm workers who get four quarters in 1955 and who are 65 by April 1, 1956. They will qualify for monthly social security payments as soon after that date as their total wages for farm work in 1956 total \$200. The minimum amount payable to any worker is \$30 a month, with \$15 payable to his wife when she is also 65.

A preliminary meeting to lay the groundwork for Little League would operate in conjunction with the regular Boys Club summer recreational program here.

**Hatchett President**

Dr. Don Hatchett was named president for the proposed Slaton Little League Association. E. W. Pike was named secretary-treasurer. Dr. Glen B. Payne was named chairman of a finance committee. Members of the committee are: T. C. Reynolds, C. E. Dickson, Johnny Morris, Bentley H. Page and Dr. Hatchett. Coach Tomer Tompkins will serve as committee advisor. Other officers will be named as needed.

Two representatives of Little League at Lubbock were supposed to attend, but were unable to be present. They were to be invited to attend the April 11 session to help map plans for the local organization.

Coach Tompkins acted as temporary chairman to open the meeting. He pointed out that Little League baseball operated just like the big leagues with competition advancing to a national champion. Little League would operate in conjunction with the regular Boys Club summer recreational program here.

**Diamond Planned**

Tentative plans, providing approval can be secured from Lubbock County, are to build the Little League baseball diamond adjacent to the Scout Hall, the coach said. Other diamonds in Slaton would be used for the various teams to hold practice sessions.

It was estimated that \$900 would be required to finance the Little League program. Various methods to raise the funds were discussed by the group, with the finance committee to investigate possibilities and report back at the next meeting. It was generally agreed that funds would have to be raised by direct solicitation, merchant sponsorship of teams, or both.

- Date Nut Pinwheel Cookies**
- 2 1/4 cups pitted dates, chopped
  - 1 cup granulated sugar
  - 1 cup water
  - 1 cup chopped nuts
  - 1 cup shortening
  - 2 cups brown sugar, firmly packed
  - 3 eggs, beaten
  - 4 cups sifted flour
  - 1/2 tsp. salt
  - 1/2 tsp. soda

**Method**

Combine the dates, granulated sugar and the water in a saucepan and cook over low heat until thick—about 10 minutes. Add nuts and cool. Meanwhile, work the shortening with a spoon until fluffy and creamy. Add the brown sugar gradually while working with a spoon until light. Add the well beaten eggs and mix well. Cover and chill thoroughly. Divide the dough in two equal parts and roll each out into a rectangle a little less than 1/4 inch thick. Spread each with some of the date filling and roll up as for a jelly roll into two long rolls. Wrap in waxed paper and chill over night if possible. Cut with a sharp knife about 1/4 inch thick. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake in moderately hot oven of 400 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes. Makes about five dozen cookies.

## Gardening Hints For The Week

Anyone with several garden stakes to paint can save much time and effort by dipping them instead of painting each one separately with a brush. Plug one end of a piece of pipe of suitable length and fill it with paint. This will be found a suitable and economical vat.

Order rose bushes for planting while they are still in a dormant condition. Prune the new plants while the weather is not too cold, cutting out all the dead wood. Dig plant food around the roots when the ground is dry enough to work. Start seeds of slow-growing annuals, such as Lobelias, Zinnias, Pot Marigolds, Petunias, Asters, Heliotropes, Ageratums and Salvia in boxes of earth or pots in the house or in hotbeds.

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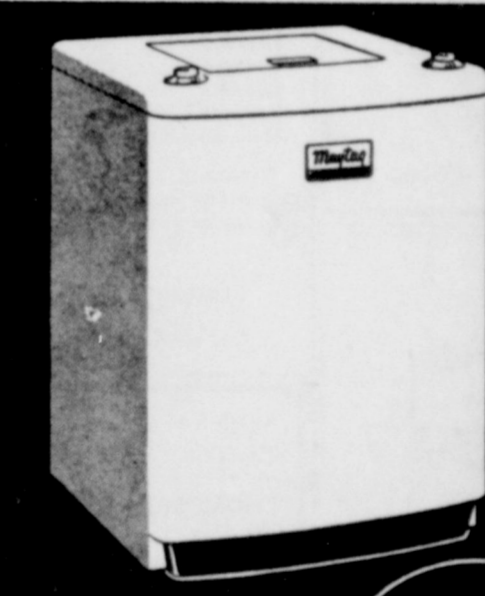
