Rules of a contest to name a Frontier Day Queen for the celebration to be staged in Slaton June 3-4 were announced Monday by Bill Smith, chairman of the parade committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

The contest will be open to all single girls between 14 and 21 years of age that reside in the Slaton trade area, Smith said. She can be sponsored by an organization, business firm or an individual and must wear a formal or semi-formal dress for the judging ceremony.

Deadline for a contestant's name, age and picture, if possible, to be submitted to the Slaton Chamber of Commerce office is Monday, May 30. Pictures will not be returned.

All contestants must be in the parade either on floats or in decorated cars. The queen will be judged on beauty, poise and personality.

The parade will be held at 4 p. m. Friday, June 3. Out-of-town judges will be selected for the judging ceremony, which will be held after the parade at approximately 5:30 p. m. on the City Hall lawn.

An open house observance will be held by the First Methodist Church of Slaton from 3 to 6 p. m. Sunday May 22, to acquaint the public with its new and modern \$100,000 brick educational building.

Refreshments will be served in Fellowship Hall during the open house, according to the pastor, the Rev. J. L. Mayhew.

Various committees, comprising the congregation, are handling arrangements for the open house observance.

Modern Church Plant With completion of its educational building, the First Methodist Church now has one of the most modern church plants in the city with its sanctuary, parsonage and the new building featuring brick construction.

Only the four walls of the former sanctuary were used in constructing the new 50 by 125 foot educational building, the Rev. Mayhew pointed out.

One of the outstanding features of the new building is the beautiful chapel which has a seating capacity of 120. Sam's and Son of Waco. An unusually attractive and impressive stained window in the chapel was made possible by the young people of the church. The young people washed automobiles and did other miscellaneous tasks to raise funds for the window.

Other Features In addition to the chapel, the building features a number of classrooms, a Fellowship Hall, Kitchen and a snack bar on the third floor for the young people. All of the rooms are in pastel shades with pine wood finishing. Each floor has its own heating and cooling system.

Dedication services for the sanctuary were held in 1954 with Bishop William C. Martin, bishop of the Fort Worth-Dallas area of the Methodist Church, presiding. The sanctuary was completed in February of 1952, with total cost amounting to approximately \$130,000.

First established in 1911, the church has grown from an original membership of eight to the present membership of 850.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, CONCERNING "REGULATIONS FOR ACCESS DRIVEWAYS TO STATE HIGHWAYS"

WHEREAS, the Texas highway department has prepared a booklet of "regulations for access driveways to state highways" in accordance with instruction and policy of the Texas Highway Commission minute order No. 34719, dated September 23, 1953, designed to accomplish a coordinated development between the highway and the abutting property for the safe movement of traffic, and

WHEREAS, Article 8, page 8 of said booklet sets out limitations to the Texas Highway Department in that the concurrence of the municipality is required when the "regulations for access driveways to state highways" pertain to state maintained highways routed over city streets or to highways located within the corporate limits of such municipality, and

WHEREAS, the city of Slaton desires to assist the Texas highway department in its efforts to promote the safe and free movement of normal highway traffic and to assist in the controlling of access driveways to property along the highways through this city;

NOW THEREFORE BE it ordained by the City Council of Slaton, Texas:

1. These "regulations for access driveways to state highways" are herewith adopted for the public safety and protection of the city and of the citizens thereof and all of the provisions herein shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.

2. Any person, firm, or corporation who shall violate or disregard any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 per day of existing violation.

3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

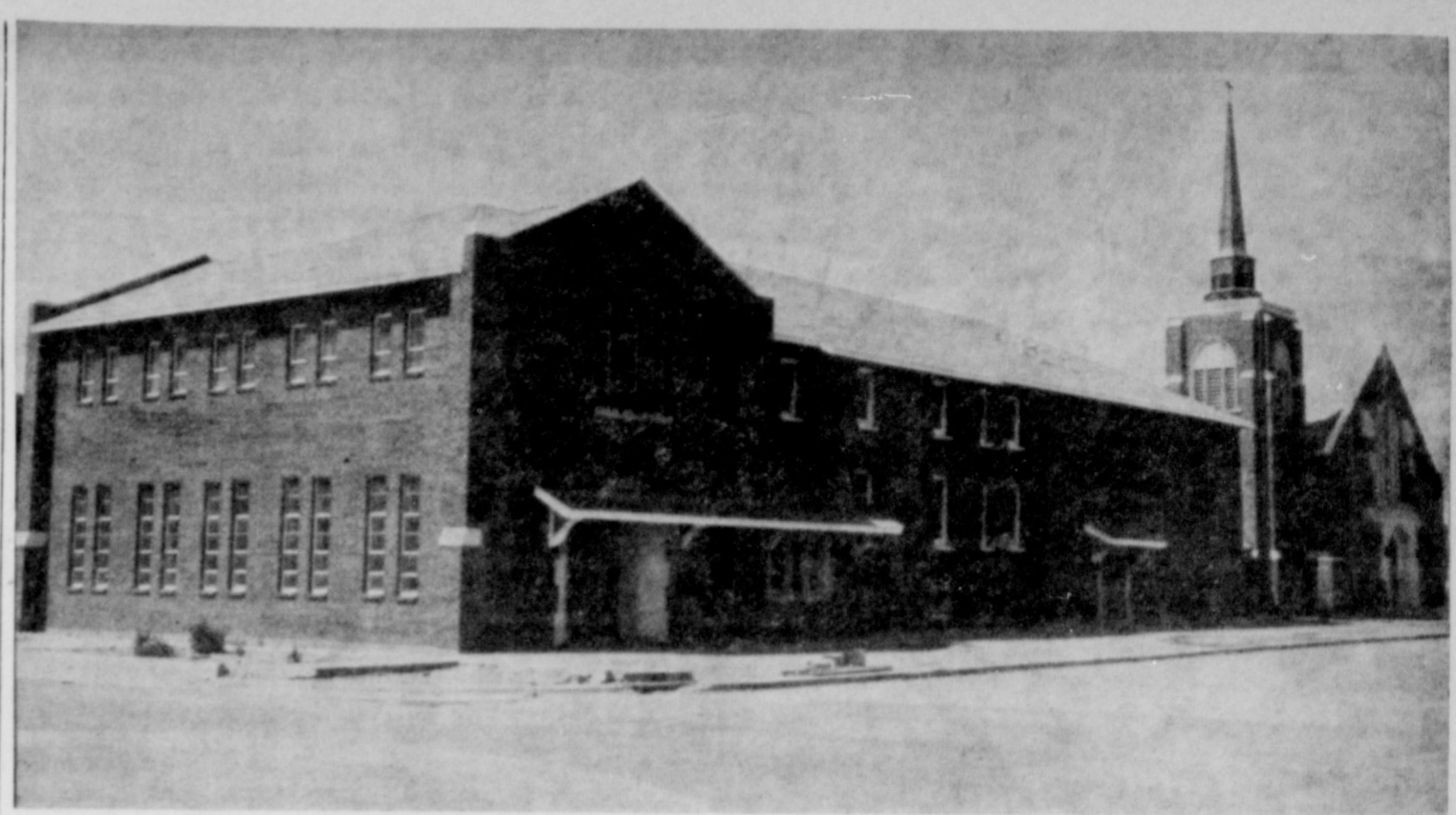
4. An immediate necessity and emergency exists by reason of the public safety and welfare of the citizens and convenience of the citizens of this city and this ordinance shall take effect immediately and shall be enforced from and after its passage and first publication.

NEW METHODIST EDUCATIONAL BUILDING—Open house will be held from 3 to 6 p. m. Sunday, May 22, by the First Methodist Church of Slaton to acquaint the public with the newly-completed educational building. The modern brick structure cost ap-

proximately \$100,000, including furnishings. Established in 1911, the church has grown to a membership of 850 with its property now consisting of a modern brick sanctuary, parsonage and educational building.

New First Methodist Educational Building Marks Growth of Church

With completion of its new \$100,000 educational building, facilities of the First Methodist Church of Slaton now consists of three modern brick structures that are indicative of the steady growth of the church during its 44-year history.

The present modern sanctuary, valued at approximately \$135,000, was completed Feb. 3, 1952. Prior to that, a modern parsonage was erected adjacent to the sanctuary. Only the four walls of the old sanctuary were utilized in erecting the new educational building.

The Rev. J. Lloyd Mayhew has been pastor of the church since June, 1951.

Established in 1911, the church has grown from an original membership of eight to a present membership of 850. Mrs. A. L. Robertson of Slaton is the only charter member with membership in the church at this time.

Other charter members include Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Ellis, Lubbock, Mr. and Mrs. Cash Ramey, Clovis, N. M., the late Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Forrest, and the late Mrs. A. B. Robertson.

At the first quarterly conference, held Oct. 26, 1911, in the home of Dr. and Mrs. S. H. Adams, a membership of 30 was reported.

The church building at the corner of Tenth and Lubbock streets was planned in 1919, but not completed until 1922. It was dedicated in 1929 by Bishop John M. Moore.

Groundbreaking
The present sanctuary has its beginning in March of 1947, when first funds were raised. The groundbreaking ceremonies were held Oct. 1, 1950.

Dedication services for the new sanctuary were held Sunday, Jan. 21, 1954 with Bishop William C. Martin, presiding bishop of the Ft. Worth-Dallas area of the Methodist Church presiding.

Taking part in the dedicatory service were the Rev. Mayhew, the Rev. Elmer Crabtree, and the Rev. J. E. Shewbert, district superintendent of the Lubbock district.

20 Pastors

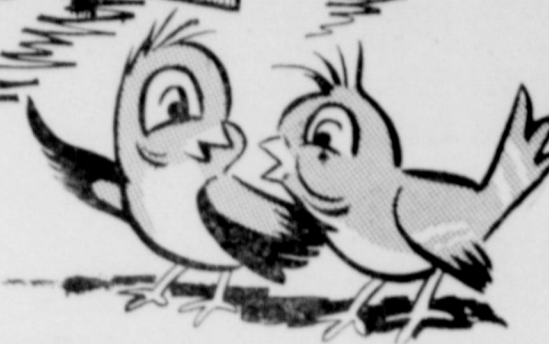

Rare, Valuable Guns Comprise Collection of Santa Fe Employee

From a toy cap gun to a double-barreled pistol made in Belgium in 1604—that's the variety of weapons included in a collection by Wm. M. Rust, 505 E. Crosby St.

A Santa Fe Railway employee since 1915, Rust has been collecting guns and relics for the past 15 years. He presently has approximately 144 weapons, a number of sabres and knives in his interesting and valuable collection.

The genial railroad engineer, who has been assigned to the Slaton division since 1920, points out that each weapon in his collection is educational from a historical standpoint. He further points out that each gun manufactured has been an improvement over previous ones, and he doesn't believe the peak in progress has been reached.

'Atomic Pistols'

"I fully believe that within a few years we will have atomic-powered pistols. Revolvers and rifles

also will probably be atomic-powered as the result of scientists learning new ways to harness the atom," he declared.

Meanwhile, Rust is just as proud of the toy cap pistol in his collection as he is any of the old and valuable ones. The pistol was given to him by Johnny Kerns, now 19 and a student at West Texas State College at Canyon, when he was five years old. Kerns frequently visited the Rust home to admire the gun collection, and insisted that his own "weapon" be included with the others.

Perhaps the most interesting gun in Rust's collection to this writer is an old Philadelphia derringier, similar to the one that was used to assassinate President Abraham Lincoln. Small as present-day water guns, it seems almost impossible that it could have snuffed out the life of the immortal statesman.

A particularly dangerous appearing weapon in the collection is a German Luger that came from the Meuse-Agroonne battlefield in World War I. The weapon has a 32-shot drum magazine and is still in good condition.

Oldest Gun

The oldest gun in the collection is the flint and steel pistol made in Belgium in 1604, and it remains in excellent condition. For the movie fans that have watched numerous duels on the screen, Rust's collection contains several New Orleans dueling pistols.

Rust's Favorite

To mention a few of the other fascinating weapons in the collection there is a percussion cap gun made in 1847 and still in excellent condition; a Springfield rifle made in 1836; an old Sharps rifle, a Spencer rifle that was used during the Indian uprisings; an old Kentucky squirrel rifle; a long-barreled Confederate musket; a silver plated Remington pistol that is more than 100 years old; a Colt's pistol that has past the century mark; a target rifle that has a small arm rest; an old ivory handled handmade gun; and a .36 caliber col more than a 100 years old with original finish.

Perhaps Rust's favorite gun is an 1866 model Winchester. This handsome weapon contains a bronze action with engraved animals. He secured the gun in Oregon. The weapon was especially made to fire pistol ammunition, which is no longer available from the Remington company. In a letter from the Remington people, Rust learned the weapon was originally shipped to Brazil, and that it was returned to this country in some undetermined manner.

Other than the guns, one of the most fearsome weapons that Rust owns is a huge knife that was used by the Japanese during the Bataan death march. Gripped with both hands, the weapon can easily decapitate a person. Powder flasks, old sabres, steer horns and other relics add to the western atmosphere of the room in which Rust keeps his weapon collection.

Mrs. Rust also collects antiques, but her tastes are of a less violent nature. The "joy of her heart" is a three-piece handmade bedroom suite of solid black walnut. The furniture is over 100 years old and the shipping weight from Detroit, where it was purchased, was 1,236 pounds. The dresser and chest contains heavy marble tops, while the bed is oversized. All three pieces contain identical hand carving. Mrs. Rust also has 100 plates in a collection from all over the world.

Enjoyable Pastime

Mr. and Mrs. Rust find their respective hobbies an enjoyable pastime since their children are married and live away from here.

A number of ribbons have been won by Rust's weapons in the South Plains Fair. The weapons were accumulated over a period of time with Rust's interest increasing along with the collection.

Born and reared on a Tennessee farm, Rust worked as a water boy for the railroad at the age of 12. From the ages of 17 to 21 he was employed as a railroad construction worker. During the years he has been in on the ground floor of railroad improvements from the old scoop coal fire, through the oil burners to the present modern diesel powered engines.

Eligibility Requirements For SSA Benefits To Farmers Explained

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles prepared for farm families by the Lubbock, Texas, District Office of the Social Security Administration.)

In a previous article I discussed the various types of benefits that have been made available to farm families under the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Administration. In this article I want to explain how the farm owner and his family may become eligible for these benefits.

To be eligible, the farm owner must be insured. Being insured simply means that a minimum amount of time together with minimum amount of earnings are required.

We measure this requirement in calendar quarters of the year and call it "quarters of coverage."

Quarters of coverage are used to determine insured status. The law requires that for the newly covered farm owner, who has never worked under Social Security, to work roughly half of the time from 1950 until age 65 or death. Quarters of coverage are given where net profit from farm operations are at least \$400 or more each year. Where the minimum earnings are made four quarters of coverage are given. For example, a farm owner who becomes 65 in 1960 will require five years where his net profit from farm operations has met or exceeded the \$400 requirement. This will, of course, give him 20 quarters meaning that the requirement for a fully insured status is met. After 40 quarters of coverage have been earned a lifetime insured status is required.

Requirements are similar for the farm hand. He, too, must have a minimum number of quarters of coverage. However, this person will be given a quarter coverage for each \$100 of cash wages paid him during the year. Only four quarters of coverage may be earned in one year.

This becoming insured entitles the farm owner to benefits when he is 65 or over and no longer employed. These benefits range from \$30 to \$108.50 per month. Also,

his wife, if 65, or his wife and children if there is a minor child may receive benefits. In this event, family benefits range from \$30 to \$200 per month. Further, in case of the farm owners death family benefits to his wife or children may be paid. Minimum family benefits in these cases are \$30 and the maximum is \$200.

Research May Have Answer To Urban Fly Problem; New Baits Developed

Insecticide-resistant flies on farms, as well as urban-type houseflies and blowflies, got bad news last week from entomologists of the USDA. It came in the form of an announcement that new, effective baits for their control had been developed.

Here are some of the results reported. At a rendering plant that processed dead animals and the refuse of slaughter houses, one bait material reduced the fly population 99 per cent within four hours. At a city dump, control of houseflies and blowflies ranged between 97 and 99 per cent 24 hours after treatment. On garbage and trash piles in an urban slum area, daily treatment provided progressively better control until, at the five day, control was 90 per cent or more.

Insecticides used in the test baits were all organic phosphate compounds. Two of the chemicals,

malathion and L. 13/59, had proved effective against resistant flies in dairy barns. Promising materials included in the test were chlordion and an experimental phosphate, OS-2046. They were greatly diluted in mixtures of molasses, malt or sugar or water—the fly attractants.

At the rendering plant, daily application of malt baits containing one per cent OS-2046 gave the best control of the predominantly blowfly population. On garbage and trash piles, one per cent chlordion in a malt bait gave the most effective control of blowflies. On city garbage dumps, both houseflies and blowflies were most effectively controlled with malt bait containing one per cent OS-2046 and two per cent malathion. Nearly effective, said the scientists, was two tenths per cent L-13/59 in sugar-water solution and two per cent malathion in blackstrap molasses.

The scientists predict widespread use of the baits.

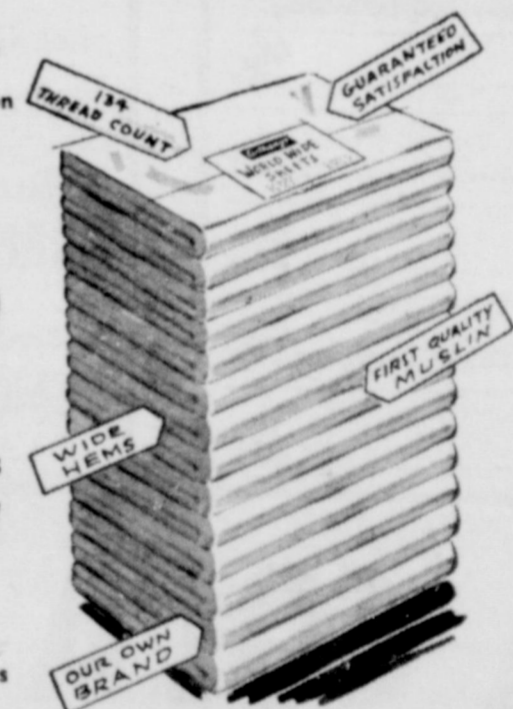

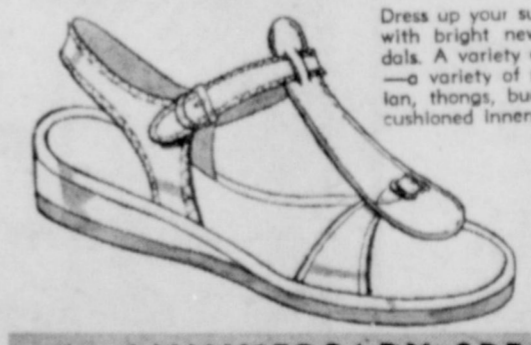

**TEXAS MOTORISTS REQUESTED
TO WATCH FOR CHILDREN
IN TRAFFIC**

"Bring 'em up, don't run 'em down!"
In these words, E. C. McFadden of Dallas, vice president, Employers' Casualty Co. and president, Texas Safety Association, Inc. today made a plea to Texas motorists to watch out for children in traffic. McFadden was speaking in connection with the child pedestrian and bicycle safety program being sponsored this month by the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"Every year thousands of children are injured and killed in motor vehicle accidents," McFadden said. "To improve this tragic situation, every driver must keep alert for children."
According to National Safety Council statistics, 4,400 children under 15 were killed in traffic in 1953, and approximately 225,000 youngsters in this age group were injured, McFadden said.
"Of those who died," he said, "2,000 were killed in cities, and 2,400 were killed in rural areas."
McFadden also pointed out that in 1953 almost 2,000 of the youngsters who lost their lives in traffic were pedestrians.

"A total of about 82,000 child pedestrians were injured and killed that year," he said, "and most of these accidents occurred to children crossing streets between intersections, coming onto streets from behind parked cars or playing in the roadway."

To avoid bringing harm to children in traffic, McFadden suggested that drivers follow four safety rules. The rules are:

1. Always expect the unexpected where children are concerned, remembering that children are unpredictable and that the motorist must think for them in traffic.
2. Give young bike riders every break.
3. Drive with extreme caution near schools and playgrounds and in residential areas—in fact, near any place where children may be expected to gather.
4. Be especially alert in school areas for signs, signals, traffic police, school patrols and for children themselves.

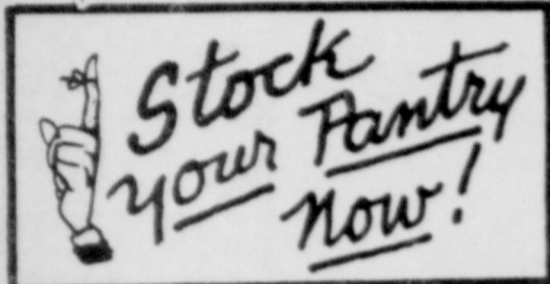

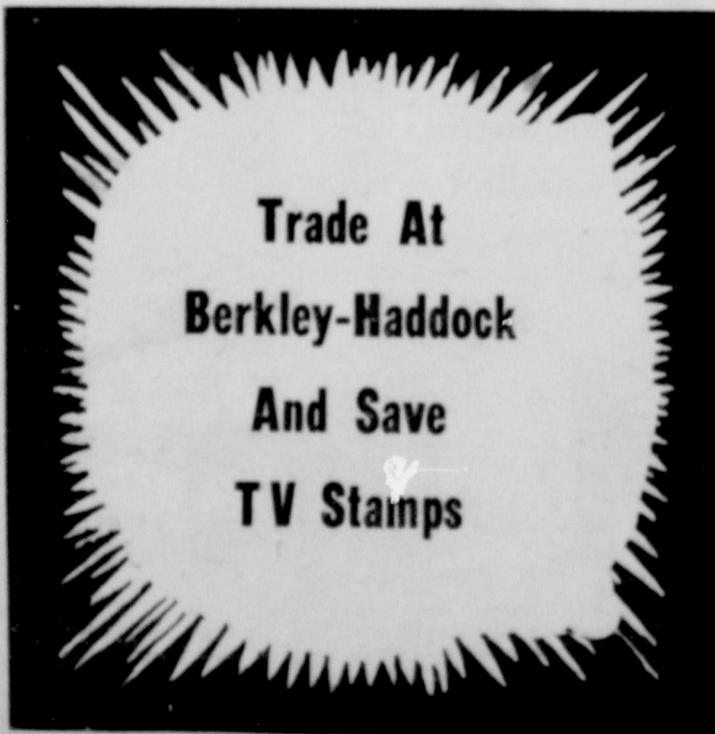

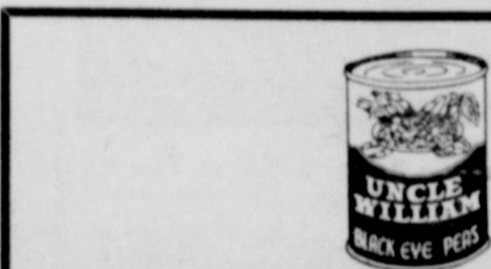

GARDENING HINTS FOR THE WEEK

As the spring-blooming bulbs such as Tulips, daffodils and hyacinths come to the end of their blooming season, they will need home special care so they can develop large strong bulbs for the next season.

As the bulbs have more or less exhausted themselves blooming and now must develop bulbs for next season, it will help to give them a light application of liquid fertilizer. All green leaves should be left on the plant since they are the organs that are manufacturing the food to develop the bulbs. The leaves should be permitted to mature and die naturally before being removed.

If the bulbs are to be in a bed where other plants are to be set immediately as many roots as possible and reset at the same depth as before. The soil should be firmed and the plant kept well watered. Some gardeners also give a very light application of liquid fertilizer. Bulbs treated in this manner usually develop bulbs large enough to bloom the next season.

Layer Cake
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs, separated
2 cups cake flour, sifted
1/4 tsp. salt
2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/3 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla

Method
Cream the shortening, add sugar gradually and beat until fluffy then add the beaten egg yolks. Sift the dry ingredients together three times. Add alternately with the milk and vanilla. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in 2 layers at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Spread the pineapple filling between the layers and ice with Seven Minute icing and cover with fresh grated coconut.

Pineapple Filling
1 small can crushed pineapple
1/2 cup sugar
1 tsp. corn starch
1 tsp. lemon juice
Cook until thickened. Cool.

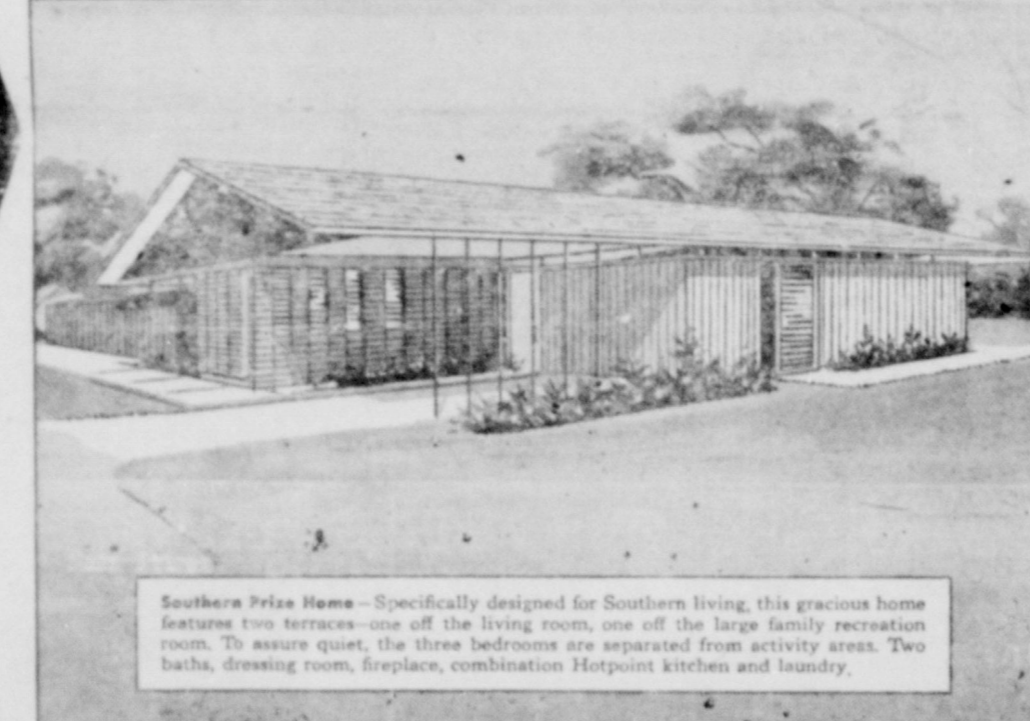

C. M. McPherson and class officials looked into the costs and expenses of several places and the class finally decided upon one near New Braunfels, Texas.

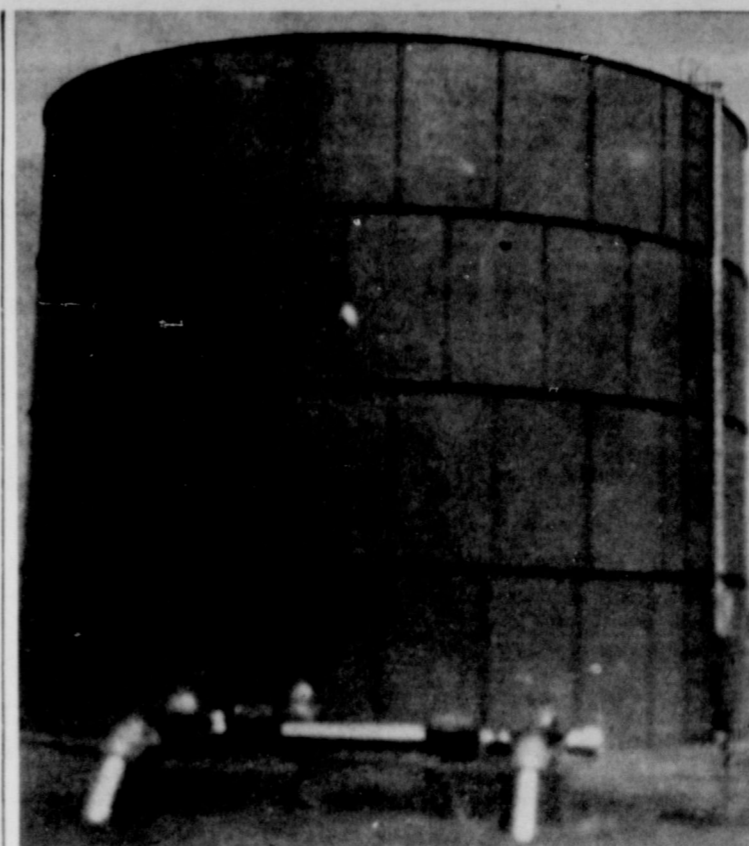

tracting and actual work on the station. An engineering estimate for the job was \$38,000, with a saving of \$15,000 by the water department doing the work.

The new station area provides places for three additional wells, which will not be drilled until needed, Davis said. He pointed out that seven of the city's old wells are not in operation at the present time as they are being "allowed to rest" until the peak demand this summer.

"There is no chance of a water shortage in Slaton this summer," Davis declared. He pointed out that with completion of the new station, the city now has 20 wells capable of producing 3 million gallons of water daily with a total storage capacity of 1,370,000 gallons.

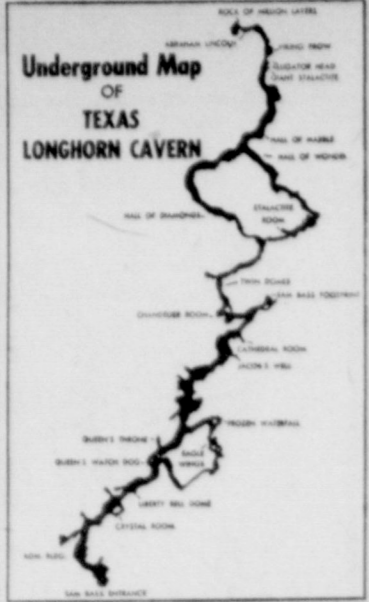

CLASSROOM TEACHERS GROUP OFFERS COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP

Plans of the Slaton Classroom Teachers' Association to offer a college scholarship to worthy high school seniors were announced this week by T. C. Martin, president.

The scholarship has been named after A. C. Strickland of McGregor, former president of the association and former agriculture teacher in the high school, who originated the idea. He is now retired.

Martin said announcement of the winner of the first annual A. C. Strickland Scholarship will be made at the 1955 commencement exercises Monday, May 23.

The money, not to exceed \$50 per long term semester, will be given at the beginning of the first and second semesters of school to the proper person at the college selected by the student. The executive council of the SCTA will check on the recipient at the end of each grading period to see if the student has maintained the proper grade point average of 1.5 or better in order to qualify for the next semester.

Qualifications for the scholarship follow: scholarship, B. average or better; citizenship and attitudes, list extracurricular interests; need, should be given preference if scholarship and citizenship equal; must plan to be educational major, must be a graduating senior; must have attended Slaton High School at least during junior and senior years; should plan to be a teacher.

If for any reason the student should drop out or be disqualified in any way, the remaining portion of the scholarship fund shall remain in the A. C. Strickland Scholarship fund of the Slaton Classroom Teachers.

Applications, including the following, should be turned in to the chairman of the scholarship committee of SCTA not later than March 15: letter of application; statement about family background and financial status; essay on why student wants to be a teacher; letters of recommendation from principal of school, three or more teachers of academic subjects, Slaton school supervisor and two laymen; letters of recommendation must be mailed directly to the scholarship committee; recommendations must be without reservations; final choice should be made by the executive council of the association at the May meeting on the basis of recommendation of the

executive and council and the results of speeches made by students on "Why I Want to Teach."

Funds for the scholarship were raised by several different means.

Several teachers contributed money, a cake sale was held at local stores, the school donated receipts from a concession stand at a basketball game, and teachers sponsored the "Serenaders" program locally.

Martin expressed appreciation to everyone that helped make the scholarship possible.

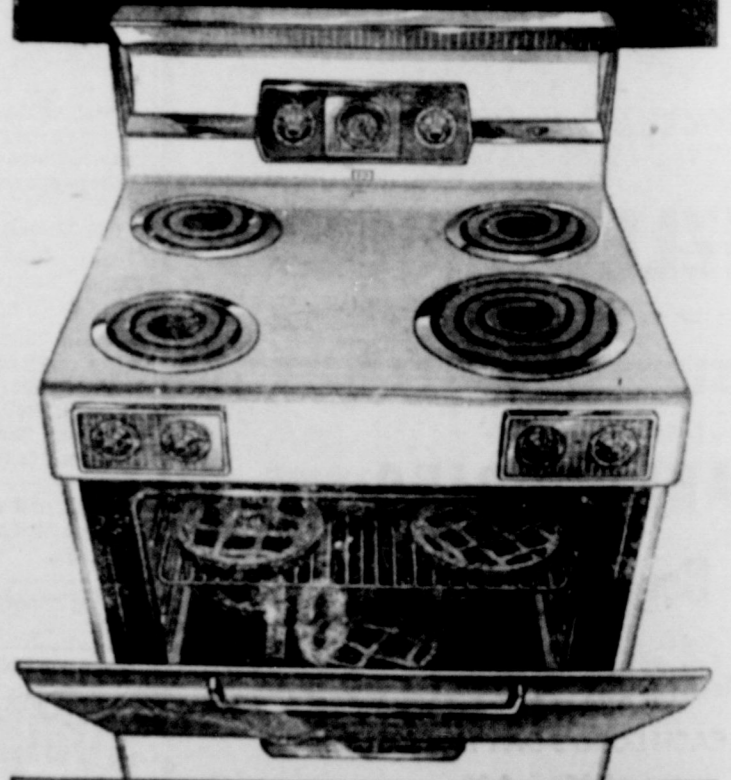

He praised the work of U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson as Senate majority leader.

He stated that he started negotiations with U. S. Interior Secretary McKay, looking to the solution of technical problems in involving control of tidelands oil and gas leasing - and he expressed the opinion that Texas' tideland problems were more technical than legal.

Shivers may ask the Legislature to set up state control over the distribution of polio vaccine. His decision will follow a conference with Dr. Henry Hollie, state commissioner of health.

One of Shivers' first visitors on his return from Washington was 12-year-old Bernard Andrews. He is spelling champion of the Negro elementary schools of Houston.

Young Andrews told the Governor and Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston that the hardest word he had to spell in winning the championship and a trip to Austin by aeroplane was "zephyr".

Park Bill Passes
Ready for Governor Shivers' signature is the long fought parks bill.

Jointly sponsored by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston and Sen. Carlos Ashley of Llano, the measure provides for \$25,000,000 worth of bonds to build tourist accommodations in state parks.

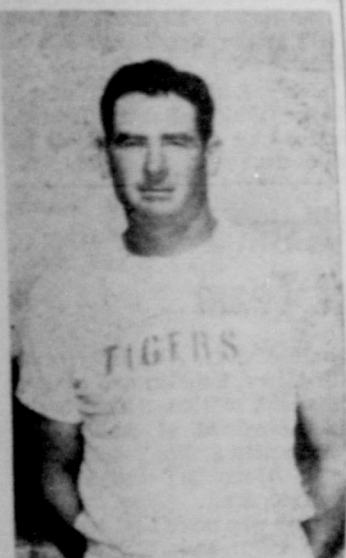

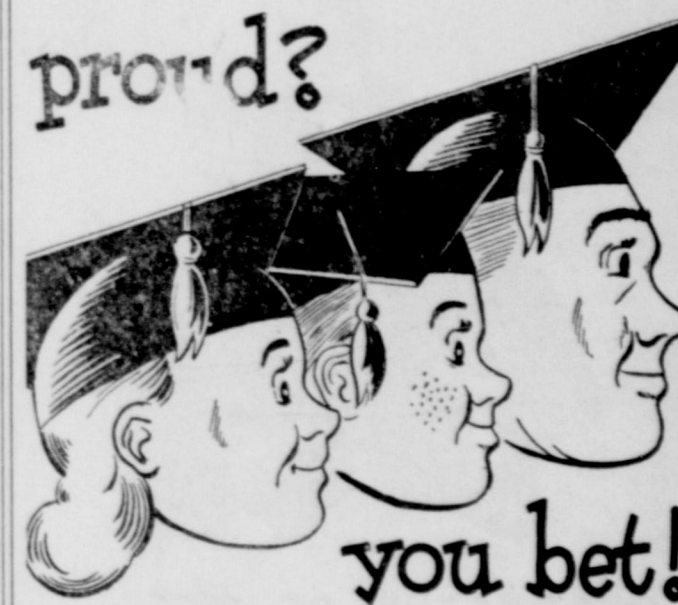

Fighting Tigers of SHS wound up the 1955 season as co-champions of district 5-AA. This was the second year in a row the Bengals have won this honor. They finished the season with a record of 25 wins and five losses. Coach Homer Tompkins' crew was led by five senior boys, who will not be back next year.

REVIEW REVEALS MODERATE ATHLETIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Looking back upon the 1954-1955 athletic season one sees that the Tigers have had a moderate season.

Playing such teams as Amherst, Coahoma, Seagraves, Olton, Floydada, Spur, Tahoka, Post, Abernathy, and Ralls in football the Tigers chalked up a 4-5-1 record. During play, the Tigers received five trophies in various tournaments. In electing captains, Shearer, Martin and Wylie were elected. Shearer, Martin, Smith, Troutt, Roy Wells, and Tommy Kyle will be lost by graduation.

In track, the Tigers placed third in the district with Waymon Muse placing also on regional to represent Slaton at state. Muse and Ronald Smith were named captains of the 1954-55 season. Muse, Smith, will be missing from the track team next year.

In tennis the boys' doubles won district, but was beaten in regional by Kermit. Robert Heaton and Charlie Woodfin were the boys representing Slaton.

Slaton Tigers baseballers have played 12 games so far this year and now have a record of seven wins and five losses. The Tigers have played such teams as: Lubbock, Plainview, Olton, Floydada, Cooper, Lorenzo, and Southland. — H. S. Tigers Cage.

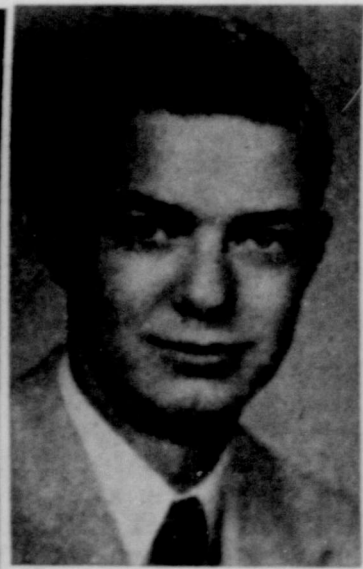
