

THE MARINES WERE THERE

The Marines are to have a special shrine in Philadelphia, where the corps was founded on Nov. 10, 1775. The location will be the so-called New Hall, near Independence Hall, built in 1791 and now to be restored as a memorial museum to the Marines.

Incredible as it may seem, there was a time in our history when they did not exist. After valuable service in the Revolution they were disbanded, just as the navy was, and not reestablished till 1798, when the looming Naval War with France made it advisable to strengthen our armed forces. They have served ever since wherever there was fighting. They were at New Orleans with Andrew Jackson. They fought the Indians.

They put down bandits in Haiti, the Dominican Republic and Nicaragua, at a time when our government was actively intervening in the Caribbean states. Their part at Belleau Wood in World War I is history.

The nation is proud of the Marines. They have earned the Philadelphia shrine.

ART STUMPS THE EXPERTS

"Time to stump the experts!" This was the slogan of "Information Please," some years ago a popular radio quiz program. It took advantage of a common secret desire to prove that experts after all really know little more than the average man. This desire must have caused some pleasure when the Van Meegeren art scandal broke in the Netherlands 10 years ago. It is now recalled by the death of Daniel-George Van Beuningen, a Dutch art collector who played a prominent part in the unmasking of a great deception.

H. A. Van Meegeren, a little known Dutch artist, suddenly confessed that he had painted masterpieces thought to be by 17th century artists. This was confirmed when in prison he painted a picture which experts would have thought the work of the 17th century master, Jan Vermeer. Van Beuningen would not believe that a Vermeer in his possession was a forgery, and sued an art expert who listed his painting among the fakes. The suit had not been tried when Van Beuningen died.

The experts came a cropper over Van Meegren's cleverness.

PLEDGE REAFFIRMED

President Eisenhower, in his keynote address before the United Nations tenth anniversary session in San Francisco, called for a reaffirmation of the faith with which the United Nations was founded.

It was not a speech filled with glittering promises that world peace will come tomorrow but it held out the hope for an era of peace such as the world has never known if the nations of the world are willing to seek it. He mentioned the impending top level Big Four discussions and while he made it plain that he was not predicting miracles he was positive in his statements that we will enter talks loyal to the spirit in which the UN was conceived.

Unfortunately reaction to the United Nations, by its supporters as well as by its detractors, has been emotional rather than intellectual. Those who favor the UN have too often been unwilling to concede that it is not a perfect instrument, that its faults are many. Its opponents have very often taken the position that it is a useless, even a dangerous organization.

The fact is that the UN was made by men and as in all man-made things it has imperfections. Yet it has served some extremely useful purposes and has accomplished a great deal of specific good. The President's speech at San Francisco showed an awareness of this and he was speaking for most Americans when he pledged "my country's unwavering loyalty to the United Nations and the reasons for our tireless support of it!"

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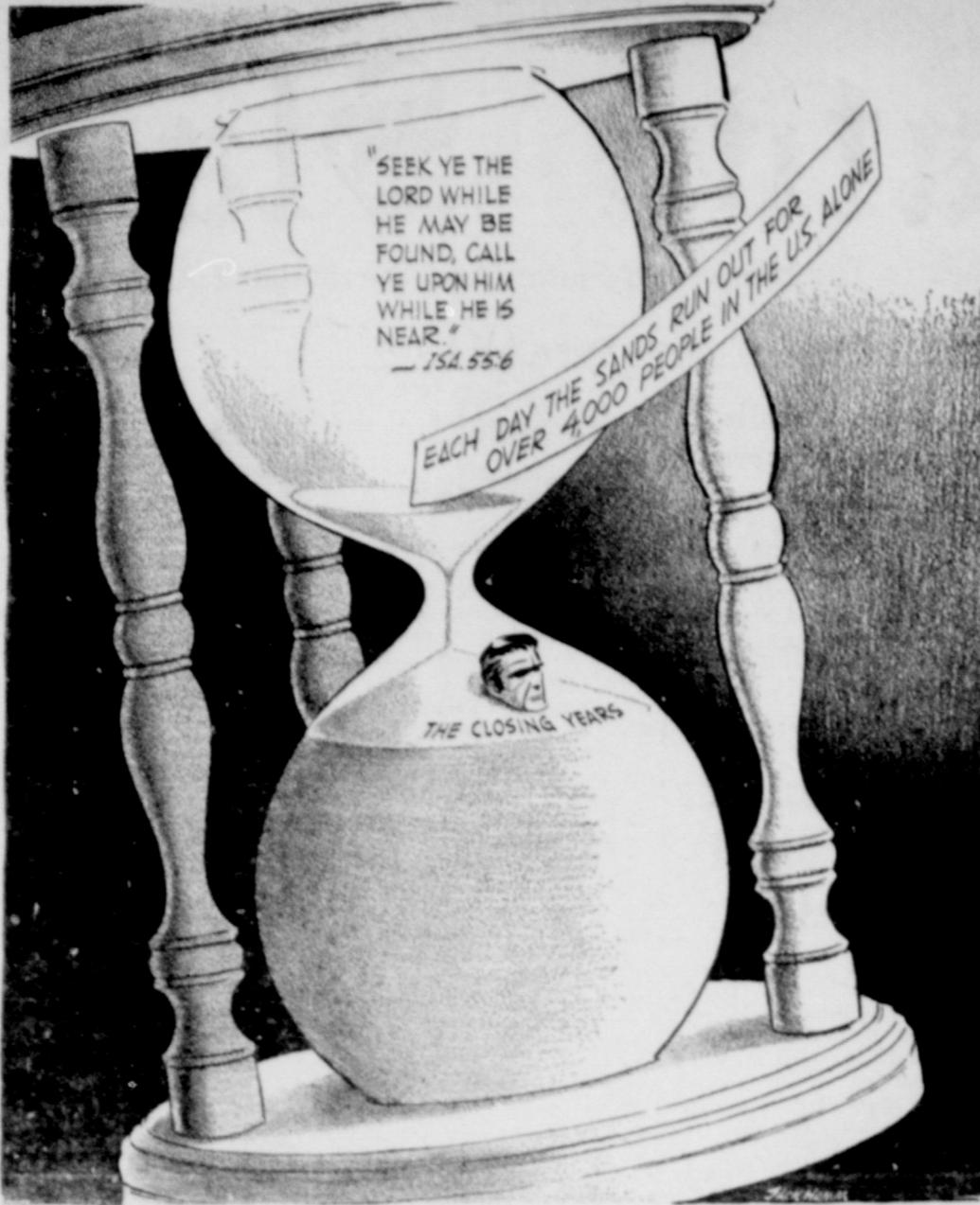

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

Mrs. Hobart Trimpa chose this recipe for Shrimp-Cheese Salad as it a dish they especially enjoy this time of year. She says she got the recipe from an aunt of hers that is a wonderful cook.

Shrimp-Cheese Salad

(serves 12)
3 hard boiled eggs
1 pkg. Lemon Jello
1 cup boiling water
½ teas. salt
1 tbs. grated onion
½ cup mayonnaise
½ cup heavy cream
½ lb. pimento cheese, cubed
1 teas. green pepper
3 cups diced celery
½ medium cucumber, chopped
1 cup walnut meats, broken
1 can shrimp (5 oz.)

Method: Dissolve jello in boiling water; add salt, onion and mix well and chill until fairly well set. Beat into jello the mayonnaise and cream. Toss together the cheese, chopped green pepper, celery, cucumber, walnuts, shrimp, and chopped boiled eggs. Add all this to the jello mixture and place in molds. Serve on salad greens with

mayonnaise and garnish with stuffed olives, chopped parsley and small wedges of tomatoes.

Mrs. Trimpa says you can use more onion if you like and her aunt sometimes adds more cucumbers and leaves the shrimp out. She also uses cheddar cheese occasionally with a little chopped pimento, as the cheddar flavor is very nice.

AUSTIN, TEX.—Selection of a successor to Wright Morrow, Democratic National Committeeman from Texas, is imminent. Because he voted for Eisenhower for President in 1952, Morrow was barred from serving on the Democratic National Committee.

But, Gov. Allan Shivers doubts anyone can be found to fill the prescription laid down by Democratic Chairman Paul Butler.

It must be someone, Butler told Shivers in his famous Washington "kitchen conference," who never bolted the party. It must be someone who worked for Adlai Stevenson's election. And it must be someone who can be approved by Shivers, House Speaker Sam Rayburn, and Senator Lyndon Johnson.

Possibility of replacing Morrow became a by-product of activity by top-level Democratic and Republican figures in the preliminary skirmish toward Texas' role as a battle field in the 1956 presidential contest.

Chairman Butler spent six days in Texas, mostly under the guiding hand of the "Democratic Advisory Council," a group of liberal-loyalists to take over Morrow's duties.

Butler declined an invitation by Governor Shivers to visit the executive mansion; Shivers did not accept Butler's invitation to come to some of his meetings.

Republican National Committeeman Jack Porter followed Butler promptly with a state workers' rally in Austin. He announced he was extending "not only an invitation, but a challenge" to the conservative Democrats who carried Texas for Eisenhower, to join up

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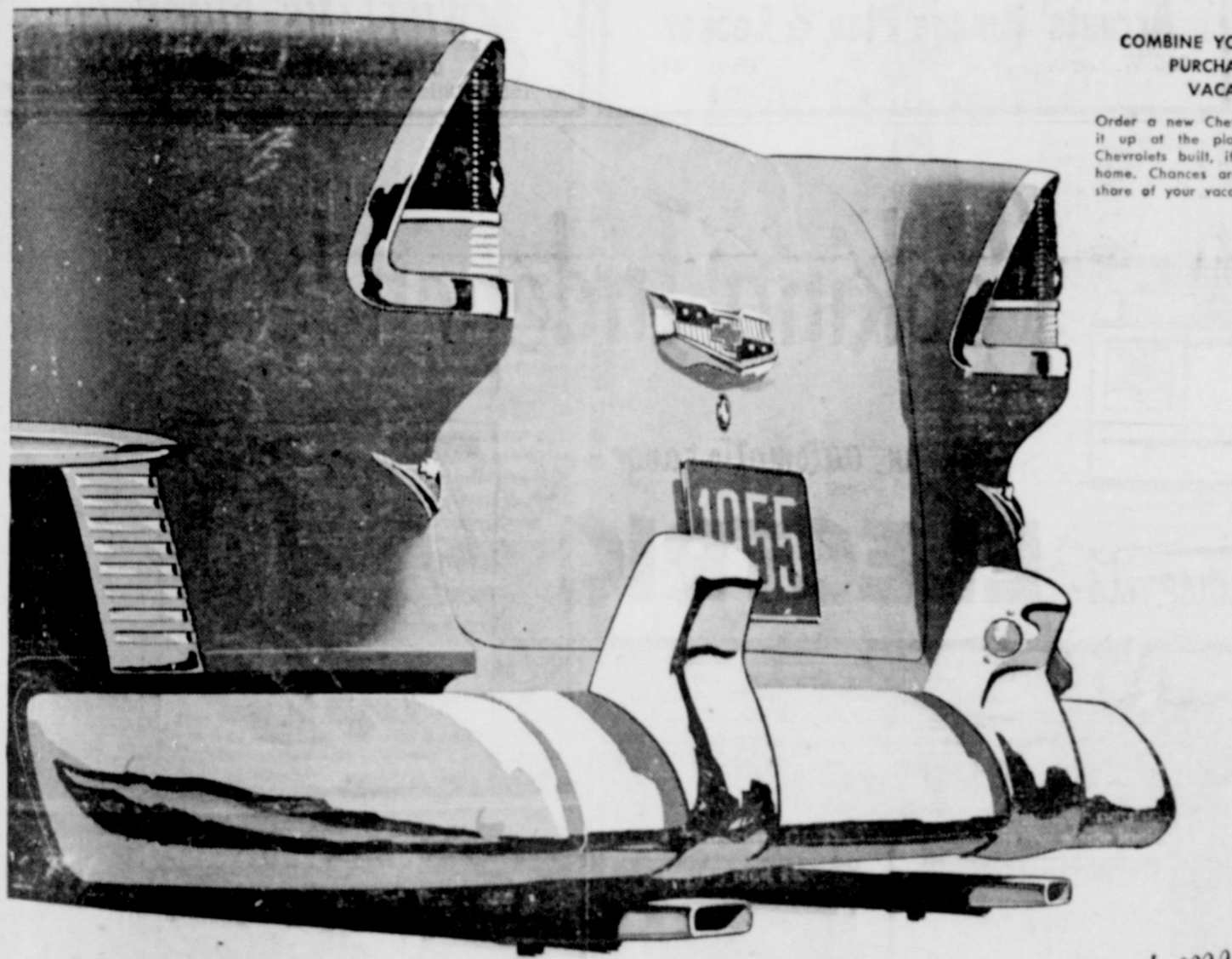

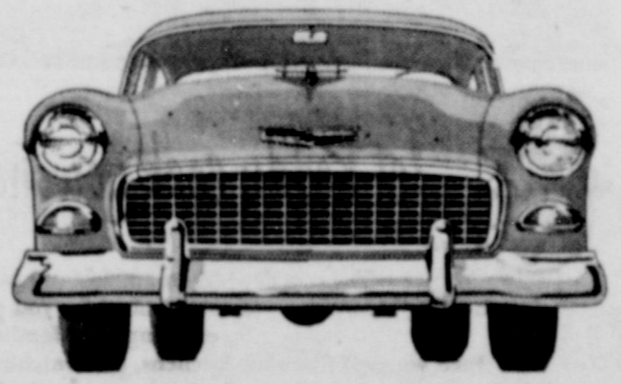

AIR FORCE PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

All veterans of the Slaton area, regardless of former military af-

filiation, who have been out of the service since July 1951 and who possess a skill needed by the Air Force can now re-enlist with an announced today T/Sgt. Herbert C. Ulbrich of the local Air Force Recruiting Station, located at the Post Office.

The re-enlistment program is part of a new policy designed by the Air Force to benefit the veteran and also insure the procurement of the much needed prior service technician. In addition the policy allows veterans with special qualifications a choice of base assignment or overseas theater where he would like to serve.

In the past, one of the greatest deterrents to re-enlistment was the 90 day after discharge time limitation. For veterans who possess skills which are needed by the Air Force, that time has been extended. In other skills which are classed as surplus, grade determination

will depend mostly on date of separation. Veterans re-enlisting with a skill surplus to present needs will be offered the opportunity to train in a specialty of their choice which is currently needed.

At the present time all specialties are listed under six classifications ranging from needed to surplus. From time to time the classifications of the specialties will be changed depending upon the needs of the Air Force.

Sgt. Ulbrich said, "This program revises our re-enlistment policies completely and all veterans should be aware of the many new benefits now available under the policy provisions."

Gardening Hints For The Week

Thin out the old wood of shrubs that have finished blooming.

Stake tall perennials before they begin to bend and break. Tie them with raffia or keep them confined

in wire hoops.

Lawns should not be cut as closely now as in the spring. Remove the clippings as they mat growth.

Cut back the old, hard canes of RAMBLER ROSES when their blooming period is over; prune hybrid perennials; feed plant food and mulch the teas for autumn blooming.

Divide TROLLIUS clumps after they have finished blooming and set them in a partially shaded position. Since flowering clumps will not mature for two or three years, they should be set in a light and well-drained soil.

Despite the development of many imported varieties, sweetclover, one of the oldest soil building legumes, remains the most widely adapted and recommended for use in Texas

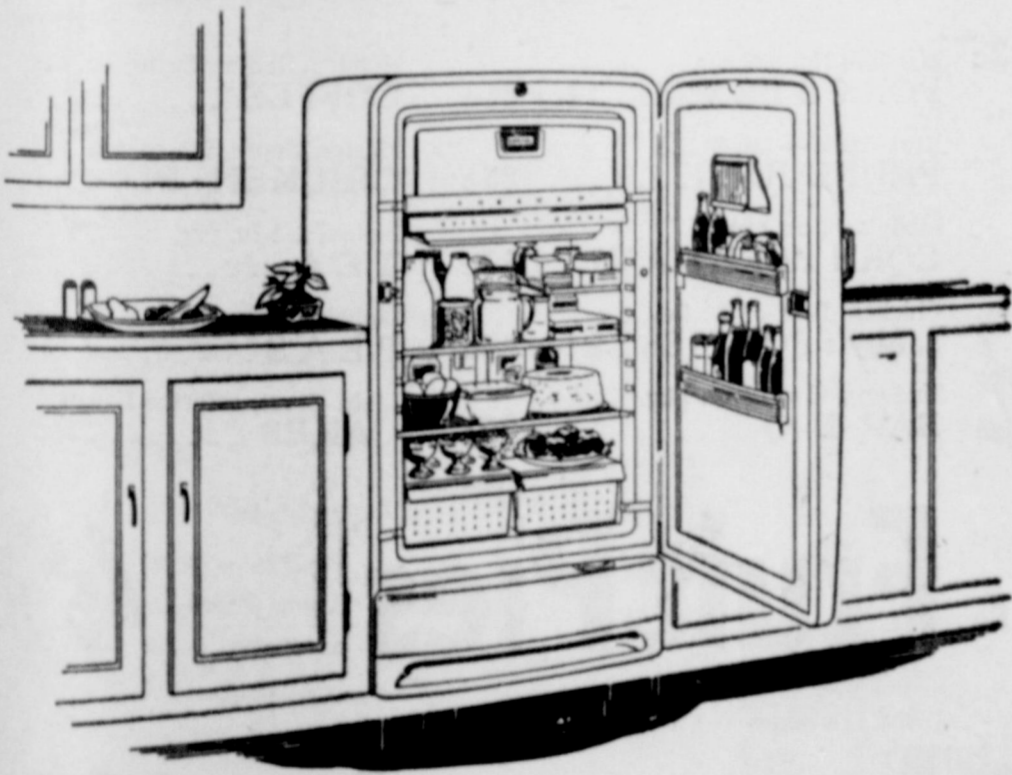

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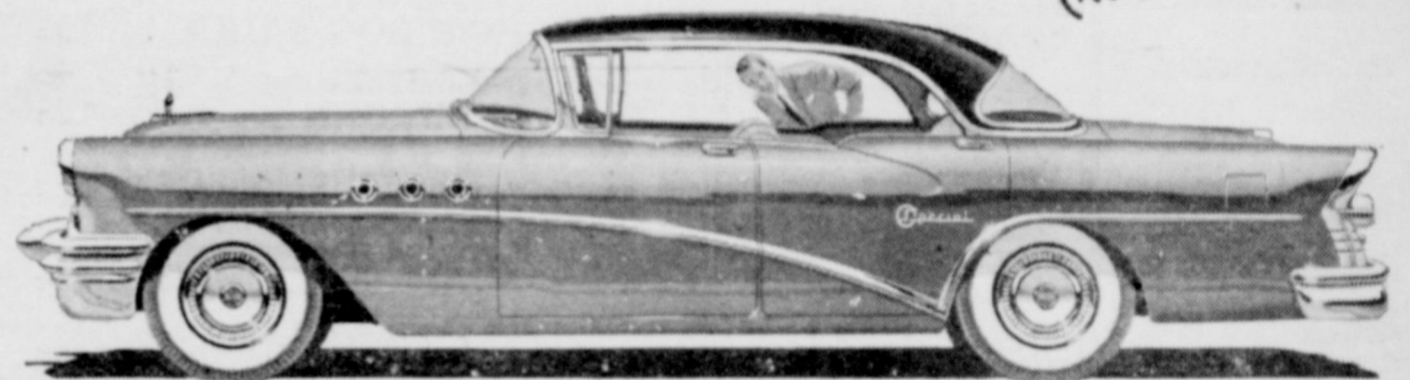
