South Plains residents will have a major water conservation and recreational area almost at their finger tips. Meeting jointly with the Buffalo Lakes committee last week the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce directors voted unanimously to approve a plan to improve the lakes offered by the commit

The project was temporarily christened the Lubbock Water Control and Improvement, District 1, taking in all of Lubbock County's 892 square-mile area.

Before final approval of the plan, representatives will go Austin for consultation with the State Board of Water Engineers. Elmer East, Chairman of the ond committee for the project,

utlined Thursday the steps yet needed before the improved lake area will beome a reality. The committee's plan includes the distribution of a petition for signatures of at least 50 county land owners before its submittal

to Commissioner's Court for ap-If the court grants the petition t must enter an order creating the district and appoint five directors

to oversee its operation. Committee officials said that the court may then call a county-wide bond election to cover the estimated \$1,860,000 cost of the project and the new directors may then proceed with the authorization of the issuance of bonds as voted at the election.

Officials said that engineering data concerning the Buffalo Lakes project also must meet the approval of the State Board of Water Engineers. The attorney general also will have to approve the issuance of bonds.

Plans for the future of the Buffalo Lakes area include a lake of minimum 217 acres with a storage capacity of approximately 5.000 acre feet.

THE MARINES WERE THERE

The Marines are to have a special shrine in Philadelphia, where the corps was founded on Nov. 10, 1775. The location will be the so-called New Hall, near Independence Hall, built in 1791 and now to be restored as a memorial museum to the

Incredible as it may seem, there was a time in our history when they did not exist. After valuable service in the Revolution they were disbanded, just as the navy was, and not reestablished till 1798, when the looming Naval War with France made it advisable to strengthen our armed forces. They have served ever since whereever there was fighting. They were at New Orleans with Andrew Jackson. They fought the Indians.

They put down bandits in Haiti, the Oominican Republic and Nicaragua, at a time when our government was actively intervening in the Caribbean states. Their part at Belleau Wood in World War I is history.

The nation is proud of the Marines. They have earned the Philadelphia shrine.

ART STUMPS THE EXPERTS

"Time to stump the experts!" This was the slogan of "Information Please," some years ago a popular radio quiz program. It took advantage of a common secret desire to prove that experts after all really know little more than the average man. This desire must have caused some pleasure when the Van Meegeren art scandal broke in the Netherlands 10 years ago. It is now recalled by the death of Daniel-George Van Beuningen, a Dutch art collector who played a prominent part in the unmasking of a great deception.

H. A. Van Meegeren, a little known Dutch artist, suddenly confessed that he had painted masterpieces thought to be by 17th century artists. This was confirmed when in prison he painted a picture which experts would have thought the work of the 17th century master, Jan Vermeer. Van Beuningen would not believe that a Vermeer in his possession was a forgery, and sued an art expert who listed his painting among the fakes. The suit had not been tried when Van Beuningen died.
