

POWER BOOM AHEAD

Anyone who doubts that nuclear power is on the verge of a tremendous boom had better take another look at the evidence. Here are two items of information that tell something about the potential.

In the United States, it is estimated, private industry and the atomic energy commission will spend half a billion dollars within the next five years to develop the atom as a source of power.

Worldwide, there is substantial atomic development work in at least 32 nations. The Atomic Industrial Forum reports that 42 nuclear reactors already exist, 20 more are under construction, and close to 50 others are planned.

Such figures give little real idea of the vast development to come. Says Fortune magazine:

"To provide the world with even one-half as much energy, per capita, as the United States enjoys, would require an investment of billions of dollars a year for as long as the world population continues to expand."

Yet the mere existence of this vast market for nuclear power does not mean that it is going to be supplied. First we need a rising level of world prosperity, and the absence of full-scale war.

Atomic power itself may help to bring about both of these. As backward regions get power, prosperity is bound to rise. And if the world concentrates on building nuclear reactors instead of bombs, the basic economic reasons for war may be done away with.

ATOMIC HAMBURGER

A housewife in upper New York state made history the other day by frying a hamburger on an electric stove. It was a history-making hamburger because the current to cook it came from an atomic reactor, the first in the free world to produce commercial power.

The significance of this event, coming almost precisely ten years after the first atomic bomb explosion in the New Mexico desert, can hardly be over-stated. For when Admiral Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the atomic energy commission, threw the switch he formally ushered in the atomic-electric age.

This does not mean that we are going to have cheaper and more abundant power all at once. The reactor at West Milton, N. Y., is a small one. Not until about two years from now will this country's first full-scale commercial reactor go into action.

At this early stage electricity produced by an atomic reactor is more expensive than electricity produced by coal or oil or water. Costs must be brought down sharply.

But that is exactly what is happening. For example, the Rural Co-operative Power Association at Elk River, Minn., hopes to build a reactor which it thinks will produce power there 14 per cent cheaper than coal. We have crossed the threshold into the era of atomic power. Great and beneficial changes lie ahead.

WHAT IS A FARM?

What is an American farm like? The U. S. Information Agency is trying to tell the world and having a difficult time of it.

A farm in this broad land is a 10,000-acre ranch where beef cattle are produced by a combination of cowboy techniques and modern production and marketing methods. A farm is 160 rocky New England acres that produce chickens, hay, apples and maple syrup. A farm is a dairy spread on the outskirts of a great city. A cotton plantation in the deep South, a corn-hog operation in Iowa.

A farm is many things, so many that the USIA broadcasts tell of seven types ranging from subsistence farming to wheat production. Listeners abroad are getting one more chapter in the story that says the United States is a big country inhabited by a vigorous people who make good use of unparalleled natural resources.

South Plains Fair Livestock Dept. To Have New Look

The Livestock Department of the Panhandle South Plains Fair will take on a new look this year with the construction of additional barns to house cattle and swine. Preliminary grading work has already begun at the building site.

A new livestock barn, swine barn and swine judging arena will be built next to the present livestock building to allow much more space for an expected record number of livestock entries. Premiums in both departments nearly doubled this year and Fair officials expect a large influx of new breeders to show animals at the Fair, Sept. 26 through Oct. 1.

In addition, a contract has been let for additional paving on the carnival midway. An extension to the present paved midway, 350 feet by 175 feet, will cost more than \$11,000. This work is expected to begin within the next several weeks.

The new livestock barn will measure 90 feet by 100 feet and will be located adjacent to the present judging arena. This and the other new building will be of corrugated steel.

The new swine barn and swine judging arena will be located next to the present swine barn, and this new structure will be 85 feet by 200 feet.

These additions will cost approximately \$35,000.

Fair goers will also notice many improvements throughout the grounds. Early this spring the Fair Association began an extensive beautification project and has planted numerous trees and shrubs in all sections of the sprawling Fairgrounds.

The feature attraction of the 1955 exposition will be the appearance of "Holiday On Ice" in Fair Park Coliseum. Nine performances of this colorful ice spectacle will be presented beginning Sunday, Sept. 25 and continuing through Friday, Sept. 30.

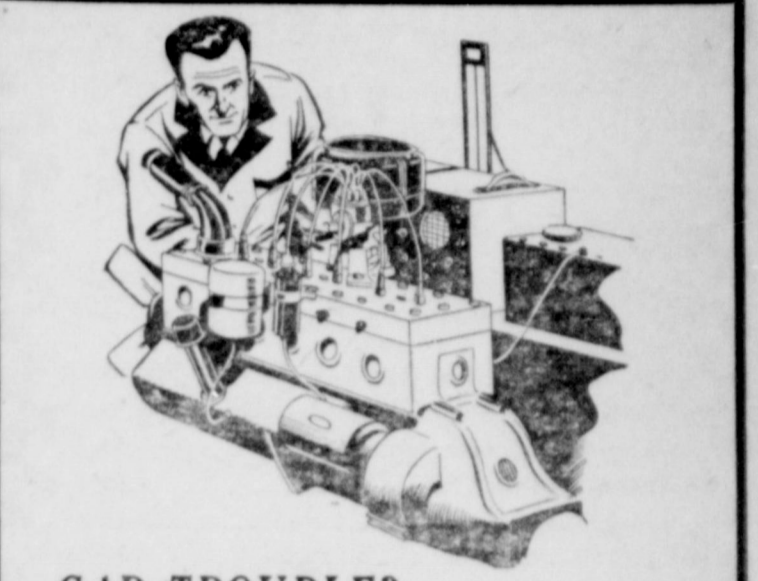

Lions Hear Talk On Many Duties Of Fire Fighters

Lions Club members heard Bartlett R. Jones speak Tuesday, on the many types of duties of the Slaton fire department.

One of the most important duties of the department is Life Saving, including first aid, treatment for drowning, electrical shock and other types of aid. When the department arrives at the scene of a disaster, the first thing the men are concerned with, is the saving of human life.

Another thing the fire department is concerned with, is safe driving through city streets with the fire engines. Along with safe driving, the department urges townspeople not to follow the fire engine. Too many automobiles at the scene of a fire could very easily hinder or make dangerous the job of the men who are attempting to fight the fire.

The firemen are trained to make on the spot analysis of the fire or disaster and decide which equipment is needed to handle existing conditions, Jones told the group.

Firemen, according to Jones, must know how to care for their equipment so as to make it last

and function properly. Slaton has 18 firemen on the force according to Jones. These men are all volunteer firemen, with the exception of a full time man on duty 24 hours per day. This man also is the driver for the department.

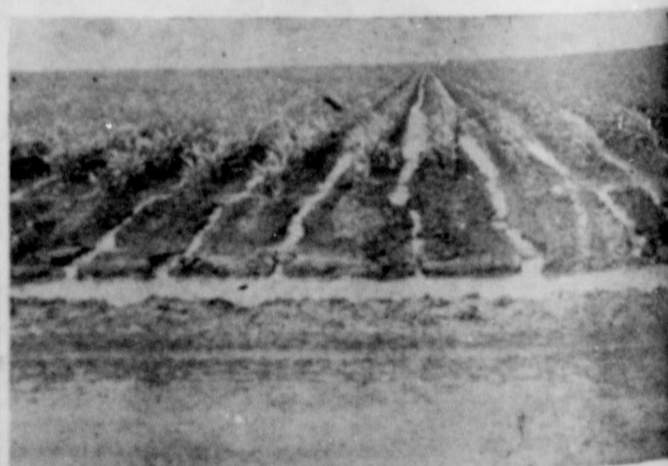

Gardening Hints For The Week

Hardy PHLOXES that have finished blooming should have their old flower heads snipped off. This will prevent seeding and encourage a second crop of blooms.

COLUMBINES often die after two or three years and therefore should be treated as biennials for the best results. Seeds are best sown now.

Hardy fall CHRYSANTHEMUMS will flower best if they are heavily watered and well fed with plant food. If flowers languish in spite of cultivation and watering, most likely they are hungry. Feed them with Vigoro.

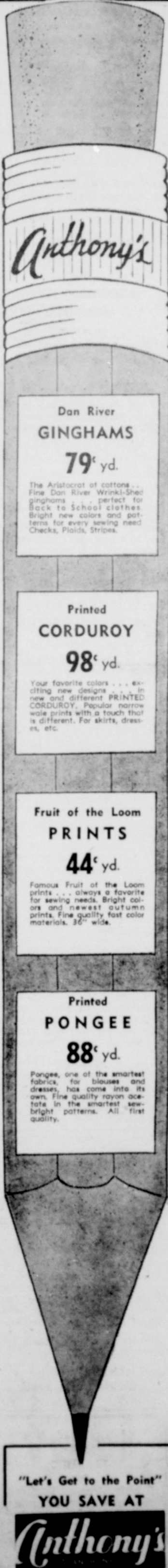

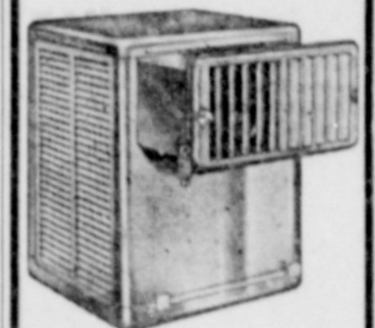
