from 1840 lbs. of seed cotton or 480 lbs. of lint and 770 lbs. of seed. Denton lives in the Hackberry community near where he was raised. The Denton family, including his parents, have lived in Slaton's trade area for 30 years according to Mrs. Bisbee of the Chamber of Commerce.

CRACK IN THE CHEST

The American Cancer Society announces that its local chapters will no longer be permitted to take part in federated drives or community chests. The Society will raise its money by special appeals. The Red Cross has already taken the same stand, and a similar position is hinted as likely to be adopted by the national polio and heart funds.

The reasons given by the Cancer Society are desire to concentrate on public education about this disease, without possible confusion by other charities seeking support, a wish for direct relationship between givers and the fund, and complete control of the money raised.

These are all worthy causes, but all take the attitude that theirs is the worthiest. Many local charities are equally deserving of support. The one point overlooked is that a multiplicity of appeals will dry up the supply of generous givers, and then all alike will suffer.

FAMILY INCENSE

The smoke of incense—a special kind of incense—is rising into the still air in backyards all over the country these summer evenings. This smoke does not come from votive fires nonoring some pagan god, but from charcoal grills. The incense is laden with the odor of sizzling hamburger, weiners, steak-fragrances more satisfying in the nostrils of a hungry man, than the most exotic scents of Araby.

Grilling food over glowing coals is rapidly becoming a favorite outdoor sport in America. It is done in the humblest of backyards, and in secluded corners of great estates. The grills range from small metal tripods to elaborate stonework affairs with built-in electric spits.

Father is generally at the grill. This doesn't always make matters easier for Mother, who still has to fetch and tote and have everything else ready.

But backyard meals of this kind are a fine thing, even when the steak gets a little too black on the outside. They bring the family together for a pleasant hour without benefit of television. That's a real achievement, in this electronic age.

SLEEPY TIME DATA

The Men's Pajama Institute has surveyed male sleep-wear habits from top to bottom. In the process it has turned up some data with interesting psychological overtones.

The study shows that 73 per cent of the men questioned wear pajamas. Presumably the others sleep in nightshirts or, as the French say, in the natural, except for the latter day Davy Crockett who wrote Tongue-in-cheekily from Brattleboro, Vt., "In the winta I jes' shoot a b'ar and wear the hide."

But-and here's where those psychological overtones sing out loud and clear-Washington politicians are an exception. Most of them prefer gaudy colors and fancy stripes. 

USDA Announces **New Regulations**

COLLEGE STATION,-Effective January 1, 1956, swine that have been fed raw garbage at any time in their life and products derived from them will not be permitted to move interstate unless given special processing. The special processing reduces the value of hogs in some cases as much as 50 percent, says the announcement from the U. S. Department of Agricul-

This regulation in effect since July 1953 was relaxed to permit garbage feeding establishments to obtain the necessary cooking equipment. It is now available. Since Janary 1954, hogs, and products derived from them, that had at some time been fed raw garbage could be shipped interstate for any purpose, if for 30 days preceding shipment they had been fed cooked garbage or feeds other than raw garbage. This relaxed regulation goes out on January 1, 1956.

Vesicular exanthema is caused from a virus and in recent years was a threat to the nation's swine industry. Infections are limited now in isolated premises in 39 counties of six states, Forty-six states, including Texas, have passed laws prohibiting the feeding of uncooked garbage chief cause of the spread of the

Department officals point out at about 83 percent of the 14,000 garbage-feeding plants, and more than 80 percent of the hogs fed garbage in the United States now get it cooked. But, experience indicates, they say, that cooking must be 100 percent for complete control of the disease.

Lynn County Wind Erosion Program Planned By ASC

A practice of seeding grain sorghums, sweet sorghums, sudan grass, millet, barley, or rye to establish a cover for control of wind erosion is expected to be set up for Lynn County, according to Dee Green of the local ASC Office.

Requests for this practice are now being accepted at the Lynn County ASC Office. Approvals will be issued for such requests just as soon as the practice is approved by county and state committees and the Soil Conservation Service.

Triple dwarf grain sorghum and volunteer crops will not qualify. Sorghums, millet or small grains should be planted at the following seed rates per acre: Grain sorghams, sweet sorghums and sudan grass in normal width rows, 5 to 6 ounds per acre; in rows 16 to 24 inches wide, 10 to 12 pounds: drilled or broadcast, 15 to 18 pounds; millet, 10 to 12 pounds; barley, oats, or rye, 30 to 40

The article in its entirety is as follows: Public relations can be complex and heavily financed or it can be simple, direct, and inexpensive like a very effective program completed in Slaton,

Reporting for his city, City Secretary J. J. Maxey wrote, "All cities have or have had public relations problems. Slaton has been no exception to the rule."

Slaton is an exception, however, at least among small cities. Her officials tackled the problems of public misunderstanding and dissatisfaction in newspaper articles and good will activities spread over a seven month period.

Beginning with an article on the city's sewerage system published in Nov. 1954, the local newspaper covered every department in the city government, plus each commissioner individually. Additional articles on special events such as a recent banquet for public employees appeared during the public te lations period which ended in

Slaton's officials used two other devices, profitable in terms of good will and inexpensive. They bought a sign for the city hall and they designed service pins for city employees. The sign read "Slaton City Hall-Welcome." At a banquet in May, the pins were presented to employees with three, five, ten and 15 years service.

City operations covered in 8 newspaper articles included the sewer system, sanitation, streets police, fire protection, cemetery water, and taxation. Another article dealt with Slaton's form of government-home rule mayor-commission-and profiles of four commissioners concluded the series All articles were sympathetic and informative, connoting the sincerity of both newspaper reporters and their sources at city hall.
