

THE BUSIEST PLACE

Ordinarily, when we think of the busy places in town we think of the bank, the market, or the city hall. But you know something? Perhaps the busiest place of all is the school.

We often take the school for granted, forgetting that school business is our business. At school we are busy raising the town's next citizens.

Your school is part of our great democracy and we might just as well realize that it is perhaps the busiest place in town.

In its classrooms are your next policemen, your son-in-law, your secretary, your doctor, a worker at the plant, or perhaps the young couple who will buy the lot next door.

It is up to the school to make sure that he is a good policeman, that he's a responsible son-in-law, that she's an efficient secretary, that he's a reliable worker, that he succeeds as a doctor, and that the folks next door are good neighbors.

And you and your community usually put the responsibility for the education of these future citizens where it belongs, in the hands of the teacher. We know that a child learns more quickly with a good teacher, because the good teacher is the key person who . . .

Oh, where did he go? What's happening. Well, I'll tell you. Literally thousands of well-trained and qualified teachers are finding other lines of endeavor more lucrative and attractive. Consequently, the number of sub-standard emergency type teachers is on the increase. Every time a competent, well-qualified and trained teacher leaves an American classroom to obtain the necessities of life in another profession, the people of America lose. We simply cannot tolerate this sort of thing for long. One of the most alarming statements found in the Teacher Supply and Demand Report for last year is that there were only 867 persons prepared to teach chemistry and physics and this is only a specific example; there are shortages in other lines, too.

What can we do to halt this exodus of competent personnel from our profession? To be sure, salary improvement is basic, and could perhaps do more to alleviate the situation than any other single factor. However, there are other ways. There are certain fringe benefits, the absence of which are causing teachers some concern. For example, whatever can be done to improve the Teacher's Retirement provisions and other security benefits should certainly be done.

Our Legislative Committee recognizes certain weak spots in our Retirement System. It certainly is not a bad retirement system, but there are certain improvements that need to be made in it.

We have now completed an actuarial study to determine what might be done to improve the retirement benefits of Texas teachers. Specific plans based upon these findings have now been presented in the Legislature for the improvement of our Retirement System, and it is hoped that the people of Texas will give serious thought to this as one important avenue of making teaching more attractive to those already in the profession as well as to young graduates of our colleges. As matters stand now, the demand for teachers is very high, while the supply of teachers is dangerously low.

Yes, if we are to have reliable policemen, responsible son-in-laws, intelligent employees, and congenial neighbors, you must depend a great deal upon the quality of your teachers and the quality of your teachers depends upon your support of "the busiest place in your town," the public school.—The Texas Outlook.

POLIO VICTORY

The success of the Salk vaccine means that polio has been whipped in the laboratory. But it is outside the laboratory that the epidemics occur. In cities, in small towns, wherever people live and gather, the danger still exists.

In a tremendous effort to immunize the most vulnerable as quickly as possible, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is making the vaccine immediately available for first and second grade school children. Then the Foundation intends to inoculate as many children beyond those grades as it is able.

The responsibility for immunization lies with the parents. Each first and second grade in every county in the nation should be able to report 100 per cent cooperation. It is only by full cooperation that polio can effectively be contained, can be whipped in the communities as well as in the test tubes.

Though polio most frequently strikes the six to eight year olds, there is no age limitation on its power. Parents whose children will not be vaccinated through the Foundation's program are urged to take their children to their family doctors for inoculations.

The Foundation made possible by the generosity of the public is spreading as far as it can to immunize the primary graders. A child deserves at least as much responsibility from his own parents as this organization is showing to millions.

Mrs. Bailey's main concern was for the baby. The clothing used in England is very rough and she had a hard time trying to find suitable materials. They dress their babies in woolen clothing. When she looked in the magazines and found so many varieties of baby food, she wondered how she ever managed to feed her baby on two kinds. Baby lotion was almost impossible to find.

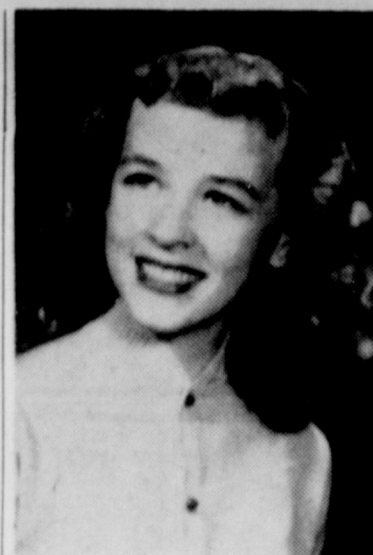
After attending the morning worship service a luncheon was held at 12:30 in Maxey Memorial Hall. The invocation was led by Mrs. Chess Lovern.

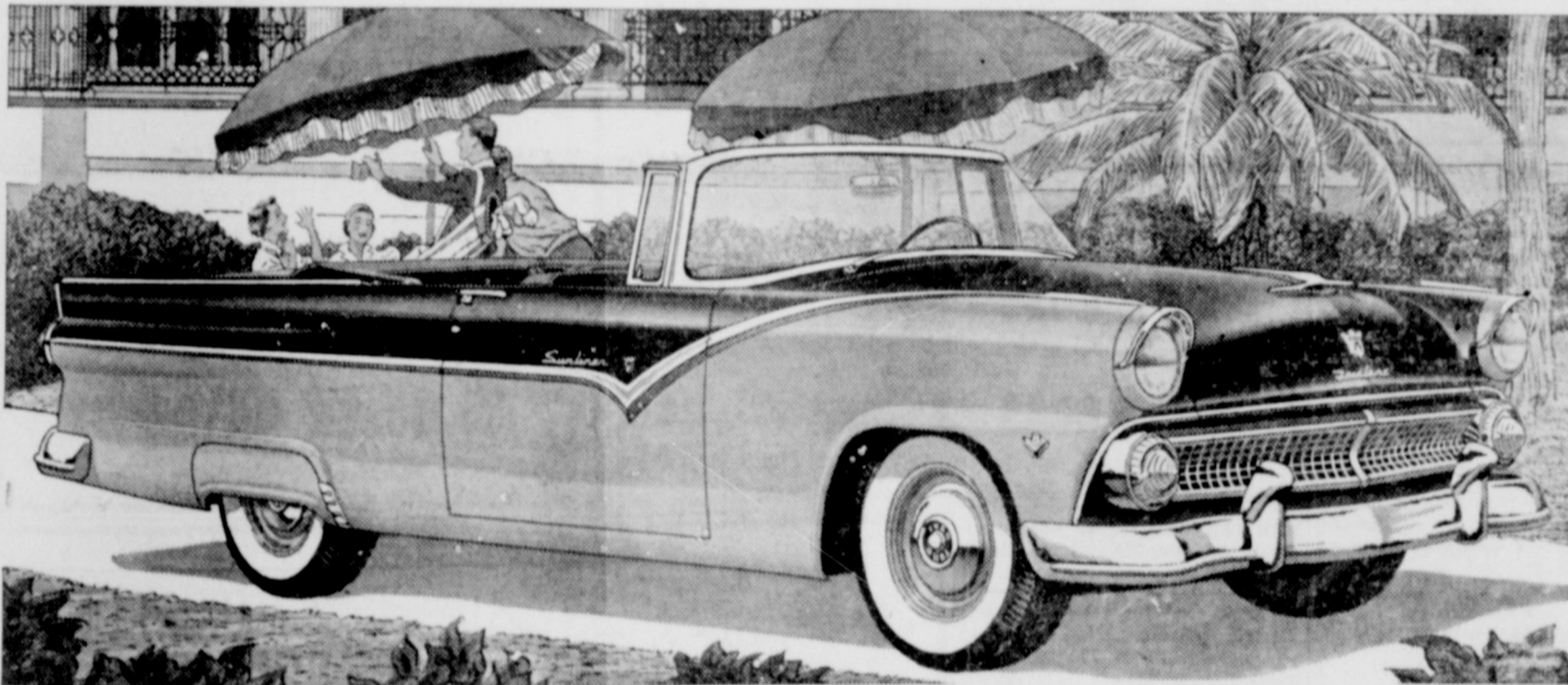

Santa Fe Chief Says Railways Are Burdened Unfairly In 'Separations'

LOS ANGELES, Calif.—Fred G. Gurley, president of the Santa Fe Railway, today testified railroads are burdened unfairly when they are forced to pay "staggering sums" for highway grade separations.

The Santa Fe chief executive, appearing at a public utilities commission hearing at Los Angeles, said there were "serious implications" to the proposal to widen El Nido underpass at Hawthorne Boulevard and the Santa Fe Harbor line in Los Angeles.

He termed this case, subject of the current hearing, as one involving two instruments of commerce and transportation. One instrument, the railroad was privately owned. The other, the highway, was owned by the state.

"Surely," Gurley said, "the state in exercising its legislative authority should never legislate unfairly in favor of the interstate facility it owns, and treat unfairly the interstate facility privately owned."

Gurley said the growth of truck and vehicular traffic necessitated the state highway department's move to widen El Nido underpass.

When Santa Fe's Harbor Line was built, Gurley said, the Santa Fe constructed all highway grade separations along the route from its own funds. On these separations, like others elsewhere, the railroad is forced to continue to pay taxes. But the separations are freely used and enjoyed by truck competitors.

"The (Harbor) Line of railroad built by us some 30 years ago was entirely adequate for our business then, and . . . it is entirely adequate today. The proposals for widening . . . (The crossing) in question in this case stem from increases in highway traffic, not increases in railroad traffic."

"It is most important to note," he said, "that without exception . . . the only significant factor involved is that of improving a street or highway so that more vehicular traffic can move over it. Thus, the demand for grade separations has been identical to the demand for other engineering improvements in the highways, such as providing more lanes, widening curves and flattening out of grades so that heavier traffic can move more expeditiously."

He said it was a matter of "grave concern" to assess railroads unduly for "such unproductive proposals as we have here today." He cautioned that such a demand for payment of "staggering sums" to "sterile" projects from which railroads derive no benefit was to the detriment of the railroads and the nation's economy.

railroad's financial stability and damage its ability to perform the transportation service the economy requires of it.

"To take the railroads' money to build these separations, for use by competitors, deprives them," Gurley said, "of money which we should use in providing the needed new technologies and new instrumentalities of transportation."

"It should be clearly understood," Gurley testified, "that railroads are the only transport agency which is not helped in some way by the taxpayer's dollar . . . no taxpayer pays anything for our plant."

Gurley claimed government gives "artificial competitive advantages" to air, highway and inland water carriers by payments of direct and indirect subsidies. He classed construction of highways and grade separations as among these types of subsidies.

He stressed railroads asked neither subsidies nor favored treatment. They ask only, he said,

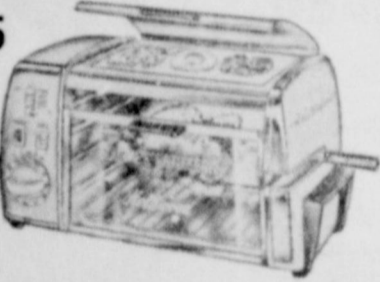

Social Security Representative To Visit May 6

Our representative will be in Slaton at the Red Cross room, City Hall, at 8 a.m. on May 6 and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

The new amendments to the social security law create a bigger and more generous system. Retirement payments are increased, as are family payments when a worker dies, and retired people are permitted to earn more without losing their monthly benefit payments. In addition to these changes, millions more are coming under the system for the first time beginning with January, 1955. Those who are covered under the law for the first time can find answers to most of their questions in leaflets and booklets which may be obtained at any social security district office.

Farm operators, beginning with Jan. 1, 1955, are compulsorily covered under social security just as is any other self-employed business man, and they will, therefore, pay their social security tax along with their income tax return for 1955 by April 15, 1956.

If the farmer does not have a social security account number, he should secure one from the nearest social security district office before his first tax return is due. If he needs tax information he should contact the nearest district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

Many more farm workers are also covered under social security for the first time beginning with 1955. Farm workers who met strict regularity-of-employment tests have been covered since Jan. 1, 1951. Now the new law brings into the system any farm worker who receives at least \$100 cash wages from a farm employer in one year. No specific number of days will have to be worked.

Farm hands who do not have a social security account number card should secure one right away. Any farm employer or employee should check with his nearest social security office to learn just what his rights and responsibilities are under the new social security law.

"This meeting is a family affair, and there will be a place for all of the family," states Bryan Ross, associational Sunday School Superintendent.

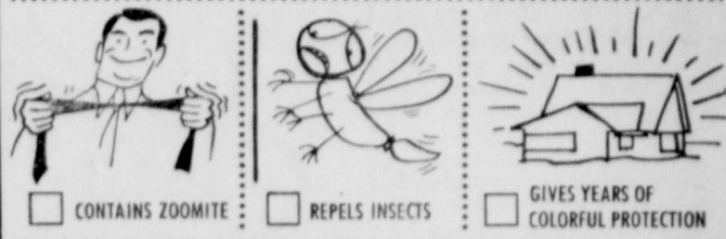
