Theme - Great Chapters Of The Bible.

The third of these series brings us to Colossians 1, which shall be termed the "Colossian" chapter. The outline is very simple:
1-14 Colossians are addressed.
25-29 Christ is hope of Colossians.

As is the usual style, Paul begins with an introduction, and immediately turns to the thought of the reputation the Colossian church had "because we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love you have for all saints." (Col. 1:4). What sort of reputation does your church have? One of growth and witness, or stagnation and death? The great secret of the radiant, growing Colossian church was that "from the day we heard of it, we have not ceased to pray to you." (Col. 1:9) Intercessory prayer is a wonderful gift, because we can ask God's blessing and strength for people that we may never see or meet in our lifetime.

But Paul doesn't say that he or the other Christian saints are the answer to their church's success, but it is Jesus Christ, "the head of the body, the church." Col. 1:18a) We are servants; Christ the Master. All credit and honor must be given to Jesus, because "you, who once were estranged and hostile in mind, he has now reconciled by his death." (Col. 1:22a)

So, as His child, Paul could write, "I toil, striving with all the energy

which he mightily inspires within me." (Col. 1:29) Read Colossians 1. You have the key to the trunk, but you must open and examine the contents yourself.

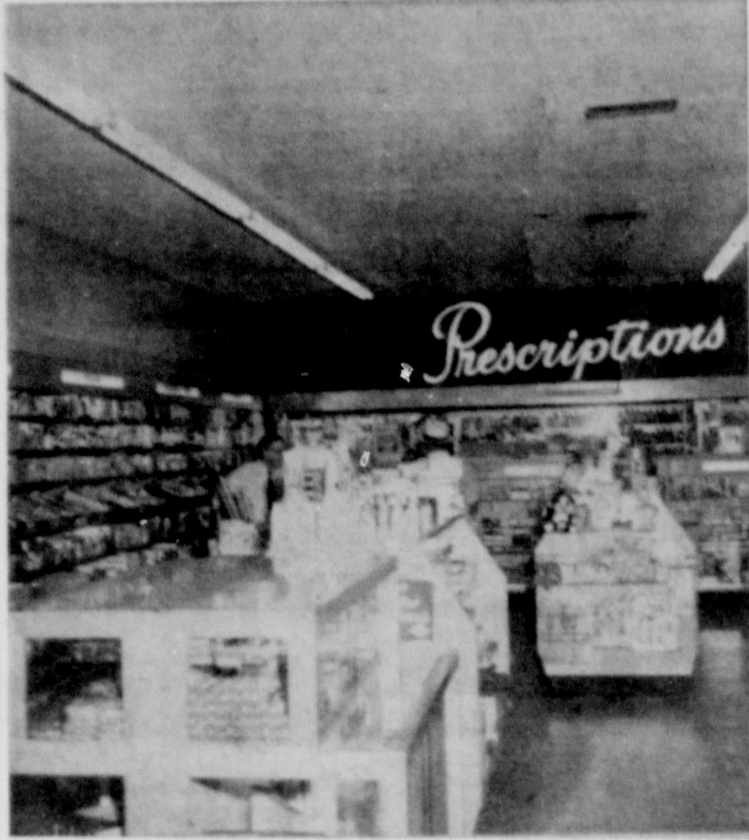
Completely Remodeled Teague Drug Reopens

Method: measure and sift dry ingredients together. Cream shortening and add sugar. Add vanilla and well-beaten eggs. Put in flour alternately with milk. Make a paste of cocoa and hot water and add to batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes.

Fudge Icing

- 5 tsp. cocoa
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/3 cup corn syrup
- 1 tsp. butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Method: mix all ingredients except vanilla and stir constantly until it comes to a boil. Let boil three minutes, stirring constantly. Set aside to cool, add vanilla and beat until creamy.

Santa Fe Engineer To Retire June 1st

J. W. Walter, (3204 Hayden Street, Amarillo), veteran Santa Fe Railway engineer who personally supervised the Building of much of the railroad mileage in the Panhandle, is retiring June 1, after more than 53 years continuous services with the Santa Fe.

Walter will be succeeded as District Engineer, Southern District, at Amarillo, by Jack E. Eise-mann, 47 who transfers from District Engineer of the Santa Fe's Gulf lines at Galveston.

When the Santa Fe was extending its lines in the Panhandle - Plains area of Texas, Walter was in on the construction. He started to work for the Santa Fe January 28, 1902, as a chairman in the engineering department at Pueblo, Colo.

With the exception of short periods of service as trainmaster and assistant superintendent on the Panhandle, New Mexico, Plains, Western and Slaton divisions, all his service has been in engineering, and most of that on the Southern District. Walter played a key role in the opening of the West by railroad across the new frontier and assisting in the location of many important industries along the rails.

Notable among his projects was the laying-out of the townsite of Slaton, Tex. Eise-mann, a native of St. Paul, Minn., attended the University of Illinois and worked for the Rock Island railway, the Illinois State Highway Department, and the San Joaquin Power & Light Company at Fresno, Calif., before joining the Santa Fe as a rodmans on the Valley Division in California October 28, 1953. He has worked in engineering capacities on the Coast lines leading to his appointment to the Amarillo job. He has been District Engineer at Galveston since April 1, 1952.

During World War II, Eise-mann entered the Army in 1944 as a first lieutenant, served in the European Theatre, and was discharged in February, 1947, with the commission of major.

Tree Windbreak Assistance Deadline Near

In compliance with agreement between local nurserymen and the Lubbock County Soil Conservation District, Arizona Cypress trees ordered by farm land owners under the special price of 25c per potted tree, will be sold on a first come first serve basis after June 15th until all are sold. Nurseryman reported to the Lubbock County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors in their meeting today, that approximately one-half of the trees have been sold.

J. C. Davis Nursery Co., Tom's Tree Place, and Winter Garden Nursery reported they still have several hundred trees on hand, while the other two nurseries co-operating with the district, Holden-Dodson and Kershner, reported that they do not have any surplus on hand at this time.

Farmers will still have time to make application through their Soil Conservation Service offices, and will be able to pick up the trees the same day application is made as long as the supply lasts, and until the deadline, Wednesday, June 15th. Persqns must have the districts agreement in order to secure the trees at the special reduced price, said Joe S. Walker, Chairman, of Lubbock Co. Soil Conservation District.

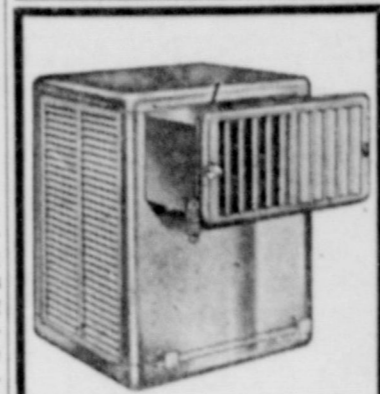

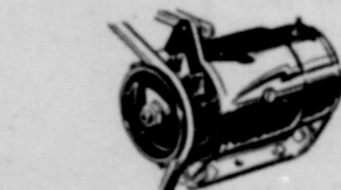

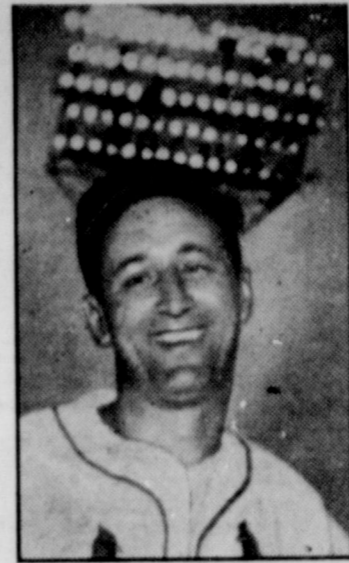

HEALTH, RECREATION AND SAFETY, IMPORTANT TO 2,000,000 4-H'ERS

The last "H" to join the 4-H cloverleaf, Health, is receiving new emphasis from the two million club members across the nation through three National 4-H Programs: Health, Recreation-Rural Arts, and Safety.
 By emphasizing the importance of good community and individual health habits, effective use of leisure time and the need for practicing safety at home, work and play, this "H" has become vital in the four-fold development of tomorrow's citizens.
 Improving health habits is a special 4-H activity the year-round for nearly a million members. During the summer months, about 250,000 4-H'er's attend camps on the local, county, regional and state levels. Thousands more take part in recreational activities through their 4-H Clubs.
 Last year, 675,000 members participated in safety activities. A few examples of their participation were conducting safety surveys

on the farm and in the home, eliminating hazards and learning to live with those which cannot be eliminated and taking part in radio and television programs promoting safety.
 Incentives valued at \$100,000 are provided through the National 4-H Health, Recreation-Rural Arts, and Safety Award Programs to encourage members to do more and better work in the three areas. Health awards are made available by the Kellogg Company; Recreation-Rural Arts incentives by the United States Rubber Company; and Safety awards by General Motors.
 Medals are provided in each program for four winners in each county. State winners in the programs will receive all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov., 27-Dec. 1. At the Congress, national awards of \$300 college scholarships will be presented to the top six winners in Health and Recreation-Rural Arts, and eight high ranking winners in Safety.
 In addition to the honors for individuals, local 4-H Clubs will be recognized for carrying outstand-

ing community Health, Recreation, Rural Arts, and Safety programs. Certificates will be presented to clubs as county and state awards. State winning clubs in Recreation-Rural Arts will also receive a \$20.00 cash award.
 Leader training funds are provided in Recreation-Rural Arts. Last year, 21,000 adult and junior leaders received training made possible with these funds.
 The programs are conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and the award programs arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Full information about them can be obtained from county Extension offices.

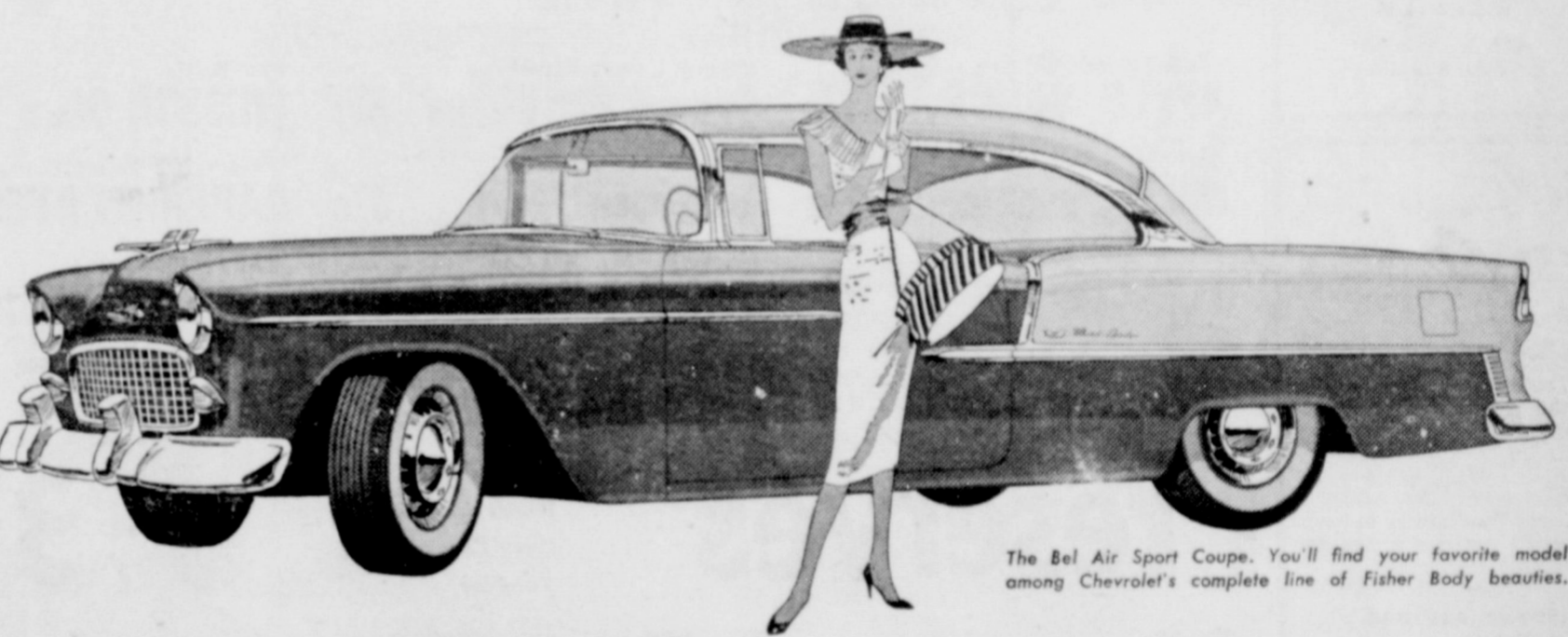

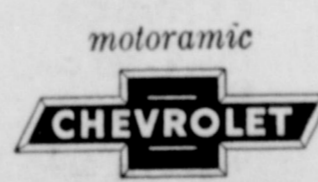

Gardening Hints For The Week

MOONFLOWER plants may be set out now. They are difficult to grow from seed, but started plants may be purchased from nurseries. PETUNIAS, ALYS-SUMS, and FORGET-ME-NOTS make good fillers for rose beds because they do not draw much nourishment from the soil.

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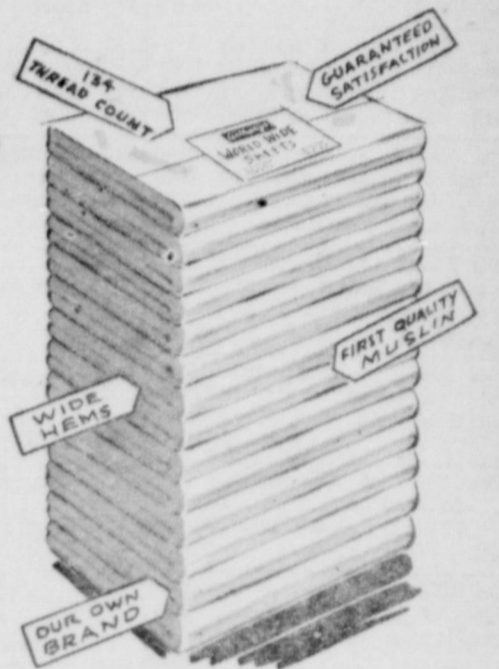
