



In compliance with agreement etween local nurserymen and the abbock County Soil Conservation District, Arizona Cypress trees ordered by farm land owners under the special price of 25c per potted tree, will be sold on a first come first serve basis after June 15th until all are sold. Nurseryman reported to the Lubbock County oil Conservation District Board of Supervisors in their meeting oday, that approximately one-hall of the trees have been sold.

J. C. Davis Nursery Co., Tom's Tree Place, and Winter Garden Nursery reported they still have several hundred trees on hand, while the other two nurseries cooperating with the district, Holdenson and Kershner, reported that they do not have any surplus on hand at this time.

Farmers will still have time to make application through their Soil Conservation Service offices, and will be able to pick up the trees the same day application is made as long as the supply lasts, and until the deadline, Wednesday, June 15th. Persons must have the districts agreement in order to secure the trees at the special reduced price, said Joe S. Walker, Chairman, of Lubbock Co. Soil Conservation District.



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


Standing in a prominent place in the Teague Drugstore is a candy case containing both bars and boxes of candy. At first look the case appears to be just another display case for candy.

On closer investigation it will be discovered that the case is refrigerated to keep the candy cool.

The case is one that was especially designed for the Teague Drug by Mr. Walton and Mr. Teague. Before they had the cases built candy was kept cool by placing blocks of ice in the candy case. Not being able to locate the style of refrigerated box they wanted, the two partners set about designing their own and the results can be seen in the store.

The case has a concealed rofrigeration coil which runs the soda fountain compressor placed in the center of the case. Display cases for candy are on each side of the concealed coil, with the result being that the store can now offer its customers candies that they normally couldn't carry during the hot summer months.
