It is not so long ago that fresh vegetables were available only during the growing season, eggs were counted one by one out of a basket, sugar was scooped up and poured carefully into a bag. Those-days have been replaced by the day of packaged foods.

Gone, too, are the hours the housewife spent toiling over a hot stove. Now she can choose from a wide assortment of pre-cooked, frozen packaged dinners and among 400 varieties of canned foods and 5,000 varieties of packaged ones.

Annual sales of the food industry have increased from sixteen billion dollars worth to sixty-four billons worth in the past 15 years. Americans are eating better foods and better balanced meals. According to a recent report by the Department of Agriculture, Americans are spending no larger proportion of their incomes for food than they did 30 years ago.

. The Department hopes that in these altered eating habits lies at least a partial solution to the problem of the nation's huge farm surpluses.
