## Radio Service Subject of Talk At Lions Club

Police communications is a radio service operated by the police to expedite police work, Bill Williams of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety told Lions Club members Tuesday at their regular luncheon meeting.

Modern police communications, according to Williams is an outgrowth of former crude methods in informing police officers of criminal acts.

The early method of notifying policemen of an act of crime was to signal them from the roof of the city hall with a red light. All policemen who were in seeing distance of the light hurried to the city hall to investigate.

Later on with the addition of one-way radio, squad cars could be notified of a disturbance, but the car could not answer the operator who was sending the message. This method proved very unsatisfactory, because the operator could never be sure that his message had been received.

Today's radio is a two-way set which can send and receive, and a policeman can call for assistance immediately if he needs it.

"There is humor and pleasure all through life no matter what you do," just about sums up the private philosophy of Mrs. Lee Green, who resigns today as secretary-manager of the Slaton Retail Merchants Association. Mrs. Green, 82, a pioneer resident has resigned after 28 years of service with the organization.

Mrs. Green, who during her tenure of office has kept a running account of the town's growth and its residents, plans to do a little writing in some of her well-earned spare time.

Thursday Mrs. Green was a guest of the Rotary Club where she was presented a portable typewriter and typewriter table. The gifts were presented by Bill Ball, president of the Retail Merchants Association from the citizens of Slaton.

The well-wishes of the entire community went with the presentation of the gifts to Mrs. Green, who is loved and respected by all who know her. Mrs. Green, herself was surprised to say the least. She had been in the Slatonite office the day before looking at typewriters and trying to decide which one she preferred, with the intention of buying one herself.

During Mrs. Green's period in office the association has grown from two small filing cabinets to a present modern filing system containing 25,000 cards. The association was organized in July of 1923 by Jim Douglass. Mrs. Green replaced G. O. Looney in June of 1927 as secretary-manager. The same year the association office was moved into the City Hall, where it has remained since.

A pioneer resident of the Plains country, Mrs. Green was employed as a bookkeeper for her sons, who operated a garage here.

The local association is now affiliated with both state and national associations and exchanges credit information with other groups all over the world. Mrs. Green has attended a number of district, state and national association conventions during her 28 years in office so that she might keep pace with modern trends and methods in credit trends.

In addition to association work Mrs. Green has been active in Red Cross, Methodist Church, Civic and Culture Club, Slaton Welfare and other civic organizations.

Mrs. Vivian A. Jones, the new secretary-manager for the association was employed by the board of directors in a meeting April 28. Mrs. Jones, also a pioneer Slaton resident, came here in June of 1913, two years after the city was organized. She was employed in the Santa Fe Railway office a number of years, and has been employed by several local business firms in the past. She is a charter member of the First Presbyterian Church.

Bill Ball, association president said in connection with Mrs. Green's resignation: "She is certainly due public commendation for the many years service she has given to the association. It was with deep regret that we accepted her resignation."

The nine-man board of directors for the association meets regularly each month. The directors hold an annual election with five elected one year and four another, each serving for two-year terms.

### Training Course Offered By RMA Is Well Attended

Two things cause the most trouble in retail selling, Mr. S. H. Womack of the University of Texas, Division of Extension told the approximately 40 sales persons who attended the sales training course this week. These things are lack of technical knowledge and personality defects.

The classes met Monday through Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in the West Ward Cafeteria, under the sponsorship of the Retail Merchants Association of Slaton.

The two trouble makers, according to Mr. Womack, lack of technical knowledge and personality defects, are the reasons for many employees being fired. Technical knowledge, he explained as meaning, a knowledge of the merchandise a person is trying to sell. One-third of all employees fired, lost their jobs because they didn't know enough about the product or service they were selling. Personality defects were the real employee killers, two-thirds of all employees fired, lost their jobs because they just couldn't get along with people, Womack told the group.

Mr. Womack went on to list and discuss various ways and means of overcoming personality defects.

Womack has had more than 15 years experience in the retail selling field and is thoroughly familiar with the problems of retail sales people. He has also had eight years experience in teaching the type course he conducted this week.

### Rotarians Hear Perry Talk On News Business

"Public relations is our biggest goal and the most important thing we work for," Francis Perry told the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon meeting at the Clubhouse Thursday.

Perry, publisher of the Slatonite, gave a vocational talk to the members about the newspaper business.

According to Perry a newspaper must be locally written to be locally read, and if neither of these things are accomplished local results will not be attained.

"Along the same lines of public relations we must have and do have an interest in what happens locally," he said.

"Slaton had a good newspaper when we came and we think it is better now, and will continue to get better."

Explaining the development of newspapers, Perry told the Rotarians that the newspaper grew out of printed circulars which were distributed in the early days by merchants to advertise their products. Make that trip over the weekend a little shorter so you can drive it a little slower—you know without being told what conditions will be on the highways this weekend. Slaton has not one single, man, woman, or child that it can spare. Take it easy this year and you'll be able to enjoy Independence Day next year too.

**OUR EATING HABITS**

Maybe it hasn't been noticeable to most of us, but our eating habits have changed. In fact, they have been revolutionized.

It is not so long ago that fresh vegetables were available only during the growing season, eggs were counted one by one out of a basket, sugar was scooped up and poured carefully into a bag. Those days have been replaced by the day of packaged foods.

Gone, too, are the hours the housewife spent toiling over a hot stove. Now she can choose from a wide assortment of pre-cooked, frozen packaged dinners and among 400 varieties of canned foods and 5,000 varieties of packaged ones.

Annual sales of the food industry have increased from sixteen billion dollars worth to sixty-four billions worth in the past 15 years. Americans are eating better foods and better balanced meals. According to a recent report by the Department of Agriculture, Americans are spending no larger proportion of their incomes for food than they did 30 years ago.

The Department hopes that in these altered eating habits lies at least a partial solution to the problem of the nation's huge farm surpluses.

**WHERE THE CUSTOMER IS WRONG**

"In a Communist department store, the customer is mostly wrong."

That wry observation was made by Wall Street Journal correspondent Mitchell Gordon, after he had visited one of the larger state-owned department stores in Soviet East Germany. The wares were few, costly and shoddy—a 10-inch TV set was offered at 1,300 East Marks, which represents four month's pay for the average factory worker, and people stood in long lines for an opportunity to buy light bulbs on a two-only-to-a-customer basis. There were no escalators, and only one small, slow elevator. There was no complaint department—and when a customer did remonstrate about some difficulty he was all but thrown out bodily by salespeople. Of course, as Mr. Gordon also observed, "The customer can always take his business elsewhere—to another state-owned store."

This may seem incomprehensible to the American housewife. She is used to utmost in courtesy and attention, whether she patronizes a big store or a small one, a chain or an independent, and if she doesn't get it she goes elsewhere. She is conditioned to the best in sanitation and displays. She expects to find large and varied stocks, and she isn't disappointed. And the prices charged for all the necessities and most of the luxuries as well are within the means of the average family.

Why should there be such a vast difference between a privately-owned American store and a socialized communist store? Monopoly, and most especially government monopoly, always makes for scarcity, high prices and indifference. Free competition makes for abundance, lowest possible prices, and indifference. Free competition makes for abundance, the lowest possible prices, and excellent services all along the line.

Theme- Great Chapters of The Bible.

Concluding our study of great chapters of the Bible, Philippians 2 is the "Christ-like" chapter. A synopsis of the contents reveal this snapshot:

- 1 - 11 Be like Christ
- 12 - 30 Work for Christ

Thomas A. Kempis wrote the best seller, "The Imitation of

Christ," which probably used Philippians 2 as its basis. In everything we do, we must imitate or copy Christ. Listen to these words, "have this mind among yourselves, which you have in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equity with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men." (Phil 2:5-7) How many people are like this - truly humbling themselves before Christ? Remember these words: "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whosoever humbles himself will be exalted (Mt. 23:12)." Paul continues, "he humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross." (Phil 2:8b)

But true humility is not the complete answer to being Christlike. It also involves "working out your own salvation with fear and trembling." (Phil 2:12c) - not to be the babe in Christ forever, but to learn to walk and think for yourself. "Do all things without grumbling." (Phil 2:14) like Timothy (Phil 2:19) who proved his worth to the Lord as a helper of Paul. Ephroditus (Phil 2:25) went to Paul in prison to help and carried the greetings of the Philippian church. Never once must we cease to work in the church of Christ, the institution of God here upon earth.

Read Philippians 2 over many times, and see the richness of Paul's language in such a manner like this, "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth,

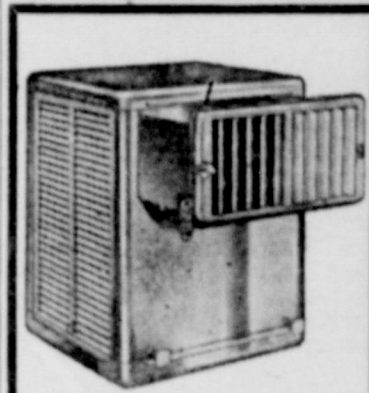

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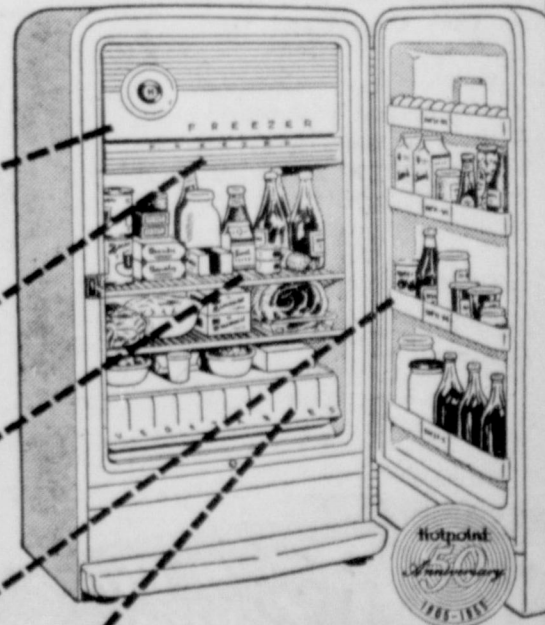

Another favorite recipe of a Slaton woman is given this week by Mrs. Alex Bednarz who says this is her husband's favorite dessert, although Chocolate Cake runs a close race to it.

**Lemon Pie**

2 tbs. cornstarch  
1 1/4 cups warm water  
Juice of 1 lemon  
1 cup sugar  
1 tbs. butter  
Small amount of lemon rind  
3 eggs.

Method: Mix cornstarch and sugar. Add this mixture and the juice to the beaten egg yolks, pour water on this mixture. Place on low heat or in double boiler and cook until thickened while stirring. Add butter. Pour into baked pie shell. Cover with meringue and set in slow oven to brown (300 degrees).

**Meringue**

Whites of 3 eggs  
2 tbs. powdered sugar  
1/4 tsp. vanilla  
Method: Beat whites until stiff, fold in sugar and add flavoring.
