Mrs. J. J. Willingham, president of Lubbock Women's Club will also be a guest on the program.

The upcoming election is for funds to purchase rights-of-way for approximately \$16,000,000 of state and federal highway construction in Lubbock County.

Plans were completed for the construction of a new school building to replace the present Evans School building at a meeting of the school board Monday evening. Butler and Kimbell were employed as architects and are now working on the building plans. These are the same architects that drew the plans for the new high school building.

To Complete Building Program This will complete the building program that was begun in 1953 when a bond issue was planned and later voted for \$350,000. Included in this bond issue was the complete renovation of the old high school building, the erection of a new high school building and a new building for Evans school. The money is already available for this new construction. A site has not yet been selected for the

To Be Brick And Tile

planned building.

The plans call for a 1-story brick and tile building which will be semi-fire proof and will be somewhat of the same structure as the building which was recently completed. There will be 7 class rooms, an auditorium and other necessary rooms such as book room, offices, rest rooms, and storage space.

It is hoped, according to Supt. P. L. Vardy, that construction can get underway soon after the first of the year. "If so, we feel sure the building will be ready for occupancy by the first of September",

THE TIME HAS COME

(Guest editorial by Larry Lake)

Last Sunday afternoon was a proud day for Slaton. As people walked through the classrooms of the High School, the hearts of Slatonites swelled with pride over their accomplishments, and it was justified.

Three school buildings can boast of providing facilities for students, and they are very substantial buildings. West Ward is an up-to-date school, has nice lighting. clean halls, and though rooms are taxed to the limit, temporary buildings have not been moved in. The Junior High building has received a new face lifting, and in the words of many long-time residents, "is built to stay." And now, the newest triumph of all is the High School formally opened. A beautiful auditorium, well-chosen paint colors, flush lockers, comfortable class-room seats, and marvellous home economics facilities add to the building, all touched off with the lines of a modernistic, well-designed architecture.

But Slaton's schools are not the only institutions on the move-the churches are keeping up with the pace too. The Methodist church has the first complete, modern, church plant in town, and offers the largest church auditorium in Slaton. Both of the Baptist churches have plans for new church buildings, and the Presbyterian church is drawing up plans for an educational plant. Drive by any day and see the new parsonage of the Lutheran church under construction. Many other churches are contemplating expansion also.

Churches and schools are going hand-in-hand in Slaton as they grow by leaps and bounds and serve the community. The time has come for the people of Slaton to take a greater interest in their schools and churches, and stop openly criticizing how slow and backward Slaton is. We have something to be proud of-now live up to the reputation we have of being a progressive, forward town.

WHAT CAN I DO?

WHAT CAN I DO? Yes, what can we do to help in the fight against a deadly enemy? One that may be as close as your best friend or a member of your family. Nothing as spectacular as an H-Bomb or some deadly weapon, but an enemy that is ever present. Tuberculosis is that foe. In fact it is estimated that 1,200,000 Americans need medical supervision for active or inactive TB. Of that number 400,000 either don't know they are sick or have not been reported.

Last year 16,000 persons died in the United States of Tuberculosis, with over fifty known deaths in Lubbock County. In the next year 100,000 more Americans will discover they have this dread disease.

Tuberculosis is a contagious disease caused by a germ called the tubercle bacillus. Although TB can affect any part of the body, it strikes most often in the lungs. It is an infectious disease that can strike anyone, anywhere, anytime-it can kill all ages.

Now, back to the original question, "What can I do to help." Money is needed to aid in the treatment of these cases and for further search for a vaccine and for better treatment methods. When you receive your "Christmas Seals" from the Tuberculosis Association, don't throw them away, but remember by a small contribution you will be bringing hope to the hopeless and aid to someone who needs help badly. Place the seals on your Christmas cards and show that you are doing your bit.

FLYING SAUCERS

The Air Force does not believe in flying saucers, but is going to make one to show all interested what they look like. This Air Force project aims to add to our knowledge of vertical-rising planes on the helicopter order.
