Jerry Jones, halfback, had to quit because of a heart murmur. Douglas Corley, 2nd string quarterback, is lost because of a collapsed nerve in his chest not due to football. Defensive halfback Bill Lee became ineligible. "B" teamer Darwin Merck, a 210 pound sophomore, would have played some but quit to work. Tommy McClanahan is not playing because of diabetes. Dale Edwards, first string substitute had to work after school. Seven of these boys would be running first string now if it wasn't for these conditions.

ing on the city farm. The land not long ago, according to Davis, was just blow sand. Leon Walston, who is leasing the land from the city, deep plowed and fertilized it before planting the cotton. The land is irrigated from the city's disposal plant, which takes the raw sewage from the city and converts it into effluent which can be used for irrigation purposes. The cotton grew so tall and the bolls got so big that the stalks have bent over from the weight. The reporter from the Slatonite counted 22 bolls of cotton on a stalk picked at random. According to city secretary J. J. Maxey the stalk the reporter picked up was a volunteer, because Maxey found one with 46 bolls on it.

## COMMERCIAL JETS

Eastern Airlines has allocated 125 million dollars for the purchase of 120 jet airliners. They will be the most modern commercial planes yet seen. It will be about four years before the first one is delivered. Other airlines have already made it clear that they intend to keep up with Eastern and place orders for jets.

This is proof that the jet—long used by the military—is on its way into more general use in the commercial field. The unfortunate experience of the British with several jet crashes has not deterred business men from realizing that jets are no longer the plane of the future but are necessary today.

Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, president of Eastern Airlines, has said that he foresees more progress in the next ten years than was made in the last twenty-five. His estimate may well prove to be modest.

## INDIA'S PENAL SYSTEM

India is experimenting with a penal system in which emphasis is on reform instead of punishment. Two of its states are trying open prisons.

One of these prisons is a camp with inmates living in tents situated in park lands just outside the old prison walls. One unarmed guard supervises the work of 40 prisoners who are given as much freedom as possible and allowed to return home for a month every three years. Prisoners in another, smaller institution live in barrack-like rooms whose doors have no locks. They are allowed to send representatives to town every two weeks for shopping and can have visits from relatives. Out of 18,000 long-term prisoners in the first institution, only seven have tried to escape.

Critics of the system complain it is no deterrent to crime, since going to prison represents no more than spending a few years away from home in a comfortable atmosphere. Defenders reply that the system is not meant for all offenders, especially the habitual type. They maintain that the system has a marked effect on the behaviour and morale of prisoners who actually try to discipline themselves so they can retain their freedom.

This experiment bears watching here in the United States where prison riots provide a warning that reform is needed.

chemistry and astronomy. By the end of each school year the student must memorize all of his text books, roughly 3,000 pages of printed matter. He takes examinations orally and he takes them alone.

Many cheeses with foreign origins are widely made in this country today, acording to Mae Belle Smith, extension specialist in consumer education. American or domestic cheeses are recognized for their high quality, low cost as compared with imported varieties.

Consumers have a choice of asoft, semi-hard and hard, Miss Smith says. The hardness depends upon the amount of water in the finished product. Flavors and texture are produced by the type of milk used, the amount of butterfat retained and the method of

Soft cheeses, such as cottage and cream, are not ripened and have a slight sour taste. Ripened Brie and Limburger, are produced by the use of molds. All soft cheeses have a high water content,


