WE'RE ASLEEP ON THE JOB

Slaton is asleep on the job! Our town has before it one of the finest opportunities for growth and expansion of any city on the South Plains. We have here a town with all sorts of possibilities.

But without someone that knows how to take advantage of those possibilities, someone that knows how to get our town's finer points before the proper people—when they need them, these advantages that Slaton has might as well not exist.

Industry is looking for places to settle in West Texas. A prime example of that fact is an announcement in the December 15 issue of the County Wide News, Littlefield.

A fertilizer manufacturing plant has settled in Littlefield, and the News carried a behind-the-scenes story of how it was obtained.

"Although he has worked hard at giving someone else the credit, there's no doubt that the star performer was Chamber of Commerce Manager Jack Lacy Jr.

"Some 10 days ago two men in Sulphur Springs placed long distance calls to Chamber of Commerce offices in several West Texas towns.

"C. H. Tyler and Arnold Newman were looking for a spot on the Plains to locate a large fertilizer manufacturing plant.

"First they called the larger towns that were located in the center of the Plains area. The men were looking for someone to give them some fast answers.

"Time was of utmost importance. In order to get their plant into production before the spring season, they knew they must begin construction immediately.

"Finally they called the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce office . . . and Jack told them what they wanted to hear.

"He didn't stutter when they asked such questions as 'Can we get a suitable location?' and 'What will it cost?' He had the information at his fingertips.

"According to Mr. Tyler, Jack concluded the conversation with 'Look, come on out. Whatever you want done we'll do it.'

"In less than 24 hours the men were in Littlefield . . . and in less than two weeks, actual construction had begun on the new \$200,000 industry."

What happened in Littlefield doesn't happen every day. But the fact that the Chamber of Commerce manager had the information at his fingertips, and was trained in how to handle such a situation probably meant the difference in getting or losing the industry.

We feel that Slaton is really asleep on the job. The present set-up in our Chamber of Commerce is doing about as well as it can be expected to do. But we need something more.

There's no valid reason why Slaton can't have a Chamber of Commerce manager—in addition to the present staff—who has had intensive training in Chamber of Commerce work. If Slaton merchants would contribute \$5 to \$20 per month, in addition to the tax funds already allotted to the Chamber, funds would be available to finance such an operation.

Having someone in the office 24 hours a day to take care of routine office work that has to be done would enable a trained manager to devote his full time to the actual work of a Chamber of Commerce—helping a town grow and improve.

What we had 30 years ago was adequate then—but it's a far cry from what Slaton needs today.

THE COST FACTOR

Practically everyone, informed and otherwise, has been sounding off about education—more education, better education, faster education, education to produce post-Sputnik scientific wonders. Some of what has been said is thoughtful and wise; some of it has been expounded without considering the hard facts.

A couple of these hard facts, especially with reference to higher education, are as follows. American's already tremendous college-going population continues to increase. To meet the rising tide of students, both private and public institutions will need greatly increased financial support.

This is not mentioned by way of throwing cold water on the clamor for more, better, faster education. It is mentioned to underscore one key fact: More, better education is going to cost a lot more money than we have been spending. That is no reason to abandon the idea. But we must face reality.
