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Burglars Hit Two Firms Tuesday Night; Narcotics, Cash, Merchandise Taken

Two business firms were entered Tuesday night, both through the front door. The amount of merchandise taken from the safe at Slaton Pharmacy, a camera, a camera, a woman's makeup and about \$80 in silver were taken in addition to quantities of narcotics. Slaton police, along with members

of the Lubbock County Sheriff's Office and Texas Rangers, were making investigation of the burglaries Wednesday. The hole was cut over the meat locker in the back of the building at Haddock's. Access was gained to the roof of Slaton Pharmacy, local police theorized, by climbing a tree in the alley by Anthony's, then crossing over adjacent buildings. The hole was cut over a shelf in the storage room.

Tech Student Called as Music Director Here

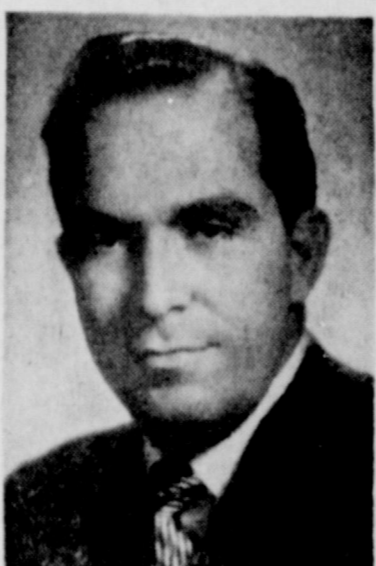

The first week of the program, sessions will be held from 1 until 4 p. m. Thereafter sessions will begin at 9 a. m. and continue until noon. At the close of the program, July 20, awards will be presented for sportsmanship and attendance, and to winners of events.

Slaton residents voted for issuance of \$150,000 water and sewer bonds Tuesday, by casting 342 ballots for the bond issue, and 48 ballots against. Bonds will enable the city to install chlorinators in the water distribution system, thereby qualifying Slaton's water system for state approval. Additional sewer lines will be

constructed, which will be designed to permit the original system to carry the capacity for which it was intended. New lines will give sewage disposal to various areas of town which now are not served with sewage disposal. A new outfall line, going from town to the sewage disposal area in the canyon will also be constructed with funds from the bond issue. At present the outfall line is carrying more than twice its capacity. In Ward 1 there were 17 votes cast against the bond issue, and 128 for. Ward 2 voted 10 against and 124 for. In Ward 3, 30 votes were cast for the bonds, and 8 against. Ward 4 cast 60 votes for the issue, and 13 against.

Negro Child Drowns in Canyon Stream While Fishing Wednesday Morning

Charles Henry Smith, 7, was drowned Wednesday morning when he fell into a rushing stream in the canyon near Slaton. Young Smith, with his father, George Smith, and several other Slaton Negroes, were fishing just off the Acuff road. The boy fell in the waters about 11:20 a. m. His father was fishing about eight feet from the boy, but was unable to reach him. Slaton policemen Howard Kean and Joe Martin recovered the body about 11:45 a. m. Kean went into the water, which was about 15 to 18 feet deep while Martin kept a taut line on Kean. The boy's body was found in about eight feet of water.

Artificial respiration and a resuscitator were used in an effort to revive the boy. About 45 minutes after being brought from the water, the boy was pronounced dead. riotti, Grady Elder, Curtis Dowell, J. C. Smith Jr. and Bill Daniels, police chief.

Young Smith is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Smith, and one brother and three sisters. Funeral arrangements were incomplete.

U. S. INVOLVEMENT

The Jordanian crisis and the treaty signed with Saudi Arabia suggest that American diplomacy is now likely to become involved in Middle Eastern intrigues and that American resources will be used for these purposes rather than for the more constructive one of stimulating economic improvement which would promise to lift the standard of living of the poor Arab masses. Likewise, we are now in a position of having to support, financially and otherwise, states which are not democratic and show no promise of being able to become democratic or of moving in the direction of democracy.

We are, further, in the situation of being virtually committed to giving aid with no strings attached, and of making concessions repugnant to all that is best in the American spirit and traditions. Thus, the agreement to keep American citizens and American soldiers of Jewish origin out of Saudi Arabia.

Middle Eastern affairs, policy and diplomacy must be watched daily and carefully. For the United States is more or less caught in a difficult situation where deviousness and blackmail are possible. The very aid we give is half feared. The fear even to invite Ambassador Richards to Amman is unprecedented. The personal representative of our President floats around the Middle East seeking to convince Arabs that we have 200 million dollars or more to give away. And his very presence in some capitols is an embarrassment. Washington must be wary in these circumstances.

PARTIES REORGANIZING

Recognizing that his party has lost ground among big city voters, Paul M. Butler, Democratic national chairman, is organizing a seven-man team to try to recoup urban losses for the 1958 and 1960 campaigns. He told Young Democrats in New York City that "the whole framework of party organization used 10 or 20 years ago must be revamped and revitalized in the light of the changing political scene."

Efforts will be made to train precinct workers nationally, and the new team being formed will work with county and state committees. Also, Butler declared, the new program he is initiating will seek to counter the effect of what he, and many other Democrats, term "the one-party press."

At the same time, President Eisenhower sent a message to a regional conference of New England Republicans calling for a stronger party and a victory in 1958 which would give him a Republican House and Senate. The President wants a completely up-to-date party "responsive to the modern-day needs and aspirations of the people."

This is a time not only of political fence building, but of efforts to improve and streamline the two major parties structurally. Also, it is now becoming evident that the times demand steady and constant work on party organization. Politics in America is now an around-the-clock and day-by-day task. More than ever, the campaigns are continuous, and 1958 is very close in the minds of the leaders and organizers of both parties.

HAIL TO SCIENCE!

United States patent reports disclose that science—applied science—continues to progress at a brisk pace. Among the most recent developments are a self-service dog biscuit dispenser, an electric wrist watch that recharges its own battery, and a marble shooter for small boys short on thumb power.

The idea of the marble shooter is that, thus equipped, small fry will have a chance to take a few marbles from the bigger boys with stronger thumbs. We have some reservations about how sporting that is, but the dog biscuit dispenser has our unqualified approval. By enabling Fido to serve himself a tidbit whenever the mood is upon him, it will greatly reduce the amount of yapping at the cupboard in which the dog biscuits are stored.

How the electric wrist watch fits into this picture of canine bliss, we don't pretend to know. Perhaps, with an unending supply of biscuits, Fido will become so surfeited that he'll have to wear a watch to tell when it is time for another biscuit. At any rate, science marches on!

A FIRST HAND LOOK

It is good news that Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, a member of the Senate foreign relations committee, is getting first hand impressions of the crucial situation in the Middle East. Besides meeting government leaders and other important personalities, Senator Humphrey can see for himself. He will be able to give his colleagues in the Senate a first hand report, and to develop his own views as well as deepen his knowledge.

The Minnesota senator is an influential member of the Senate foreign relations committee who has now begun to devote his main attention to foreign affairs. Therefore, the Humphrey journey is of considerable importance. What Senator Humphrey reports back to the Senate is likely to have a significant influence in helping to shape the views of the Democratic majority on Capitol Hill.

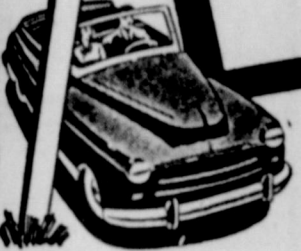

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex.—Fifth-fifth Legislators will have a shorter-than-usual "vacation." Gov. Price Daniel says he will call them back, probably about October, for a special session.

Final score showed 47 out of 51, or better than 90 per cent, of the governor's recommended bills passed in the regular session. But the missing 10 per cent are vital, says Daniel. He still wants:

1. His law enforcement commission, a sort of statewide grand jury to investigate official misconduct.
2. A lobbyist registration act, registration of persons who represent others before state agencies, and, possibly, other "better government" bills previously advocated.
3. A state plan for buying water storage space in federal reservoirs. A constitutional amendment to do this died in the past session. Since amendments cannot be considered in a special session, the governor said he is working on a statutory plan—possibly the creation of a statewide water district with authority to issue bonds and levy taxes.

4. Action on "other matters that may arise" after the Travis County grand jury reports. Jury is looking into any irregularities that might have caused the ICT Insurance Co. collapse and alleged payoffs to legislators by the Texas Naturopathic Association.

So, instead of the usual post-session lull, the Capitol faces a summer of suspense followed by a frenzied fall.

NEW JURY AT WORK—Texas has generated more troubles than one grand jury could see to in two months. Hence, a brand new Travis County jury begins this week where the old one left off after digging away all during April and May.

Its study of ICT's past and naturopathic legislation will probably last all summer.

A Dallas grand jury already has indicted BenJack Cage, onetime ICT manager, on charges of theft and embezzlement. Authorities are trying to get him returned from South America so he can be tried. WHO, WHAT, WHERE AND WHEN?—Texas' off-again, on-again Insurance Commission is still a prime source of speculation. Past legislature passed laws abolishing the old board and enabling the governor to appoint new members. It also directed the commission to move within three years from its leased office quarters into a building to be erected with insurance tax revenue. And it passed dozens of new restrictive insurance laws for the new commission to administer.

Old board members, Mark Wentz and John Osorio, promptly resigned. But Gov. Daniel refused to accept their resignations. He said they'd have to stay on until their successors were named.

Then Atty. Gen. Will Wilson

couldn't be used for a new building. It goes into the general revenue fund and is already earmarked for other things, he pointed out.

And, until the new commission gets going, insurance men over the state are uncertain as to how to comply in detail with some of the new laws.

ETHICS QUANDARY—Just who should do what to comply with the new code of ethics is still being discussed in the Capitol.

Some 163 legislators and state officials have given the secretary of state statements about their connections with businesses under state regulation. Assets ranged from Cuban oil companies to small town dry goods stores.

Sec'y of State Zolzie Steakley said failure to file such a statement could be grounds for removal from office, but that he didn't have authority to enforce it.

Gov. Daniel said he saw no need for his filing, since the constitution prohibits a governor serving as officer or director of a corporation under state regulation. But, he suggested the secretary of state might ask for an attorney general's ruling to clear up other points about the law.

BONDS GO BEGGING—First sale of the second \$100,000,000 issue of Texas veterans land program bonds attracted no takers.

In today's "tight money" market the constitutionally-prescribed 3 per cent interest doesn't lure buyers, said Land Commissioner Earl Rudder.

He said the bonds would not be offered again until conditions improve.

CROPS LAG—After years of long-

ing for water, most Texas farmers now are trying to "recover" in the rains.

State Agriculture Comm. J. White estimates flood damage to crops at \$50,000,000 or more. Cotton planting deadlines had to be extended by the state office because farmers were delayed ploughing their wet fields. Even some crop loss was foreseen from inability to plant.

In some areas of North Texas small grains were reported hurt too much water. But dryland cotton farmers in South Texas say they could use a little more moisture.

Texas already has received more rain in the first five months of 1957 than in the entire year 1956. Sample totals for 57: Dallas, 36 inches; Austin, 24 inches. (Continued on Page 5)

Mrs. A. C. Melugin Returns From Vacation to South

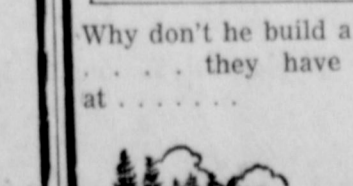

NEW BUILDINGS SLATED—From four to six new buildings are to go up soon, moving toward the eventual creation of a "state government center" clustered around the Capitol. In the offering are:

1. A State Courts Building, now under construction, to cost about \$3,750,000.
2. A State Office Building, for which contracts have been let and site-clearing begun, to cost about \$4,000,000.
3. A Central Power Building to furnish heat and air conditioning for the Capitol and other buildings. Authorized by Legislature with directive that it be ready by October, 1958.
4. A State Archives and Library Building for which Legislature appropriated \$2,500,000.
5. A Texas Employment Commission Building and an Insurance Commission Building. Lawmakers told each to move from rented quarters, but money for new buildings is not immediately available.

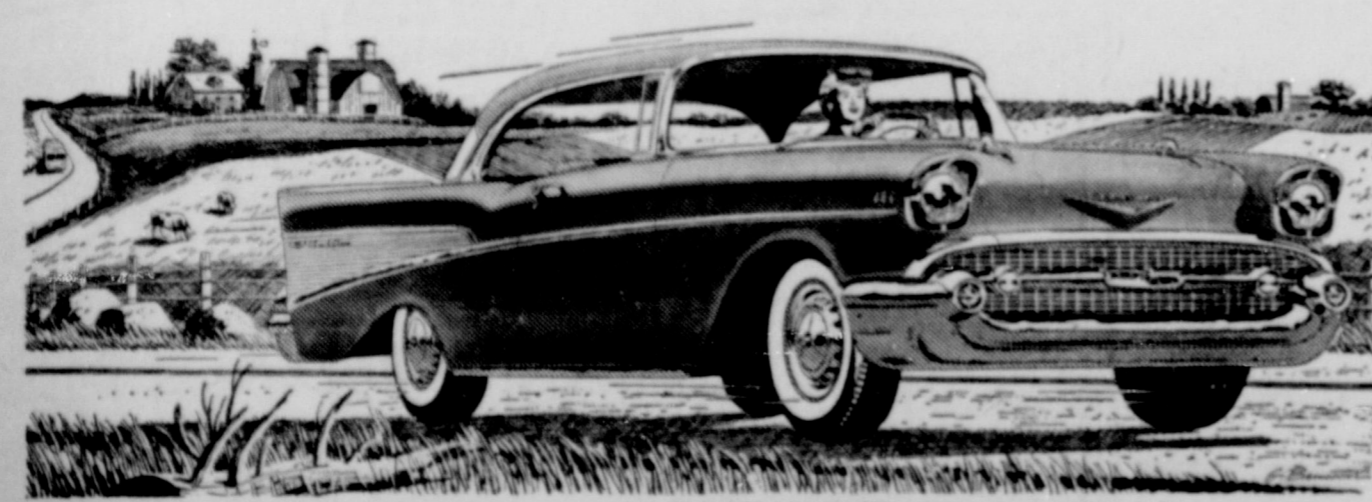

FHA Loans To Lubbock, Crosby Farmers Total \$971,000 for Past 10 Months

More than \$971,035.00 has been loaned to farmers in Lubbock and Crosby counties during the 10 months ended April 30, 1957, by Farmer Home Administration, the agency's county supervisor, Fred N. Warren, announced this week.

The heaviest demand has been for credit to finance the establishment of the young farmer on a long time basis.

During this same 10 months period, Farmers Home Administration extended credit in operating, emergency and real estate loans to some 18,500 Texas farmers and ranchers for a total of \$54,773,000.00 the agency's state director, Walter T. McKay, reported. This is an increase over the same period last year of about \$6,500,000.00.

"This increase is due primarily to the demand from family-type farmers for credit needed to place their farming operations on an efficient basis," McKay explained. "In fact," he added, "Agency records reveal that there has been a slight decline in the demand for emergency credit so far this year. Long-term credit, to develop bal-

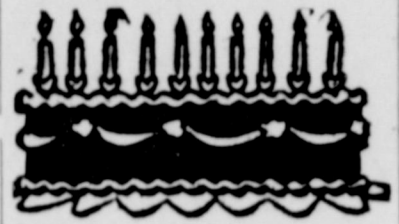

Molasses Gleam To A Meal

Molasses Glazed Ham

¾ cup unsulphured molasses ¼ cup prepared mustard
 Bake ham as directed. Forty five minutes before ham is done, take from oven. Score the fat surface; stud with cloves. Mix together unsulphured molasses and mustard. Brush ham heavily with the glaze; return to oven and complete baking. Brush with remaining glaze last 15 minutes baking time.

Grandma's Apple Sweet Potatoes

6 medium red apples ½ cup butter or margarine
 ½ cup unsulphured molasses 2 pounds small sweet potatoes, cooked
 Core apples; cut in approximately ½-inch slices. Heat unsulphured molasses and butter in skillet; add whole or halved sweet potatoes and apple slices. Turn to cover with molasses-butter mixture. Simmer gently 15 minutes, turning and basting occasionally.

YIELD: 8 servings.
