Mrs. Dudley Berry, who works with Mrs. Lora Wicker in operation of the motel, spoke before the service club. O. Z. Ball was program chairman.

Mrs. Berry said that business had been very good for the past few months. "We had 20 people ask for accommodations on Tuesday, even with our 'No Vacancy' sign on." Customers have been pleased with the facilities available to them there.

Each unit at the motel, she continued, has vented heat, refrigerated air conditioning, six to seven lights, complete carpeting and the best of accommodations. Slides of units in the motel were shown.

John Reichart, Rotary visitor from Austria, bid club members farewell at the luncheon. He left Friday by bus for a tour of Grand Canyon and points of interest in western United States before returning to New York for his return to Austria.

Rev. Meers Begins Revival at Bible Baptist

The Rev. Tommy Meers of Amarillo will be evangelist for revival services at the Bible Baptist Church beginning Sunday, September 29, and continuing through Sunday, October 6.

Programs for boys and girls will begin each night at 7 p. m., with evening worship services starting at 7:30 p. m., according to the Rev. H. E. Summar, pastor of the church.

Rev. Meers 22, is a graduate of Bob Jones University, Greenville, South Carolina. He was named to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities in 1956.

The revival in Slaton will be the 32nd conducted by Rev. Meers. He recently returned from Ft. Worth where he conducted a county-wide revival.

The public is invited to attend the services, Rev. Summar stated.

National Day of Prayer Set for Wednesday, October 2 by President

Wednesday, October 2, has been set aside as a Day of Prayer for Peace by Dwight D. Eisenhower, president of the United States.

The president urged that "each according to his own faith unite in prayer and meditation on that day" and "ask for wisdom and strength" in seeking the "welfare of all people through a just and lasting peace across the face of the earth."

Designation of the Day of Prayer comes as a result of a joint resolution approved by the Congress in 1952, stating that a suitable day each year, other than a Sunday, be set aside as a national day of prayer.

The proclamation is as follows:

"Whereas, we are grateful for the faith in which our fathers found their strength, and for the hope which has guided our nation from the earliest days; and

"Whereas, it is a good thing for a people unitedly to remember their heritage of spirit, and to refresh themselves daily in the divine truth which is their most precious inheritance; and

"Whereas, in our steady drive for enduring peace among men we must always seek the aid of the Father of mankind; and

"Whereas, the Congress by a Joint Resolution approved April 17, 1952, has provided that the President shall set aside and proclaim a suitable day each year, other than Sunday, as a national day of prayer, on which the people of the United States may turn to God in prayer;

"Now, therefore, I, Dwight D. Eisenhower, President of the United States of America, do hereby set aside Wednesday, the second day of October, 1957, as a national day of prayer; and I call upon our citizens, each according to his own faith, to unite in prayer and meditation on that day.

"In constant dependence upon our Creator for the spiritual gifts required in the conduct of our affairs as individuals and as a nation, let us now ask for wisdom and strength to fulfill the high purposes for which we are called, seeking the welfare of all peoples through a just and lasting peace across the face of the earth, bringing happiness to the home of the humblest family and to the courts of the Almighty. Let us pray with eager expectation that we may be inspired to sacrifice, at home and abroad, to achieve a life worthy of the children of God, for all men, everywhere."

A Cub Scout meeting to organize Pack 28, and secure volunteer Den Mothers has been called by Cub Scoutmaster Alex Webb for 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, October 1. The meeting will be held at the Cub Hall in the County Park.

Cub Scouts must be between the ages of 8 and 11. Webb said that all mothers of boys in this age group were urged to attend the meeting and volunteer their services.

Den mothers serve for three consecutive months. After this period they can be relieved by other mothers who will volunteer for this service.

Some 64 boys were active members of Cub Scout Pack 28 last year. Eight dens of eight boys each made up the pack. Sponsored this year by the Slaton Rotary Club, Webb said he expected an increase in the number of Cubs.

Santa Fe Sponsors Scholarship Program for Indian Students

A program to award four-year scholarships to outstanding American Indian High School students living in states served by the Santa Fe railway was announced today by the Santa Fe Foundation, Chicago, Illinois, a non-profit corporation sponsored by the railroad.

Two such scholarships are being given for the current school year, and next year the plan will be expanded to four scholarships annually.

New Mexico Boys
This year's winner are Alfonso Ortiz of San Juan Pueblo, New Mexico, who will attend Michael's College at Santa Fe, New Mexico, and Lawrence Sarracino of Paquette, New Mexico, who will enter St. Benedict's College at Atchison, Kan.

Ortiz, a national honor student, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Ortiz, and a graduate of Espanola, New Mexico, High School. He will major in business administration and labor management at college.

Sarracino is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John L. Romero and a graduate of St. Catherine's School at Santa Fe. He is a talented pianist and will major in pre-law at college.

One-Fourth Indian
To be eligible for one of next year's four Santa Fe Foundation scholarships a student must be a high school senior or fourth degree or more Indian blood and must reside in an area served by the railroad.

Scholarships are available in Missouri, Iowa, Mississippi, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Oklahoma, Texas and Louisiana.

In addition, the student must be a member of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, Evanston, Ill., which will select the winners. This test is open to all high school seniors each year and Indian students taking the test will compete only against other Indian pupils for the Santa Fe award.

Amount of the award is determined by the NMSC and is

based on the student's individual need. It provides for free choice of any accredited college in the United States and also carries an educational supplement to the college.

Open House in Slaton Churches Scheduled for Week of October 6-11

October 6-11 has been set for the annual Ministerial Alliance Open House in Slaton churches.

Six churches will hold open house this year, each on a different night. Regular worship services such as are normally held on Sundays will be held in each church, in order that members of other churches may see how each denomination worships.

Services at each church will begin at 7:30 p. m. Participating churches in the Ministerial Alliance have been requested to dismiss their services during the week of Open House.

First Baptist Church will hold its service Sunday night, October 6. On Monday night the Pentecostal Holiness Church will be host. First Christian Church will conduct services Tuesday night. Church of the Nazarene on Wednesday night. Bible Baptist Church and First Presbyterian Church will be Open House hosts on Thursday and Friday nights, respectively.

Completion Due Next Week on Water Chlorination Equipment for Slaton

Slaton's water distribution system will begin having chlorine-treated water about the middle of next week, according to Forrest Davis, water superintendent.

Equipment for the automatic chlorination of the water has arrived and been set in place. Actual tying-in of the equipment will begin on Monday of next week when engineers are here to supervise the work.

Davis said that addition of the chlorine would be gradual at first, so as to eliminate as much drastic change in taste of the water as possible.

First installation will be completed at the pump station on South 5th street, he said. This station is presently supplying the majority of the water supply for the city. All installation should be completed toward the end of next week.

Junior High Football Teams Bow to Frenship Tams in Play Last Week

Frenship downed Slaton in two Junior High School football games played Tuesday night of last week at Frenship.

The 6th and 7th grade team from Frenship overpowered the Slaton team 13-7. In 8th grade play, the score was Frenship 20, Slaton 13.

The game played by the younger boys saw Slaton score on a 50-yard run. Yardage gained by the Frenship team

made on short gains, with a few 18-20 yard gains. The game saw no penalties for either team.

Frenship gained a total of 142 yards and marked up 9 first downs. For Slaton the tally read 140 yards gained, and 7 first downs.

THE THREE E'S

Engineering, Enforcement and Education. These are familiarly known as the three E's among professional safety men, and they offer the basic approach to any sound accident prevention program.

Here in Texas, the three E's are at work day and night, especially in the field of traffic control. The State Highway Department is largely concerned with the E of Enforcement and has brought Texas to the top ranks in excellent highway construction. While in the area of Enforcement, the Texas Department of Public Safety is doing the most effective job possible with its limited budget. As for Education, the public schools suffer from a lack of wide-spread Driver Education programs, but the Governor's office, Texas Safety Association and many local safety councils are making headway in the field of public education.

Yet in 1956 we killed 2,611 persons on our streets and highways and injured 11,501. Where, then, have the Three E's failed? Frankly, they haven't. You can't engineer a road that is safe for an unsafe driver; Texans couldn't afford to pay for enough patrolmen to police every mile of its highways; and, you can't educate an apathetic public.

When Texans and the rest of the United States get fed up with our annual highway hayhem, it will stop. It will stop because the individual—you and I—demand that it stop. Then the Three E's will be completely effective.

HIGH PRICE OF FRIENDS

Since prices are rising as the inflationary spiral continues to curve upwards, there should be no surprise in the prediction of the bi-weekly magazine, The Reporter, that the price for American good will and maintenance of the Eisenhower Doctrine in the Middle East will now be higher. A major cause is the coup of pro-Communist military men in Syria.

Russian technicians are reported to have flooded Syria. They will be needed to teach the Syrians how to use the relatively huge quantities of arms which Russia has sent to Syria. Technically the Syrian coup is not a "violation" of the Eisenhower Doctrine.

But the new pressures on pro-Western governments in the Arab world, the fresh crises to come, mean that our friends and our "friends" in the Middle East will need more of the good old mazuma.

We cannot buy friends in the Middle East for peanuts or on a low-scale economy budget in this day and age. If we want to buy our friends we cannot give them coffee and doughnuts, plus kits and old magazines, while the Russians send tanks, Migs, and submarines. The price of friends, like the price of food, has gone up again.
