



#### THE CAUSES GO DEEP

Whenever a community suffers an outbreak of teen-age hoodlumism, there is bound to be a public outcry. Usually those who are heard may be divided into two classes-the ones who demand that the young rowdies be given a taste of their medicine, and the ones who declare that the problem would be solved by having better recreation programs to "get the kids off the streets."

Neither of these suggested remedies is anything like an adequate answer to the problem of juvenile delinquency. It is a dangerous fallacy to conclude that severe punishment alone will set delinquents back on the right path and dissuade other young people from breaking the law. It is equally fallacious to assume that providing a big program of fun and games is going to lick the problem.

This is not to say that young law-breakers and disturbers of the peace should go scot free or be given the equivalent of a pat on the wrist. Nor can one deny that organized recreation programs do help to some extent. But the reasons for misbehavior by young people are many, and they go deep.

For youngsters as well as adults, punishment to fit the crime is a healthy deterrent to further crime. And recreation programs may tend to keep young people from roving about looking for trouble. However, these approaches deal only with the surface manifestations; they do not get at the individual and social causes which lie beneath the surface.

Before society can deal adequately with juvenile misbehavior and crime, much more must be known about the causes, and ways in which these causes can be eliminated. This is the most promising point of attack on the whole broad problem of teen-age delinquency.

#### DAILY MIRACLE

Most of us, at one time or another, are oppressed by a mood of cynicism and disenchantment with life. The burden of troubles, of disappointments and frustrations, seems too much to bear at such moments. We tend to shake our fists at life, then, taking a kind of childish satisfaction in this act of defiance.

At times like these, one could do worse than consider the advice of Judge Coates, a wise old character in James Gould Cozzens' novel "The Just and the Unjust." Noting that "nobody promises you a good time or an easy time," Judge Coates adds:

"There is the present to think of, and as long as you live there always will be. In the present, every day is a miracle. The world gets up in the morning and is fed and goes to work, and in the evening it comes home and is fed again and perhaps has a little amusement and goes to sleep. To make that possible, so much has to be done by so many people that, on the face of it, it is impossible. Well, every day we do it; and every day, come hell, come high water, we are going to have to go on doing it as well as we can."

There you have it, the philosophy of a man who has seen much of life and has concluded that "every day is a miracle. It is something worth mulling over when the going seems rough.



Many people in the High Plains, who are now aware of the diminishing supply of underground water, are concerned with the problem of saving the large quantity of water that has recently collected in the thousands of wet-weather lakes by draining the water into the underground reservoir for storage and future use.

#### Dual-Purpose Wells

Numerous farmers throughout the High Plains have installed dual-purpose wells near the lakes for the purpose of draining the lakes and producing irrigation water. Such practice has been described by them as highly success-







persons being sent to their graves daily in Texas 305 persons suffered injuries in 625 daily accidents. And in what is termed a conservative estimate, the report states that the average dollar loss per day during 1956 was just short of two-thirds

of a million dollars. 5 Deathless Days

Even though 64 more persons were killed in Texas motor vohicle traffic accidents in 1956 than in 1955 the statistical informaticu does suggest a chance for impl ment in the future. There were five eathless days in 1956, as compared with three the previous year, and two of those days fell together on June 5 and 6.

In rural fatal accidents the effects of better highways is evidenced in the fact that head-on collisions were reduced from 27.8 per cent in 1950 to 20.9 per cent in 1956. Woerner said this decrease was due primarily to an increase in the number of rural miles of divided highways.

A reduction in the number of sharp curves on rural highways has helped in reducing the "runoff-roadway" accidents from 28.8 per cent in 1950 to 22.2 per cent

Young Drivers

Younger drivers and newer vehicles were involved in more than their share of accidents. Of all drivers involved in rural accidents, 44.8 per cent were under 30 years of age-this group represents 31.2 per cent of the licensed drivers in

One-third of the vehicles involved in rural accidents were one year old or less. This is emphasized by the fact that 60 per cent of rural fatal traffic accidents involved only one vehicle. On this point Woerner concluded that posly drivers are placing too much confidence in their newer cars.

November 24 was the black day in Texas last year with 29 persons killed-the greatest number of any day in 1956. This number, with an additional 9 killed November 25, made that weekend the deadliest on Texas Highways for the year with 38 persons killed in 24 accidents.


