Increase Noted in School Enrollment Here; School Tax Rate Boosted 8 Percent; Now \$1.35

Enrollment here this year was up 54 students over the time last year, according to an announcement today by Superintendent Vardy Jr.

Annual increase is expected the first two weeks of school year, Vardy said. Enrollment in all schools the first two days is 1,470, a sharp increase in the high level.

Ward enrolled 579, East Junior High, 288, and

High School 329. Evans School enrollment was 170.

A gradual increase in enrollment for the past 10 years, has been noted, with an increase in the past four years of 17 per cent.

New Tax Rate

Members of the school board of the Slaton Independent School District this week set the tax rate at \$1.35 per hundred dollar valuation, an increase of about eight per cent. The old rate was \$1.25 per hundred valuation. Board members pointed out that the rate is less than rates set by comparable

schools in the area. Most schools, they said, have a tax rate of \$1.50 per hundred dollar valuation.

The increase in tax rate was attributed to increase in cost of operation, increase of enrollment, addition of new faculty members to teach the additional students, and cost of the building program.

Schools Feel Pinch

Increase in cost of supplies and operation that affect business and industry also affected the cost of operation of public schools, the board members said. Evans School burned about

a year and a half ago, which necessitated the construction of a new building there.

To avoid voting a new bond issue, arrangements were made locally to finance the cost of the new Evans School, in view of the fact that the building fund did not have sufficient monies to pay for the construction. Amounts not covered by the building fund were those financed here.

Pentecostal Church Has New Pastor

The Rev. W. C. Hutsell assumed pastorate of the Pentecostal Holiness Church of Slaton this week. He will preach his first sermon at 11 a.m. Sunday.

Rev. and Mrs. Hutsell come to Slaton following 14 years in the pastorate at Meridian, Mississippi. Their home was originally in Oklahoma City, Okla.

Morning services are held each Sunday at 11 a.m., with youth services held at 7 p.m. and the evangelistic evening service beginning at 8 p.m., Rev. Hutsell said. Midweek services will be at 8 p.m. Thursdays.

The public is welcome to attend all services, Rev. Hutsell said.

Construction of \$129,000 Building For Citizens State Bank Underway

Razing of present building this week marked the beginning of construction of a new building for Citizens State Bank. The new structure will be located on the triangular lot bounded

by Texas Avenue and Garza streets. Construction of the new building is scheduled to be completed within 179 days from September 7, according to terms

of the contract.

Contracts have been let for the building, air conditioning and heating equipment in the amount of \$129,047. Tidmore Construction Co. of Lubbock is general contractor. Architect is George E. Christensen of Dallas.

Over 9,000 square feet of floor space will be available in the new structure. This includes storage space in a basement and refrigerated air conditioning and heating equipment rooms on a mezzanine floor.

Outside construction will be of light colored brick trimmed with ceramic tile or granite. Thermopane glass will be used. Entrance to the building will be facing the square.

Five teller cages, including the drive-in window, will be used. Additional safe deposit boxes will be installed, bank officials said.

A night depository and the drive-in teller's window will be new additions to services offered by the bank.

Included in the building will be officers quarters, a director's room, and quarters for the book-keeping department in addition to vaults, tellers cages and storage space.

Rev. Clarence N. Wylie, pastor of the local church.

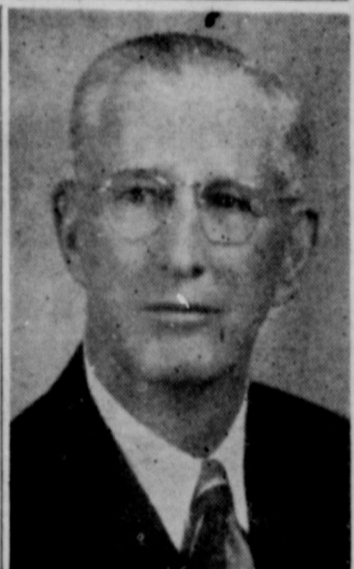
First Baptist Plans Revival Sept. 9-15

Tigers, Canyon Eagles Clash in '57 Football Opener Tonight in Canyon

With only four days of the 1957-58 school term behind them, the Slaton Tigers go to Canyon tonight to meet the Canyon Eagles in the first game of the season. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

No injuries have plagued the Tigers thus far, according to head coach Leonard Ehrler. Some bruises have been sustained, but no players will be out because of them, he said.

Ten lettermen are among the probable starters for the season's opener. Tom McClanahan, 145-lb. senior will play right end, Alfred Blissard, 185-lb. senior will be right tackle.

Glen Taylor, a junior weighing 145, will handle the right guard position. Jerry Hogue, who will play center, is a junior weighing 170.

Carlton Tumlinson will be left guard. He is a senior weighing 165. In the left tackle slot will be a junior, Dale Gordon, who weighs 185. Howard Limmer, 170-lb. junior, will be left

end.

In the backfield, Doug Corley will assume quarterback duties. Corley is a senior weighing 170. Left halfback will be Rodney Fulcher, 165-lb. senior, while right halfback will be Pat Adamak, a junior weighing 150. Alex Franco, 170-lb. senior, will start at fullback.

Franco, Tumlinson, and Blissard will share tri-captain honors. All are seniors. Blissard and Franco have earned two letters previously, and Tumlinson, one.

Clovis Chappell Here for Second Revival Sept. 15

Revival services will begin at First Methodist Church Sunday, September 15, with Dr. Clovis Chappell doing the preaching. Services will be held twice daily, at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m., for one week. Dr. Chappell will preach Sunday through Friday evening.

"Dr. Chappell, whose home is Waverly, Tennessee, is much in demand throughout the entire country. Slaton is fortunate to be able to have him the second year," said the Rev. James B. Sharp, pastor of First Methodist Church.

A native Tennessean, Dr. Chappell attended Duke and Harvard universities and holds academic honorary degrees from Duke, Centenary College of Louisiana, and Birmingham Southern College.

He is the author of a number of books and has been named one of the 40 outstanding ministers of all faiths in the last 400 years, according to Dr. Andrew Blackwood of Temple University, in a history written by him.

Ordained in 1908, Dr. Chappell has held pastorates in Washington, D. C., Gatesville, Ft. Worth, Dallas, and Houston, Texas.

An all-out effort will be made by John Morris and Bart Jones to have the sanctuary filled for the Saturday evening services, Rev. Sharp said.

County Clerk's Fees Increased

Fees for service performed by the County Clerk's office were raised effective September 1, according to an announcement by Louise F. Moore, County Clerk.

Moore said that the increase in fees was authorized by the last Legislature and approved by the Lubbock County Commissioner's Court, since part of the fee goes to the state and part remains in the county.

Marriage licenses will be \$3 instead of the former charge of \$2.50, Moore said. Notary Public commission and bond recording fees will be \$3 instead of \$2.

Hunting licenses will increase from \$2.15 to \$3.15, while fishing licenses will cost \$2.15 instead of \$1.65.

Fees for recording legal papers at the office also has been raised. The fee formerly was 15c per hundred words, and now is 20c per hundred words.

Moore said that a complete fee schedule for recording all legal records was in the process of being worked out, and would be available shortly.

Highway Dept. Gives Go-Ahead on Highway Building West of Slaton

Plans for a highway to be built on the west side of Slaton were announced last week by the Highway Commission.

The project, a continuation of the highway now under construction between Slaton and Canyon, would begin where the road is being narrowed to two lanes, and go to the County line, some six miles west of Slaton.

State highway engineer announced that the highway would be entered into agreement with the Lubbock County Engineer's Court for purchase of right of way. Conditions of agreement would be that the portion of the cost be paid after March 1,

right of way purchases on a 50-50 basis with local agencies, such as the commissioner's court.

Wood, McClanahan, Bagby To Head Touchdown Club's '57 Activities

Initial plans for the football season's work were laid by members of the Touchdown Club Monday night at the organizational meeting held at the High School auditorium.

Clark Wood Sr. was named president of the organization, to succeed Robert Huser. T. E. McClanahan will be vice president. Secretary-treasurer will be J. W. Bagby.

About 40 people were present to hear Coach Leonard Ehrler give prospects for this year's team, and describe the training set-up. Ehrler said that 39 boys were on the varsity squad. Of that number 33 would be on the travelling squad.

For training purposes, the varsity squad is broken down into three teams, Black, Red, and Gold. Freshman team members are known as the White team for training.

Some 21 boys have turned out for freshman football, bringing the total in the football program this year to about 60.

Ehrler said that there had been some difficulty in scheduling freshman games.

When a boy merits wearing a jersey, then that jersey is his until someone comes along who is able to displace him. Ehrler said that in this manner they were able to select their starters, the Reds the next team, and the golds, the third.

Captains of this year's team were present and introduced to the group. They included Alfred Blissard, Alex Franco, and Carlton Tumlinson.

Committees for the year appointed Monday night included the Membership committee, with Bob Vivial chairman, Dave Sanders, and T. M. Wright. Carl Lewis is chairman of the Football Program Advertising committee. Working with him will be Paul Melton and Rick Spinks.

Following the business por-

tion of the meeting, a film of highlights of the 1957 Southwest Conference Football was shown.

Next week's meeting will be held at 8 p.m. Monday at the high school auditorium.

GIANT UNION POWER

James R. Hoffa, who appears to have an excellent chance to succeed Dave Beck as president of the International Teamsters Union, has been flexing his muscles. He has, among other things, said that he wants to form a mighty federation to take in all of the nation's transportation workers.

Such a grouping of rail, truck, shipping and air workers might, if effective, become the most powerful single union in the United States. Hoffa has declared his intention of combining the transport workers into a single federation "for their own protection." Whether or not that is his real motive, it is clear that the head of such a federation would wield unprecedented power over the nation's economic life.

This is a possibility which Americans—and certainly that includes workers in the various branches of the transportation industry—should think about most seriously. They should think about whether possible benefits for transport workers in such an arrangement might not be outweighed by the potential danger in giving a man or a small group of men such tremendous power.

Years ago, when the country seemed in danger of being dominated by huge industrial combines, Congress passed laws to break them up and keep them under control. These laws would make it impossible for any single firm to gain control over the nation's transportation network. No union should have that power, either.

That would be true of a union directed by the most enlightened leadership. It is doubly true when the potential leadership involved has been called into such serious question by both Congress and the courts.

THE CLASSROOM CRISIS

Michigan needs 10,000 additional classrooms immediately in order to relieve over-crowding and to eliminate multiple sessions in the state's public schools, in which there will be an anticipated addition of 70,000 children this fall. Lyn M. Bartlett, state supervisor of public institutions in Michigan, made a statement asserting the above in Lansing.

Although the people of Michigan have spent 675 million dollars for more classrooms in the last six years, more are needed. In the years to come, enrollment will keep rising. Unless many fresh millions—at least 400 millions, in fact—are spent, the deficit in classrooms will continue.

Here is a situation not peculiar to Michigan. It predicts the future in the education of our children unless action is taken on the local, state and national levels. America, the richest country in the world, is in danger of lagging in education to the disadvantage of its own future and that of its children. Warnings should be heeded in time, or we will suffer in years to come. An investment in adequate schools for our children is an investment in their future and, hence, in the future of America.

CIVIL RIGHTS POLITICS

The political issue in America today which possesses real moral content is that of civil rights. The hope of various leaders that this issue could be pulled out of politics and handled by the Supreme Court has now pretty much faded. Civil Rights is all entangled in politics.

Hope for a strong civil rights bill is virtually destroyed as far as the present Congress is concerned. The Senate vote supporting the jury trial amendment is a defeat for those who want to end discrimination in America and who believe that all Americans should enjoy the same status with regard to civil rights.

The administration allowed civil rights to become entangled in many issues, and now it is too late to be bitter. Sound leadership beforehand is more sensible than bitterness afterwards. The vote revealed strange political combinations; many factors went into the voting. But the Democratic party has set itself back in the 1960 campaign.

Leadership in civil rights has now been largely captured by the Republicans. Unless the Democratic party can pull a surprising reversal, the greatest likelihood is that it will lose more Negro votes in 1960. It appears that the Roosevelt coalition of votes may now be totally a phenomenon of the past.

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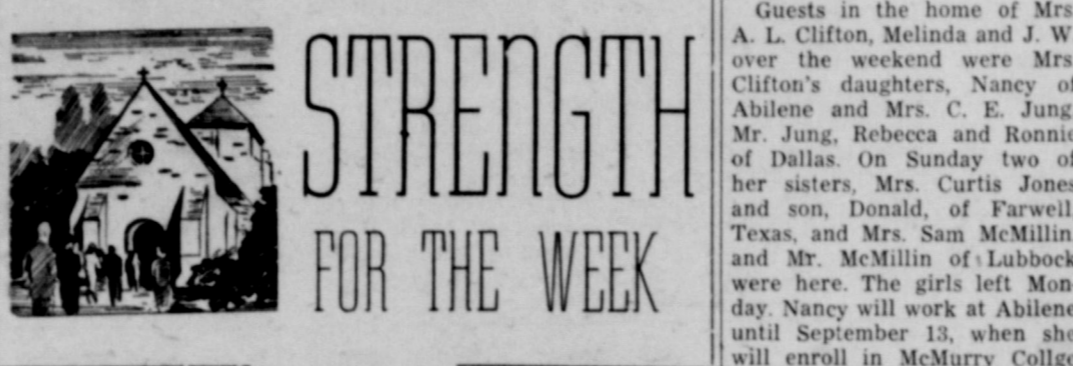
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"I CAN DO ALL THINGS THROUGH CHRIST WHICH STRENGTHENETH ME." PHIL. 4:13

"He leadeth me beside the still waters." Psalm 23:2.

The secret of successful and happy living as a Christian is learning how to pause for moments with God that renews and refreshes one in his daily task. The minutes of our every day are filled with activity and often we find ourselves getting tired both physically and spiritually. We need to take time to find new strength and vigor in every-day living that makes for happy Christians.

In this verse the Psalmist suggests the answer in the "pause that refreshes." The picture is of the shepherd gently leading the sheep to refreshing waters, waters that produce relief and comfort. It is water from a fountain that fully satisfies the thirsty sheep. Here the psalmist suggests a truth that God has made wonderful provision for the spiritual renewal of His people—coming to God in prayer who is the source of strength and power.

This being true, then, the pause that refreshes for each day to be alone with God in prayer. I want to suggest that you find the secret of happy living by taking the time to "pause" for five minutes during your working hours to be with God. Seize upon an idle moment during the day to be with God in prayer even while you work. You will find new joy and happiness in Christian living.

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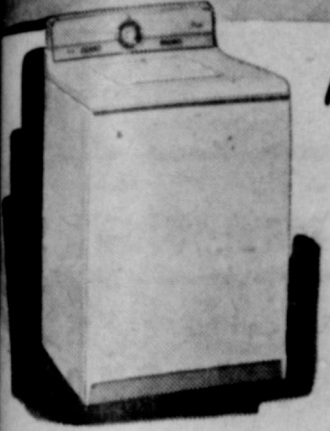

Talks Between Santa Fe and Unions Reach Stand-still Early This Week

Discussions between the Santa Fe Railway and the fifteen non-operating labor organizations for compulsory union membership agreement have reached a deadlock, it was announced earlier this week by officials of the Santa Fe Railway. The following letter dated August 30 has been addressed to all Santa Fe employees concerning the points in question by Fred G. Gurley, chairman of the board and chief executive officer, and E. S. Marsh, president.

"We are writing to tell you about the negotiations which have been under way since July 29, 1957, between the management and a committee representing the non-operating unions on their demand for a union shop agreement.

Asked To Sign
"The union committee asked us to sign the so-called Eastern Union Shop Agreement, modified only by a memorandum agreement like that signed by The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad. Together these provide for union membership as a condition of continued employment, with the exception that employees not union members on the date the agreement would become effective, as well as new employees, would be deemed to meet the requirements of the agreement if they should pay the initiation fees, periodic dues and assessments (not including fines and penalties) uniformly required of union members.

"The Company, while making it clear that is opposed on principle to any form of compulsory membership or compulsory payment of any sums of money as a condition of employment, nevertheless, by way of compromise, offered to yield to the demands if two conditions were met: (First), that no employee should be discharged for failing to pay for contributions or expenditures by the unions for political or ideological purposes or for social, fraternal, or insurance or other purposes not connected with collective bargaining; and, (second), that present union members would be allowed to resign during a specified period, although they would be bound to continue to pay dues and assessments required for collective bargaining purposes. The unions rejected this counter offer, insisting upon compliance without change in their demands.

"To make this point clear, we now quote from our letter of August 28, 1957 to the union committee:

Suggested Provision
"We suggested provision be made on the agreement that compulsory initiation fees, dues and assessments be confined to the actual cost of collective bargaining. When you took exception to this proposal, we then offered to spell out the things for which compulsory initiation fees, dues and assessments would not be required.

"We are sending you a copy of that letter, which outlines the position of the Santa Fe. In order that you may go further into the matter if you are so inclined, we are also sending you some other material:

1. The Eastern Agreement
2. The Atlantic Coast Line memorandum agreement
3. Decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the Hanson Case.
4. Decision of the Supreme Court of Texas in the Sandsberry Case.
5. Decision of the Supreme Court of Georgia in the Looper Case.

"Those decisions are the ones

Regret Deadlock
"We regret that there has been an inability to come to an agreement in this matter. The Santa Fe has been engaged in collective bargaining with railroad unions since the 1880's. We have repeatedly said that while agreeing with voluntary membership in unions we opposed compelling any employee against his will to become a member of a private organization.

"We are equally opposed to compelling employees to make money payments in support of political, ideological or other purposes not related to collective bargaining. We have not been able to reconcile ourselves to the signature of any agreement that would go counter to the rights of employees, both union and non-union, and to which so many of them have voiced their objections in letters and petitions addressed to the management."

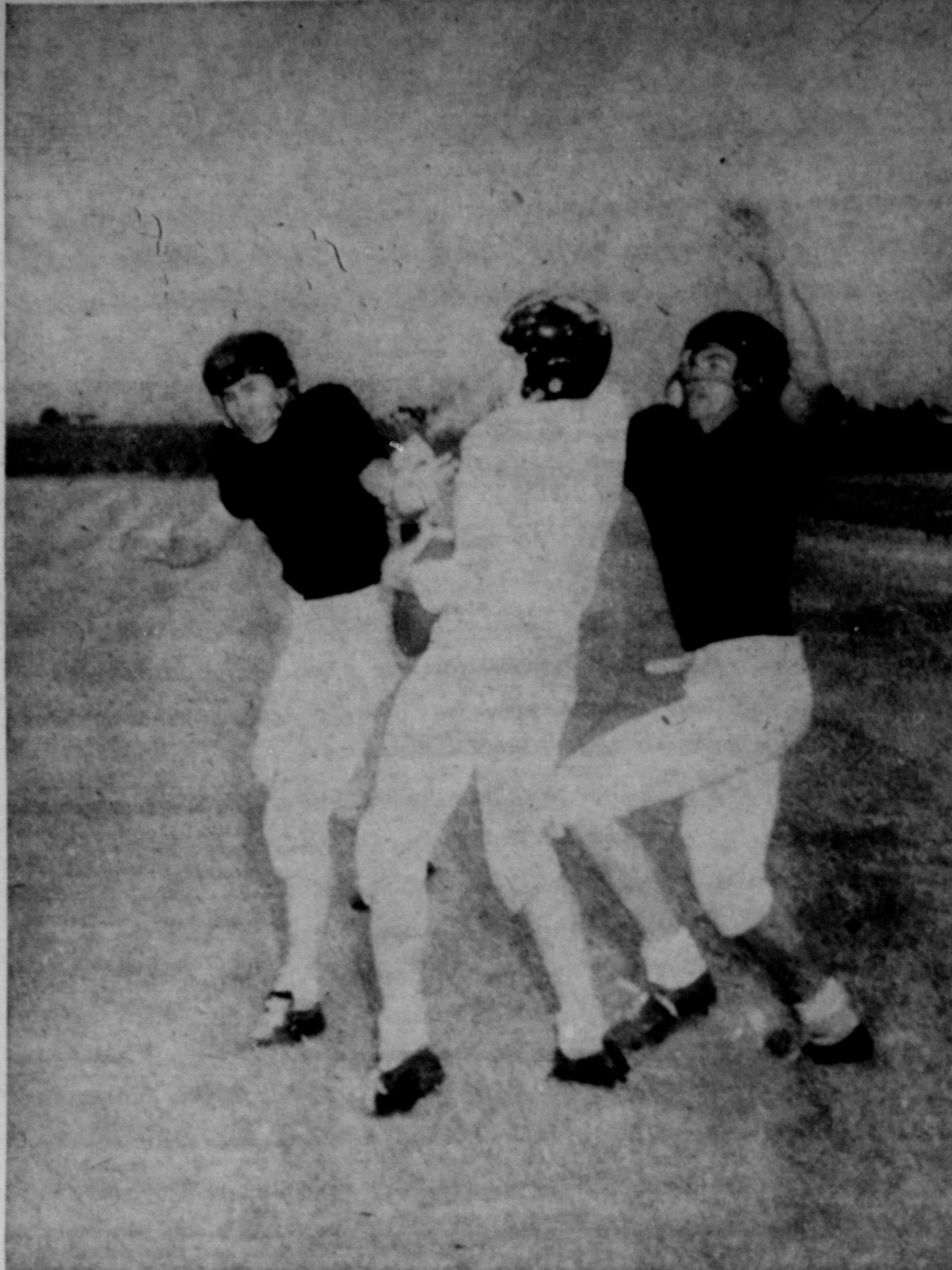

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


