Numerous Local Area Improvements Named in Program for Chamber

Adoption of a program of work for the ensuing year was the main item on the agenda when directors of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development met Tuesday night.

Recommendations as set forth in Community Clinics held here on April 28 and 29, 1956, comprised the greater part of the work outline. Included were items to be undertaken on a long range program, and others for immediate action.

Included in the list of civic improvements were plans for improving traffic signals at the three-way intersection, securing of adequate housing, both in rental property and home-ownership property. Plans for an annual cleanup campaign and an annual city-wide beautification drive, to include maintenance of vacant lots, a tree planting program, and enforcement of covered garbage cans were taken under consideration in the parks and recreation portion of the work program. Also included there were plans for continued expansion and improvement of park facilities, to include better park facilities on the east side of town. Possibility of enlargement of kitchen facilities at the Clubhouse were included.

Plans for activation of a new comer's welcome program to Slaton were discussed. A committee was appointed to meet with representatives of the Retail Merchants Association for possible formation of such a program.

Work for additional Farm-to-Market roads in the area was discussed, as well as beautification of highway approaches to the town.

Another phase of the work program included an effort to attract small adaptable industries to the locale, and support of existing industries.

Work toward acquisition of permanent facilities for livestock shows, and extended support of 4-H Future Farmer activities were coupled with an effort for expansion of the rural telephone system to form the Agriculture-Livestock portion of the chamber's work.

In other actions, the directors named Bruce Pember to draw up briefs of routes through Slaton to be presented to the State Highway Department as possible means of relieving traffic on 9th street when the four-lane highway between Slaton and Lubbock is completed.

Slaton High School Band and the Slaton Rangers will be asked to jubilate Slaton at the Golden Jubilee celebration to be held at Post.

State Senator Discusses Progress of Legislature With Rotarians Thursday

State Senator Preston Smith of Lubbock was speaker for the Slaton Rotary Club Thursday. His talk was concerned with the state government and what the last Legislature accomplished.

Francis Perry was program chairman for the day. Slides taken over Smith's senatorial district, which is composed of 11 counties, were shown. Included in the slides were some of the state capitol building, the House of Representatives and the Senate Chamber.

Smith said that 1,442 bills were introduced at the last session of the Legislature, with over 500 of them passed. Seventy water bills alone were passed.

Included in actions taken by the legislators were the formation of the Texas Water Resources Committee, increase in teachers' pay, and passage of an education bill.

A constitutional amendment which calls for yearly sessions of the Legislature will come before the people of Texas for approval on November 4, 1957, Smith said.

State Senator Discusses Progress of Legislature With Rotarians Thursday

Fifty-seven game and fish bills were passed this session that ranged from the lawful killing of bats to the restriction of hunting alligators.

One of the interim studies of the Texas Legislative Council covered the field of ethics of legislators. A bill was introduced and passed that set forth such a code of ethics, and carries a penalty of expulsion from office for violators.

Three strong measures to curb the narcotic traffic were put into effect. They are designed to protect juveniles, to care for those persons who have already become addicts, and to stiffen penalties for those furnishing alcoholic beverages or narcotics to inmates of the Texas Prison System.

Reorganization of the State Insurance Commission was accomplished.

Noteworthy progress was made in the field of Mental Health by the legislators. Bills were enacted providing for hospitals and schools in which to provide research and education for the mentally ill.

TELEVISION WATCHDOG

It is a good thing that the Federal Trade Commission has begun to monitor television to detect false advertising claims. Such fraudulent claims are harmful not only because they bilk the public, but because, once the public catches on, the effectiveness of all advertising is crippled to some extent.

Charles A. Sweeny, an attorney in the FTC's Bureau of Investigation, told delegates to a recent American Bar Association meeting about the monitoring system and the philosophy behind it. He noted that the nation's bill for advertising last year was nine billion dollars, and suggested that the FTC is a much-needed umpire for this complex business of urging people to buy.

Sweeny said that advertising was "indispensable to maintenance and continued expansion of our American standard of living." He added that false advertising, by lessening public confidence, might seriously cut the value of the advertising dollar.

The argument is sound. Advertising is one of the foundation stones of our rapidly expanding economy. Whenever there is a lapse in integrity, this foundation stone begins to crumble. The FTC's efforts to prevent that are clearly in the public interest.

NOBODY HOME

A lot of people who go off on vacation are so careless that they might as well put up a sign: "Attention, burglars. This house will be unoccupied during the next two weeks. Help yourselves."

They forget to stop milk and newspaper deliveries, for example, and the resultant accumulation is a clear tip-off to housebreakers. They pull down all the window shades, which is like shouting, "Nobody home!" They leave notes at front and back doors notifying tradespeople that there is no use in knocking.

Such careless persons also forget to make arrangements to have the front lawn cut. After a week, the shaggy grass is in telltale contrast with other neatly trimmed lawns in the neighborhood. Sometimes these vacationists even forget to arrange with the neighbors to have their mail picked up, providing another dead giveaway to would-be robbers casing the area.

These are things to think about before heading for vacation lands. It is even a good idea to leave a small light burning to give the house an occupied look. Vacation is fun, but it's no fun to come home to a ransacked house.

SUMMER ATHLETE

Behold the summer athlete, fat and short of wind after a long winter of indolence. He goes forth at dawn to drive 200 miles and then row a boat in pursuit of the wily bass. He leaps about on the tennis court in the heat of the day, and play 18 holes of golf before sundown. At picnics and family reunions, he charges about as he was wont to do in the days of his youth.

Nor does he confine his strenuous activities to games and fun. He hauls black dirt to repair a bad spot in his lawn; he stoops and twists to weed his flower garden. As the temperature rises he is to be seen, red-faced and panting, doggedly waging battle of the mown grass.

Behold the summer athlete! He works hard and he plays hard, ignoring both the years and the paunch that the years have duly provided. Behold him where he lies there on his bed of pain—the fallen warrior, no wiser than he is young.

ECONOMIC DANGERS

The continuous rise in the cost of living index cannot be taken lightly. Rising prices and rising costs of production, unless checked, can force cutbacks and restriction of production, with another consequent rise in prices. Production and consumption can get seriously out of line. This process is part of the central logic or pattern which leads to depression.

Increased productive capacity, as a consequence of automation as well as other cause, has begun to threaten jobs in manufacturing. There is not likely to be any increase in the number of jobs open in manufacturing plants, and there are signs of stabilization and decline.

We can ignore signs of this character only if we wish to court potential disaster. The question here is not optimism versus pessimism. It is, rather, a question of keeping in good running order an economic mechanism which, because of its complexity and inter-relatedness, is highly delicate. Our own future and that of the free world is at stake. Now is the time for serious and dispassionate thought.

We cannot assert that we are beyond all dangers of another depression. All of the signs of our present economic situation do not point clearly to a continuing upward and upward course. Clarity of thought and sensible effort, not alarm, are now called for. We dare not fall asleep at the American economic switch in the year 1957.

Donald Ray Gragg, 19, was buried in Englewood Cemetery Sunday following services held at Williams Funeral Chapel.

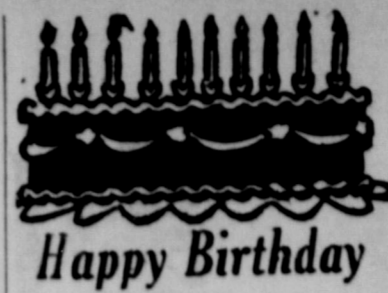
Young Gragg died Thursday evening at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tobie Gragg, Lubbock. He had been in ill health about four years.

Aid to Handicapped Available Through Social Security

Monthly insurance payments can now be paid to the handicapped son or daughter of a retired or deceased worker, according to John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration.

"This is the first year that payments can be made to a dependent child who is incapable of self-support due to a physical or mental disability.

"Payments can begin for January of this year to a person of any age who was disabled before he reached age 18," Hutton said. Such payments are made on the social security account of a parent of the disabled person. The parent must be an insured worker who has retired or died.

"Before this new provision went into effect, no family insurance could be paid for a child after he became 18 years of age. Now there is no age limit for a disabled child," he added.

Applications for these payments should be filed with the Social Security Administration, 2878 34th street, Lubbock.

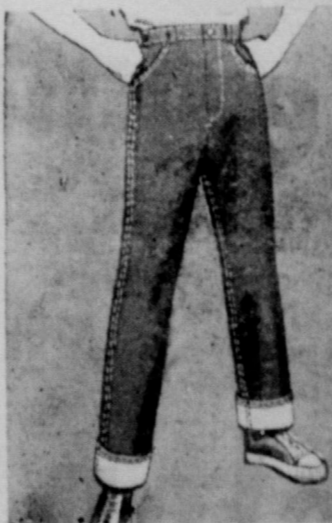

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PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund and provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proposition therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, composition, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such term as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members of the State House of Representatives, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein to be issued shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds' and shall be secured by such form, conditions and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law. Provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum and shall be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund. The fund shall be administered by the Board and shall be used for the purpose of providing financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as provided in this section, there shall be set aside for the assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund of the bonds issued by this section sufficient moneys to become due during the ensuing year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established by this section to be used for the purpose of providing financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State.

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund, to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State.

"Section 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law. The expense of publication of such proclamation shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by

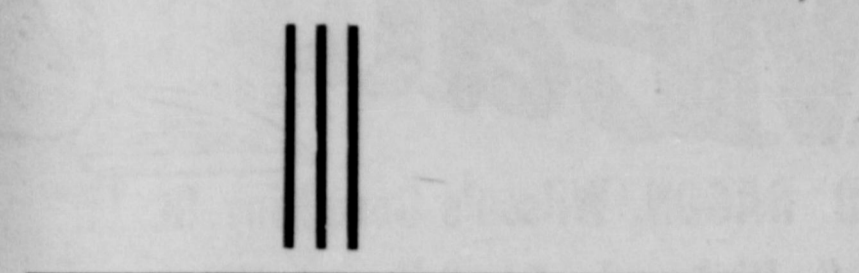

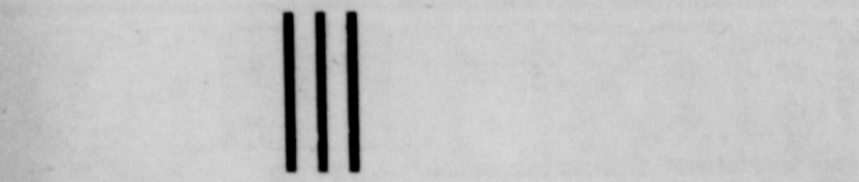

Ten Patrolmen Drew Assignments For New Toll Road

A contingent of 10 Texas Highway Patrolmen has been assigned to the new 33-mile toll road, linking Fort Worth and Dallas, to be opened to the public in the near future.

The patrolmen will use the latest and most efficient equipment in their toll road assignment. Their patrol cars will be new models fully equipped with police, high powered, interceptor engines for maximum acceleration and high speed. The patrol units also will have red come lights, and two sets of radios connecting them with the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Toll Road Authority. Each car will carry complete first aid equipment, shot-gun, and safety equipment to clearly mark accident scenes.

Not only will the patrolmen be able to render first aid in the event of an accident, they will have with them a two-gallon can of gasoline for those who are unfortunate enough to run out of fuel. And they will carry fire extinguishers and cameras to be used in the event of an accident, as well as road maps and a booklet explaining Texas traffic laws.
