NOT SCIENCE ALONE

It needs to be reiterated that science is not the only subject fit for the attention of keen, inquiring minds. There is danger of forgetting this salient fact in the heat of controversy over proposals for a federal scholarship program to encourage the study of science an dengineer-

The primary questions about the plan suggested by President Eisenhower are whether such a program of aid to education is desirable or not, and whether the amount requested by the President would be sufficient for the job. Many persons, among them a great number who yield to no one in their concern with educational problems, still believe that any federal aid to education is dengerous. Others believe ont only that there should be federal aid, but that the amount proposed by Mr. Eisenhower is far too little .

Entirely aside from those central questions, however, is this other one that demands serious thought. Leaders among the world's civilized nations have always fostered the arts an dsocial studies as well as science. Is the United States now virtually to turn its back on that tradition, with a crash program for education in science and little or nothing for education in other fields?

The questio nis an exaggeration, but the issue is nevertheless a real one. Though we certainly need many more scientists and engineers and technicians than we are now developing, our culture also needs intelligent men and women in other fields. It would be a tragic error to concentrate on weapons and technology to such an extent that our culture would be warped out of shape. There is a danger here that we dare not ignore.

POLICY OF LIBERATION

Dr. Augustus Popa, Roumanian delegate to the Assembly of Captive European Nations, has written an interesting pamphlet, "Does Liberation Mean War?" which merits attention. Popa insists that a policy of liberation conducted by the United States and its Western allies could avoid, rather than precipitate, war. It is a startling thesis, but one that deserves thought.

Dr. Popa points out that, for years after the end of the Second World War, Western Europe lay exposed and indefensible against Soviet attack. Yet there was no attack. The Kremlin is cautious, this Roumnanian thinker believes, and will not risk all-out-war unless the West allows it to gain overwhelming superiority. The West, Popa thinks, should conduct a bold counter-offensive against the Kremlin in the non-military field "It would be logical," he writes, "for the free powers to use the freedom granted by the military stalemate as boldly for the furtherence of freedom as the Soviets are doing it for the triumph of tyranny."

The West conducts a non-military campaign that is feeble when contrasted with that of the Soviet Union. Dr. Popa's proposed remedy for this state of affairs is a stimulating contribution to the great debate about free world policy.

Science, Math, Graduation Requirements In South Plains Schools Being Studied

Extra Caution Urged in **Twilight Hours**

Early twilight calls for drivers to ease-up on speed and use extra caution.

"Motorists must be aware of the fact that dusk can be deadly, and drive accordingly," J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, said today. He was speaking in behalf of the safety-after-dark program sponsored by TSA.

"There is no doubt about it many future traffic accident victims are walking and riding on the streets right now. Victims who will be struck down after dark," Musick said. "I'm talking about the careless pedestrians and motorists-the ones who do not realize that from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. are particularly dangerous hours. That's when people are rushing home from work, tired, fretful, impatient and inconsiderate. And, when visibility is especially poor."

Musick stressed that it is im-

portant for pedestrians and motorists to look out for each other. He emphasized that this could be made easier if they would "light up" at night.

"Darkness reduces visibility, and it is important that the pedestrian be easily seen. It is a good idea for night walkers to wear white or light colored clothing and carry a flashlight if possible," Musick said.

"Of course the idea of being seen also applies to the drivers. They should make it a point to turn on their headlights at the first hint of dusk. Parking lights won't do, because they make the distance of the car too easy to misjudge by others."
