Teachers generally are still rather poorly paid, considering their vital role in society. This ruling will reduce their income taxes and make it easier for them to improve their professional status and salaries.

Throughout the nation, thousands of public school teachers undertake special study each summer. They have done this even though, until now, they could not deduct the cost of such training as self-employed persons can do. The Treasury ruling very likely will encourage additional teachers to take such courses.

The result will be to raise the level of professional competence in the nation's schools. In the long run, the quality of education will be improved. The entire population will benefit, in the end, by this wise Treasury

ARAB BOYCOTT

Last year Dag Hammarskjold, secretary general of for Little League Field, Eng Nancie Lou Walton, Lindle the United Nations, referred to the Arab boycott of Israel as a "dead weight upon our efforts." As long as this boycott continues it seems futile to hope for peace and a relaxation of tensions in the Middle East, or to expect than an extensive American aid to Arab countries will produce the desired result of increased stability in

The Arab boycott is worldwide in scope, and it is being systematically and continually fostered by the Arab League. The presidents of all the major Jewish organizations in America have recently signed a Report on the Arab Boycott Against Americans. This succinct and factual study has been issued as a pamphlet by the American-Christian Palestine Committee in New York

The report clearly reveals that Jews are being boycotted as Jews. The Arab boycotters are inquiring into the business, the ownership of stock and the employment policies of American business enterprises. While other countries, like the Netherlands, scorned this arrogant action, the American State Department has been fearfully ostrich-like. The record of the State Department on Arab practices cannot be justified on the basis of any of the principles which America proclaims.

Some American enterprises have bowed to the Arabs. The pamphlet charges that Aramco is among the companies that "have facilitated the operation of the boycott." It is reported that this giant firm threatened to cancel contracts with European firms if they do business

If that is true, the matter is one for all thoughtful Americans to be concerned about. At any rate, this report should be read by everyone who wants to know why there is no real peace in the Middle East.

EASY SAFEGUARD


Players' try-outs for Little League Baseball have been postponed because of rain and wet fields, according to H. M. Englund, league president.

ANTI-AD-BAN UPHELD - A new law prohibiting price advertising of eye-glasses is constitutional, says the Texas Supreme Court.

Passed by the last legislature, the law says "opthalmic dis-pensers" (which the court says means optometrists, too) may not mention "bait, discounts, premiums, prices, gifts" in their

It landed in the courts when one group of optometrists (Texas State Optical) brought suit to prevent another group (Lee Optical) from advertising prices. Defendants said the law was invalid because its caption did not specifically mention the things the law covered.

But the high court ruled the caption was clear enough. The bill as originally introduced made no reference to price advertising. The portion pertaining thereto was inserted in committee without there being any change in the caption.

Opponents of bill charged "trickery." They argued that this was just another attempt to raise the price of glasses by prohibiting the publicizing of
