A VARIETY OF MINDS

An unfortunate side effect of the debate about education since last fall is a tendency to assume that the best minds ought to go into science as a matter of course. Various persons, some of whom know better, have fostered the idea that the arts and professions, business and other pursuits should be served only after the cream of the nation's young brain power has been skimmed off Thursday, following a head-on uled at Thompson Furniture for science.

This is an erroneous notion, and potentially a dangerous one. Its creation in the public mind can easily be understood, since nuclear physics and other tough scientific disciplines are such a mystery to the average man. The general public can be forgiven for entertaining this idea. But when an educator holding a responsible position goes along with it, he needs to be pulled up short.

The superintendent of schools in a large city recently gave unthinking lip service to the belief that top students should be guided into science, leaving the others to trickle down to supposedly less important fields of activity. This ought to be set in perspective. The superintendent should have gone on to say that to excel in some other fields requires mental powers as great as those demanded by the most exacting science.

A young man with no talent for mathematics or abstract thinking may turn out to be a genius in literature or painting. Also, the perceptions and insights of such a man may be outside the ken of another gifted science. The essential thing to remember is that minds are not all of the same sort. And that we can be most grateful.

INDIVIDUAL ACTION

It would be redundant to say that men of good will desire world peace. Of course they do. Yet to say that all men of good will are actively at work to bring about world carnations and greenery. peace would be worse than redundant; it would be quite untrue.

A major reason for this is that many who yearn for world peace feel helpless to do anything constructive toward that end. One of the questions most commonly asked is that despairing cry, "But what possible good can performed the ceremony in Wilone individual do?'

Mary P. Lord, United States representative on the UN Commission on Human Rights, gave one persuasive answer to this question recently in This Week magazine: "Whenever you practice person-to-person democracy, when you strive to understand people of other religions, races and nationalities, when you fight intolerance, when the store from J. C. Champion. you stand for equality before the law, when you speak up for freedom whenever it is threatened, you are making an important individual contribution to peace. You are setting an example that is seen around the world."





For the Supreme Court of the United States to be subjected to criticism is not a new experience. Throughout its history it has from time to time been vilified, roared at, and even threatened. This principle has since become an accepted part of our constitutional system.

The court naturally accepts a certain amount of in Burleson, her sister in Galrisk when it declares an act of Congress or an act of a veston and other relatives in state legislature unconstitutional. Parliamentary bodies are normally jealous of their rights to legislate, and may become resentful when they think hte judiciary are infringing on that right. Individual congressmen or groups of them periodically seek to restrict the court's jurisdiction, hoping to limit the field in which acts of Congress may be rendered null and void. Such an attempt is being made at the present time.

That Congress has the right under the Constitution to determine the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court cannot be denied. But the present rash attempt by a group of disgruntled Senators must be looked upon with grave misgivings.
