on December 13, 1621, if they had known that their day of thanks was to become a yearly national holiday celebrated by millions of people in the United States and Canada.

For the Pilgrims were deadset against "annual" holidays. and refused to celebrate even Christmas and Easter.

According to research experts with The World Book Encyclopedia, the Pilgrims referred to the religious holidays of the Church of England as "Roman liams Funeral Home Chapel. corruptions." They believed in celebrating only when Proviblessing

As if to prove their disdain of yearly calendar-fixed celebrations, the Pilgrims did not have a thanksgiving celebration the next year. However, other New England colonists picked up the idea and held "thanks days," usually around the end of November.

I didn't learn what happens when a month has five Sundays, but I do know that these Sunday calls turn a lonely day into a happy one for the folks back home.


