Slaton And Its Future ...

Business development and future expansion of the South Plains is undergoing a wide revolution some of which is apparent, some just developing and some trends yet to develop and the towns that best meet these developments are the ones that will have prosperity and growth.

What the growth and expansion of shopping centers is doing and will eventually do to Lubbock, and other big communities, is causing some distress and will likely cause more, before it's full significance is realized. In towns the size of Slaton the problems have not been felt but a few thousand more population could easily bring similar problems to us and if there are any answers to such problems they should be considered before they are of vital significance.

It might seem to many people that a concentration of business firms into a restricted area is not yet a problem here but a thoughtful inspection of our town might change their minds. There are blight areas and particularly in the business property area. While taxes are not high in Slaton there is unfair valuation on a considerable part of the property when compared to the parts of the business area the fickle public now favors.

Parking problems and concentration of activities in restricted areas has proven that all past arrangements in even small cities is changing to meet public demands.

Slaton is not far from having to consider some kind of City building arrangements. A study of how to meet future growth should be of serious consideration of those who are in a position to do something about it. If there is not such a group who are giving such things serious consideration there should be and its organization should not be postponed.

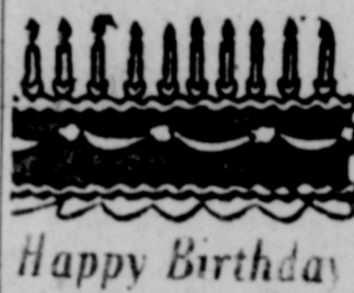
—SOUNDING BOARD—

mer and tongs" stage. High state officials are laying their careers on the line when they take a stand.

On one side is Gov. Price Daniel, who wants to obtain needed new revenue through a program based primarily on taking over abandoned property, changing the bookkeeping methods a bit and increasing natural gas taxes and certain selective sales taxes.

On the other side are a number of lawmakers, including House Speaker Waggoner Carr, who call the governor's plan inadequate. They contend Texas revenue needs are great and should be "spread thinly" to cause the least injury. Cited as possible solutions by Carr were the nine-part omnibus tax by Reps. R. L. Strickland and Wesley Roberts, or Rep. H. J. Blanchard's 1 1/2 per cent gross receipts tax.

Some House members, of course, side with the governor. Just how many will go to each side will not be known definitely until a floor vote is taken.

But some people already are reminded of a session 20 years ago when then Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel got into a wild tax hassle with House members. O'Daniel used his Sunday morning radio broadcasts to blast steadily at 56 House members who blocked his push for a transactions (sales) tax. Price Daniel is one of the 56.

So far this session, Governor Daniel is focusing his ire on the "powerful lobbyists" who he says are blocking his tax program. Most of Daniel's proposals

have been bogged down in the House Taxation Committee since the first of the session.

Whether they intend to push the governor's bills or some others, the tax committee members have made a move toward speed by adopting a Monday-through-Friday work schedule.

Not Gas—
No tax proposal thus far has brought a solid round of cheers.

Spokesmen for the gas industry told the House Taxation Committee the governor's proposed natural gas tax would have to be paid by Texas producers, not out-of-state users, as sponsors claimed. They contended it would increase the industry's burden to 43 per cent, seriously impairing ability to stay in business, let alone contribute to Texas' growth.

Several House committee members were openly hostile to the bill.

City Boys Ho'nswoogled—
In a couple of recent city vs. country votes in the House, the "city boys" were completely outdone by their country cousins.

This is not unusual in the frequent clashes over rural and urban interests, since rural area lawmakers no longer discriminate. But with the cities growing so fast, the rural group fears that one more census and re-districting will tip the scales.

They hope to head this off in a constitutional amendment proposed by Rep. Will Ehrle of Childress that would limit any county to nine representatives. Despite city protests, it passed the amendment committee, 10-6.

Cities lose again in the House floor vote on a bill which would allow farmers with 10 acres of land to "disannex" themselves from a city.

Easier Pond Permits—
Farmers won, too, when the House passed a bill that would make it easier to get a permit to dam up a small pond for irrigation.

Rep. Murray Watson's bill would change the law governing ponds of less than 200 acre feet. These may be constructed without a Water Board permit for domestic and livestock use. For irrigation use, a permit is required which farmers complained was far too complicated, expensive and difficult to get.

It's That Time Again!

Tornado Safety Rules

(Editor's Note: The following rules of behavior while in danger from a tornado were distributed recently by the Texas Civil Defense headquarters in Austin.)

To know what to do when a warning is received, or a tornado is observed, may mean the difference between life and death!

There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit to use, free from water, gas, or debris, and preferably equipped with pick and shovel.

If you are in open country:

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

If in a city or town:

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a steel reinforced building. Stay away from windows!

2. In homes: The southwest corner of the lowest floor or in the basement offers greater safety. People living in brick or stone houses should seek out shelter, preferably in a storm cellar or the basement of a frame house. If time permits, electricity and fuel lines should be shut off. Windows on the north and east sides of the house may also be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

If in schools:

1. In city areas: Especially if school building is of good steel reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditorium and gymnasiums!

2. In rural districts—remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

If in factories and industrial plants:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted

to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electric circuits and fuel lines if the tornado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

Keep calm! It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case".

Keep tuned to your radio station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

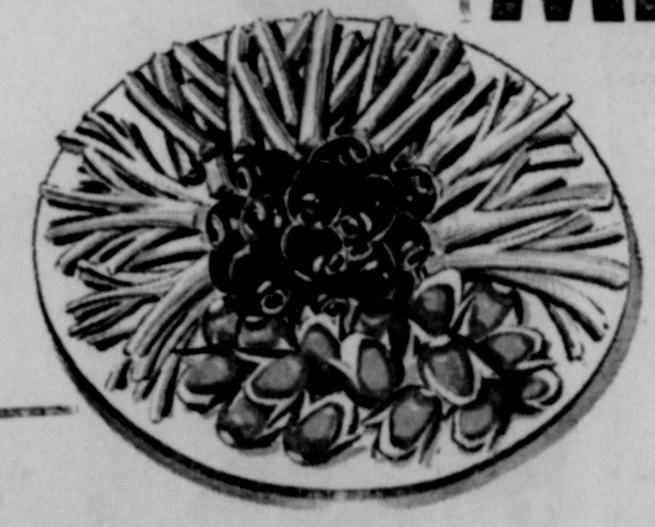

STRENGTH FOR THE WEEK

WHAT DOES EASTER MEAN TO YOU?

The Easter story of the resurrection of Jesus Christ is the most unusual story the world has ever heard.

There was a poor, little known Galilean carpenter, from the small town of Nazareth, who began to preach about the Kingdom of God, and went about inviting people to enter this kingdom. The rulers of that time condemned him to death on a cross because his preaching was in conflict with the ordinary ways of life, which they practiced.

At his death, his followers were frustrated, and utterly discouraged. They felt that all of their leader's work, and their own had all been for naught, that there was nothing to do now but to go back to their old tasks, such as fishing or tax-collecting.

Evidently Pontius Pilate said to himself: "Well, that troublesome Jew is out of the way now. I'll not be bothered with him any more." The centurion had officially reported that Jesus was dead. So Pilate thought, "We'll hear no more from him."

And Caiaphas, the powerful High Priest, must have breathed more easily, when he knew that Jesus was dead, for Jesus had disturbed the business of the priests, who had turned the outer area of the temple into a stock market. Also he had been teaching a higher way of life. But now this maker of trouble had been crucified, and his followers were scattered and beaten, so Caiaphas did not expect any more trouble.

But, as a matter of fact, they were not through with Jesus and his disciples. On the third day after his crucifixion Jesus Christ rose from the dead. The sepulchre was empty. He was alive, and lives today.

The resurrection of our Lord made a tremendous difference in the lives of his disciples. In-

stead of running away from their enemies, they faced them boldly. Instead of being discouraged, they were filled with courage. They then had a glorious message to give to the world. Altho Jesus had been crucified by wicked men, Almighty God was willing to accept his death as the atonement for sin for all men who would accept it for themselves. Altho he had died, he lives again, to be not only the Savior, but also the Lord of life.

Often times, it seems, that many are quite willing to accept Jesus Christ as Savior, but are not willing to accept him as their Lord, and let him rule in their every day living.

The true meaning of Easter is that Jesus is not only Savior, he is also the risen, living Lord, and so should be given his rightful place as the Lord of our lives, for it is not enough to accept him as Savior, only. He asks to be our Lord, as well.

What does Easter mean to you? Is it something that happened 1900 years ago? Or, is it something that is happening in you, today, as you let the risen
