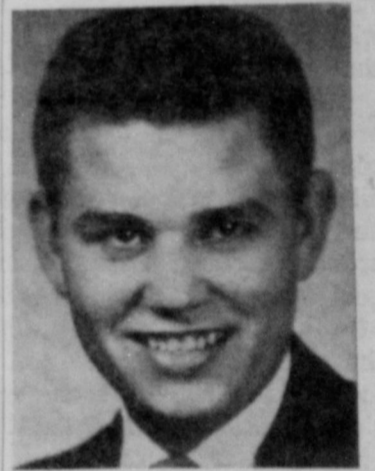

EDITORIALS

Everybody's Business . . .

Everybody's business is nobody's business and in many communities the really important public problems go unattended because none, or no group of people, endeavor to overcome the disadvantages that face the local public.

A great many cases of this kind can be cited here in Slaton but there are encouraging signs that some serious attempts may be made in the near future to bring out the objects that can be faced, and perhaps solved, that will be of advantage to Slaton, and to overcome some of the serious problems that may be standing in the way of the city's growth and future prosperity.

Particularly active along these lines have been the members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Only recently they called a meeting to which they invited not only individuals but committees from both the women's and the men's clubs of Slaton, to come and submit suggestions that could be worked out for the betterment of Slaton or ideas that, if followed up, would result in the discontinuance of something that is of harmful to the town. How successful the meeting was has not been made public, but whether the first meeting was fruitful or not, the fact that such a meeting was held is encouraging.

The complaint has been heard that the young men are taking over the town, which is probably the most encouraging thing that could happen. It may be true that all of the heads of Government, the Generals in the Army and most of the BIG Shots in business, are met tottering around in their late sixties, or older, but it can also be pointed out that they seem to be making a Heck of a Mess of things also. It may also be pointed out that most of these old dodderers never get out on the firing line and face the problems. It is the young fellows who are physically able to get the job done and if the young men of Slaton are willing to stir things up, let them have at it, and let's all get behind them. There's no telling what kind of mess we might get in, but at least Slaton will be doing something . . . not just vegetating.

The Hamilton Herald-News is lathered up about Plastic Bags: Dr. R. A. Kookon sent us a magazine article in which a physician stressed the importance of the press and medicine joining together to sound an alarm in saving lives of children.

Dr. Paul B. Jarrett of Phoenix, Ariz., stated in the article that four children in that city were killed by placing plastic bags over their heads. Many establishments there had replaced the paper bag with a plastic bag. Here is what the physician found: After the articles were taken from the bags, they were often thrown to the children to play with, and dire results followed.

"An electrostatic charge may have been generated by friction from handling. The youngster, in peering through this material, is apt to have it literally grab him through electrical attraction to his face. If this happens only the prompt intervention of an adult will prevent

tragedy. This dangerous material won't tear when a child fights it. Dizziness, inability to think, spasm of muscles occur with more and more rapid breathing. Vomiting with inhaling of undigested food puts a finish to this terrible tragedy," Dr. Jarrett states.

Don't let this happen in Hamilton. Destroy the bags after removing the articles, or keep them out of reach of the children!

We read the other day about the daily life of one of America's richest married ladies—and the article pointed out that this affluent female was actually quite busy during the day. She attended various social functions and devoted much of her time to "her favorite charities."

It appears that working with ones charities is becoming quite the thing, ranking right up there with the four-car garage, the two-tone ulcer, a foreign racing car, Miami winters, mink coats, penthouses and what have you.

These things are accepted as proof of success. Such things as credit cards, wall-to-wall carpeting, back yard swimming pools, etc., are quite commonplace and even the working class has these.

So working with ones charities is catching on.

For example, the tab on the annual April in Paris Ball, at the Waldorf-Astoria, is \$150 per table, \$300 per table if you want to waltz after the meal.

You can see readily this sort of charity is for the rich.

This April in Paris Ball is a success in charity circles, although no one is quite sure what charity benefits from the money raised. This particular ball has

achieved such status that no one in the mink coat crowd would dare not be seen there.

It used to be that charity was devoted largely to the Christmas basket and cast-off clothes, with unfortunate widows and orphans the chief beneficiaries. In this day of Social Security, highly organized and tightly wound welfare organizations, old fashioned handouts are a thing of the past.

Last Christmas, for example, the Perryton Ministerial Alliance and the Red Cross sought out families who needed help at that holiday time and appealed for individuals and organizations to channel their efforts along this line. Turned out there were few takers of the charity baskets, the vast majority of people preferring to make their own way.

Call it what you may, there is still a feeling of resentment toward charity, as the old fashioned term is known. There is no such feeling toward receiving an unemployment check or federal aid, check, or government groceries. People feel like these things are really owed to them.

Charity, it appears, has grown with the nation and is now a big business within itself. Probably the chief advantage of this high society charity is the feeling which it generates within the givers—not within the receivers. This is a sign of the times.

GOOD REASONS FOR ELECTRIC HEATING

It's just hard to keep baby off the floor. That's why you must be sure that floors are warm and free from drafts. Prospects for next year look good. The Tigerettes will lose five seniors: Forward Pat Schilling, Guards Sandra Wells, Linda Buxkemper and Vicki Kirksey and Manager Gail Huser. Three of these were starters. However, this year's leading point maker, Judy Bishop, will be back, along with guard Jeanette Price.

Concerning the Funeral

Most of us have given little thought concerning a funeral until death comes. I would like to make some suggestions that can be helpful.

Contact your minister as soon as convenient when a loved one passes away. Your minister will want to remember you in prayer and help in anyway possible. Make this your rule in calling your pastor; anything that is important to you will be important to him. When in doubt, call him. One preacher says, "I had people get sick, go to the hospital get well and go home get mad and go after me because I never knew they were sick."

Do not set the hour for the funeral service until you have consulted with the pastor. There may be a conflict of schedule that needs to be worked out. The service, usually, should not be delayed more than 36 hours after death and if possible before the week-end. Sunday services should be avoided whenever possible. If it takes longer for some of the family to arrive, then, of course, further delay will be necessary.

Who will conduct the service? Your present pastor should always be in charge of the service. If you desire other ministers to participate, ask your pastor to contact them for you. He will be glad to do so, and the visiting minister will not feel like an intruder.

What about the music? Consult with the minister before selecting the music for the service. Have the choir sing hymns from one of the church hymnals. The great songs of the faith are most appreciated. Many songs used at funerals do not express the victory and faith of a Chris-

tian. Music used in funerals should not be jig-tunes or music usually found in honky-tonks.

We are often bound by tradition in our attitudes. It seems to me that it would be most appropriate to have the body lie in state for several hours before the memorial service, for those who wish to pay their respects.

Viewing the body after the service can greatly upset the family and friends. Sometimes, for various reasons, the family wishes the casket opened after the service. This, if done at all, should be done at the church and never at the cemetery. The emotional strain is too great at the place of burial.

These are meant to be helpful hints. Possibly they will ease

Year Of '58 Saw Many Prominent Person's Death

Between the launching of the first U. S. satellite and the overthrow of Cuban dictator Fulgencio Batista, the year 1958 saw the deaths of many notable persons.

Some of those whose names are listed in The World Book Encyclopedia Yearbook were famous when they died—others were forgotten.

The deaths of Tyrone Power, Mike Todd and Ronald Colman made the headlines. Less well known perhaps was Albert Smith, the inventor of the Vitagraph, one of the first successful motion-picture projectors. Most of the public may not have recognized the name of entertainer Maude Nugent when she died. But they probably have heard of "Sweet Rosie O'Grady," one of the songs she composed.

The sports world lost Mel Ott, who hit 511 home runs for the New York Giants, ranking third among baseball greats. Baseball also lost Leon Cadore, the Brooklyn Dodger pitcher who hurled all 26 innings in the longest game in major league history in 1920.

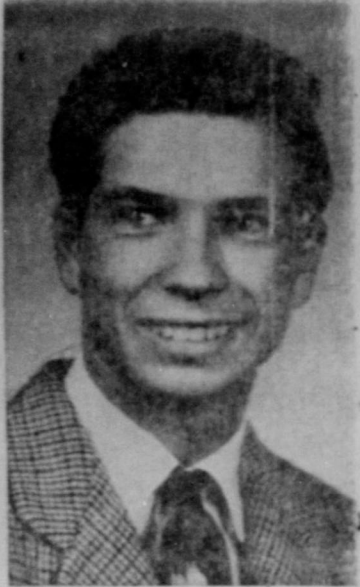

On February 17, Russell Cummings, Dee Allen Tucker, and Mr. Bill Townsend, band director, left for Galveston where they attended the All State Band Concert.

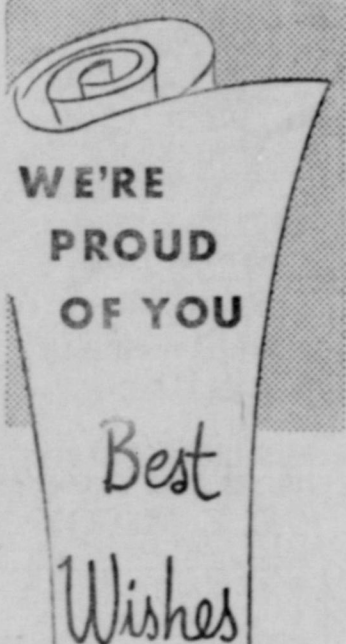

On April 14, the band held its annual Spring Concert in the auditorium of the Slaton Senior High School.

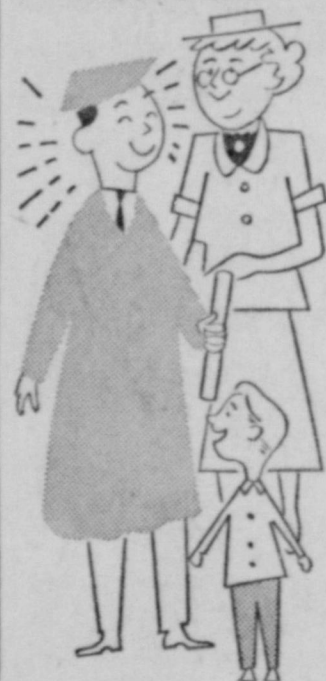
On May 2, the band went to Plainview to enter the Interscholastic League Region I, concert and sightreading competition. They came home with a division II in both concert and sightreading.
