Where Do They Go From Here?

Sixty students will graduate from the Slaton High School within a week. Some will go to other cities to continue their studies at some college, some of the young men will go into the armed services and still others will probably go to work. How many of them consider Slaton as home?

It is probable that Slaton does not come into consideration at all in most of the plans being made by these young people. Of course, where a young woman will make her future home depends to a major extent upon her marriage but the young men who graduate will either want to come back to Slaton after his armed service of college term is out if he feels that he has enjoyed living here and If he feels that he has as good, or a better, opportunity to prosper here than in some other locality.

It is to late to do much about making Slaton attractive, as a permanent home, to those who are graduating this year, for they have all made up their minds, but it's an angle worth considering for the future. Slaton not only needs to attract substantial, first class, citizens from other localities but we need to hold the ones we have and to make Slaton the kind of town our own young people want to consider as their permanent home, by encouraging the youths who are in the lower grades at school now and will e graduating in the future.
