#### **TAXES ARE A PART OF PROGRESS**

While none of us relish the idea of increased taxes. there comes a time when such action is necessary. Members of Slaton's City Commission this week have announced the necessity of a 10 per cent raise in taxes, in order to meet obligations of the city.

Too often we will overlook improvements which are in that race. behind the necessity for tax increases, and make a hasty decision that we just don't need the increase.

Improvements in Slaton's streets within the last few weeks, badly needed improvements in our water and sewer systems, the installation of an automatic chlorination system, and an up-to-date police department are back of the tax increase. Bond issues give us the money now, but must be repaid.

All of us have been proud of the progress that our city has made during the past 10 or 15 years. But progress, like everything else, costs money.

In order to maintain a staff of city employees who are qualified to do an adequate job, salary increases have been necessary. These, as well as the general increase in maintenance and operating costs have far outstripped the increase in revenue to the City of Slaton.

Slaton has been fortunate not to have had a tax increase since 1946. But the time has come when such a step is necessary.

We stand firmly behind the commissioners in their efforts to give Slaton citizens an up-to-date city government and at the least possible cost.

#### YOUR VOTE IS IMPORTANT

Young men and women in Slaton will be working Saturday from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m. furnishing transportation for anyone who needs it to go to the polls and cast their ballot in the primary election.

Slaton Jaycees, at their own expense, will furnish the means for persons without transportation of their own to be heard in Saturday's election.

Too often when an election year has been as quiet as this, when there are no heated races to stir up voter interest, people are prone to sit idly by and fail to cast

Situations such as this certainly add nothing to our way of life, and can, when carried to an extreme, weaken our governmental processes before such weakening is readily noticeable.

While in Lubbock County, and throughout the state as well, we have no real "hot" political issues at stake, we would urge each person who is a qualified voter to vote. One vote generally won't determine the outcome of an election, but multiplied by hundreds of disinterested voters, the outcome can easily become serious.

While we praise God for their consecrated devotion, we recognize that this is only the equivalent of the crews of six large aircraft carriers, an average of one missionary for 139,000 non-Christians!

In Latin America there is one missionary for 55,000 non-christians; in Africa, one missionary to every 80,000; in India and Pakastan, one missionary to every 320,000; in China, one missionary to every 470,000; in Japan, one missionary to every 170,000; in Korea, one mission ary to every 120,000.

Almost 2,000 years have pass ed since Christ gave the great missionary command and the task is far from completed. We must redouble and intensify our efforts many times if we are to meet, even reasonably well,

this great missionary challenge. Unless Christians put forth more effort to make disciples of all nations they cannot expect to live in a better world. It is just simply not possible to pass on the Christian faith as you pass on some money or property from one generation to the next. Each generation must be brought anew to the feet of the Christ and to worship the Lord.

There have been many uplift and betterment societies and they have as their aim to improve the world. I do not say that they have never done any good. They have done much. But if you bring the Gospel to these people then you do more for them.

The way to have a better world is to have better people in the world. And the only way to get better people is to change people. No law, however this. Only the Gospel of Jesus Christ is able to do this. For it is the power (dynamite) of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth.



Division of authority between the courts and Insurance Department over insurance company liquidation has been a source of dissension for years 50-50 PLAN - State Highway Department will reimburse cities and counties half the court costs of securing land for state and U. S. highway build-

Up until last year costs of obtaining right of way were borne solely by local governments. Last Legislature passed a law authorizing the state to share the cost 50-50 with cities and counties. At first this was construed

to mean the state would pay half the cost of purchasing the land. Now it has been expanded to include half of court costs and appraiser's fees.

MORE PRISON COTTON - An increase of 10.88 per cent has been ordered in the Texas Prilotment.

Officials of the Texas system had been actively dissatisfied, contending the prison farm had been dealt a bigger-thanaverage cut. Less production means less money for operating the prisons, they pointed out, and, hence, greater cost to Texas taxpayers.






