94% Slaton voters cast ballots in Primary election voting Saturday

Run-off races are in view in three county races: County Judge; County Treasurer; and Commissioner, Precinct 2. All other races were decided in Saturday's Democratic primary elections. Ottis Isom and Bill Davis will be pitted against each other in the August election. Isom received 5,368 votes; Davis, 4,598; and Dudley Brummett, the incumbent, 4,207. George Green, incumbent Commissioner for Precinct 2, ran second in his race. His 828 votes were topped by 834 for Leon Walston. The third candidate, Raymond Gentry, received 380. About 979 votes were cast in the three Slaton boxes, which was 94 per cent of the voting

strength in the three precincts. In the County Treasurer's race, Mrs. Jane Reiger and Mrs. Anne Ford Neal will vie for the Democratic nomination in the second primary election. Eliminated from the contest were Mrs. Gertrude Mills and Houston Boyd. Little League all-stars from Slaton by defeating Kent-Stonewall and Tahoka, became champions of the Area 4 tournament held last week in Post. In the regional tournament held last week end in Brownfield, the local boys were defeated 9-3 by the Lubbock Dixie all-stars.

In the game with Post, with Bentley Page Jr. pitching, the Slaton boys had 16 hits and four walks to defeat Post 16-10. In meeting Tahoka, Jimmy Townsend hit two home runs and pitched Slaton to a 9-4 victory. At the district tournament, Slaton took the lead in the

first inning against the Lubbock Dixie all-stars, with two singles by Max White and Deanie Hatchett, and a homer by Pete Harris. Dixie took the lead from Slaton in their half of the first with four runs, and were never headed. Slaton pitchers were Paul Degan and Lindell Lee.

Local entries in Soap Box Derby edged out in Tuesday competition

Both Slaton entries in the Lubbock Soap Box Derby Tuesday night were edged out. Rainfall comes just as needed. Rains in and around Slaton Sunday and Sunday night ranged from 3 1/2 inches up to 5 inches. Farmers expressed optimism over crop prospects, especially in view of the rains falling as such an opportune time.

David Cross, entered in Class A, and sponsored by Marinell Portraits, was nosed out by inches in Heat No. 5 by Larry Donnithorn of Lubbock, whose time for the 975-foot course was 36.9 seconds. Bentley Page, sponsored by Paymaster Feeds, won his first heat in 38.5 seconds, and was eliminated in his second race in Class B. Only Byron Stoval, Lubbock, who went on to win the championship, bettered the time of the Class A car that eliminated Cross.

Slaton swimmers win honors at Odessa; Scott breaks state record

Members of the Slaton Swimming Team brought home a high point trophy from the annual State Olympic Swimming and Diving Meet held last Saturday at Sherwood Park in Odessa. Jan Scott broke the existing state record in backstroke (21.9 seconds) when she placed second in the Odessa meet. Her time was 19.8 seconds. Phil Goad took high point honors for boys 10 and under. Doug Williams took sixth place in the boys 10 and under in breast stroke, with Barbara McCook placing fifth in the girls division for that age group. Jan Scott placed second in the girls backstroke, with Phil Goad taking first place honors for the boys division.

Noel Dickson took second in the boys 50-yard backstroke, in the 11-12 age group, and Alan Reasoner placed third in the boys 50-yard butterfly stroke, age group 11-12. Goad placed first in the boys 25 yard freestyle, and Glenna Payne placed third in the girls 25 yard freestyle, both in the 10 and under division. Bobby Joe Harlan took second place, and Randy Polk fifth in the boys 50-yard freestyle in the age group 11-12; Marilyn McSween placed sixth in the girls 50-yard freestyle, same age group. Phil Goad took second place in the individual medley in his age group. Ritchie Polk placed third in the 13-14 year old boys 50-yard freestyle. David Cross took second place in the 100 yard breaststroke, and Polk placed fourth in the 100 yard freestyle. Slaton's team won second place in the 200 yard freestyle relay.

Workshop on 4-H records set 2 p.m. today

Slaton 4-H Club boys will have an opportunity to bring their club records up to date this afternoon at 2 p.m., when Nathan Boardman, assistant county agent, conducts a Records Workshop in Room 157 at Slaton High School. Boardman said that work would be done on the records in order to get them in shape to be turned in by August 15, due date for all 4-H records. Joe Bob Jones and Roy Strube will be junior leaders at the workshop to assist Boardman. Boardman stated that records were kept as a means of telling others about 4-H Club experiences and achievements. "You can tell the growth of a 4-H Club boy from a small scale to a large size by his records," Boardman said. Records also serve as a basis for 4-H Club awards. Boardman pointed out that each boy who turns in a record of his work will receive a year pin. Jas. Buxkemper named Lone Star Farmer

James Buxkemper, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Buxkemper, Rt. 2, Slaton, received his Lone Star Farmer degree at the state FFA convention in San Antonio recently. Buxkemper was the only boy from the Slaton FFA Chapter to receive the honor this year. In order to be eligible for the award a boy must show outstanding leadership—qualities and have a superior supervised farming program. Buxkemper has made over \$2800 since his freshman year with cotton, milo and pig projects. He has served as chapter reporter and as chairman of several committees. He will be a senior student at Slaton High School this year. The Lone Star Farmer Degree is received by about two per cent of the 37,000 Future Farmers in Texas each year, and is the highest degree to which a boy can be advanced on a state level. While in San Antonio, the Slaton delegation was notified that their chapter had received a gold emblem rating on the state level. The chapter was one of 32 chapters in the state to receive the award. The Slaton group was also recognized for its outstanding leadership teams during the past year.

ARE YOU QUALIFIED?

Participation in the election Saturday hit a high mark, with some 979 persons casting ballots in the race for United States Senator. In Slaton's three boxes, this was about 94 per cent of the qualified voters taking part.

Including regular poll taxes and exemptions, Slaton's boxes had 1,047 persons qualified to vote.

Certainly it is encouraging to have that many of the qualified voters taking part in an election, but what about the remainder of the persons who hadn't qualified themselves?

With a population of about 6,500 persons, Slaton should have about 2,000 persons who would be eligible to cast ballots if they qualified themselves.

Poll taxes are nominal in cost—just \$1.75. And it takes only a few minutes to purchase one. True, poll tax-buying time comes in January, when few of us are thinking about elections. But all the same, it's our duty—and privilege as well—to see to it that we can cast our ballots.

How many times have you heard someone criticizing the way our government is run—whether it be city, county, state, or national? And how many times, when you look further into the situation, do you find out that the person who is doing the most griping hadn't voted—and probably hadn't paid his poll tax to be eligible to vote?

One part of our record in Slaton is good . . . but it's a shame to know that so many people didn't have the interest to qualify themselves to vote.

FOOTBALL'S COMING

Very few people in Slaton will admit no interest in our youth. And most of us are vitally interested in our local football team. But too often our interest is only in winning . . . not in developing the type man we should from the boys who are taking part in the sport.

It isn't very long until we'll start going to Tiger Stadium on Friday nights to back our team. But we can back them in as many different ways as there are people.

First of all, our coaches have a definite training program set up whereby they hope to bring the players into top physical condition. Then they have to work on keeping their frame of mind such that they are ready to play their best game week in and week out.

Much as Dr. Norman Vincent Peal's "Power of Positive Thinking" has proven itself, the "power of negative thinking" is equally strong. When the boys hear townspeople talking along such lines as "our teams just never win" or "we don't have a chance" or "seems like the boys don't care" — then that sort of thinking will dominate our team.

By backing our coaches in their every effort to train our football team, and praising the boys when they play their best game, we stand a chance to have an outstanding year in football.

Attendance at the games, talking up the boys' ability, and wholeheartedly supporting the coaches are vital in any town if it is to produce a winning team.

A PRUDIST PROTEST

Some persons see nothing but evil in any work of art which discloses the obvious truth that human beings have bodies underneath their clothes. Such an attitude seems to have impelled some American visitors at the Brussels world fair to protest because the U.S. exhibit features a plateglass etching which depicts unclothed Indians in Pilgrim days.

Europeans, whose cultural heritage includes (as does our own) magnificent representations of the nude human figure in painting and sculpture, must be snickering at this example of what they will consider American prudery. Let us hope they will realize that most of us in this country have long since outgrown the Victorian notion that there is something immoral about the body as such.

Dealers report that 1,200,000 switchblade knives are sold in the United States annually, most of them going to juveniles. The younger generation must have a lot of whittling to do.

Advising people not to worry is presumptuous unless it is known what they are worrying about.

Sometimes individuals feel that the work of bringing the Gospel to the world is almost complete. A recent survey of the United Press showed that today there are some 800,000,000 Christians in the world, the highest number ever reported, and 32% of the world's population.

Here in the United States the number of church members has passed the 100,000,000 mark. In Africa the number of Christians has risen from 1.8 million in 1925 to 10.5 million today.

In Asia, the growth has risen from 2.9 million in 1925 to 14.7 million today. And, of course, we are happy when we hear and read these figures of the growth in the Christian Church.

The plain fact, however, is that the per centage of Christians in the total world population has been dropping. Today Christians number 32% of the total world population, while twenty-five years ago the figure stood at 37%.

The plain fact is that the greatest increase in the world population is in the non-Christian lands. And it is these people who have the lowest standard of living. Hunger and starvation is the normal thing.

When these people look at the Christians and see that they are

not only slow in bringing them the Gospel, but that they also have so many other material things that they themselves do not have, then it is only natural that they desire these things. And usually the material things are more desired than the spiritual things.

Jesus said: "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well." Matthew 6:33 (RSV). Then it is not surprising that there is unrest and dissatisfaction in the world. And the enemies are quick to exploit this unrest and turn it to their advantage.

The prospects for the future do not look too encouraging. Any Christians should redouble their efforts in bringing the Gospel to their fellow-men.

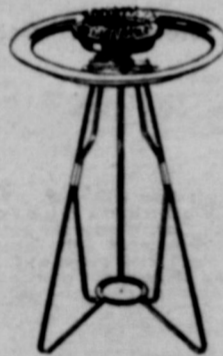

Railroads accused of building case against workers 'horrible examples'

Classifying railroad workers as "loyal and dedicated," the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers has taken sharp issue with what it terms "a concerted campaign by rail management to discredit the working men of the nation's railroads."

A statement from H. E. Gilbert, international president of the 92,000 member union, which was released locally, accused the railroads of endeavoring to build a case against labor on so-called "horrible examples."

Gilbert stated: "In recent months and weeks, certain carriers have complained publicly about what they claim are 'wasteful work practices.' Supposedly these conditions cost the industry \$500 million yearly. However, these same railroads have furloughed more than 600,000 men because of cut-backs in business and an economy wave.

"IT IS DIFFICULT to believe that 'wasteful work practices' can be prevalent when 600,000 men are out of work because no work exists for them."

The statement continued by stating that millions of dollars have been spent by the railroads on improvement in equipment and other technological improvements, yet improved service has not resulted. It cited the fact that turn around time for a freight car has increased by two days in the past 10 years.

DIESEL POWER, they stated, has enabled the railroads to haul up to 250 and 300 cars. "There are times when a 150 car train will be held in the yard 24 to 48 hours so that 100 and 150 more cars can be added to the train.

The Union said it did not agree with the railroads' contention that the switch from steam to diesel has made the 100 mile day of operating crafts obsolete.

"THE 100 MILE DAY denotes a certain amount of pay for a certain amount of work and cannot be compared with the eight hour day, of an industrial worker.

"The railroads would like the public to believe that every train now runs a mile a minute or better and a man can earn pay for 100 miles in 100 minutes or less.

"However, the carriers' own statistics show the average speed of a freight train in 1957 was 18.8 miles per hour. In the heyday of speed, the years 1936 to 1940, the average freight speed was 16.4 miles per hour."

THE UNION charged the railroads with trying to convince the public that "it is the worker who is putting the rail industry through a financial wringer."

They continued that the traveling public, including both the shipper and the passenger knows that the railroads reduced services at a time when they should have increased it to meet competition.

"Other negative steps were taken instead of meeting the problem aggressively with a program designed to win back business.

"Blaming the working man for the financial muddle created by short-sighted management is erroneous. Such a campaign can only serve to destroy the morale of the rail industry's largest group of salesmen—the railroad worker."
