## School Enrollment Up; Total of 1,553 Students

First day enrollment in the Slaton Public Schools showed an increase of 83 over the first day's enrollment last year. Some 1553 students registered at the five schools in the Slaton system Tuesday.

At Evans school 175 students registered Tuesday, showing an increase of five over last year. Schools met for a half-day session Tuesday, and began regular schedules and classes on Wednesday. First grade students will attend for a half-day during the first two weeks, enabling first grade teachers to make visits to the homes of their students during the afternoons.

### Contributions asked for Big Spring veterans

Containers and posters have been placed in several business houses over Slaton, asking for donations with which to buy cigarettes for veterans at the Big Spring Veterans Hospital. The drive is being sponsored by the Auxiliary to the American Legion here.

Money for other "comfort" items to take to the hospital is available to the auxiliary, but they do need money to purchase cigarettes for the veterans, Mrs. Hobart Trimpa said.

Members of the local auxiliary go to Big Spring each third Monday and spend the day caring for the patients. Among the tasks they perform are feeding men who are not able to feed themselves; taking men out in wheel chairs, etc.

The group from Slaton formerly has been making the trip on Monday afternoons for a half-day, but at the request of the hospital authorities, are now serving a full day.

Touchdown Club activities are well underway for the year, even though the football season won't begin until Friday night, Coach Leonard Ehrler said.

Thus far this year the club has sponsored a week-long training camp for members of the Varsity squad, which included three meals each day for the entire squad.

Films of each game during the season will be shown at the club meetings, Ehrler said. First film of the season will be Monday, September 8, at 7:30 p.m. when the film of the Canyon game will be presented.

Clark Wood is serving as president of the club this year. Dave Sanders is vice-president, with John Bagby as secretary-treasurer.

## Meurer, Thomas, Boyd win cotton awards at Farmer-Merchant dinner

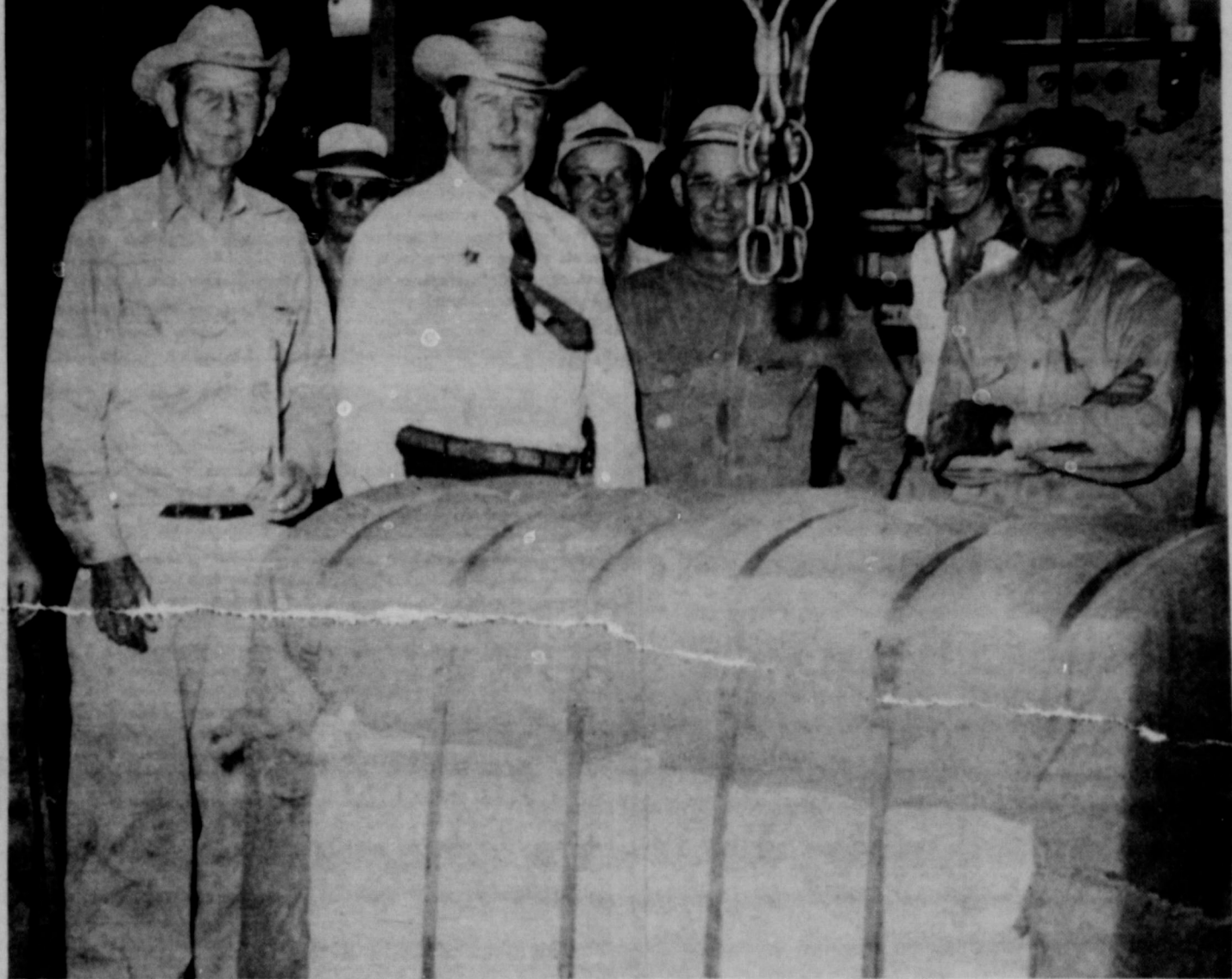
Precinct Two's constable-elect, Allen Meurer, received \$150 award for having the first bale of cotton in the Slaton area. The award was presented Monday night at a Farmer Appreciation Dinner held at St. Joseph's Hall.

Meurer's bale was brought to Slaton Cooperative Gin No. 2 at 10:10 a.m. Friday. The second bale, grown by Troy Thomas, came to Coop Gin No. 3 at 11:30 a.m. Friday. Third bale award went to Roy B. Boyd, who registered in at Posey Gin

at 11:15 a.m. Saturday. Meurer's 500-pound bale was picked from 10 acres irrigated land on his farm five miles southeast of Slaton. Thomas' bale weighed 475 pounds, and was grown on his farm five miles northeast of Slaton. Boyd

## Tigers, Eagles open season Friday 8 p.m. in Slaton's Tiger stadium

Kickoff time for the 1958 football season will be at 8 p.m. Friday in Tiger Stadium, when the Slaton Tigers meet the Canyon Eagles.

The Tigers will be after a victory this year, after taking a 26-13 defeat at the hands of the

Eagles last year. Coach Leonard Ehrler's boys this year are slightly lighter than last year's team, but Ehrler said this week that the same was true of the Canyon team.

Randy Sanders will call signals for the Tigers this year, a

post he was primed for during the latter part of last year's play.

Other Tiger starters will include Jerry Allen and Sammy Wilson at the end positions; Dale Gordon and David Bishop as tackles; Wayne Banks and

Robert Hurst at guard. Center will be Jerry Hogue. Howard Limmer will fill the fullback slot, with Pat Adamek and Giles Smith in the halfback positions.

About eight Tiger players were victims of intestinal flu early this week, but Ehrler said Tuesday afternoon that they should be able to play by Friday. Nine returning lettermen are on this year's team. Ehrler said that 34 boys would suit out this year on the Varsity team; with a total of 54 boys eligible to play on all teams.

Jerry Allen has been on the injured list with a bruised leg, and has been confined to limited workouts.

Coach Bill Davis of Canyon has 12 seniors on his team this year. Co-Captains Eddie Boydston, a 190-pound senior will be left halfback; co-captain Larry Kitchens, a 170-pound senior plays right tackle slot, but will be out for the early part of the season with a broken foot.

Roy Harris is the third co-captain, and will play in the left guard slot. He is a senior weighing 165.

Others on the coaching staff from Canyon in addition to Davis are Bill West, James Kaufman, and John Howle. Season tickets for home football games are still available through the school business office, VA 8-3282, or the high school office, VA 8-4303. Individual tickets will be available at the box office at the stadium prior to the game.

**OUTLETS FOR CAPITAL**

Aside from inflation, one possible reason for the present high level of stock market prices is that savings seeking investment have no place to go other than to bid higher for securities presently on the market. Because of this the "blue chip" stocks go higher in price with no real benefit to business in general.

Apparently there is a large supply of investable funds, seeking equities to purchase, that industry is unable or unwilling to use. Most industrial expansion is accomplished through the sale of capital stock. Presently much of industry prefers to borrow by issuing bonds, because of income tax advantages.

For the health of American industry and commercial enterprise, there ought to be more outlets for venture capital. Large corporations might issue additional shares, thus broadening their equity base and permitting wider ownership. It also has been suggested that the government, with high capital investments in enterprises such as TVA and other dam and reclamation projects, might divest itself of ownership.

This proposal gets into the touchy area of public versus private power. The idea is worth considering, even so, because it would have the desirable effects of putting private capital to use in the traditional way and providing the government with large sums that could be used to retire public debt or finance a deficit budget. If the sale of federal projects were safeguarded both as to fair price and as to continued operation in the public interest, public power advocates might find little objectionable in such a plan.

At any rate, we should not lose sight of the fact that this nation's success is closely tied up with the efficient use of capital. Under present conditions, the use of capital is not as efficient as it might be.

**A DANGEROUS POLICY**

An American arms shipment has arrived in Iraq. It was dispatched before the July 14 coup in Baghdad, but the shipment could have been turned back or the arrival further delayed. Also, American Globemasters are flying small arms into Indonesia. However, the United States government continues to refuse to sell arms to Israel, a democratic and Westernized state which Arab leaders have vowed to destroy.

While the Soviet Union and its satellites have been pouring arms into Egypt and Syria, the American government has been steadfast in its refusal to sell arms to Israel. Nasser has been given Russian submarines and Polish destroyers, but Israel cannot get equipment to defend its coast line and to defend itself against Russian submarines which fly Nasser's flag.

At the same time that American officials speak of massive deterrence, our government could shoulder Israel in the latter's appeal for defensive and deterrent weapons. This policy can well be a contributing cause of a future war in the Middle East. If the Arabs, under Nasser's leadership, gain a great superiority over Israel, there may very well be an attack. The American government's policy of refusing arms to Israel is not only inconsistent, it is highly dangerous.

**BASE BALL'S DRIFTING**

The current baseball season is an unexciting one. The Yankees forged so far ahead and so outclassed the other teams in the American League that when Stengel's team fell into an August slump, it still remained safely ahead of its rivals. In the National League, the Braves finally shot safely into the lead. Stan Musial made his 3,000th hit, but no records of consequence are likely to be broken this season.

Attendance at Los Angeles and San Francisco has put the overall figures ahead of last year, but a number of the major league clubs are likely to run behind the 1957 attendance figures. And the Cleveland Indians will probably draw less than 700,000. The Cleveland club may emigrate to a city which hungers for major league ball.

Baseball continues in transition through the current season. The longer the owners continue to follow a policy of drift, the more likely is it that the one-time national game will become a television sport. Perhaps it is already too late for anything to be done.

Ty Cobb says old-time ball players were more aggressive. Except, of course, at salary contract time.

Beat one egg in cup. Fill cup with lukewarm water. Add 2 cups of flour (a good pinch). Add a pinch of salt and mix well. Beat and knead (by picking up dough and throwing or hitting it on table) until white blisters appear. Divide into 4 parts and cover each. Let stand 2 hours. Roll and puff paper-thin. Spread with sliced apples, sugar, cinnamon, butter and sour cream. Roll up in greased pan. Bake in moderate oven for one hour, basting with hot milk. Apple strudel may be frozen unbaked. After removing from freezer, bake, basting with hot milk. Bake slightly longer than one hour.

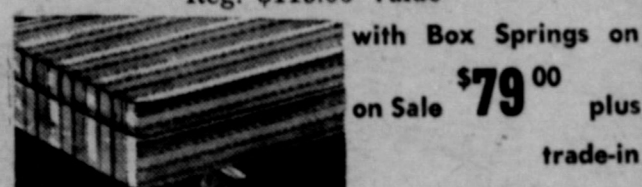

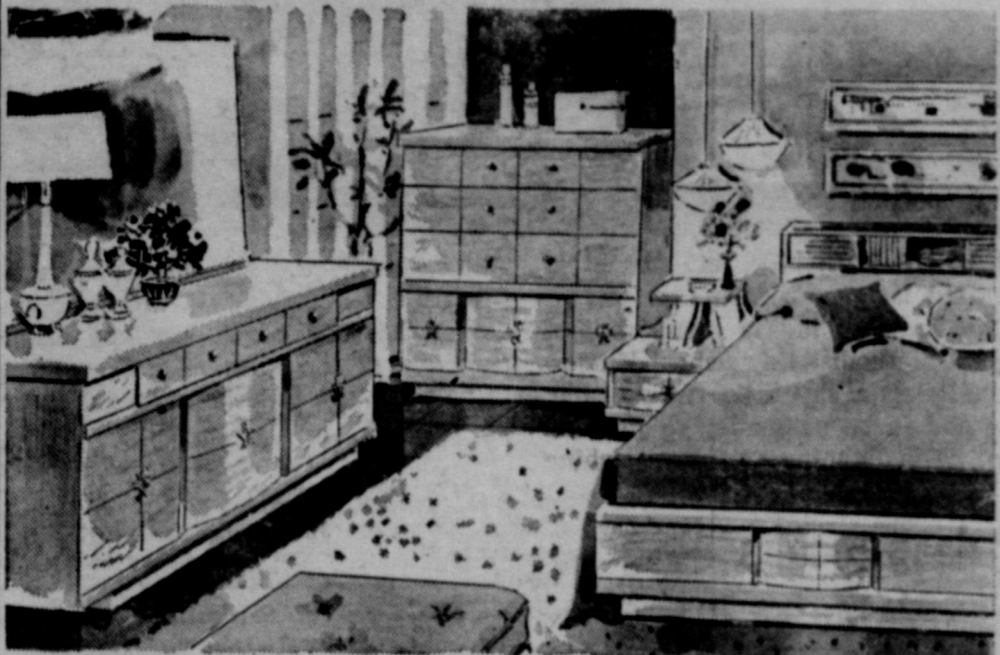

## DPS report improvement in crime rate throughout state

Increasing crime in Texas showed some signs of improvement in a report released recently by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Crime statistics released by Joel Tisdale, chief of Identification and Criminal Records, showed that crime in all categories during the first six months of 1958 increased 7.2 per cent. This figure, however, was not as great as the 9.5 per cent increase reported for the similar period last year.

Noticeable decreases in this year's report were shown in the categories of auto theft, rape, and murder and homicide.

Auto theft was down 5.1 per cent, while last year is showed a 26.8 per cent increase. Murder and homicide decreased 12.7 per cent during the first six months of 1958; in the same period in 1957 that classification of crime was up 22.7 per cent. And the 1958 report on rape was a decrease of 24.6 per cent in comparison with a 2 per cent increase in 1957.

Tisdale said both the urban and rural figures show increases this year, but the crimes in urban areas were not increasing as rapidly as previously experienced. Urban major crimes were up 8.4 per cent; rural crimes increased only 1 per cent.

Most classifications of crimes against property in the new report showed increases. The rise in burglary was 14.1 per cent; robbery 14 per cent, and theft 7.3 per cent. Aggravated assault, classified as crime against the person, increased 1.1 per cent.

Juvenile crime during January through June continued a strong upward climb with 52,871 total arrests of persons 20 years or younger who were charged with a major crime. Chief Tisdale explained that this figure was not all-inclusive in that many juveniles were not

fingerprinted, especially those arrested for misdemeanor offenses. His report on juvenile crime was based on fingerprint cases received by the department.

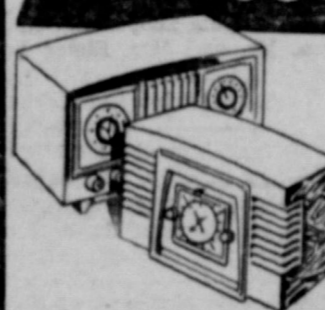

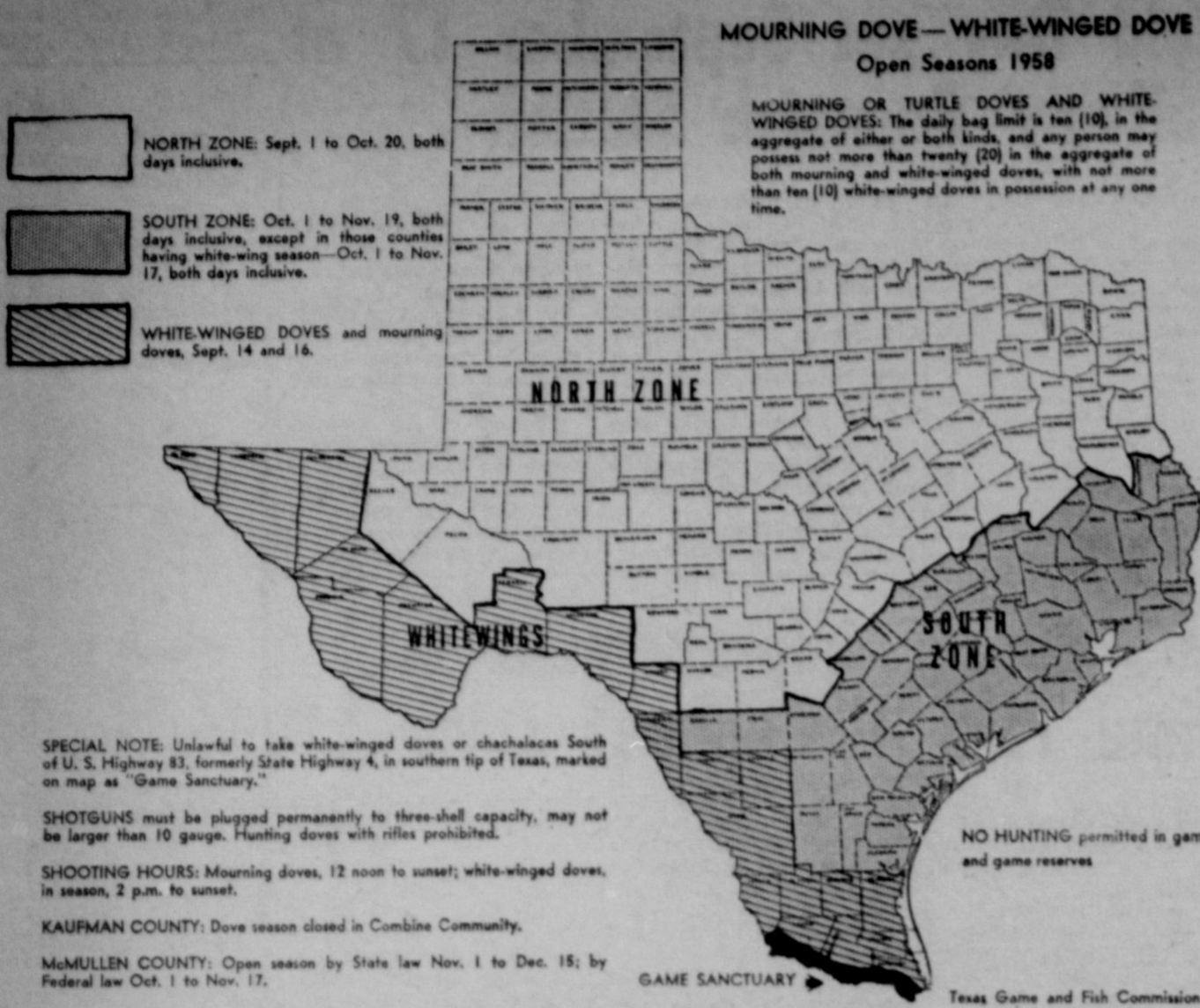

## Dove season now open in north zone; prospects good for hunters

Dove hunters opened the season in the North Zone of Texas Monday, with one of the best crops of doves in years, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission.

The South Zone will open on October 1, except in the Rio Grande Valley counties where the white-winged and mourning doves may be shot on Septem-

ber 14 and 16 from 2 p.m. until sunset.

The directors gave a few warnings to shooters:

Be sure you have your new 1958-59 hunting license, on sale with wardens, sporting goods stores and county clerks.

Shooting starts at 12 noon and ends at sunset. Be sure to check your time and don't shoot by moonlight.

The limit is 10 doves per day. After the first day you may have 20 mourning doves in your possession. This doesn't mean you can put 20 in the deep freeze and then go out and kill another daily limit.

Be sure to get permission from landowners for hunting in their property. You can be arrested for trespassing.

Don't shoot across roads, highways or public property. Stay off of wildlife refuges. Your gun must be plugged to hold not more than two shells in the magazine and one in the chamber—three shots in all. Look before you shoot. A charge of bird shot in a man's face has a way of irritating him.

Don't shoot from an automobile. Wardens will get you in a hurry. If you are inclined to be careless, check your life insurance policy.

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**  
 by Vern Sanford  
 TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas' 56th Legislature, though not yet sworn in, already casts a long shadow over Statehouse activities.

Its membership was settled—or virtually settled—with the counting of the Democratic second primary votes. A few will have Republican opponents in November.

Of more interest now is how the 56th will lean on key issues. Political prophets already are taking pulse reading and pronounce it likely to be more liberal than its predecessor. But not predominately liberal. A big influx of newly-elected liberals from Houston is expected to be offset by Dallas conservatives, plus others from small towns.

On next session's crucial issue—finance—everyone's crystal ball seems a bit cloudy. Next Legislature will have to grapple with a financial deficit which the Legislative Budget Board has predicted may call for as much as \$140,000,000 in additional tax revenue.

Winning candidates, in both their speeches and newspaper announcements, were understandably skittish and unspecific in making specific proposals for dealing with this gigantic problem. Many came out flatly against a general sales tax or state income tax. Numerous suggestions were made to balance the budget through "economy in government, elimination of waste, duplication," etc.

Such statements are like the breeze off an iceberg to state departments, many of whom have said they'll be asking for more, not less money, next session.

When the showdown comes, decisions will be made largely by the same group who pushed the voting buttons in '57. All told, there'll be 49 new faces among the 181 lawmakers.

Replacing the three retiring senators, Otis Lock of Lufkin, Searcy Bracewell of Houston and Carlos Ashley of Llano will be Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin, Robert W. Baker of Houston and Louis Crump of San Saba.

House will have 46 freshmen, slightly less than the normal one-third turn-over of its 150 members. Changes result from the retirement of 33 representatives, defeat of 13 others. MANGLED MATH—When the next speaker of the House of Representatives takes office in January, some confused arithmetic will be cleared up.

A speaker is elected at the start of each regular session by the 150 House members. Support, in the form of signed pledges, is lined up well in advance of the session's start.

This year, when the dust settled from the run-off primary, both contenders claimed victory. Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, present speaker, said he had 80 pledges. Rep. Joe Burkett of Kerrville claimed 77 pledges. In addition, Burkett said he knew of 15 House members who had made no pledges. All the claims added to 172 representatives—22 more than the people elected.

BIG DAY DUE—San Antonio, site of the Alamo, may see another lusty scrap Tuesday (Sept. 9) when Texas Democrats of widely varying sentiments gather for state convention.

No one is making an ironclad prediction on what will happen, but pre-convention rumblings promise at least some of the usual fireworks.

A group of conservatives are working on ways to bounce the militantly liberal Mrs. Frankie Randolph from her post as national committeewoman. Having the chairman of the Democrats of Texas and leader of the opposition to state party leadership in the prestige-laden national committee post is hard to take.

But removing a national committee member offers difficulties, too. A state convention merely nominates the national committee members; actual election is by the national convention. Whether a state convention could undo the action of a national convention is not definitely known.

Another possible source of friction is the selection of the State Executive Committee Chairman, the post now held by Jim Lindsey of Texarkana. Abilene Oilman Ed Connally has been mentioned as a prospect. Liberal delegates and supporters of Sen. Ralph Yarborough are expected to fight hammer and tongs against a Connally drive. Connally was a strong supporter of William Blakely in his Senate race against Yarborough and headed

Gov Price Daniel's precinct convention fight against the DOT.

TOO "GENERAL"?—Alumni of East Texas State College are asking help in untangling conflicts over a new program at the Commerce school.

At issue is the value of a "general studies" program instituted by ETSC President Dr. James Gee. Revised Curriculum substitutes a course in "communications" for freshman English, "heritage" for American history, and so on. A professor who had taught some of the "general" courses called them a "hodgepodge," comparable to grade school work.

Dissatisfied exes meeting in Austin asked Sen. Charles Herring, Senate investigating committee chairman, to look into the situation. Herring said he would bring it up at the committee's next meeting, but urged the exes to talk first with the college's Board of Regents.

FACULTY RAISES ASKED—Salary raises for faculty members are the principal item in a \$12,515,000 budget increase being sought by Texas' 18 state colleges and universities.

Texas Commission in Higher Education said the \$4,000,000 being asked by college officials would allow for average raises of \$600 per year per prof.

Altogether, the colleges' budget requests the Commission total \$68,721,975 for the 1960-61 biennium.

Commission's talk is to screen these requests and make up a recommended budget to present to the Legislature.

SHORT SNORTS—State Board of water Engineers has scheduled a hearing for Sept. 18 on the proposed Diablo Dam on the Rio Grande River. Gov. Price Daniel has proclaimed September and October as "American heritage months," a period in which people are to be encouraged to vote on an informed basis and contribute to the political parties of their choice.

**Youth offered European tours in U.S. Army**

Training at Fort Riley, Kansas, and then an assignment in Europe is offered qualified men under the U. S. Army's "Choice, Not Chance" enlistment program, M/Sgt. George E. Henderson, announced today.

This "Choice, Not Chance" option allows a man, with or without prior military service, to enlist for the 1st Battle Group, 26th Infantry. The 1st Battle Group is an Army "Operation Gyroscope" unit which is scheduled for service in Europe. Enlistments will be accepted until the terminal date of 24 October 1958.

Prior service personnel will not be accepted in grades above private first class.
