Tigers downed in season opener 20-6 by Canyon

The Canyon Eagles, led by fullback Eddie Boydston and quarterback Jerry Richardson downed the Slaton Tigers 20-6 in the season's opening game for the two grid teams.

Richardson scored all three touchdowns for Canyon and intercepted a pass to stop a Tiger

right end Craig Hinger for 20 yards, and another first down on the Slaton 30 yardmarker. Ten plays later Richardson scored on a keeper, going three yards for the touchdown. Tommy Henderson went around end for the extra points, making the score 8-0.

and the Tigers recovered on the 26. After picking up a first down on the 12 yard line, Barry lost five in an around-end attempt, and Limmer made five over tackle. A third down pass was intercepted behind the goal for a touchback.

Canyon took possession on their own 20, ran two plays, and quick-kicked to their own 47, where the Tigers took over.

Going over tackle and over the guard, Slaton scored in nine plays, with Sanders going the final five yards on a keeper play. The try for point was not successful.

Junior high football will get underway this year on Tuesday, September 16, when Slaton and Post meet at 7 p.m. at Tiger Stadium.

The season will continue through October 23.

Second game of the year will be on Tuesday, September 23 when Slaton will play at Friendship. Game time will be 7 p.m.

On Tuesday, September 30,

Slaton will meet Tahoka at Tahoka.

October 7th, formerly an open date, has been filled with a game against Seagraves, to be played at 6 p.m. in Slaton.

Slaton and Friendship will play in Slaton on October 14, with game time at 7 p.m.

Final game will be when Slaton and Tahoka meet in Slaton on October 28, at 7 p.m.

The Junior High Athletic Club, with A. C. Burk as president, meets each second and fourth Monday nights at the Junior High building. At their meeting this week, the group discussed means of raising funds to secure equipment and other materials to aid the athletic program at the junior high school.

LATER SLATON recovered an attempted outside kick on their own 42 yard line; Adamek lost four on an end run, and Giles Smith picked up two yards over guard. After an incomplete pass by Sanders, Adamek kicked out of bounds on the Canyon 31.

The Eagles' Richardson took an eight-yard gain over center, only to have a 15-yard penalty for holding move the ball back to the 22, where Boydston kicked to Slaton on their own 33 yard line.

ADAMEK TRIED an outside kick with Canyon recovering on their own 48. Boydston picked up seven yards in an off-tackle smash. On the next play the ball was given to Boydston, who ran into a wall of Slaton defenders, but was able to lateral to Richardson, who had a clear field for the remaining 45 yards, the try for point was not good.

The game ended five minutes later with the Tigers on Canyon's 45 yard line.

Richardson of Canyon was the top ball carrier in the game with 68 yards on 12 carries. Limmer was the top man for the Tigers, with 67 yards on 19 carries.

Friday night the Tigers will meet Seagraves in Tiger Stadium at 8 p.m. Seagraves won over New Home last week 34-0.

Howard Limmer picked up 11 yards on two line smashes for a first down on the 44 yard line. Eleven plays later Slaton had a first down on the Canyon six yard line. Smith made one yard over tackle, and Limmer got one yard around end. Sanders lost three yards on an attempted pass, and was held for no gain on the fourth down try, losing the ball on downs on the Canyon 7.

On the first play of this series, Canyon fumbled and Slaton recovered on the 10 yard line. Time ran out on the Tigers after a one-yard gain over tackle and a two-year pass completion. The half ended with Slaton on the Canyon 7 yard line.

THE TIGERS took the second half kickoff on their 25 yard line and returned it to their own 34. Ten plays were used, and with the help of a 15 yard penalty for a personal foul, Slaton had a first down on the Canyon 15. Limmer carried the ball five times for 21 yards on this drive.

Adamek went over right tackle for nine yards, before fumbling on the six yard line, when Canyon recovered the ball.

THE EAGLES picked up a first down on their own 18, where on the third down Boydston quick-kicked to the Slaton 35. Adamek returned the ball to the 40 yardline.

Randy Sanders picked up two on a keeper; Limmer was held again for no gain around end, and a pass fell incomplete. Adamek kicked out of bounds on the Canyon 15.

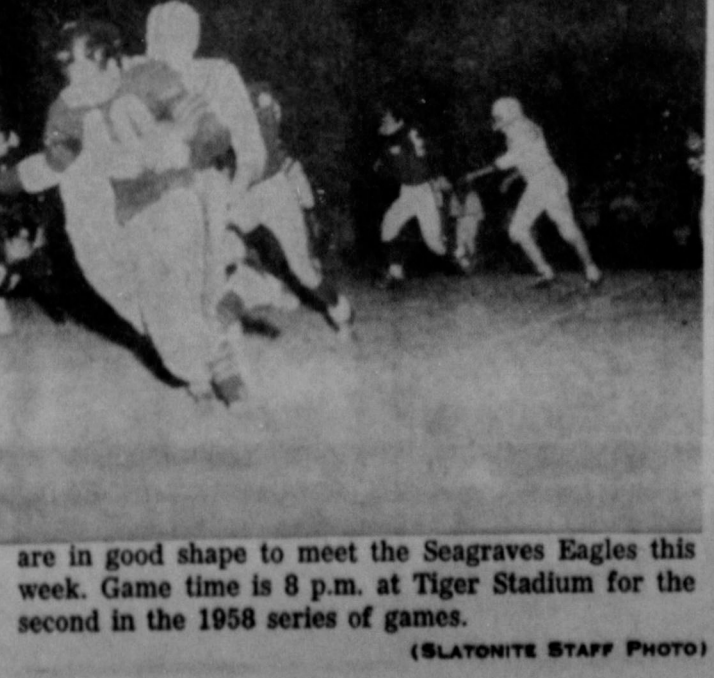

28 bales ginned at 11 area gins through Tuesday

Gins in the Slaton area were running at a pace somewhat slower than full blast this week, as ginning was getting off to a fairly slow start.

Three gins in the area had yet to receive their first bale for the season Tuesday afternoon. Some gins had ginned one bale, while one gin in the area had ginned 16.

Total number of bales ginned when the reports were made Tuesday were 28, from 11 gins in the area. One gin could not be contacted.

DON'T MINIMIZE SPEED

The question before the house is this: Is the pre-occupation with speed as a cause of highway accidents obscuring better ways to reduce such carnage as that which occurred during the recent Labor Day weekend? The question is not a new one, but it has been raised again persuasively in a magazine article by John D. Williams, head of the Rand Corporation's mathematics division.

It is Williams' belief that obstructions to the smooth flow of traffic, rather than speed, constitute the chief villain in the highway drama. He would focus more attention on such things as improved signals, additional separated traffic lanes, better ways to prevent and unscramble traffic jams, and widespread use of personal crash protection devices—harnesses, helmets, and so forth.

This is a constructive approach. But there would be harm in fostering the notion that speed isn't so bad, after all. Speed does kill. It reduces human reaction time below the safety limit. That is a good thing to keep in mind while we are busy smoothing out the flow of traffic.

RETIREMENT VALUES

A prominent industrialist has reached the age of retirement. Now, it is reported, he intends to spend his time catching up on his hunting, and on watching football and baseball. That is his privilege, certainly. After spending long years at work, a man has the right to do what he pleases during the rest of his life.

Yet there is something rather disturbing about the idea that a man who has been a leader in the business community can think of nothing better to do with his remaining years than to indulge in sports and games. To say this is less a personal criticism than it is a criticism of the social values that make such an attitude not only possible, but common.

There is nothing wrong with catching up on hunting and baseball. But is it intellectual snobbery to suggest that it might also be rewarding to spend some of those retirement hours as catching up on Shakespeare, or listening to the great music that is a part of our cultural heritage, or reading the political philosophy of Thomas Jefferson?

If some retiring executive were to tell interviewers that he intended to spend some of his leisure time at such pursuits, that might be a sign that we were reaching maturity. The implication is not that hunting and football games—or, for that matter, golfing or speedboating or other such pleasures of retirement—are signs of immaturity. Recreation is valuable, and eminently justified. But there are values and rewards, also, in things of the mind and spirit. These, too, should play their enriching part when a man has put aside the harness of daily work.

Since scientists of Communist and democratic countries seem to hit it off harmoniously, it has been suggested that they be allowed to run the governments. But then who would invent new bombs and other weapons?

A new paint can be used to spray lawns and change brown spots to green. Probably an outgrowth of the process which makes blondes of brunettes, and vice versa.

Residents in the Lubbock area who plan on enrolling in evening and Saturday classes at Texas Tech will sign up earlier this year, the registrar's office has announced.

Registration of evening and Saturday-only classes will be held from 4 until 6:30 p.m. September 17 and 18, and from 8 a.m. until noon on September 20.

This is almost five days earlier than previously when the night class enrollees signed up only after regular Tech classes were underway.

This fall Tech is offering 59 courses in everything from accounting to zoology for part-time students and adults desiring to do specialized or general work toward a degree or for professional advancement.

Texas resident tuition fees are \$15 for three semester hours or less and \$19 for a four semester hour course or less and

\$67 for four semester hours. A \$7 refundable property deposit is required of all who enroll at Tech.

All of the evening and Saturday-only courses will begin meeting the week of September 22. A list of courses may be obtained from the Tech registrar's office.

Aspiring accountants have eight courses to choose from—elementary principles to CPA Review. Weaving, silk screen printing and wood sculpture are three applied arts courses offered, while agricultural education offers a problems course.

One business education course and three business law courses, including insurance law and oil and gas law will be taught by the school of Business Administration. One principles of economics course and a course in business correspondence are also scheduled.

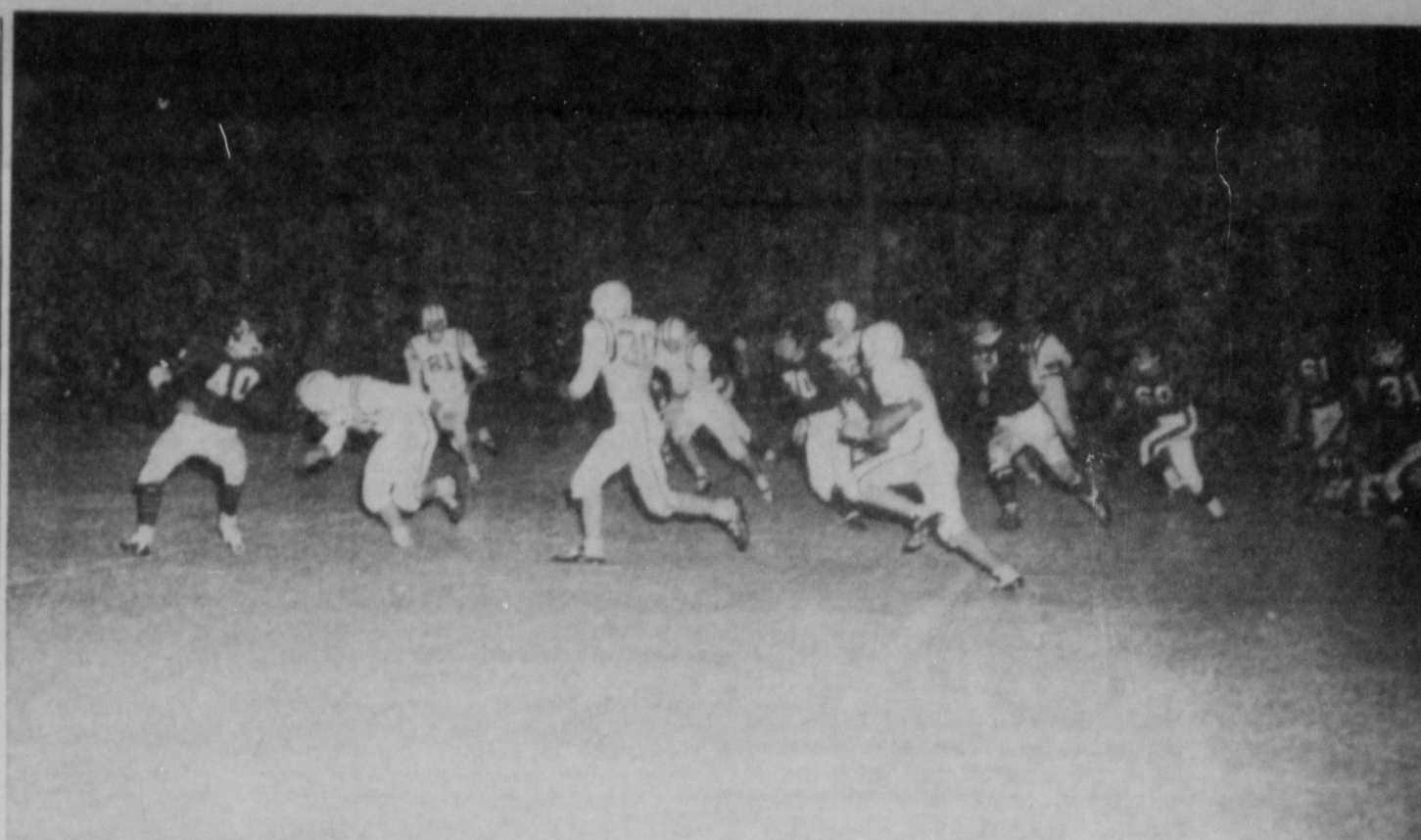
The education department has 11 courses scheduled for area school teachers. They range from elementary education curriculum development to graduate seminars.

Tech's English department is offering six courses and the government department is presenting two American government courses. Two history courses are also scheduled.

The School of Home Economics has scheduled a child development and family relations course and a home economics education class in supervision.

Six math courses—from elementary algebra to differential and integral calculus—are slated. One course in music education, "Music for Children" is scheduled.

Those interested in the why's of human behavior have four courses in psychology available. These include an introductory course and three graduate-

Korean veterans education, training reinstatement now possible through VA

Veterans of the Korean War who have previously initiated educational or training objectives under Public Law 550 (Korean GI Bill) but have interrupted their training for more than 12 consecutive months may now be eligible to resume their education and training objectives, R. W. Sisson, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Lubbock, said recently.

This is as a result of a recent change in VA regulations, Sisson said.

VA Regulations will now allow a Korean veteran to reenter training if he has been out of training less than 12 months since his cut-off date or if he shows training was interrupted for one of the following reasons:

1. Immediate family or financial obligations beyond his control which required suspension of training to obtain employment.
2. Personal or family illness or death in the immediate family which prevented continuance of training.
3. The allowable 12-month period during which training can be suspended without VA approval ended during a vacation, recess, or other period during which it was not possible to reenter school.
4. Training was suspended because of unavoidable conditions arising in connection with employment.

Veterans wishing to resume their training interrupted under the Korean GI Bill should contact their nearest VA office or write to the VA Regional Office, Lubbock, submitting evidence showing the reason for interruption of training.

If VA approves reentrance under the new regulation, Korean veterans will be required to resume their training not later than the date the training first becomes available, Sisson stated. With school openings just around the corner, it is imperative that veterans desiring to reenter training contact the VA soon as possible.

Experiment station program for 1959 up for consideration

Research program for 1959 for the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Station at Halfway will be decided at a meeting of the Advisory Council during the second annual Field Day set for Wednesday September 17, according to Harold Hinn, chairman.

Members of the advisory council, representing 19 counties, have been analyzing the agricultural research needs in their section of the Plains. They have also been receiving suggestions from farmers during the year.

Priority of the projects to be undertaken at the station will be determined by the board on the basis of the greatest need. The extent of the projects to be conducted will be governed by the funds available.

The addition of a specialist in irrigation and water conservation proposed at the June meeting will be presented for formal action.

Budget for 1959 will be presented for consideration by the board. Included for consideration will be the building program which was deleted from the 1958 budget. Priority will be established for construction of

a laboratory, greenhouse, barn (for processing and storage), and an office building. Policy of the foundation since its inception permits no indebtedness.

Accuracy, completeness of information is essential in driver license renewal request

The Texas Department of Public Safety reported this week that it is returning applications and fees for renewal of Texas Driver Licenses at the rate of 1,000 per week, because of information insufficient to identify the applicant.

The wholesale return of DL applications is brought on by the omission of a number of factors that must be included for the proper identification of the person desiring to renew his driver license.

THE DEPARTMENT reported that it must have the full name of the individual, the person's birth date and current address. The number of the old license is a quick means of identification.

Most of the information needed is already included on the renewal notice that is sent by the department to the motorist prior to the expiration of his license. A space is provided for that license owner to change his address.

H. C. SMITH, manager of the DPS License Issuance and Driver Record section said that most of the difficulty comes when a person applies for renewal without returning a renewal notice. In this type of renewal application the individual simply writes a letter and includes the fee.

Insufficient information in renewal applications received by the Texas DPS sets up a chain reaction of processes for identification of the individual asking for a new license. But in many instances the search is hopeless.

WHEN A MAN gives the name of A. B. Smith in his renewal application, the file clerks of the Driver License service of the state police organization set to work in an attempt to identify the individual by birth date, if all identifying information does not correspond, the application must be returned to the individual.

You can imagine the task that awaits a DL clerk who must search through a file that contains more than five million individual records, and more specifically, to look for the name of A. B. Smith in 35 trays with each containing 700 personal record files. There are 36,400 files in the department's massive record system bearing the name of Smith.

IN ORDER THAT it may improve its service of renewing licenses with a minimum delay to motorists, the Texas Department of Public Safety asks that you give complete information.

A woman should give her date of birth, all given names, and her surname. If she is married, she should also give her maiden surname and previous married names.

A MAN SHOULD give his date of birth, first name, middle name and surname.

Texas driver licenses are issued for a two year period and expire on the date given on the face of the license. The fee for an operator's license is \$2, a commercial operator \$3 and a chauffeur's \$4.

The Texas DPS asks that drivers check the expiration date on the current license and renew it in time—before you discover you are driving without a valid license. And in making application for renewal, include complete information. Correct, complete information on your renewal will result in a more rapid return of your new Texas driver license.

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.—How best to educate Texas children — and how to pay for it—will be a key issue in the upcoming legislative session.

Problems were spotlighted when the Hale-Akin Committee made its first report. Included were 12 recommendations for improvement or expansion of public education.

Several proposals reflect the concerns of the times. In an age of mounting traffic death tolls and almost universal availability of high-speed cars to teen-agers, state-supported driver education was urged. In the face of widespread reports of the superiority of educational systems in other countries, the committee recommended state aid for classes for the "academically gifted." It also proposed increasing the school year from a minimum of 175 days to 180 days plus five days for teacher training.

Other proposals were to provide state support for (1) more principals, (2) assistant superintendents in large districts, (3) pre-school teaching of children unable to speak English, (4) larger allowances for maintenance, (5) replacing school buses and paying drivers (6) buses for city children living more than two miles from school, and (7) state and local guidance services.

It also suggested basing teacher-pupil ratios on current attendance rather than figures for the year before and urged the setting aside of TV channels for future educational use.

Final decision on other recommendations was postponed until Sept. 15. These include raising the minimum pay for teachers \$595 a year (from \$3205 to \$3800) and releasing state property taxes to allow for more local district collections.

Hale-Akin Committee is a 24-member study group of lawmakers and private citizens set up by the last legislature to study public schools and make recommendations to the 1959 session. Grass-roots discussion has been going on for nearly a year in cities and counties over the state. Proposals being made now result from sifting and weighing of hundreds of ideas urged by educators and interested citizens.

Committee members are not blind to the likelihood of stiff legislative resistance to the additional money-spending called for by most of the proposals. Cost of the state minimum foundation program for the present school year is estimated at \$349,416,000. H-A Committee's "enrichment" suggestions could add from \$50,000,000 to \$150,000,000 to that figure.

Most lawmakers already are feeling financially gloomy because of a predicted \$140,000,000 gap between state revenue and cost of present programs—without any kind of improvement anywhere.

One committee member suggested that, while all the proposals might not be put into effect right away, they could serve as "a pattern for years to come."

WHAT, NOT HOW — Greater emphasis on what to teach, rather than how to teach will be reflected by this year's college graduates majoring in education.

A law passed in 1955 requires future teachers, beginning with the 1959 grads, to have 40 per cent of their credits in subjects they will teach, 40 per cent in "cultural subjects," 20 per cent in education courses.

State Board of Education called attention to this change at its September meeting.

Board also hit a lick in its unrelenting battle against all plans to dip into principal of the permanent school fund for current expenses. Its resolution warned of possible "tragic consequences."

Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar was authorized to prepare recommendations for Texas participation in the newly passed federal aid to education program. Texas would be eligible for some \$9,000,000 to bolster the training of teachers, scientists, mathematicians and other kindred purposes.

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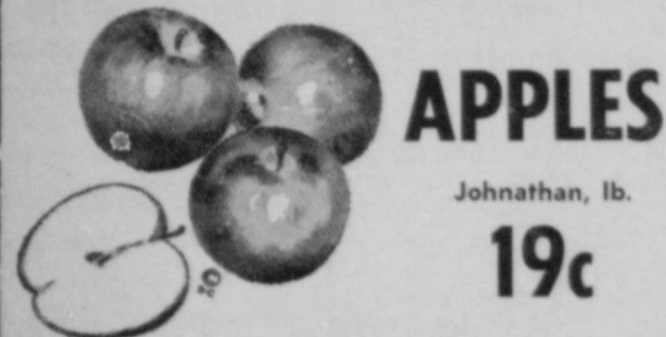

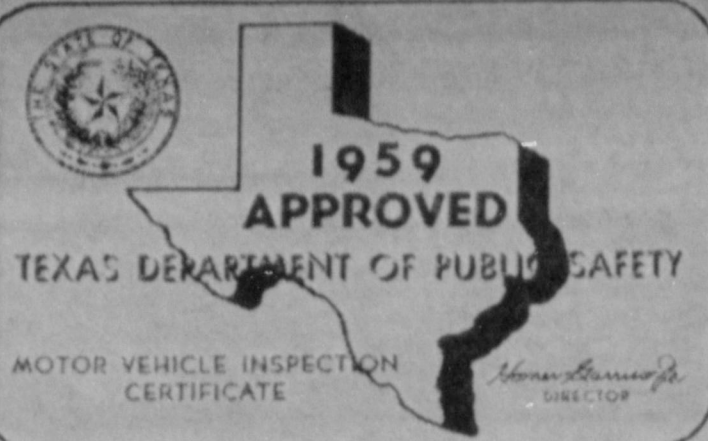

Inspection of cars for '59 now underway

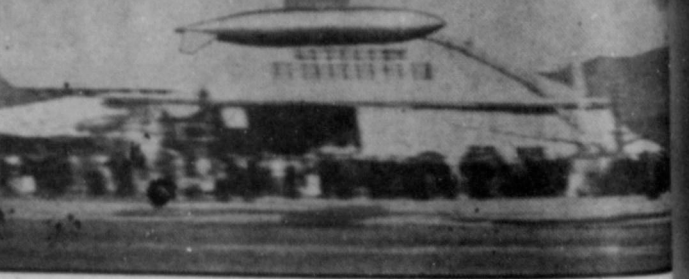
Whether they are happy about school or not, if you drive you have a responsibility to see children arrive there safely. Watch for signs like this one. Slow down as you approach, ready to stop.
