Slaton Student Wins Navy Summer Cruise At Texas Tech Science Fair

LUBBOCK—Schools on the South Plains will be producing some promising chemists, biologists and engineers in future years if the Regional Science Fair held recently at Texas Tech is an accurate indication.

A variety of displays—ranging from electronic apparatus to intricate internal surgery on white rats—were exhibited at the third annual event.

Two area high school students have been awarded trips to the National Science Fair in Hartford, Conn., next month.

Young Privett's biological entry dealt with "Parabiosis for the Study of the Pituitary-Ovary Relationship." He made Siamese twins of two large white female rats, then studied their physical reactions.

Privett, who wants to become a doctor and a medical missionary, gives much credit to Dr. John C. Locke, Slaton physician, for his inspiration and knowledge.

It is known that a number of families live here dependent upon Lubbock for their livelihood. Slaton has not had a sensational growth but it has steadily gone forward and may be depended upon to continue to do so.

Alternate senior division winners were Max Fisher of Andrews High School in physical science and Johnny Fowler of Seagraves in biological science.

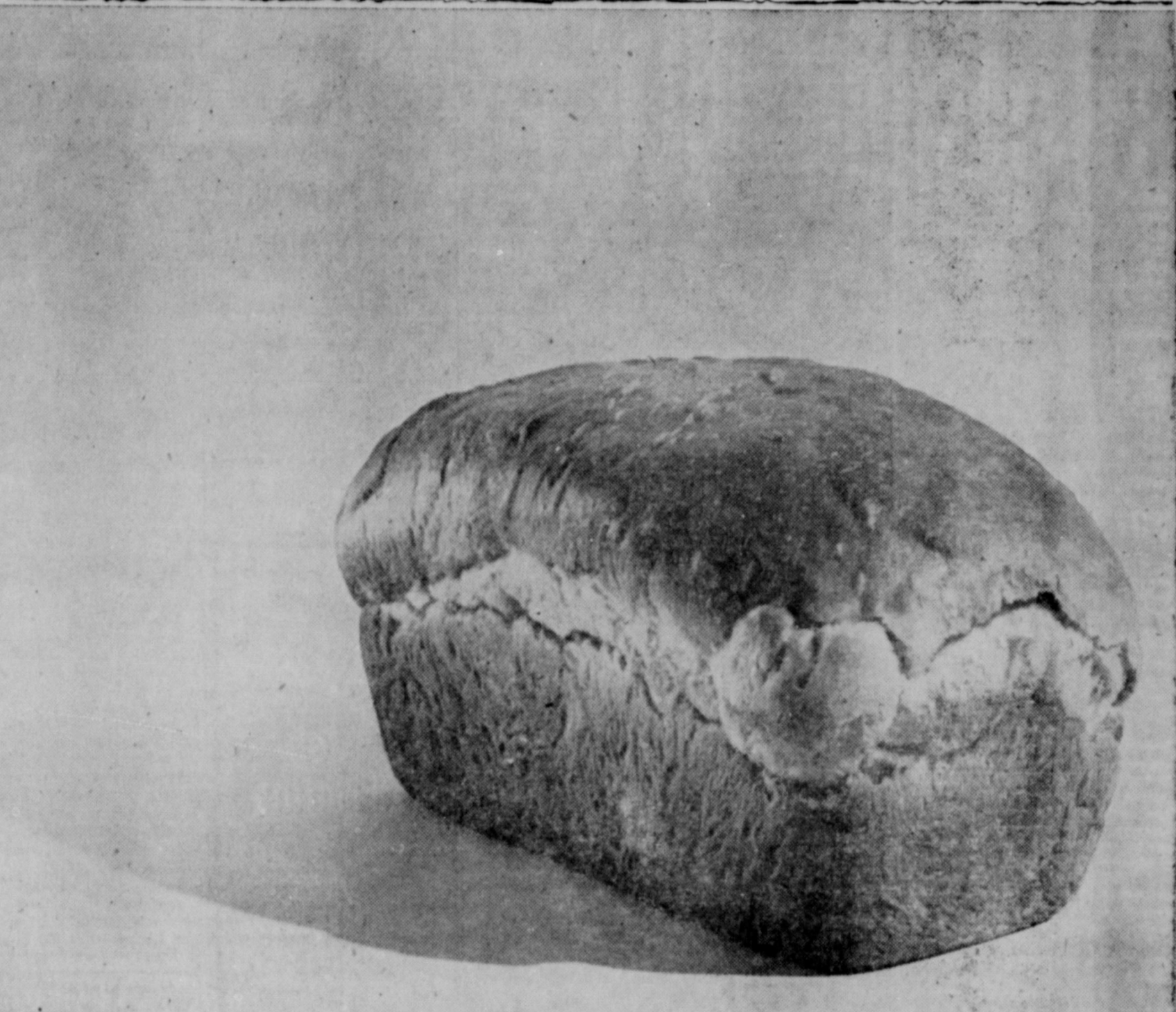


**The Life of A Christian**

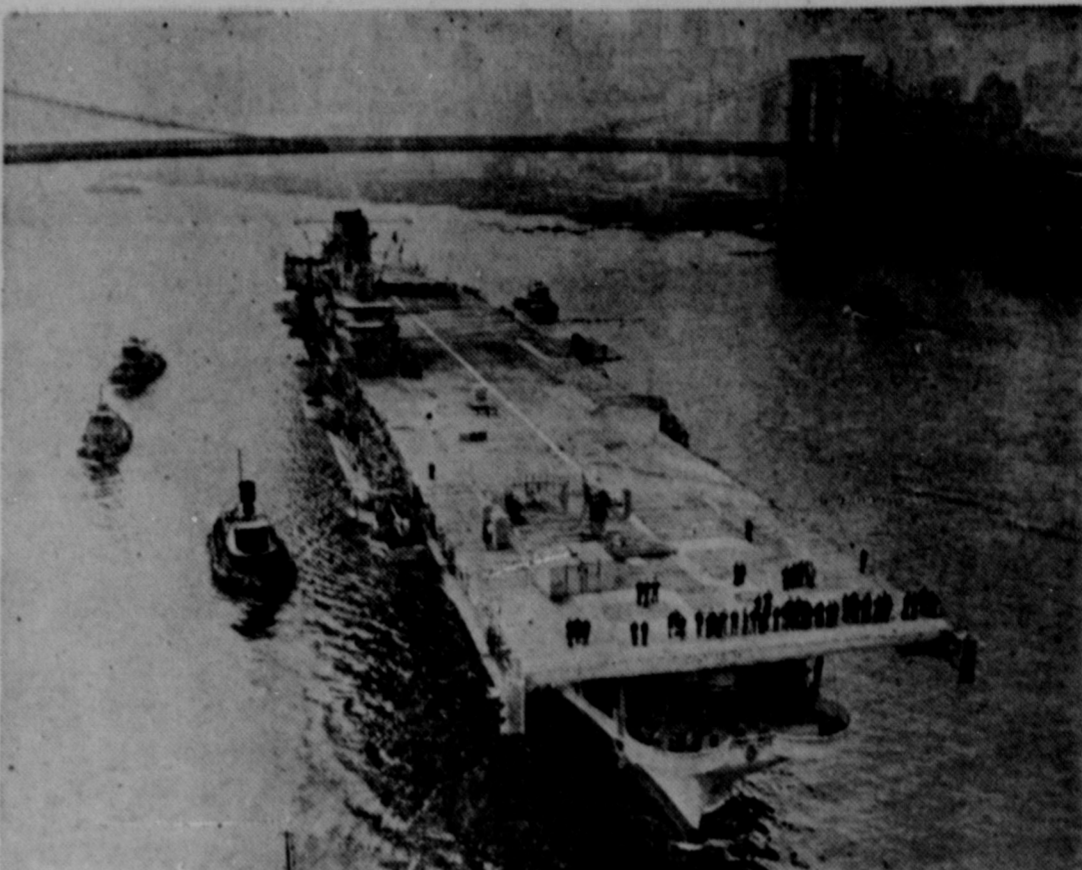

## ORDINANCE NO. 170

AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR A PERSON TO CONSUME OR POSSESS FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSUMPTION ANY ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE IN ANY PUBLIC PLACE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SLATON IN LUBBOCK COUNTY, TEXAS; DECLARING ANY SUCH ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SO POSSESSED TO BE AN ILLICIT BEVERAGE SUBJECT TO SEIZURE WITHOUT WARRANT AND PROVIDING FOR THE ARREST OF ANY PERSON VIOLATING THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE WITHOUT WARRANT; REQUIRING EVIDENCE THAT A DEFENDANT HAS CONSUMED AN ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE IN VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE ON THE DATE OF THE OFFENSE CHARGED BEFORE BEING GUILTY OF THE OFFENSE OF POSSESSING AN ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSUMING THE SAME IN A PUBLIC PLACE; PROVIDING A PENALTY; DEFINING "PUBLIC PLACE" AND "ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE" AND PROVIDING THAT THE PROOF THAT BEVERAGE IS A NAMED BEVERAGE SHALL CONSTITUTE PRIMA FACIE EVIDENCE THAT THE SAME IS AN ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SAVING CLAUSE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. BE IT ORDAINED By the City of Slaton that:

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to consume any alcoholic beverage in any public place within the Corporate Limits of the City of Slaton, Lubbock County, Texas, or for any person to possess any alcoholic beverage in any public place within the Corporate Limits of the City of Slaton, Lubbock County, Texas, for the purpose of consuming the same in such public place at any time.

(b) Any alcoholic beverage possessed in violation of this Section is declared to be an illicit beverage and may be seized without warrant to be used as evidence of a violation of law.

and any person in possession thereof or who otherwise violates any provision of this Section may be arrested without warrant.

(c) Proof that an alcoholic beverage is possessed in violation of preceding Section 1 (a) shall require evidence that the defendant has, on the date of the offense charged, consumed an alcoholic beverage in violation of said section.

(d) Any person who violates any provision of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50).

## SECTION II

The following definitions of words and terms shall apply as used in this Ordinance:

(1) "Public Place" as used herein is meant any public road, street, sidewalk, parkway, alley, store building, workshop, restaurant, cafe, public theatre, picture show, public lobby of a hotel, motel or rooming house, or any place at which people are assembled or to which people commonly resort for the purposes of business, amusement or other lawful purposes, including but not restricted to any room in a private residence where the public generally is invited for purposes of business or amusement.

(2) "Alcoholic Beverage" shall mean alcohol and any beverage containing more than one-half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) of alcohol by volume which is capable of use for beverage purposes, either alone or when diluted. Proof that the beverage is alcohol, spirits of wine, whiskey, liquor, wine, brandy, gin, rum, ale, malt liquor, Tequila, Mescal, Habanero, Barreitego, or beer shall be prima facie evidence that the same is an alcoholic beverage as herein defined.

## SECTION III

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances of the City of Slaton in conflict with this Ordinance or any part thereof are, insofar as such conflict exists, hereby repealed and this act shall prevail over any conflicting provision of any ordinance of the City of Slaton.

## SECTION IV

If any article, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Commission hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more Sections, subsections, sentences, clauses or phrases thereof are declared unconstitutional.

## SECTION V

The fact that the drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places within the Corporate Limits of the City of Slaton has caused and is causing disturbances and affrays to such an extent that the life and property of the inhabitants of the City of Slaton is threatened and the peace, order and security of the City and its inhabitants is materially and substantially affected by such drinking, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the provision of the Charter of the City of Slaton providing that no Ordinance be passed unless read and voted upon at two (2) regular meetings be suspended and this Ordinance shall be effective from and after five (5) days following the passage and publication thereof.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

**AUSTIN**—Whichever way the ball bounces, Texans can look forward to a hefty increase in state taxes for 1960-61.

House of Representatives passed a general appropriations bill calling for spending of \$332,000,000 from general revenue. Senators took a more economical approach, began their work with a bill calling for \$30,000,000 less than the House measure.

Even so, the Senate proposal would put spending some \$21,000,000 above the present level and require an estimated \$117,000,000 in new tax money.

House bill includes longevity pay raises for long-time state employees and increases in welfare checks to the aged, blind and dependent, all added during floor debate. House also accepted committee recommendations for boosts in the appropriations for higher education, state hospitals and special schools and the prison system.

**Gasoline Tax Viewed**—Gov. Price Daniel says he's ready to support a 1-cent hike in

the state gasoline tax if it will be used to improve public schools, raise teacher salaries.

Neither the House nor Senate appropriations bill included public school teacher raises. Lawmakers seemed to think this, if it were to be done, should be handled in a separate bill.

Texas still would have a lower gasoline tax than other states, said Daniel, even after the 1-cent raise. He said he felt sure service station operators would "go along" with it if it were for the purpose of better schools.

Opponents say that, with practically everyone having to use a car these days, the gasoline levy is about as "general as a sales tax can get."

**Health Chief Resigns**—Recent target of lawmakers is the State Health Department, where Commissioner Henry A. Holle stepped out of his \$16,000 a year post under the glare of legislative disapproval.

Dr. Holle said he felt the department would be better off

with another commissioner who could get more support in the way of legislative appropriations.

Meanwhile, both House and Senate launched inquiries into Health Department spending practices.

**Flexible Rating Off**—State regulation of Texas auto insurance rates apparently will continue for at least another two years.

Senate Insurance Committee refused to approve a flexible rating plan, sent it to the subcommittee "graveyard."

Backers of the bill, mostly large out-of-state companies, claimed it would save Texas auto owners millions. Careful drivers would be rewarded with lower insurance, they said.

Opponents, including most Texas companies, fought the bill, said it would "take the lid off" rates. They said a merit rating plan, being considered by the State Board of Insurance, would take care of rewarding safe drivers.

**Lending Bill Flibustered**—Senate disagreement over how to improve loan shark regulation brought on the first filibuster of the session.

Sen. Abraham Kazen of Laredo sponsored the House-passed measure which would, if approved by a vote of the people, amend the constitution. It would allow the Legislature to license lenders and set maximum interest rates. Present 10 per cent ceiling, widely ignored, would be abolished.

Sen. Frank Owen, III, of El Paso led a long-winded assault on the measure. He and other senators insisted such regulation should be limited to loans under \$500 to \$600.

Senate gave Kazen's measure preliminary approval, despite all the opposition.

**Party In-Fighting Begins**—Fifteen months ahead of convention time is not too soon for Texas Democrats to start haggling over who'll receive their presidential nominating votes.

U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson is the focal point of controversy. Recent developments:

Young Democrats of Texas, currently controlled by left-wingers, declared the senator should pay more attention to the party platform. J. Ed Connally, chairman of the state executive committee, quickly announced the Young Demos did not speak for the party. He called them "immature extremists."

Democrats of Texas, unofficial liberal organization, announced it would have a convention in Austin in May. DOT, also, has "fallen out" with Sen. Johnson.

In the Legislature, the House elections committee approved a bill that would allow Senator Johnson to run for president re-election as senator in the same general election.

**Investment Board Urged**—A bill by Sen. Hubert Hudson of Brownsville would create a new board to handle investments of three large state trust funds.

Making up the nine-member board would be the governor, attorney general, comptroller, chairmen of the two retirement systems, chairman of the State Board of Education and three bank presidents.

Investment in corporate stocks and bonds would be permitted by Hudson's measure. Altogether, the three funds total \$820,000,000.

**No Aggie Women**—U. S. Supreme Court has upheld state court rulings that women are not entitled by law to enter Texas A&M College.

A&M officials were pleased, but Bryan-Brason County citizens, for the most part, took a dim view of the enrollment restriction.

Their feelings were reflected in Bryan Sen. William T. Moore's prediction that "if the A&M Board continues its present policies, the time will come when A&M will have a classroom for each student enrolled there."

There is fear that when Arlington College, an A&M branch which admits women, advances to senior college status, it may eclipse the parent institution.

Tanner's request for assistance in deep plowing sandy cropland was approved on fifty acres. Also approved were requests for permanent pipe for Judge C. Smith for 1250 feet of 12 inch pipe; Viegil M. Ison for 1250 feet of 15 inch pipe, and 1200 feet of 12 inch pipe; Mrs. Tamsey C. Potts for 2200 feet of 12 inch pipe; Mrs. Maude Butler for 1419 feet of 12 inch pipe and Medford Weaver for 760 feet of six inch pipe.

Several requests to combine farm worksheets were approved because farm owners had purchased additional land or tenants had rented two tracts of land owned by the same person. One request to divide a farm was approved because part of the land had been sold.

The committee reviewed the performance progress report on pre-measuring cotton farms. This report shows that 321 farm operators requested that their cotton acreage be pre-measured. 158 farms have been completed at this time and the reports are in the process of measuring.

The incentive level of support for 1960 is the same as the past several years at 62 cents per pound.

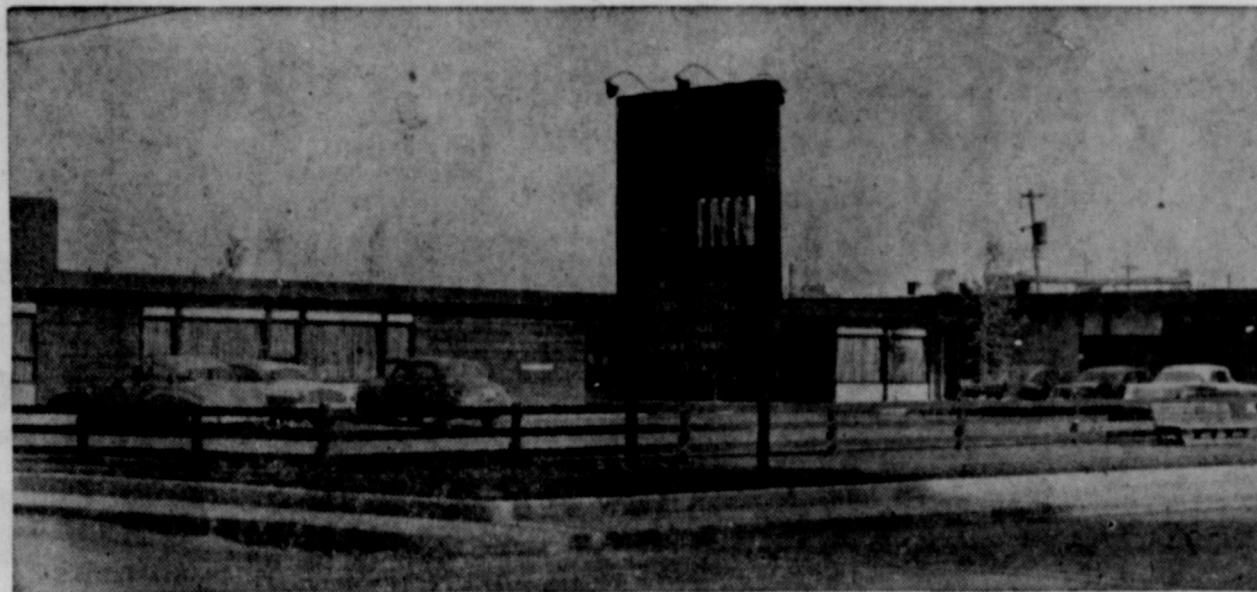
