Fifteen South Plains and West Texas towns and cities were represented by entries, besides entries made by local poultrymen. Exhibits came from Amarillo, Lubbock, Haskell, Spur, Post, Floydada, Littlefield, Sudan, Abernathy, Idalou, Wilson, Southland, Loreno, Hale Center and Shallowater.

A total of 410 fowls, including 27 turkeys, were shown. There were six rabbits in the rabbit division. In previous years, the total number of entries has never exceeded 370 birds.

The showrooms were crowded people all over this section in the matter of raising fine poultry.

The show was judged by I. L. Bandy, of Godley, an American Poultry Association official, who also judged the show here last year. Mr. Bandy stayed here for two whole days, discussing with poultrymen the practical and scientific points connected with growing poultry.





# Vote For Good Roads GET OUT OF THE MUD!

# Let's Put Lubbock County on the Map of Progress!

The people of Lubbock County will vote next Tuesday, Dec. 17, on a good roads proposition, amounting to \$991,000

# Here is Complete Information About The Road Proposition:

The election will be held next Tuesday, Dec. 17. The amount of the bond issue is \$991,000. Highways to be paved are: No. 7 from Hockley County line by Shallowater, Lubbock and Slaton, to south line of Lubbock County, total amount of county bonds for this road being \$325,000; Highway No. 9 from Lynn County line by Woodrow and Lubbock to Abernathy, total amount of county bonds for this road being \$274,000; Highway No. 53, from Crosby County line by Idalou, Lubbock and Wolffarth to Hockley County line southwest of Lubbock, total amount of county bonds for this road being \$370,500.

This makes a total of \$969,500, and the other \$21,500 of the bond issue is provided for taking up outstanding road bonds in Road District No. 1, which includes Slaton. This gives the total of \$991,000.

All of the roads to be paved are state designated highways, and with the exception of the road from Lubbock toward Brownfield, all the roads to be paved are also federal designated highways. Thus, the county will pay only one-third of the cost of paving Highway No. 7, Highway No. 9 and that portion of Highway No. 53 which lies east of Lubbock. The county would pay half of the cost of paving that portion of No. 53 from Lubbock toward Brownfield, which hits the west line of Lubbock County.

The highway leading from Lubbock direct westward toward Levelland is NOT included in this bond issue and cannot be paved by funds from this bond issue.

### What Will The Tax Rate Be?

If this bond issue carries, the tax rate for retiring the bonds can never be more than thirty cents per hundred dollars county valuation of property. In Road District No. 1, which includes Slaton, the rate cannot be raised more than fifteen cents, because the rate on outstanding bonds in this district is now fifteen cents per hundred, this making the total of thirty cents.

It is a practical certainty that the tax rate cannot average more than 25 cents per hundred dollars county valuation during the life of the bonds. In fact, as county valuations increase, the tax rate on these bonds will be decreased. The normal increase of valuations, due to constant development of the county, has been from two to three million dollars yearly for several years, and it is likely to increase even more rapidly during the next several years. As these normal increases in total county valuations grow, the tax rate will be decreased correspondingly on the proposed road bonds.

# How Much Would Taxes Be Increased on a Quarter Section of Land?

If the land is not in Road District No. 1, and taking the 30-cent tax rate as a basis for calculation, and considering the land to be assessed at \$12.00 per acre, the increase in taxes on a quarter section of land would be \$5.76 per year. If the valuation is \$10.00 per acre, the increase would be \$4.80 per year. If the valuation is \$8.00 per acre, the increase would be \$3.84 per year.

If the land is located in Road District No. 1, which includes Slaton, the increases would be just half the amount of the foregoing figures, that is, \$2.88 in the first case, \$2.40 in the second case, and \$1.92 in the third case.

For a residence located in Slaton, on which the county's assessed valuation is \$600, the increase would be ninety cents per year. If it is valued at \$800, the annual increase would be \$1.20. If it is assessed at \$1,000, the annual increase would be \$1.50. Records show that about nine-tenths of the residences in Slaton are assessed for county tax purposes at from \$600 to \$1,200 each.

### What Would Happen if Slaton Did Not Support These Bonds?

Lubbock and the rest of the county would vote bonds in Road District No. 2, cutting Slaton out.

If bonds should be voted in Road District 2, provided this issue should fail, the tax rate in that district would be 52% higher than it will be under the proposed bond issue. That is something for the people to think about who would be located in Road District No. 2.

# Who is Entitled to Vote?

Anyone having a poll tax receipt, and who owns personal or real property, whether assessed for county taxes or not. Young men and young women who have arrived at twenty-one years of age since last January 1, are allowed to vote without a poll tax receipt, if they have personal or real property, whether assessed or not.





Many owners of mongrel flocks are dard bred males of the same breed.

The resulting chicks will be known as grades. The first generation will contain 50 per cent pure blood and 50 per cent mongrel blood. Then, through the use of pure-bred males with females of increasing purity, fowls of the fifth generation will be approximately 97 per cent pure blood and 3 per cent grade blood. While I say that this method of improving an inferior flock is practical, I never advise it unless the program is to be carried through all the way.
