whose annual pay was about \$67,500. The state is supplanting railroad transportation with a very expensive system of highway transportation. The actual cost of truck transportation over the highways is more than ten times as great as the average rate collected by the railroads of the country. In the year 1929, the average rate charged by all the railroads in all commodities was 1.67 cents per ton mile. The actual cost of truck transportation conservatively estimated is about 14 cents per ton mile, and we as taxpayers are being asked to pay the difference.

The highways are being rapidly constructed by the use of trucks and buses. One section of Banks Road highway has surfaced and opened to the public only five months and has been worn out, and has had to be replaced in a new road in the amount of \$300,000. The state highway department has expended the sum of \$25,000,000 in maintaining that road, exclusive of equipment, and paid nearly three hundred million dollars in all salaries, taxes on road tax, and transportation. The highways are being rapidly constructed by the use of trucks and buses.

When the question of taxes is raised, the trucker shouts from the horse tops that he pays four cents per gallon tax on gasoline, but that tax applies to all people alike. The fact is that the common carrier trucker actually pays for his gasoline by four or five cents per gallon, than we pay, but he buys it in large quantities and hauls when we drive our cars on the highways.

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We will bring the tax account down to Calahan county, Texas, and quote figures which every body will understand. Since January 1, 1930, or for the current year, the railroads have paid into public treasuries, county and state, the sum of \$17,000,38 in ad valorem taxes. There are eleven common carrier truck lines, and five common carrier bus lines operating in Calahan county. Any one of them has paid one penny in ad valorem taxes for the log in and out of Baird. Not support of state, county, city, school, or road in the county or city.

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The highways. The Congress of the United States passed the hours of service law limiting the number of hours an employe may work. The truck driver works 24 and thirty hours without relief. There are five men in a train crew and only one person to man a truck. The person who drives a motor car on the highways must have his wife about him every second, otherwise there is disaster.

We do not ask or expect that the truck and buses shall be put off the highways, but we do demand that the competition be made fair. As tax payers we protest against our money being used to subsidize any transportation agency. The competition can be made fair, and at the same time the bus and truck can be made to pay for the highways which they destroy, by levying a ton mile tax on trucking operations and a passenger mile tax on bus operations. This tax can be applied to the county in

which they operate. By co-ordinating steam train and highway service for superior service can be rendered to the public, and great economies can be effected in the actual cost. The act of the state in taking the taxpayers' money and destroying our employment is wicked, vicious and despotic and we protest against it with all the power at our command. W. A. Fetterley, Pres. 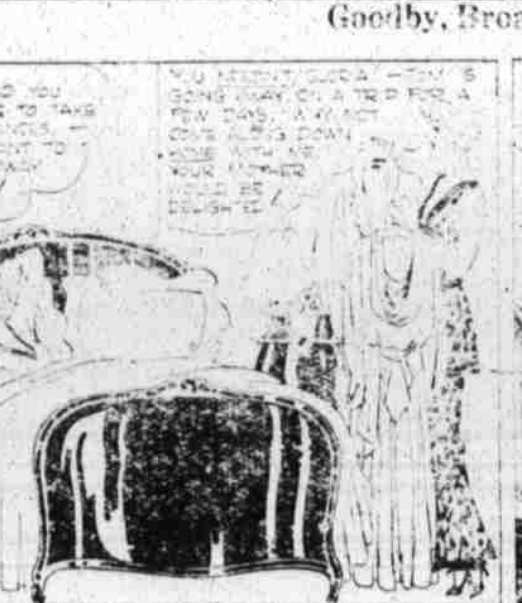

Lack of Crack Twirler and Reduction Of Schedule Has Uncle Billy Singing The Blues Over University's Chances

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 22.—(AP)—Uncle Billy Dusch, veteran baseball mentor of the University of Texas, is singing the blues. The reason for Dusch's woe is the lack of a star twirler and the recent action of Southwest conference officials in reducing the schedule to ten games instead of twenty.

Uncle Billy's Orange and White teams have ruled the conference circuit in baseball for a long time and have a valid claim to almost as many championships as the average person has fingers and toes. In fact, the Longhorns have garnered eighteen out of the last nineteen championship races and the white headed Dusch has to come to be regarded as somewhat of a wizard, especially among the opposition.

The lack of a brilliant hurler was expected to wreak havoc with the Steer diamond aggregation than the cut in the schedule. For the first time in many years, Uncle Billy will enter the season without a star moundman. In past years he has always had several good hurlers to shove into games at crucial moments, such as Ralston, Baker, Clements and Falk.

Hurler Missing

With a man in the lineup who could stand the opposing batters in their own half, most of the veteran coach's worries would be over. In fact, the reduction of the schedule will work to the advantage of a team having a pitcher who can chuck them over and leave the fans under the impression the batsman is using a stick with holes in it since most of the mound duty could be delegated to this one man.

Texas will have a pitching staff that is uniformly good with the chances about 50-50 that Texas will upset the conference flag. Uncle Billy, in times gone by, has been in just as tough spots and has always managed to pull out of the hole with a little something to spare and he may make one of his "finds" and again land his entry at the top of the heap.

One thing is certain, athletic officials said, and that is that Dusch probably will place one of the best defensive teams on the field that has never been seen in action in the conference and, in a measure, effect whatever advantage another team might hold because of stellar pitching.

Two of the best quarterbacks in Texas high school football have been in action here recently when the Tyler High School Lions met the Austin Maroons in the semi-finals of the state high school football championship.

They were "Peewee" Beard, district champion field general, and Henry Johnson, Tyler's quarter back. Johnson showed to the best advantage during the game, due mostly to the aid given him by his mate, while whatever yardage made by Beard was due to his own efforts.

Johnson, according to an unofficial vote of the scribes in the press box, was the best high school quarter seen in action in many a moon. He can make the pickin' in everything but talk. His passing is excellent and witnessed by the number of beautiful pass plays plotted against the Maroons. His punting was considered a bit more than excellent, the Tyler star having a bad habit of getting off long high kicks from close formation.

But Johnson is at his best when he is lugging the oval around the ends and this apparently is his favorite play. Two of the prettiest runs witnessed on Memorial stadium field came when the Tyler back grabbed the ball and ran 60 yards for one touchdown and then duplicated the feat a few minutes later with a 51-yard dash. He scored two more touchdowns by running the ends dizzy, but was much closer to the goal line each time.

It would have been a treat to have watched Beard and Johnson battle each other had Beard been running the same team as Johnson. As it was, Beard was a constant threat with his flashy return of punts and end runs. But he was not receiving much aid and was usually slowed down enough by the first line of defense to permit his being smothered by the second.

Another thing that handicapped Beard's play was the change in style effected by Coach Bennie Strickland for the semi-final clash. Previously Beard had been used on long, sweeping end runs, where he had a chance to use his speed and shiftness. Strickland, however, offered all plays run from close formation with the result that by the time Beard had squirmed away from the forwards he was snuffed by the Tyler backs.

Tyler Fandom Happy Over Victory

TYLER, Dec. 22. (AP)—Weary from their long celebration, but happy, Tyler football fans still were in the throes of a happy delirium today over the victory of Coach George Foltz' Lions over the Amarillo Golden Sandstorm in the final battle for the state high school title Saturday at Fort Worth.

The score, 25 to 13, ran the Lion's season record to 345 points to opponents' 63 in thirteen games played since early September. In three crucial games against Greenville, Austin and Amarillo after winning the title in their own district, the Lions ran up 96 points to the opponent's 19, leaving no doubt of their prowess under heavy fire.

Starting slowly, the Tyler eleven looked like just a fair football unit in its first four starts, being held to a tie by Mexia and nosing out Gilmer only 14 to 7. But once the Lions started clicking they overwhelmed all opposition as fast as they came to it. Texarkana, Nacodoches, Athens, Lurkin and Marshall were given decisive beatings in the district race, only Palestine being able to hold the Lions to a close score, 20 to 15. Greenville was trounced, 27 to 6, for district title, and Austin snowed under, 44 to 0, in the semi-finals.

Pasadena Open Tournament Goes Down In Golf History As Fight Of The Three Putts, Blame Ball

Tony Manero, Professional, Cops \$4,000 Placement; Golfers Head for Gold Mine in Agua Caliente, Mexico

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 22 (AP)—The \$4,000 Pasadena open golf tournament, won by New York's slender professional, Tony Manero, today was written into the annals of the ancient and royal game as the battle of the three putts.

Manero, the golfing trail led toward Agua Caliente, Mexico, where the biggest winter event on the coast, the Agua Caliente \$25,000 open, gets under way tomorrow.

Some of those who failed to collect in the 72-hole event ending yesterday blamed the "balloon ball, new to tournament play. Most of those receiving the larger cuts at the payoff declared it was only a mental complex. All agreed that the three-day contest was lost on the putting greens.

Walter Hagen, Detroit, admitted he frittered away comeback chances with frequent three-putting. Horton Smith of New York, who won the 1929 tourney over the same course, said the new lighter but larger pellet consistently refused to go down.

He was a dozen strokes higher than last year and tied with Hagen for fifth place, five behind Manero. Naturally, Tony was the leading exponent of the new ball. He had cards of 73-71-74-69 for a 287 total, but finished three points over par. Mortie Dutra, the southland's leading exponent from Long Beach, Calif., three-putted the final green and finished with 289. Herman Barron, Port Chester, N. Y. and Al Espinosa, Chicago, were third with 290 each.

New ball regardless, the treachery of the creeping bent greens had something to do with the excess putting. Charles Lacey, former British professional but now of New York, said he found difficulty in mastering western green. "I look at least 30 excess putts," he complained. He finished with a 306.

Manero's par plundering finish of 69 was duplicated by Frank Welch of Chicago, and Olin Dutra of Santa Monica, Calif. Only one other player broke perfect figures. He was W. Cox of Brooklyn.

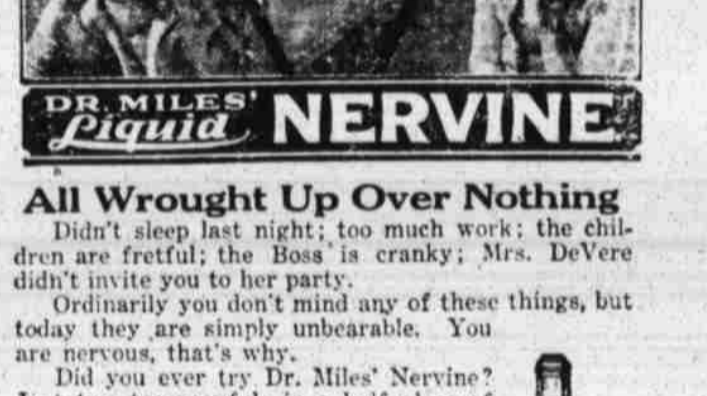

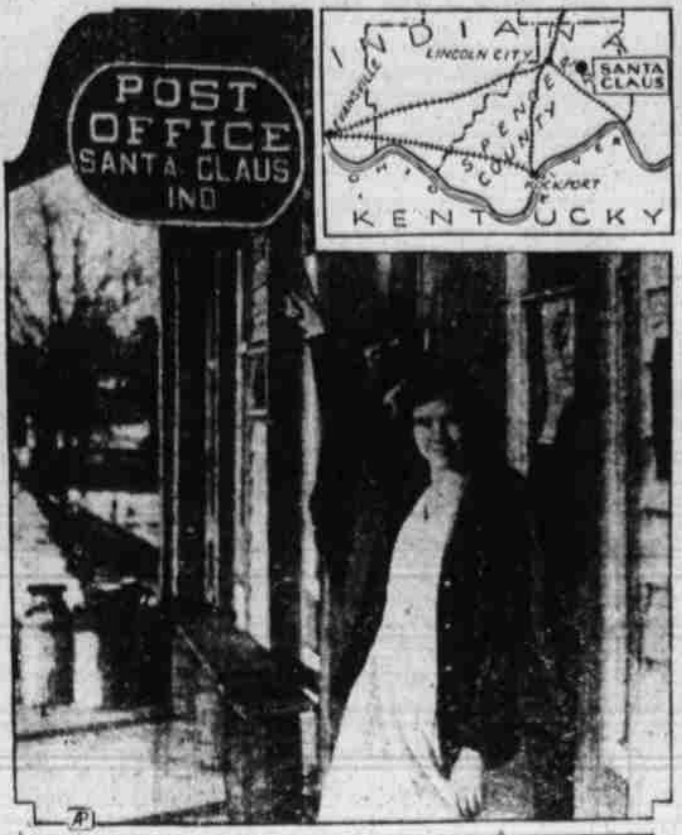
